

are definitely interested in improving and developing the best road possible for safety, for speed and for the economy of all concerned on the U. S. Highway 70 widening and straightening job in the Ruidoso valley. It seems there are two factions now pushing for two kinds of roads—and we hope they don't create such a split that our highway board will have to lay the project aside for action some years later. Our engineers are doing just as we promised in an earlier meeting here—they are studying every facet of the needs. After flying the route, as a layman—not an engineer, it looks like we might could put some parts of the new road on the south side of the Ruidoso valley, instead of the north. That of course, needs study by our engineers. We hope we get to let a contract on the first phase, the segment nearest Ruidoso, this year." He said there's lots of pressure for finishing the state road that runs from Corona to Roswell east-west across the county. He said about a dozen miles of that route is now hard surfaced, and that some 44 miles of unpaved road remain—which will be handled over a long range program at about ten to 12 miles per segment. Also visiting over the week-end with George McCornell of the Dell Valley Review of Dell City, Tex., McConnell told us interest is growing in trying to get the road from Dell City to Pinon, in the Sacramento mountain range. Improved. "There's a 30-mile stretch in there that would funnel a lot of new traffic into Ruidoso, because it comes on into Cloudcroft, and it's no problem to get to Ruidoso from Cloudcroft." HEAVY SHOWERS END LONG DRY SEASON

Thirty range lands, orchards and forests in Lincoln County have received the first heavy showers of the usual July rains, beginning July 4 in this area. In Ruidoso, a total of 3.20 inches has been recorded by Weatherman C. A. Culver July 4 through 10. Rainfall has been heavier in the mountains, but foothills and ranches have also benefited from good showers. The moisture came at a critical time, with the Forest Service having posted "Extreme Fire Danger" signs in all of the area since mid-June. Culver had reported the ban on campfires and smoking on roads other than paved routes levied by the Forest Service late in June has now been lifted with the wet weather that has prevailed. BANK DEPOSITS HIT ALL TIME HIGH

Deposits in Ruidoso State Bank reached an all-time high Monday of this week, Ed Wimberly, vice-president and cashier said. Deposits were at \$6,369,112.43 on Monday, with assets at close to \$7 million—standing at \$6,930,112.48, he said. The deposits are about \$1 million more than at the same time last year. "Each Monday this summer has seen a new high figure for deposits," he reported, "and we are expecting to pass the \$7 million figure sometime this month." Reflecting the solid economic base of the Ruidoso area is the total deposits in savings accounts here, which have passed 2 1/2 million, Wimberly said.

ONE LIFE CLAIMED IN TRUCK CRASH

An El Paso man, Pascual A. Ramirez, 51, died instantly, and two other men were critically injured in a grinding crash of two large trucks on U. S. Highway 70 three-quarters of a mile west of Hondo Wednesday afternoon at 2:30. State Policeman Jerry Wood of Riverside, the first officer to reach the scene, said Ramirez, described as a relief driver and who was a passenger in a Peyton Packing Co. truck driven by Tommy Cruz, also of El Paso, died in the crash. His injuries included a crushed head and chest. Extent of Cruz's injuries had not been fully determined when the News went to press, but hospital workers here said he was in critical condition. The third man hurt was Eugene Laverne Severson of LaMirada, Calif. He is believed to have received a fractured neck in the crash. He is also in the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley hospital. Both men were reported early Thursday as having spent a "restful" night. Severson was driving a rig for Jetter & Eaves & Co. of California, and his load included government cargo. He was enroute east. The Peyton truck was headed west, and was reported to be hauling meat to Ruidoso. State Policeman Jerry Wood said he had not been able to determine whose fault the wreck was, that the vehicles collided at a high speed on a curve just west of Hondo. Both cabs were headed west after the impact, with the California truck's trailer blocking traffic a half mile across the road. Other state police county and precinct officers joined Wood at the scene to assist in clearing the heavily traveled highway. The traffic was delayed for about two hours. An inquest for the crash victim was held at Mason Funeral Home here last Wednesday, called by Justice of the Peace H. M. Graham. The jury, composed of Joe Hawkins, coroner; Clavis O. Perry, Walter G. Mooker, J. P. Matthews, Bill Pappas and R. S. (Dick) Fox, returned a verdict of death by accident after reviewing the tragedy with officers who had checked the wreck.

TWO HOSPITAL BOARD MEMBERS OFFER RESIGNATIONS

Two longtime members of the board of directors of the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital have offered their resignations. Chairman W. A. Hart during a meeting Monday night tendered his verbal resignation, stating he no longer could work with the board in view of disagreements on management problems. Prior to stating he was resigning, he reported that he had been told "an hour before this meeting" by L. L. Butler that he would resign, also. The resignations must be tendered to the County Board of Trustees who shall appoint two successors, and it was reported that the resignations were accepted. Toward the end of the meeting, when W. A. Hart departed, Kiet Bonnell, another member with a long time tenure, sat in as chairman pro tem, and said he would entertain a motion to accept the resignation of Hart. Robert McDaniel made the motion, "accepting with regret," and it was seconded by the only other board member present, Jesse Perrett, then passed. Hart's resignation climaxed a discussion on management problems, which Hart described in vivid terms as far below the standards that should be expected. Others on the board were quick to defend the present manager, George Owens, by stating they felt he was capable and had turned in a good record on collections. Hart contended collections are not as good on delinquent accounts as previous managers had obtained, yet Owens said that collections during the 1961-62 fiscal year averaged 94.2% and during the 1962-63 year just ended 93.9% had been collected. Owens further stated gross business increase in 1962-63 totaled \$42,788 as compared with an increase of only \$17,736 during the previous fiscal year over 1960-61. Hart had said in a previous meeting he thought the manager was lax in buying, and had made some purchases without the board's knowledge, but no testimony was heard


Bob Pearson Has Been Realtor Here Since 1957

The Peace Corps, believe it or not, is probably one of the most popular innovations of the New Frontier—receiving acclaim generally from both parties in the country. The only fly in the ointment is the cost of the thing. The figures on expenditures for the Peace Corps show that it costs more than \$100,000 to train, equip and place an individual in the program. The Peace Corps is a magnified version of what our churches have done missionary wise for many years—and they (the churches) dollarwise, have done a mighty job at a cost of pennies.

Someone Suggests That . . .

When the telephone rang in our office the other day, on the other end of the line was one of our faithful subscribers and readers who started off "You are a pretty good crusader, and at which point we denied the compliment, or allegation, at least, pointing out we haven't had much luck with any of our campaigns in recent years through the columns of this paper. After our interruption, she continued, "but you can tell the folks about some wrongs that are occurring here. We have a number of women who work in Ruidoso at various jobs, and many of them are not receiving their legal rate of pay under the National Labor Act. They are underpaid. And, another law that is being broken is that some women, who sleep on the premises, or who are given meals as a part of their salary, are having only deductions from their checks for social security for the amount of money paid them—and the rooms and meals are not being counted as part of the pay for which reimbursements must be sent the Social Security fund." She said the last omission is costing some of the women money later on when they reach the age of retirement and their social security checks (also known as old age benefit) are not as much as they should be.

Well, there's not much crusading for us to do on this other than point out the oversight (deliberate or otherwise), and remind the wronged parties that they DO have recourse by law to have such oversights corrected. Our Federal agencies handling these matters will get the employer to obey the law if such infractions are brought to their attention. And, there are still penalties involved, too.





Game Department Tells of Planting Trout in Area

This is the time of the year when many New Mexicans and tourists criss-cross our state looking for a place to rest, relax, and enjoy themselves. Many of these vacationers head for our recreation areas to fish. Ralph G. Little, Fisheries Biologist for the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish stationed at Roswell, has prepared the following information for vacationing fishermen.

Trout waters in southeastern New Mexico are limited, but the Department of Game and Fish stocks these waters which are suitable. A question which often arises is how does the Department determine the number and pounds of trout to stock

in a body of water whether it be lake or stream. A formula has been devised for this. Factors which influence the trout plantings are surface acreage, fishing pressure and water suitability. These three factors govern the number of pounds each body of water receives over a definite period of time. This period could be several months or it could be for an entire year. When the

County Commissioners See Architects' First Proposal For New Court House

Lincoln County Commissioners this week viewed the first sketches of a proposed new courthouse, to include remodeling of the annex with two new structures to be built around an open court.

Submitted by Voll & Buffington, Roswell architectural firm, the commissioners were reportedly well pleased with the ideas incorporated in the plan. "There will likely be some minor changes in the proposal, but the county officials seemed to like the overall design very much," Paul Payton of the Lincoln County News told the Ruidoso newspaper.

Sketches of the proposed new court house are to be prepared for distribution and display around the county for residents to study, and it is hoped that an election can be called in October for bonds to start construction a short time later. The commissioners will outline the county's financial capacity for the bond issue sometime between now and then for county property owners to study.

As proposed, the building improve-

stocking schedule for the entire state is considered, the fish produced by the state's five trout hatcheries are divided among all lakes and streams receiving fish.

Trout waters in southeastern New Mexico are those located on the Lincoln National Forest and are as follows: Bonito Lake, Nogal Lake, Ruidoso River, Penasco River, Tularosa River, Eagle Creek and the South Fork of Bonito Creek.

At the present time Bonito Lake is a municipal water supply for Alamogordo and the Holloman Air Force Base. In the summer it is also used as a recreational area. A question which is often asked is how can Alamogordo charge for fishing in Bonito Lake if it is stocked by the Department of Game and Fish. The Attorney General has ruled that

Bonito Lake is a public water. The fee is levied for clean up and to maintain sanitary facilities.

Bonito Lake was rehabilitated on March 11, 1961, because of excessive numbers of rough fish. All of the fish in the lake were removed and it was restocked with trout. With the rough fish population removed, competition is eliminated and trout grow faster and bigger.

Before the rehabilitation fishing at Bonito Lake was considered fair. The 1963 records show that fishing in the lake during the early part of

the season was excellent. This can be attributed to the fact that Bonito Lake had been closed for nine months. A lake of this type is usually exceptionally good during the opening days. Most of the fish caught on the first weekend in Lake Bonito was open ranged from 14 to 20 inches in length. Although the catch rate was high during the early part of the season the success at the present time is still average and compares favorably with other parts of New Mexico. Recently surveys were conducted

ed on Nogal Lake and the Ruidoso River. Rainbow trout in Nogal ranged from 8 to 18 inches in length and weighed from one-fourth pound to one pound, 14 ounces. A large population of brown trout was present in the Ruidoso River. They ranged up to 17 1/8 inches in length and up to one pound, 15 ounces in weight. During the last fiscal year catchable-size trout were planted in the following waters: Bonito Lake, 14,

033 fish or 4,634 pounds; Nogal Lake, 12,227 fish or 3,630 pounds; Ruidoso River, 7,347 fish or 2,310 pounds; Tularosa River, 5,153 fish or 1,530 pounds; Penasco River, 5,663 fish or 1,695 pounds. In addition to these catchable-size trout, 10,304 fingerling trout were put in Bonito Lake, 10,304 fingerling trout were put in Nogal Lake, and 12,840 brown fry were put in the lower Ruidoso River.

All waters open year 'round are stocked periodically when suitable water conditions exist. There are seven plantings of catchable-size trout made in Bonito Lake during the summer months. The season for all Southeast Area trout waters, with the exception of Bonito Lake, is open from June 1, 1963 through September 2, 1963.



27,700 Acres of Ft. Stanton Land Earmarked For Range Studies

Lincoln County State Representative W. G. (Bill) Shreengost of Lincoln this week received a letter from Dr. Bill Leyendecker of New Mexico State University at University Park near Las Cruces in which he stated he had signed a work agreement as a representative of the college, with the Bureau of Land Management to conduct livestock and range management research on 27,700 acres of the Ft. Stanton range in Lincoln County, effective April 1, 1963.

The agreement will be signed each year hereafter on July 1, the letter said.

At present he stated the college is unable to take possession or initiate the research program since funds are not available. He said he was hopeful the state legislature will provide funds by July 1, 1964 to implement this work.

In the meantime he reported the State Department of Fish and Game as well as the college will be conducting surveys to become familiar with the range so that no time will be lost if funds become available.

Rep. Shreengost said both he and Lincoln County's State Senator, Joe Skeen, were pledged to work for appropriations for the work, and hoped Lincoln county citizens gave the two legislators support in their campaign to secure such moneys.

Shreengost further stated the Fort Stanton Range is an ideal location—since it represents an average New Mexico range—and this project should prove of inestimable value to the county.

He said the area on which the state's only tubercular hospital is situated will not be affected by the college's agricultural experiment work.

A. E. Beavers Gets Contracts On Area Jobs

A. E. Beavers Construction Co. has been low bidder on three projects in the area lately, including one job for the State Highway department to provide chips for resurfacing State Road 37 in the Alto area, which figures about \$6,000, an \$18,000 project for Alamogordo schools in resurfacing tennis courts and playground area around schools there with asphalt, and a \$13,000 project of asphaltizing the grounds around the new Community Public Service Co. warehouse in Ruidoso Downs. The job will also include building a retaining wall along part of the property, Beavers said.

\$129,700 Ruidoso Open QH Futurity Trials Slated Friday; 89 Entrants Carded

The gold rush will be on again Friday when the Ruidoso Downs turns its starting gate over to the quarter horses for nine important trials leading up to the richest all-time Ruidoso Open Futurity—a fantastic gross purse of \$129,700.

When Ruidoso Secretary Jimmy West was virtually stamped under an avalanche of 89 paid-up eligibles, a summit conference among officials and horsemen decreed that there would be nine "go for broke" qualifying trials, eight with 10 starters each and the other with nine.

Since only the 12 fastest individualy-timed finishers among the entire lot will qualify for the "Fort Knox" finale a week from Sunday, July 21, Friday's all-out trials—the best classification system horse racing could desire—should produce some hair-raising straightaway action, going as the first nine races on a 12-race card.

Headed by the one-two finishers in the recent \$81,800 Kansas Futurity—Mr. Tinky Bar and Manor High—the Open Trials will bring out such other untested but highly-regarded 2-year-olds as Ford Harris Bar Fare, a galloping winner here Sunday; K. M. Chaffin's Missile Queen, a 10-race winner here; Clarence Schaubauer, Jr.'s Dynago Man, Dee Garrett's Vansaria Too, W. L. Miers' Star Pippin, Emmett Harrison, Jr. and Son's Three In One Oil, George Aldoff's Spotlight Bars, Lester Goodson's Eagle Bar Man, Howell Lewis' Skip Straw, C. R. French, Jr.'s Drue Rita, Louis Pierce, Jr.'s Three Leo, and Phil Hanson's Red Alert.

Seeking to make amends for their performances as beaten favorites in the Kansas Futurity will be Vern Fools' Chaundell and Bruce's Gal, along with such others as Tinky Bar's dust as Miss Balfish, Chinzane, Dora June, That's Our Boy and Mr. Spears.

Figuring to stir up the most commotion of the nine trials will be the fourth and seventh. The fourth will be a "tag team" rematch of four Kansas speedsters, Mr. Tinky Bar, Chaundell, Dora June and Mr. Spears, while the seventh matches Miss Balfish, pride of the King Ranch of Florida, against Bruce's Gal, Market K. Bar, Bullbar, and the highly-regarded Eagle's Bar Man.

Likely post-time favorites in the other divisions are Bar Face and Tonto Barzone in the first; Missile Queen and Question's Goldie in the second; Vansaria Too and Sun Fly in the third; Three In One Oil, That's Our Boy, Star Ada and Dynago Man in the fifth; Manor High, Spotlight Bars and Chinzane in the sixth; Skip Straw, Miss Croton Oil, and Music Note in the eighth; and Three Leo, Drue Rita, Red Alert and Nela Charge in the ninth.

The importance of Friday's Trials

can best be described by the fact that the 89 royally-bred juveniles will be running for considerably more than the usual overnight purses.

At stake will be 12 starting positions in the grand finale and a shot at such lucrative slices of purse money as \$58,850 to the winner, \$25,894 for second, \$31,186 to third, \$11,770 to fourth and minor awards tapering off from \$3,500 for fifth to \$700.00 each to the last three finishers. A special \$1,500 award also will go to the breeder of the winner.

First post Friday again will be 1:30 p.m., with the usual daily double play on the first two races and quiniela wagering on the fifth and 12th races.

Another richly-deserved tribute will be paid here Sunday to the memory of one of the most colorful figures in Ruidoso Downs' history when a field of 10 Derby-conscious 3-year-olds goes postward in the six-furlong Joe Reilly Memorial.

Leading the charge in the weekend feature honoring the late "Mr. Jockey Club" will be H. & H. Stable's Diamond Lodge, a three-time stakes winner at Sunland Park that wasn't too far off victorious Scorchum in the Sunland Derby last April.

Diamond Lodge gets in with a feathery 110-pound impost for this and will be ridden by the leddy D. W. Whitted in her first important stride toward the running of the \$25,000, estimated Ruidoso Derby here Sunday, August 25.

Also in with 110 pounds is Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Boyle's Miller's Folly, due to be ridden by Benny Roller. The one they may find tough to handle in the stretch, however, in all probability could be A. B. Green's Better Eye, a stout-finisher under 113 and Elbert Minchey.

Actual high weight of the field is A. M. 



(The Selective Service draft has been extended for four years, until July 1, 1967. This means that the young men of the country must continue to expect to serve in the military forces. This series of articles outlines the basic responsibilities and rights of young men under the draft law.)

The Military Obligation
At age 17, a young man (with his parents' consent) may choose among a wide variety of ways to begin the discharge of his current active duty and reserve military obligation. He may enlist in the regular forces for 3 to 6 years. He may enter a number of reserve or National Guard programs. He may volunteer, with parental consent, for induction for two years.

Even after he registers for the draft at age 18, he has ahead of him at the present time five or more years in which to choose his own time and method of discharging the military obligation. As he gains more education, these opportunities widen to include various military programs leading toward a commission.

But if he does not make his own choice, at around age 23 he may expect induction if he is qualified and not deferred or exempt. And even though he may not be qualified, or is deferred or exempt when his normal turn to serve comes, he may still be put in Class I-A if at any time up to his 35th birthday he loses the deferment or exemption, or the cause of his disqualification is removed.

If he should be reclassified into Class I-A after he would normally be inducted and before age 26, he would probably be the oldest man available in his local board and, if qualified, would be the first to be called.

Because of the need for manpower in the Armed Forces, about six out of ten men who become 26 in 1962 had entered service voluntarily or by induction. Those who had not were almost all disqualified men. A few were those who were continuously deferred or exempt through age 26.

Government manpower experts estimate that well over half of all men who reach age 26 through the next four years will be required to enter service to maintain active and reserve strengths. Disqualification and deferment and exemption will account for the remainder.



Part of the wool, the lamb and the ewe incentive programs are carried on separate books. The incentive payment on any one acre of wool is \$1.00 and \$1.00 per head of lamb incentive, but it may be \$1.00 if you do not get a lamb incentive payment, check and see if your payment on this item is under \$3.00. For instance, you must have sold over \$33.00 worth of wool in one year to get a payment on the \$3.00 incentive.

Dr. John T. Bryans also reported that "we're continually on the lookout for new types of virus and respiratory diseases."




