



NOGAL MESA RANCHERS CAMP MEET UNDERWAY

The Nogal Mesa Ranchmen's Camp Meeting opened Wednesday, July 17. Tuesday afternoon Tom Myers of Albuquerque, manager of Ranchmen's Camp Meetings in the Southwest, and a cadre of helpers were busy at the camp site preparing for the four day meeting which ends Sunday, July 21.

Myers said that they were preparing to feed about 600 Wednesday but that if it ran over that or even twice as many everyone would be fed.

Dr. Glen Harris of Birmingham, Mich., and the Rev. Robert Hooks of Levelland, Tex., will be two of the principal speakers who will be in attendance throughout the Camp Meeting. Myers said. Joe Evans, veteran West Texas cattleman and one of the originators of many cowboy camp meetings will not be able to attend the Nogal meeting this year, Myers said.

SOUTHERN UNION MAKES OFFER TO BRING NATURAL GAS HERE

The Southern Union Gas Co. of El Paso presented a proposal to the Ruidoso Village Trustees at its regular meeting Thursday, July 11, relative to the bringing of natural gas to Ruidoso.

With the mayor and all trustees present, Trustee Lloyd L. Davis, Jr., made a motion that the proposal of the Southern Union Gas Co. be accepted subject to a form franchise which will be acted upon by the council at a later date and dependent on all legal requirements being satisfactorily handled and negotiated by the parties concerned.

The motion was seconded by trustee Jodie Pileman, with all trustees voting "aye."

The Southern Union proposal was as follows: "Having completed a comprehensive survey and study of Ruidoso and the surrounding area, we feel that the future growth of this area makes it possible that we propose to you the bringing of natural gas to Ruidoso, by constructing the necessary transmission line and complete distribution system without cost to the Village of Ruidoso. In addition, we will pay the General Fund of the Village of Ruidoso 2 per cent of our gross receipts from the sale of natural gas in Ruidoso, except sales to Public Authority and Industrial. Our proposed rates are as follows, per monthly billing:

First 1,000 cu. ft. (minimum bill) at \$1.75. Next 9,000 cu. ft. at 98 per 1,000 cu. ft. Next 10,000 cu. ft. at 80 per 1,000 cu. ft. All over 20,000 cu. ft., at 75 per 1,000 cu. ft.

"This would be a General Service Rate applicable to all classes of customers. There will be a \$5 connect charge for our customers, which is provided in all rules and regulations throughout the State of New Mexico."

"This proposal is contingent upon our receiving appropriate approval by the New Mexico Public Service Commission and our securing franchise in the incorporated, unincorporated and county areas that are involved."

The proposal was presented to the Trustees by E. M. Kelley, vice-president of Southern Union Gas Co., who stated further that Southern Union is presently serving 77 cities, towns and communities in four states, with more than 260,000 customers.

"We have all of the necessary facilities and the trained personnel to bring to Ruidoso the fine gas service possible by any comparison," he said.

Joseph S. Hawkins, owner of Ruidoso Gas Co. and a local LP gas dealership, told the News he has been negotiating with Southern Union Gas Co. for several weeks on the company's acquiring his franchise on his city line service serving a large number of customers on and adjacent to Sudderth Drive.

Neater Dressed Students Is Schol Board's Goal

Ruidoso school board in its meeting last Thursday evening gave approval to Superintendent Tom W. Barrow's suggestion that a school policy concerning student's dress be drawn up to encourage neater dress with more decorum.

According to the positive board members said it was a lift to morale to have a student body neatly dressed. Proposed to be outlawed in the new dress code will be blue jeans for boys and girls, "especially the type of blue jeans that are so tight they look like they are sprayed on," as Supt. Barrow stated.

All other members of the board were in agreement that on inclement, showy cold days it would probably be best for girls to wear slacks—but not too tight. The rule would be followed in both junior high and senior high school grades—from the seventh through the 12th, it was reported.

"Many, many schools throughout the nation have already established such policies of requiring students to wear neater attire—outlawing blue jeans for both boys and girls," one of the board members said. Supt. Barrow said that blue jeans are not an essential item of clothing and that skirts and slacks for girls, and slacks or pants for young men were in about the same price range.

The new code will be available for students to read, and adhere to, on the opening of the 1963-64 school term, Supt. Barrow said. The policy will be approved by the board before put into effect.

Ben Turner Offers Show Of Paintings in Ruidoso

Ben Turner, a native New Mexican artist who enjoys one of the largest followings of any living artist, opened a one man show at the Chaparral Hotel last Saturday.

Turner's paintings are owned by many Southwesterners. Over fifty banks and 1,200 homes and offices throughout the U. S. A. display his southwestern scenes of mountains, aspens, still life, and portraits, his agent, W. V. Turner, stated. He is a realist noted for his brilliant colors and light and shadow effects.

Turner started his professional career in 1929 as a cartoonist and worked for a time with the nationally known comic strip "Jerry and Jake." In 1931 he began working in oil and has worked in that medium since.

Turner studied at the Chicago Art Institute, the University of New Mexico and in Taos under Victor Higgins and Joseph Henry Sharp.

Turner now maintains a home and studio in Redstone, Colo., and Magatlan, Mexico. His brother, W. V. Turner is his agent and representative in Albuquerque.

The Ben Turner exhibit at the Chaparral Hotel will run through the month of July. W. V. Turner stated.

Village Accepts Engineer Report On Annexation

The Paradise Canyon request for annexation was noted as approved at the Thursday, July 11, meeting of the Ruidoso Village Trustees. Village engineer, Quinton Daniel, presented a survey showing that 51 per cent of the acreage ownership had signed the petition requesting annexation.

Daniel was also authorized to make an up-to-date survey on the distribution needs of the entire village water supply system. This survey of the distribution system would include fluorination, dual filter plant, storage facilities and life protection needs.

The New Mexico Bankers Association Group I, composed of bank officials from the Southwestern part of New Mexico ended their convention in Ruidoso Saturday night with a banquet and election of officers at the Chaparral Hotel.

The new officers elected for the 1963-64 year were: Dave Pearson, chairman, Silver City; Victor Bonaguidi, vice-chairman, Las Cruces; and Ed Wimberly, secretary-treasurer, Ruidoso.

Wimberly estimated that more than 100 attended the final meeting of the group.

Three Men Face Liquor Charges

The Alcohol Tax Division of the Department of the Treasury raided two places in the area of Ruidoso Downs Sunday night. Clifton Dean Negro, was arraigned to the District Court in Carrizozo under \$2,500 bond, on a charge of selling liquor without a license.

Two other Negroes, Lanny White and Amos Scott, were arraigned before John Joe Wilkinson of Alamogordo on a charge of having no alcohol tax stamps, where bond was set for each at \$1,000. They posted the bond and the two men were released.

Lanny White was reported to be the operator of a cafe in Ruidoso Downs and the house of H. M. Craig, and where the illegal beverages were allegedly sold. The other house raided Sunday night was across the Ruidoso River and was reported by the officers to be rental property belonging to E. E. (Brother) Miller, mayor of Ruidoso Downs.

Craig told the News late Tuesday that he knew nothing of a raid on the house he was reportedly the owner of.

SCHOOL BOARD WEIGHS NEED FOR ADDITIONAL CLASS ROOMS

Ruidoso Municipal School board is weighing the problem of adding additional class rooms in time for use for the 1963-64 school term. Coping with the problem of having more students than there are classrooms for youngsters in the lower grades, one proposal has been advanced that would provide six classrooms to be erected in a steel building on the campus of Nob Hill school. With six classrooms at that school, the board then would decide on a change in arrangement of grades. In the past grades one through four have attended classes at Nob Hill, grades five through eight have attended classes in the elementary building, and grades nine through 12 have attended classes in the high school. With six additional rooms at Nob Hill, it is proposed that grades five and six be moved from the elementary school to Nob Hill, and that grade nine be moved from the high school to the elementary—to give the latter school a junior high status, serving the seventh, eighth and ninth.

All of these matters are to be determined this week-end by the board because of pressure of time in getting the steel building erected and open in time for the opening of school Aug. 26.

In the board's regular meeting Thursday night last week, a motion was made by Mrs. Joyce Quatrough, member, and seconded by Mrs. Jack Hitchens, to build a steel building with six classrooms on Nob Hill campus. "It they could be built for \$35,000 or less." The motion was not acted upon—pending arrangements to have salesmen from companies selling such type structures to call here and present cost proposals to the board. On Wednesday the week salesmen for two such companies toured the campus and then met with the board in an informal meeting at 4 p.m. The meeting lasted more than three hours. The two salesmen presenting proposals were John Melton, sales engineer for Dura Bill Products Co. of Albuquerque, and Cliff Keeth, representing Hunt Building Mats of El Paso.

Melton told the group his company could erect a steel building, in a variety of shapes, and at a variety of costs, ranging from a shell structure of \$300 per square foot to \$100 per square foot—the cost depending on what types materials were wanted in the building. "We can build it in any shape, and finish it in any style you want," he desired.

After the salesmen had completed their talks with the board—and had answered some questions asked by visitors, the board and Supt. Tom W. Barrow then were asked a number of questions on school policy regarding the change in grades from one school to another as proposed.

Speaking for the board, Mrs. Gerold Tully, president, said, "The board members attended a school board member conference in Albuquerque several months ago in which we were told that as board members, we were not educators, that we must leave decisions on education up to our superintendent and principals, and should support their recommendations."


Financing of the additional classrooms can be done from money available in the local school's emergency fund, which Barrow had reported would be from \$40,000 to \$60,000 this year, and also that the building cost would be approved by state officials as an emergency need and that there would be no requirement to call for bids. Under lease-purchase, the school would pay up to 50% of the cost of the building; the first year, then make payments each year for five years on the balance. A carrying charge of 10% to 10 1/2% would be added to the building cost one salesman said. Another salesman said his firm required only 6% after 50% of the cost had been paid the first year.

What problems might arise from changes in schedules for high school students, band members, science students, and in physical education programs, lunchroom schedules, and other matters was the subject of considerable discussion for the balance of the meeting. There were nine visitors on hand, all of whom asked questions in regard to the changes in the school. There were some pointed questions asked, and some sharp answers given during the first part of the question and answer period. Supt. Barrow assured all questioners that a high school schedule could be, and would be, arranged so that no student would miss required courses. He said physical education programs, band programs, the lunchroom schedule and other phases of school life that might be affected by the change in grades to other schools would be worked out. At one point he declared principals of the schools and the band director had been advised of the proposed change when asked by one of the visitors.

Before the special meeting adjourned Wednesday evening this week, four board members present voted to buy a six-classroom steel structure from Dura Bill Products Co. of Albuquerque, specifications to be determined in a later session with company officials on materials to be used, size, etc. Voting for the project were Ralph Bonnell, Mmes. Tully, Quatrough and Hitchens. Dr. W. D. Horton, board member who had objected to a six-room building, stating he thought less classrooms could solve the crowded condition, was not present for the voting, but declared before leaving the meeting that he wanted to be put on record as opposing the 6-room project.

He said holidays would be announced later for the school year, and that plans are to wind up the term by May 22 next year, "in case we have no days lost from inclement weather," he added.

Work is underway of repainting a number of classrooms in the high school, repairing roofs on some of the school buildings, and cleaning up the grounds in readiness for opening day, Barrow reported.

Among new equipment voted for the new term by the board was the purchase of 30 new desks for the commercial department, to have desk tops that can be raised or lowered by students in the typing classes, to cost \$1,000. Don't Blind Yourself!

The New Mexico Optometric Association has warned against the impending solar eclipse on July 20 with the naked eye. The eclipse will be full or partial, depending upon the viewer's location. From Alaska to Maine, the eclipse will be total. A partial one occurs over the rest of the nation.

Observers should not use telescopes, binoculars, sunglasses or other type of glasses to see the eclipse, the optometric association advised. The use of neutral density filters or the construction of a simple viewing aid was suggested.

Permanent retinal damage and blindness have been reported in the past. In 1959, 170 Australians suffered partial or total blindness after watching an eclipse for a few seconds. In 1960, blindness was reported in 21 cases in Utah.

Unfortunately, there is no immediate hint of danger. First signs of damage to the eye may come several hours or a day after the exposure. It causes a change in the shape of objects and a blurred person sees with a reddish tinge.

If you want to view the eclipse, it is suggested the use of a viewing device which avoids the harmful infra red rays. It can be made by punching a clean hole with a pin through a piece of card.

The viewer should turn his back to the sun, hold the punched card over one shoulder and let the sun rays come through the hole onto another piece of white cardboard. The sun's image is reflected on the white cardboard with no danger to the eyes.

It was emphasized that no attempt should be made to view the eclipse through the pinhole itself. It simply intensifies the damage.

News Items From Ruidoso News Issue of July 10, 1948.

Announcement was made here this week by Fred Carson, president of the Hollywood Racing Association, that an extension had been granted by the New Mexico State Racing Commission headed by W. E. Knott, Jr., to include three more week-ends of quarter horse racing.

The new Hondo High School building being constructed by R. W. West, Roswell contractor, is progressing nicely. The building is being constructed of lava blocks and plans and specifications call for completion by Sept. 1st.

An article in this issue of the News about the Ft. Stanton Cave, was reprinted from an old publication, the "Capitan Progress", issue of March 1, 1901. This article told of the exploration of the cave by W. H. Tuttle of El Paso and several companions on Aug. 15, 1898. Tuttle and party explored about four miles of the cave. Entrance to this cave is located on the south side of the Bonito River, less than one mile from the Ft. Stanton Hospital.



This revolution of desegregation is simply the seeking of the rights guaranteed by our national constitution, and the underlying principles of our constitution, the Christian Gospel and ethics: "Ye are all one in Christ Jesus." The whole Christian Gospel and even humanism works under the banner of "The brotherhood of man under the fatherhood of God."

And yet what is our attitude and action toward those of other races? So many times we don't even accept them as human beings. We speak of working a "nigger" or "mexican" like they were mules. We in no sense accept them as brothers in love. But the tragic thing to me is that every time one speaks of racial equality, someone throws up the problem of intermarriage. Intermarriage is strictly a secondary issue that may or may not develop out of sociological conditions, but the basic rights of liberty (to vote, live in an area, eat in a restaurant and buy clothes in a store) and pursuit of happiness (attend a movie, go swimming, etc.) are of primary concern. There is no particular desire on the part of the colored races to eat by you in a restaurant, sit by you on a bus, or go swimming with you, but they do not want to be told they can't! They demand the rights of equality though sociologically they will seek their own. If there has been any pushing across the color lines sociologically it has been from the white to the colored. This I think is best illustrated by a situation in an Atlanta hotel lobby. Two Southern "gentlemen" were discussing the racial crisis while a Negro porter was cleaning the ashtrays in the lobby. One of the white men came forth after some discussion in a strong voice to say, "I don't want my daughter marrying no nigger." At this the Negro straightened, looked him in the eye and said, "Pardon me sir, but I must correct you on that statement. You mean you do not want us to marry your white daughter, we have been marrying your daughters for the past 100 years."

But again let me say, this is not the issue. The colored races simply want the rights and privileges that are theirs whether they ever use them or not. It is in this context that I say the church, we everyday Christians, must lead the way in opening our hearts, and the doors of our institutions to receive our colored brethren. There must be a lot of forgiving and compassionate understanding if this revolution is completed in any sense of peace and without drastic bloodshed. "A new commandment, Give I unto you, that ye love one another."

Any person who at age 18 is not required to register, must, however, register when his status changes.

Failure to register, like failure to comply with other provisions of the law, may subject men to prosecution, or to induction out of turn and ahead of other men.

After he registers, each man is required by law to keep his local board informed of any change in his address, or any change in his personal situation which might affect his liability to serve.

Dear Vic,

I was coming by to see you last trip up but did not have time after bogging down in plane trying to reach my hangar. Then I got in my car which was in hangar, and it was stuck in hangar so I was delayed.

I was going to talk to you about airport situation there. Of course, I would like to see Ralph stay on as he ran field when there was not much business and should be given a lot of consideration, although I do not know what he wishes to do. I do know that we run from 75 to 400 operations per day and revenue from gas will not even pay the overhead, let alone pay off any bond. This field has 550 acres and it is all in farm except runways, taxiways and ramps. It takes all revenue from farm and aviation services to pay only the overhead on field and this does not include salaries of tower operators as they are paid by the Federal Government.

The draft has been extended for four years, until July 1, 1967. This means that the young men of the country must continue to expect to serve in the military forces. This series of articles outline the basic responsibilities and rights of young men under the draft law.

Registration

Generally, every man is required to register under the draft law within five days after his 18th birthday. He may register at any local board office, but he should be certain to give his home address, for that will determine the local board which will always have his records and which will deal with his case.

If a man is on active duty with the Armed Forces on his 18th birthday, he need not register at that time. Men on active duty must register within 30 days after they leave the service.







ORDINANCE NO. 142
AN ORDINANCE CREATING AND PROVIDING FOR THE MAINTENANCE AND DISPOSITION OF A SPECIAL STREET IMPROVEMENT FUND, TO BE DESIGNATED "SPECIAL STREET IMPROVEMENT FUND NO. 2," FOR THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO, AS AUTHORIZED BY CHAPTER 14, ARTICLE 46, NEW MEXICO STATUTES ANNOTATED, 1953, AND LAWS AMENDATORY THEREOF AND SUPPLEMENTAL THERETO; PRESCRIBING CERTAIN DETAILS IN CONNECTION THEREWITH AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the Village of Ruidoso levies a tax of one cent per gallon on gasoline and motor fuel sold within the Village of Ruidoso pursuant to the provisions of its ordinance No. 81, passed, adopted, signed and approved the 27th day of May, 1954; and

WHEREAS, the Village has heretofore, pursuant to Ordinance No. 120, passed, adopted, signed and approved the 16th day of December, 1961, issued its Street Improvement District No. 60-1, Street Improvement Bonds, Series December 1, 1961, in the aggregate principal amount of \$310,500.00 of which there are now outstanding bonds in the aggregate principal amount of \$235,000.00, to defray in part the cost of grading, graveling, macadamizing, paving, draining, and otherwise improving certain streets in said Village, which bonds under the provisions of said ordinance were made payable out of special assessments and were additionally secured by a portion of the proceeds of said tax on gasoline and motor fuel; and

WHEREAS, from said tax proceeds, pursuant to Ordinance No. 120, passed, adopted, signed and approved the 16th day of December, 1961 and with the prior approval of the State Board of Finance, there are required to be deposited for

not to exceed eleven years, into Special Street Improvement Fund No. 60-1 certain additional amounts, fixed by said Ordinance No. 128, which are irrevocably pledged as additional security, for not to exceed eleven years, for the payment of principal of and interest on, and for the immediate repurchase and prior redemption of, said Street Improvement District No. 60-1, Street Improvement Bonds; and

WHEREAS, except for said Special Street Improvement Fund No. 60-1, the Village of Ruidoso has never heretofore pledged any portion of the proceeds derived from said gasoline and motor fuel tax, except as herein provided, with the result that the proceeds derived therefrom may be lawfully and irrevocably pledged as hereinafter provided;

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso, in the County of Lincoln and State of New Mexico, has made and adopted on the 8th day of November, 1962, a provisional order for the grading, graveling, paving, macadamizing, draining, and otherwise improving (including curbing and guttering where so specifically designated) of certain streets and their intersections, in the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, said improvements having sometimes been designated as "Street Improvement District No. 2," and by Ordinance No. 137, passed, adopted, signed and approved on the 25th day of April, 1963, has levied assessments against the property specially benefited by said improvements, all such improvements being made and such assessments levied in accordance with the statutes of the State of New Mexico providing therefor; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees has determined, and does hereby determine, to issue its street improvement bonds pursuant to the contract dated the 9th day of July, 1962, which the Village has entered into with Stern Brothers & Co., Albuquerque, New Mexico, and associates; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Village that bonds for said Ruidoso, New Mexico, Street Improvement District No. 2 be secured by a pledge of said gasoline and motor fuel tax moneys while said bonds are outstanding but not to exceed the maximum period of eleven years as authorized by Chapter 14, Article 46, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953, and laws amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto, the lien of said bonds on said gasoline and motor fuel tax moneys to subordinate to the lien of said outstanding bonds;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, LINCOLN COUNTY, NEW MEXICO:

Section 1 That Special Street Improvement Fund No. 2 (sometimes referred to herein as the "Fund") as authorized by Section 14-46-7, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953, and laws amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto, be, and the same hereby is declared to be, created on the first day of June, 1963.

Section 2 That, beginning on the said first day of June, 1963, and continuing until the Village's special assessment, negotiable, coupon bonds designated as "Ruidoso Street Improvement District No. 2, Street Improvement Bonds, Series June 1, 1963," (sometimes referred to herein as the "bonds") both principal and interest, are redeemed in full, or until such time as there is accumulated in said fund a sum equal to twenty per cent (20%) of the bonds then outstanding therein referred to as the "minimum reserve," which ever occurs earlier, there shall be placed in and credited to said fund but after the sum or sums which are required to be deposited annually into Street Improvement Fund No. 60-1 by said Ordinance No. 128) annual sums totaling at least two per cent (2%) of the bonds then outstanding from the receipts of municipal taxes levied and collected by the Village of Ruidoso from the sale of gasoline and motor fuel, as aforesaid. The aforesaid annual deposits shall be made at semiannual intervals. After the said minimum reserve is reached, said fund shall at all times be maintained at a sum representing twenty per cent (20%) of the bonds then outstanding. Said bonds shall be paid promptly as the same become due and at least one-tenth of the original principal amount of said bonds will be redeemed annually (as set out in Section 4 of this ordinance), firstly, from special assessments, and secondly, to the extent necessary, from that portion of said receipts in said

fund. If at any designated semi-annual interval the full amount stipulated above is not deposited into said Special Street Improvement Fund No. 2, then the difference in the amount actually deposited and the amount stipulated shall be paid into the Fund at the next semi-annual deposit date from the first receipts of said taxes, subject to the other deposits required to be made first.

Section 3 That for the period of eleven years from the said first day of June, 1963, all of the proceeds in said Special Street Improvement Fund No. 2 are hereby exclusively and irrevocably pledged and shall be used solely as additional security for the full and prompt payment of the interest on and principal of said bonds, as the same become due, and for their repurchase and prior redemption, as hereinafter provided.

Section 4 That, except as said sums are needed to prevent any delinquency in the payment of said interest and principal, as the same become due, for said eleven-year period, said Special Street Improvement Fund No. 2 and all of the proceeds therein are hereby irrevocably pledged and shall be used to the extent necessary for the immediate repurchase and prior redemption of said bonds by the Village, so that the Village shall repurchase and redeem successively on or before the second, semi-annual, bond interest payment date next following the date of said bonds and on or before the same month and day in each of the succeeding years, in addition to all accrued interest, in regular monthly order, the designated portion of the then outstanding principal amount of the bonds, as nearly as practicable consistent with the denomination thereof, as follows:

fitly, to the extent available with the special assessments levied and collected in connection with the property in said Ruidoso, New Mexico, Street Improvement District No. 2, and, secondly, to the extent necessary with moneys in said Special Street Improvement Fund No. 2, but not with moneys derived from any other source.

Section 5 That except for the prior and superior lien and pledge created by said Ordinance No. 128, the moneys herein required to be placed in said fund from the proceeds of said gasoline and motor fuel tax shall constitute and hereby are irrevocably pledged as a first and prior lien on all of said proceeds, but there shall be created no lien or liens on said proceeds on a parity with the lien hereby created; and

the sums pledged hereby which exceed the aggregate principal and interest requirements of said bonds then outstanding, both accrued and not accrued, to maturity, upon obtaining the written approval of the Department of Finance and Administration of the State of New Mexico of such withdrawal.

Section 9 That so long as any of the bonds issued for Ruidoso, New Mexico, Street Improvement District No. 2 are outstanding, the Village of Ruidoso will not reduce said gasoline and motor fuel tax nor in any manner divert moneys collected therefrom, the sums hereinabove provided.

Section 10 That all disbursements made pursuant to the obligations created herein and by the contract created and formalized by this ordinance shall be made solely from special assessments, or said Special Street Improvement Fund No. 2, or both, and from no other source, and said obligations shall not be considered or held to be general obligations of the Village, and the contracting parties may not look to any general or other fund for the performance of such obligations, except as herein provided.

Section 11 That after the principal of and interest on said bonds have been paid in full, said fund shall be maintained as a revolving fund in the financing of street improvement projects within said Village; provided, however, that the Village may thereafter terminate said fund and place the moneys therein in its general fund, or use such moneys in any lawful manner.

Section 12 That any holder of any one or more of said bonds or any of the coupons representing interest thereon, may either at law or in equity, by suit, action, mandamus or other appropriate proceedings in any court of competent jurisdiction, protect the lien and pledge created by this ordinance on any of the revenues of said fund, and may by suit, action, mandamus or other appropriate proceedings or proceedings, enforce and compel the performance of any duty imposed upon said Village by the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 13 That the Village of Ruidoso through its duly authorized officials, shall promptly collect said gasoline and motor fuel tax monthly. The portion of the moneys so credited to said fund shall constitute a trust fund and shall be deposited pending their use for the redemption or repurchase of bonds, in a bank in New Mexico qualified to accept trust funds under the laws governing the acceptance of trust funds.

Section 14 That the officers of the Village of Ruidoso be, and they hereby are, authorized and directed to take all action necessary or appropriate to effectuate the provisions of this ordinance.

Section 15 That after said bonds for Street Improvement District No. 2 have been issued, this ordinance shall be irrevocable until said bonds, both principal and interest, shall be fully paid, satisfied and discharged.

Section 16 That this ordinance may be amended or supplemented by an ordinance or ordinances adopted by the Board of Trustees in accordance with the laws of the State of New Mexico, and without the receipt by the Village, of any additional consideration, with the written consent of the holders of seventy-five per centum (75%) of the Village's bonds designated "Ruidoso, New Mexico, Street Improvement District No. 2, Street Improvement Bonds, Series June 1, 1963, and outstanding at the time of the adoption of such amendatory or supplemental ordinance; provided, however, that no such ordinance shall have the effect of permitting:

(a) An extension of the period of

(b) Reduction in the amount herein required to be placed in said fund; or

(c) The creation of a lien upon or a pledge of revenues in said fund, ranking prior to the lien or pledge created by this ordinance; or

(d) A reduction of the principal amount of bonds required for consent to such amendatory or supplemental ordinance or ordinances.

Section 17 That if any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this ordinance shall for any reason be held to be invalid or unenforceable, the invalidity or unenforceability of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this ordinance.

Section 18 That all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent therewith are hereby repealed to the extent of such inconsistency. This repealer shall not be construed to revive any ordinance or part of any ordinance heretofore repealed.

Section 19 That because of the fact the Village does not now have adequate streets, this ordinance is necessary for the preservation of the public health, peace and safety of the inhabitants of the Village of Ruidoso, Lincoln County, New Mexico, and that this ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure on the ground of urgent public need; and therefore, immediately upon its final passage by a three-fourths majority of all members of the Board of Trustees, shall be recorded in the book of ordinances of said Village kept for that purpose, authenticated by the signatures of the Mayor and Village Clerk, shall be published in the Ruidoso News, a legal newspaper published and of general circulation in said Village, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect five days after publication.

PASSED, ADOPTED, SIGNED AND APPROVED this 11th day of July, 1963.

that nothing herein contained shall be so construed as to prevent said Village from creating a lien on said tax proceeds, inferior and subordinate to the lien hereby created. Section 6 That nothing herein contained shall be so construed as to prevent said Village from creating a lien on said tax proceeds inferior and subordinate to the lien hereby created, nor to prevent the Village from using said tax proceeds for any lawful purpose, after making the required payments provided by said Ordinance No. 128, and by this ordinance, from the first moneys available therefrom from said tax proceeds.

Section 7 That for all disbursements made pursuant to the obligations created by this ordinance, the Village of Ruidoso shall be subordinated for the benefit of said Special Street Improvement Fund No. 2 to all the rights and remedies of the holder of said bonds. All of said bonds so repurchased and redeemed prior to their scheduled maturity date with moneys from said fund shall be held by the Treasurer of said Village in lieu of the cash expended therefor; and when collection is made for said special assessments, principal, interest, and any penalties, and after said bonds, both principal and interest have been redeemed in full, the receipts from said assessments shall be credited back to said Special Street Improvement Fund No. 2.

Section 8 That while any of said bonds are outstanding, the moneys placed in said fund shall not be withdrawn from said fund, and shall not be used in any other manner for any purpose, except as herein provided; and it shall be unlawful during said time so to withdraw, or cause to be so withdrawn, any of the proceeds of said fund for any purpose, except as herein provided; however, that the Village may withdraw from said fund any moneys of



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


