

The society is at present being operated with funds received through donations and from membership fees which is \$5 per year, but this is not enough to operate the animal shelter and to pay the salary of the animal caretaker, who has not yet been paid any salary at all for the several months work since the society was organized. Several members of the Humane Society appeared before the Ruidoso Village Council last week to urge the city for some financial help to operate the shelter, but were told that the city would have to consult its attorney to find out what the legal aspects were. This week members of the Humane Society met with Mayor E. E. "Brother" Miller of Ruidoso Downs to find out what, if any, help could be obtained from the Village of Ruidoso. Mayor Miller stated that he would take it up with the Village of Ruidoso Downs Council and that he was sure that village would be able to help the Humane Society.

Kingsbury Pitcher Buys Santa Fe Ski Basin

Kingsbury Pitcher, who helped complete installation and open up the fabulous Sierra Blanca winter and summer resort in White Mountain Park here three years ago, and who served as public relations director this last season, here, has purchased the Santa Fe Ski Basin from the Sierra Blanca Co.

Pitcher had been general manager of the Sierra Blanca Co., and formerly was connected with the Aspen, Colo. Ski Area, also owned by Robert O. Anderson of Roswell.

Anderson said recently that he was negotiating with the Apache tribe on the sale of the Sierra Blanca Ski Area near Ruidoso.

Pitcher said he plans to increase the capacity of the Santa Fe area's present chair lift and to add a new 1300-foot vertical poma lift.

Pitcher will assume operation of the basin Sept. 1.

The Santa Fe area was purchased only a few years ago by Sierra Blanca, a division of Hondo Oil and Gas Co., of Roswell. Robert O. Anderson is president of Hondo, whose merger with Atlantic Refining Co., was recently announced.

Balloon Launched At Airport

Ruidoso's new airport was the site early Tuesday of a balloon launching by Holloman Air Force Base personnel.

A huge plastic bag lifted from the airport at about dawn and soon floated to the northwest. By the time most of Ruidoso had awakened Tuesday morning, the balloon had drifted out of sight. At a higher altitude, with a wind change, the balloon changed directions to drift southwest over Holloman and White Sands range, where it was to be brought down during the day. It carried an instrument package to measure and record weather data.

Ruidoso Municipal Airport Manager Lowell Morgan said about 25 men were in charge of the balloon launch. They brought seven vehicles here from HAFB, two of them large van trucks. The lift-off was without incident, Morgan stated. This is the third time in recent months a balloon launch has originated at the local port.

In charge of the balloon launch was Herbert Markland, who Morgan said he knew as a lieutenant, but who might be a major now.

BIG FRUIT HARVEST UNDERWAY IN COUNTY'S THREE VALLEYS

Preparations for the big harvest were underway this week up and down the three valleys in Lincoln County. Fruit stands were opening along Highways 70 and 80 in the Ruidoso, Hondo and Bonito areas and more were in the process of opening as the fruit season began to swing into high gear.

McTeigue's fruit stand at Hondo was well stocked this week with crab apples, plums and red delicious and golden delicious apples, as well as farm fresh vegetables that are now in season. Fred McTeigue stated that he and his son farm about 60 acres of fruit and vegetables and that the season this year was very good.

Mayme Perry stated that she estimated that most of her 2,000 trees would produce about ten bushels to the tree; however, most other estimates were higher.

The John Montes orchards which were hit by hail early in the season, were not as badly damaged as thought, and will produce a good crop, Dan Storm reported.

Wilbur Coe stated that he was bringing in a number of Braceros to help in the harvest and that many of the fruit growers were also bringing in the Mexican laborers. He estimated that approximately 100 laborers of this type would be used in the valley this year. He said he found the Mexicans very good farm workers.

Jim Tully stated that he has a new type hoist ordered for picking apples and pears, which he and his brother, Gerald, will use for the first time this year. He expects delivery on the new type hoist within a week and will use it first for harvesting pears.



Barrow stated that many of the class rooms were overcrowded last year and with an estimated increase this year of approximately 100 more students the classes would have in some cases more than 50 students, which is not good, he said.

"We are trying to improve, and nothing will be done to handicap or hurt anyone," Barrow said. He also pointed out that last year in the seventh grade there were 90 students divided into two sections, which meant 45 students to the room, he said. Many of the other grades had almost that many. Barrow stated that for proper instruction the number of students per class should be 30 to 35 at the most.

Barrow said that Ruidoso's school population had shown a steady increase in the past and that he thought there were good indications that the school population here might double within the next five years. "We need to plan ahead now," he said.

What Price Progress?
My family and I have been coming to Ruidoso since we moved to West Texas in 1949, and we have watched Ruidoso change from a small mountain town to a town that looks like any town in West Texas unless you look at the skyline. Sudderth Drive used to be a beautiful drive, and the business houses tucked between the trees were picturesque.

Why can't the people in Ruidoso use a little imagination? The wider streets and modern conveniences are, I suppose, a necessity for this day and age, but with a little bit of thought you could have kept your trees. There used to be a beautiful tree where the starting circle is above the post office. Why couldn't the tree have been left in the center? When we drive down the main street now, we feel that we are still at home. We have to go up into the canyons to get the mountain effect we have always loved.

There used to be a beautiful place called Carter's, I believe, that we walked through and were shown the flowers and trees native to this part of the country. We had a warm spot in our heart for that place, and when we came up this week we were sick. In Lubbock at the big shopping center on 60th Street, they planted trees. Here the trees were there and have been cut down. I hope the few that are still standing will be curbed around and left for people to park around.

When will Ruidosians wake up and realize that if they make their town look like every other town, they have lost what makes us "Texan" industry. In another resolution adopted, the broadcasters recommended that the FCC "take a new look at purposes and objectives" of the administration of the broadcasting industry.

A third resolution urged the FCC to discontinue its scrutiny of the broadcasting industry's presentation of racing results.

Kevin Sweeney, Los Angeles station owner and past executive-director of the Radio Advertising Bureau, was the principal speaker at the Friday afternoon business session. "Our basic problem is obtaining our share of the advertising dollar," he said.

The broadcasters decided to hold the April, 1964, state convention in Albuquerque.

Inspection Fee To Be Charged New Water Users



25-Year Dream Realized With Opening of Trout Farm

Bert Pfingsten, chairman of the Board of Supervisors of the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District, and C. R. McConnell, ex-GAME agency man, are partners in the Spring Ranch Trout Farm at Hondo.

It is a commercial enterprise, but Pfingsten says, "I don't know whether or not we'll make any money—this is a dream I've had for 25 years."

Spring Ranch is true to its name. One of the best springs in Lincoln County sends out a steady stream of approximately 450 gallons per minute of fresh water which is piped through a chain of ponds inhabited by rainbow trout in all stages of growth. The spring water temperature remains at a constant 58 degrees year 'round which is ideal for trout production.

Trout eggs are shipped in by air express from Soap Lake, Wash. These are carefully incubated and as the fish grow they are shifted from one pond to another until they reach the largest pond where the public fishes for the 10 to 14 inches.

The annual production of trout is around 40,000. The feed is not cheap and is one of the major costs in producing trout. The trout are fed small amounts several times a day rather than one large feeding; they seem to grow faster that way. Trout grow at a rate of approximately 1 inch per month.

Mr. Pfingsten is quick to point out that there are problems involved in trout farming. It seems that trout are susceptible to about as many diseases as a man himself. Then there is the problem of keeping ponds from "mossing up", fungus and algae problems.

However, so far these problems have been kept under control at the Spring Ranch Trout Farm. You can go to this fishing place and catch all you want for a very reasonable fee using any kind of bait you choose. It doesn't take long either because the Pfingsten-McConnell fish are a wee bit on the hungry side—they bite right now.

Business has been good so far.











Estimate One Million Acres Invaded By Cholla, Pinon, Juniper; Testing of Controls Is Underway

There is an estimated 1,000,000 acres of land invaded by Cholla Cactus; 500,000 acres invaded by Pinon-Juniper; 200,000 acres invaded with Mesquite and Creosote in Lincoln County, soil conservation officials say. Indications are that this acreage is increasing at a rate of one percent or more per year. In an effort to stop this invasion and reclaim brush invaded land, the Carrizozo and Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation Districts, in cooperation with the Soil Conservation Service and Dupont De Nemours & Co., are installing trial plots to demonstrate different methods of control.

In July of this year, four trial plots are to be treated. A Mesquite or Creosote plot will be set up on the Kelly Stephenson Ranch south of Carrizozo. A Juniper control plot will be set up on the "Preacher" Dobbs Ranch east of Carrizozo. A Pinon-Juniper control plot will be treated on the Carroll Neely Ranch south-west of Capitán and a Cholla Cactus control plot on the Bill Edgar Ranch north of Capitán. The E. I. Du Pont De Nemours & Co., Inc., is furnishing a supply of Fenupon "Dybar" pellets for these trials.

Experimental data indicates that when applied at the correct time and dosage, an 80 to 90 percent root kill can be expected. Ranchers and farmers interested in brush control can get information from their local Soil Conservation Service offices in Carrizozo and Capitán.

Mechanical treatment is necessary when the stand of brush is too thick for economical or effective chemical treatment; for instance, a me-

quite sand, dune area or a solid stand of Cholla Cactus.




