

'No Comment,' Says R. O. Anderson On Sale of Ski Resort to Apaches

Robert O. Anderson, developer of Sierra Blanca Recreation area, fast growing winter and summer resort here in White Mountain Park opened only two seasons ago, told a Ruidoso News reporter Tuesday this week he had no comment in reply to a question as to whether or not the Mesquero Apache Tribal Council had purchased the resort area. It was reported that he had set a deadline of Sept. 1 for the council to act on his offer of selling it to them. He told the News that he might have a statement "next week."

The News query was prompted by reports in newspapers of the state last week-end that the Apaches might not buy the property—the reports emanating from Anderson in Roswell. Bearing out the possibility that the Apaches might not buy the resort was the report that work has begun on a new ski-rental building in White Mountain Park near the famed six-spired lodge. It will be ready for use by the opening of the 1963-64 ski season, it was anticipated.

Below is reprinted, in full, the report appearing in the Roswell Daily Record last week-end concerning the statements from Anderson:


A municipally owned natural gas system for the Village of Ruidoso was proposed in a motion passed by the board of trustees in its regular meeting Thursday night last week. The proposed system, based on the recommendation of a feasibility report prepared by Engineer Carlos Powell, could cost from \$1,400,000 to \$1,500,000, it was estimated.

In pursuit of such a project, a motion the board had passed on July 11 accepting a proposal by Southern Union Gas Co., was rescinded. Attending the meeting and representing Southern Union Gas Co., which has systems in several New Mexico towns and cities, was E. M. Kelly, vice-president of the firm from El Paso. He recalled that the motion of July 11 gave his company the right to install a natural gas system, with a proviso that a small city LP gas line installed and operated here by Joseph S. Hawkins of Ruidoso Gas Co., in the mid-town area, be acquired by Southern Union. He said he and owner Hawkins had been unable to reach agreement on a price for Hawkins' facilities. He said he had offered the local operator \$50,000 which "was more than it cost to install." Hawkins said the system was worth more than that and he could not sell it for that price. Kelly said he had offered that his company pay for an appraisal by an independent firm to determine a setting price. This was refused by Hawkins.

The village trustees heard the motion to install a municipal system shortly after the report from Kelly and Hawkins that they were not in agreement, but the motion was tabled for a brief time. Lloyd Davis, Jr., made the motion, seconded by Jodie Filleman. A motion to table Davis' proposal was made by Bill McCarty with Trustee Filleman and Ben Donathan voting aye with McCarty. Davis voted no. After considerable discussion, the motion was brought back before the city group with an amendment, and was passed unanimously.

Davis' amended motion read, "I move that the motion made at the regular meeting of the Board of Trustees on the 11th day of July, 1963 relative to the granting of a natural gas franchise to Southern Union Gas Co. be rescinded and that any and all matters relative to a franchise operation of a natural gas system for the Village of Ruidoso be dropped from further consideration; AND that the City Attorney, Clerk-Manager, the Consulting Engineer and investment bankers be authorized and directed to take the necessary steps incidental to the effects."

"Assets of the ski area are estimated at \$2½ million. The ski facility has four ski lifts, including a gondola lift to Look Out Peak, just below Old Baldy in the White Mountains. (Continued to Page 5)

DEPOSITS REACH \$6,857,000

Deposits in Ruidoso State Bank reached a staggering new high Tuesday this week—amounting to approximately \$6,857,000. Ed Wimbler, vice-president and cashier reported he said a record number of checks, about 6,500, were cleared through the local bank on the same day. This is approximately \$600,000 more than at the same period in 1962, he added.





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

It would take most of the week to get caught up on sleep and rest and get ready for another jaunt beginning the next Friday evening.

VILLAGE GAS SYSTEM — (Continued from Page 1) tabll rment of a natural gas utility for the Village of Ruidoso, together with the transmission facilities to the Village of Ruidoso, and if possible, transmission facilities in conjunction with the Village of Capitan; AND that the various officials mentioned are to be instructed to consolidate the present water and sewer facilities and the various bond issues into one utility fund with the end in view to extending the present water and sewer facilities in areas not now served.

Mention was made during the evening's discussion that along with servicing a wide area of the village with natural gas, facilities for water and sewer customers in several subdivisions were needed to be installed. Powell, in speaking before the trustees, urged that whatever profits could be made from such a system be retained by the village for its expansion needs in many fields, rather than let a private company come in to "make 66 percent profit for its stockholders." He cited several municipal systems that were making profits for their communities. Trustee Davis had quoted from a series of letters the village had received from city officials in various New Mexico communities, about half served by Southern Union Gas Co. and about half by municipal systems. All the municipal systems reported making a profit on their gas operations. Some of the letters were critical of Southern Union Gas Co. service where it had a franchise. Those letters were all from city officials - where municipal and Southern Union were serving respectively. Powell said in his remarks that his feasibility report showed 263 customers now on Hawkins' Ruidoso pipeline system, and that there were 2,400 butane customers served from tanks in the area by several LP gas dealers. He said his company's study recommended a natural gas system could operate at a profit - and that he recommended that any private natural gas company could seek a franchise here - that Southern Union Gas Co. should not be the only one asked to submit a proposal.

Following Powell's remarks, Dave Fowler, representing the village's financial situation, showing it would be needing additional revenue very shortly for considerable expansion and that profits from a municipal gas system could provide some assistance for these needs. Kelly again spoke, pointing out his company had the "know how, and was qualified and experienced in engineering, installation and operation of trouble-free systems." He declared gas rates were set by the Public Service Commission, thus giving the village residents the most reasonable rates possible. Powell had said Southern Union could charge what it could prove to the commission it needed in revenue - and the charges were subject to change - and sometimes were changed always upwards.

Fowler was asked by the Ruidoso News if the village voted to acquire a gas system, then would the village be required by bonding companies to pass an ordinance making it mandatory for everyone in reach of a gas line to connect to the municipal system. He said he could not answer that question. Village Attorney John Thompson said he did not believe such would be required, that only where health and welfare of citizens were involved, in the case of sewer systems and water systems, was such an ordinance necessary.

The News asked the board of trustees what price they would pay Hawkins for his existing system in the village, and Trustee Davis answered that a board of appraisal would have to set the price. Source of gas for a Ruidoso natural gas system would be the El Paso Gas Co.'s transmission lines which run from the southeast to the northwest part of Lincoln County a few miles below Corona. It is proposed that a main line to bring gas here would come from a point several miles north of Capitan.



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



These families, all receiving public assistance, include twenty-three youngsters 16 and 17 years old, the age bracket in which school drop-outs most often occur. In total, these same families in this county have 62 children between 12 and 18 years of age, according to Mrs. Irene Z. Lindsay, County Welfare Director.

LOCAL PEOPLE ATTEND MEET IN PASADENA
An eight-day international convention of Jehovah's Witnesses has opened at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif. Approximately 70,000 delegates representing all 50 states and 34 foreign countries are expected at the giant Bible conference when it climaxes next Sunday.
J. B. Dobbin, Ruidoso, presiding minister of the Capitan congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses, is attending the assembly with 34 other local members. The convention is one of three scheduled this year in the United States.
Dobbin said one of the highlights of the Pasadena gathering will be a mass baptism for Saturday. New adherents to the faith will be immersed in water to signify their dedication to do God's will and enter into a ministerial life. Convention officials estimate 1,500 candidates will be baptized in the special service.
N. H. Knorr, president of the Watchtower Bible and Tract Society of New York, sponsors of the convention, will deliver the principal address on Sunday at 3 p.m. He is speaking on the subject "When God Is King Over All the Earth." A peak attendance is expected at the Rose Bowl for the Sunday lecture, the climax of the final session.
