

Wright, four years, and Gerald Dean, five years. According to state statutes (Section 14-33-17) "County municipal hospitals shall be governed by a board of trustees consisting of five (5) members, three (3) of whom shall be appointed by the Board of County Commissioners and two (2) of whom shall be appointed by the governing body of the municipality. Said members of the board of trustees shall be appointed for a term of two (2) years." At present there is only one resident of Ruidoso on the board, all others are outside the municipality, which is not in violation of the statutes and is just fine if that's what the county and the city officials agree upon, but, the question is which two of the five were named by the city— which three by the county—and how come terms range from one to five years when two years is the maximum? . . .

MINISTER'S DEATH RULED SUICIDE

A coroner's jury impaneled by Justice of the Peace H. M. Graham at the scene of the death Wednesday night returned a verdict of suicide in the passing of Ruidoso's First Presbyterian minister, the Rev. Leland Murphy, aged 48. His body was discovered by three out-of-town men who were driving around on side roads in Ruidoso viewing the scenery. The death occurred near the end of the newly paved road that runs from Paradise Canyon up the hill to Cree Manor apartment motel and beyond. At the end of the paving, Rev. Murphy apparently had driven off the road in an open space in the woods. His body was found slumped over about seven feet in front of his passenger car. A .22 calibre pistol was in his right hand. A physician, who conducted an examination for the jury, reported death was apparently from a single bullet fired into the right temple.

Discovering the body were Lew Ingleheart, Albuquerque; Van Haynie, Las Cruces, and Jake Hanks, Roswell, who had a business engagement Thursday morning this week and had gotten together a day early to pass the time they said they were driving around Ruidoso viewing its growth in the residential areas.

Sheriff Glen Bradley, State Police Officer Ken Shuckey and Village Police from both Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs converged on the scene within minutes after the report was phoned the local police office that the body had been discovered at 5:51 p.m. A Ruidoso officer determined that gunfire had been heard at about 4 p.m. by Jesse Perteck who has a residence two blocks north of the death site. Jesse said he heard two shots, one very loud and the other somewhat muffled. He said he saw the car parked some distance from his house, and that he watched it for sometime, but never saw anyone near it. He said he did not go to investigate the shots.

On orders of Sheriff Bradley, the local doctor was to x-ray the victim's head to determine if the bullet had not passed through—the

was no evidence at the scene that it had. He was then asked to recover the bullet if it was determined it had remained in the brain.

On the coroner's jury were Frank Barajas, Shorty Stoneman, Joe Hawkins, L. L. Watley, Vic Lamb and Dr. Brian Vanderstok, who was elected foreman.

Identification came from the man's driver's license and other papers in his wallet. He was born June 21, 1915. He had moved to Ruidoso in July this year to assume the pastorate of the Presbyterian Church.

He retired from the ministry six years ago at Springfield, Mo., but prior to that had served as the minister organizing the First Presbyterian Church in Pasadena, Tex., near Houston, where there are now three Presbyterian churches; served as minister at San Marcos, Tex., then as assistant pastor at Dallas in the denomination's largest church. From there he went to Abilene, Tex., where he was minister for nine years.

He attended Austin College at Sherman, Tex., then the Presbyterian Theological Seminary at Austin, Tex. He had done work at the University of Texas at Austin, at Southwest Missouri State and also Drury College, both at Springfield, Mo. He came to Ruidoso from Alpine, Tex., where he completed graduate work in education this last semester.

Kelly Hearing Held Monday

A C. Kelly, Ruidoso stonemason, charged with involuntary manslaughter in the death of Rene Stallings, was bound over Monday to the District Court in Carrizozo. The day-long preliminary hearing was held in Ruidoso before Justice of the Peace R. L. Sherrill of Carrizozo, Monday, Sept. 16, who substituted for Judge H. M. Graham.

The hearing which was opened promptly at 10 a.m. Monday, was held in the Village of Ruidoso Municipal building. Mrs. Rene Stallings was the first witness called by district attorney, Dan Sosa, Jr., of Las Cruces. She was on the witness stand for one hour recalling the afternoon of June 5, when Kelly and Stallings met. The second witness called was Dr. Alfred S. Chauw, M.D., who performed the autopsy to determine the cause of death of Rene Stallings, Aug. 21. His testimony was mostly in medical terms; however, he stated that the immediate cause of death was pneumonia and the preliminary cause of death was trauma hemorrhage, there was marked hemorrhage within the skull, he stated. "I believe he died from a cerebral hemorrhage which could have resulted from trauma June 5," Dr. Blauw stated in reply to Dan Sosa's question.

The third witness called in the morning session was George H. Stoneman, manager of Ketch Gas Co., where the altercation between Kelly and Stallings took place. Kelly and Stallings took place. Kelly and Stallings took place.

In the afternoon session the District Attorney and his assistants Lalo Garza of Alamogordo called more State witnesses: Marshall T. J. Sanders, Sgt. O. S. Montes, Sheriff Glen Bradley, Deputy Sheriff Clyde Atwood and Mrs. L. P. Hale.

Defense attorney John P. Cusack of the Roswell law firm Frasier and Cusack, representing Kelly, presented no defense witnesses at the hearing.

When the witnesses were heard, and the defense and the prosecution rested the hearing, Judge Sherrill bound Kelly over to the District Court in Carrizozo, with bond continued at \$5,000.

CAR ROLLS INTO HOUSE

Last Saturday afternoon a driverless car crashed into the side of the home of Jack Kammady. The driverless car, a 1955 Plymouth sedan, was owned by Ethel Black and had been parked on Upper Terrace and rolled down grade into the Kammady house.

Estimate of the damage to either the house or the car was not listed in the police accident report. Two charges were filed.

LOCAL MAN BUYS ENCO STATION

Bill Neal, formerly a salesman for Adobe Real Estate, has purchased the Ruidoso Enco Station at the corner of Sudderth and Mechum Drives. The station was previously owned by Wayne Adams.

Neal and his family moved here from Roswell a year and a half ago to make Ruidoso their home.

Lincoln County Commissioners in a meeting Tuesday afternoon in Carrizozo issued a call for a bond election for Oct. 8, 1963 for the purpose of building a new courthouse in Carrizozo.

The election notice on the proposed \$525,000 bond issue is printed in this week's News and lists polling places and election officials. The commissioners have been staging a series of meetings in the county to show preliminary plans and to discuss the need for the new courthouse. Tuesday morning, prior to their action that afternoon, the commissioners, with members of the architectural firm that designed the courthouse proposal, met with Ruidoso Board of Realtors and their guests in a breakfast at Holiday House. The meeting was attended by about 40 persons.

Mrs. J. D. Locke, president of the board, introduced the commissioners, who in turn introduced George A. Buffington of the architectural firm. He showed a color sketch of the proposed courthouse, which would include an all-new single story structure and the present two-story annex as remodeled.

Areas for county records, such as the clerk's, treasurer's and assessor's office; for the courts, such as a 150-seat courtroom, judge's quarters, jury room, witness room, law book library, etc., and sheriff's and jail facilities, with offices, separate cells and "tanks" for men, women and juveniles, plus a kitchen and storage room, were pointed out in the preliminary floor plans next shown. A basement will allow for storage of little-used as well as historical county records.

Buffington stressed that any suggestions regarding changes in the floor plans were welcomed, and must be offered soon so that final plans could be prepared. Questions were invited from the audience during the discussion. In answer to one query, Buffington said considerable research had been done on amount of storage space needed for a period of many years for clerk's records—and that he believed adequate room had been provided.

County Board Chairman Tommie Jones and Commissioner Nooker discussed cost of the new structure to the property holder—reporting that with an estimated \$20 million tax valuation for 1964, taxpayers would be paying \$240 per \$1,000 valuation additional in bonds, if they were 15 year term. They reported that only \$55,000 in bonds, on the county's two hospitals, are outstanding at the present.

A discussion on prospects of moving the courthouse to Ruidoso was held, with little hope other than disrupting friendships throughout the county would result. Legal hurdles, a majority vote, and extra costs for such a move, to be borne by Ruidoso, were mentioned as obstacles that would have to be overcome.

In adjoining, both Mrs. Locke and Chairman Jones expressed thanks for the interest, and the support shown, for the needed improvement.

It was discussed that there is a possibility of paving the route soon from Angus to Nogal to give Southern Lincoln County quicker access to the county seat. The commissioners said they would push for such a project in the next few months.

A meeting was scheduled here last week with Ruidoso-Hondo Valley C. of C. officials, and another is set for the Parent-Teacher Association meeting Thursday, Sept. 28, next week here. Other meetings in the county have been held at Carrizozo, Hondo and Corona, to talk the need and explain plans for the proposed building project.

Airport Income Totals \$4,487.17 First 4 Months

The gross receipts of the Ruidoso Municipal Airport for the period May 11 to Sept. 12 totaled \$4,487.17. Lowell Morgan, airport manager, reported to the Village of Ruidoso Trustees at a special meeting held Monday afternoon.

This total for the first four months of operation was 26 percent of the 7,491 gallons of aviation fuel and 97 quarts of oil, \$3,100.70, hangar rentals, \$312. office rentals, \$680 and percentage fee from auto rental, \$194.39.

Morgan reported that during the period there were 1,661 landings and he declared that approximately 25 percent of the landings were serviced by the Municipal Airport facilities.

The Trustees, acting on Morgan's request, increased the salary of the assistant airport manager \$50 per month.

In other business, the Trustees approved the occupation license for the New Mexico Transportation Co., to designate a loading zone on the road behind the Gateway Shopping Center where buses could load and unload passengers without obstructing traffic.

The Trustees agreed that the next regular meeting scheduled for Sept. 20 would be held due to the convention of the New Mexico Municipal League which will be held in Ruidoso Sept. 26 and 27. It was agreed by the Trustees that the next regular meeting would be Oct. 10.

The Trustees also authorized that a letter be sent to the Mesquero Apache Tribal Council offering best wishes for success to the Tribe when it takes over the operation of the Sierra Blanca Ski property, Oct. 1.

RUIDOSO DOWNS ASKS 61 RACE DAYS FOR NEXT SEASON

The State Racing Commission, meeting in Albuquerque this mid-week, was to rule on a request from Ruidoso Downs for 61 racing days in the 1964 season. The commission was also to issue a ruling on a protest filed by Phillip McKee, involving two quarter horse races at the Downs in the season just ended. Members of the commission saw motion pictures of the race in taking the protest.





Commissioner Nosker Issues Statement On US 70 Alignment

Lincoln County Commissioner Kenneth Nosker, who represents District 3, at the request of the Ruidoso News, provided this statement regarding his views on alignment of the proposed improvements of U. S. Highway 70 in the Ruidoso Valley.

"I wish to make my stand clear on my position about alignment of the proposed improvement of U. S. I feel it needs to be in some areas, and not in some other areas, but I still believe the highway department can give us a road that will serve the most people best.

"I do not feel the old highway should be left in its entirety. I feel it should be used as an access road.



CAPTAN RESIDENT, WITHOUT LIGHTS, IN FATAL WRECK

A 20-year-old Captain man died early Thursday morning after the 1956 Ford he was driving left the roadway on a curve five miles west of Riverside and slid on its top beneath the roadway in a concrete cut-off underpass.

Three passengers in the car, including a year-old child, were reported uninjured.

State Police Officer Jerry Wood said Leonell Balazar Vigil, 30, was dead at the scene of multiple face and head injuries.

Wood was notified, he said, by Mr. and Mrs. Jesus Padilla, also of Capitan, after they crawled free of the wreckage with their baby and walked the half mile to his home.

The car was traveling west on U. S. 70-380 at a high rate of speed, according to Wood, when it missed a large curve to the left, traveled some 45 feet off the roadway and slid to a stop in the underpass beneath the highway.

The group had been to Roswell, Wood said, where Vigil had gone to visit his father, and were returning to Capitan when Vigil found the vehicle would not run with the lights on. Rather than stop the car, he had continued the trip without headlights and apparently failed to see the curve.

State Police found three citations issued to the victim Wednesday and an over-due one from Alamogordo City Police Capt. Rex Carrell. State Officer Howard Hunter recalled having cited Vigil for reckless driving and driving with an expired license in Tularosa along First Street at 11:50 a.m. Wednesday. WARRIORS TRIP CLASS A SOCORRO, 27-24 HERE LAST WEEK-END FOR FIRST VICTORY

KICK-OFF RETURNS SHOCK VISITORS

Ruidoso's Warriors underwent a complete change of pace from their earlier record this season last Friday night, scoring 27 points in the first three quarters and holding off a late surge by Class A Socorro Warriors to win their first game of the season, 27-24.

The Warriors, beaten in their first two games by Class C schools, finally "jelled", striking like lightning on kick-off returns with a 55-yard scamper and a 24-yard reverse to defeat the strong Class A crew.

The difference in the battle came on extra point attempts as the Ruidosans attempted four and made good on three tries. Socorro tried one run which was stopped and three from placement. One kick was wide and two were blocked by Ruidoso's outstanding tackle Mike Capps.

The Warriors held a comfortable lead at halftime, 21-12, but the Warriors from Socorro came roaring back in the third and fourth periods, crossing the Ruidoso goal line twice to close the gap.

The game featured two types of offense with Ruidoso breaking loose for long gains and Socorro grinding out short yardage on the ground. One Socorro touchdown, however, came after a 40-yard pass from midfield down to the Ruidoso ten yard line to set up the marker.

Warriors Strike Early
After the opening kick-off it looked for a moment like the game might be one of defense for both teams, but the third time the Warriors had the ball Bill Stirman took off around right end and scampered down the far sideline 55 yards for the game's first tally. On the all important extra point, Stirman successfully passed to halfback Jack Garrett. Stirman's score came one play after David Jefferson had broken through the Socorro line to go 65 yards for a touchdown only to have it called back by an offside penalty.

The Warriors kicked off to Socorro to start the second period and the Socorro squad marched quickly to the Ruidoso 11 before the Warrior

defense stiffened to make one of five goal line stands of the night.

Socorro moved the ball on three plays up the middle to the Ruidoso two yard line, but that was as far as the visitors could go. The Warrior line, led by Capps, Caudle and Clark, stopped the visitors on the two.

The Warriors moved the pigskin out to the 15, where a fumble gave Socorro another chance at a score. It looked for a moment like the locals might push another goal line stand, but a fourth down pass from quarterback Joe Padilla to end Andy Romero was good for the marker making the score 7-6. The extra point kick was wide.

On the kick-off by Socorro, Bill Stirman faked a hand-off to Garrett and picked up a fine block from Prentice Creel along with several others to dash 95 yards untouched for the Warriors' second marker. Another pass from Stirman to Garrett added the extra point.

24-Yard Touchdown
A strong Ruidoso defense forced Socorro to punt following the kick-off from the visitors' 37. Garrett returned the punt from the Warrior 32 to the 39 and it took only four plays to score from that point. Halfback Jimmy Steele and David Jefferson ran three plays to the Socorro 24 and Garrett took the ball over on the next play for the score. Jefferson ran for the PAT.

24-Yard Touchdown
With time running out in the first half Socorro marched down the field, sparked by a 40-yard pass and run play from Padilla to Romero to the Ruidoso 10-yard line. With only one second remaining on the clock another pass from Padilla to Romero was good for the score. PAT by run was halted. Score at halftime, Ruidoso 21, Socorro 12.

85-Yard Kick-Off Return
In another action-packed third period Socorro took command immediately following the opening kick-off, driving over from the 10-yard line for another touchdown in only five plays. But once again the extra point attempt played an important part in the contest as Tackle Mike Capps

broke through to block the place. On the ensuing kick-off, deep man Jefferson took a hand-off from Stirman on the 15-yard line and behind a wall of Ruidoso blockers went 85 yards for the locals' second touchdown return of the night. This time the extra point run was stopped short.

Socorro again ground out yardage after taking the kick-off to march to the Warrior two-yard line and again the Tribe defense managed to throw a kink in things by knocking down a fourth down pass in the end zone.

An intercepted pass on the Ruidoso 35 gave Socorro another chance at paydirt, but again after Socorro moved to the Warrior three-yard line the locals took over on fourth down, holding quarterback Padilla to no gain on an end sweep. Creel, Capps, Caudle and Clark provided the spark with sharp tackling.

The Ruidoso Warriors, with their backs to the wall, had to kick from their own end zone and Stirman, trying to get the ball out quickly, kicked the ball to the 40. The punt was returned to the 29 and a penalty set the ball on the five yard line. Fullback Albert Romero finally scored from the four on an off-lackie give. Again Mike Capps broke through to block the point after.

Ruidoso was unable to move the ball following the kick-off and had to punt again from the end zone. This time the kick was off the side of Stirman's foot and Socorro had the ball on the Ruidoso 19-yard line with time running out. Socorro moved to the Warrior 12 where the desperate play came with only 30 seconds remaining, as Capps, Caudle and Creel stormed through to throw quarterback Padilla for a 10-yard loss on an attempted pass. Another desperation pass was knocked down as the game ended.


