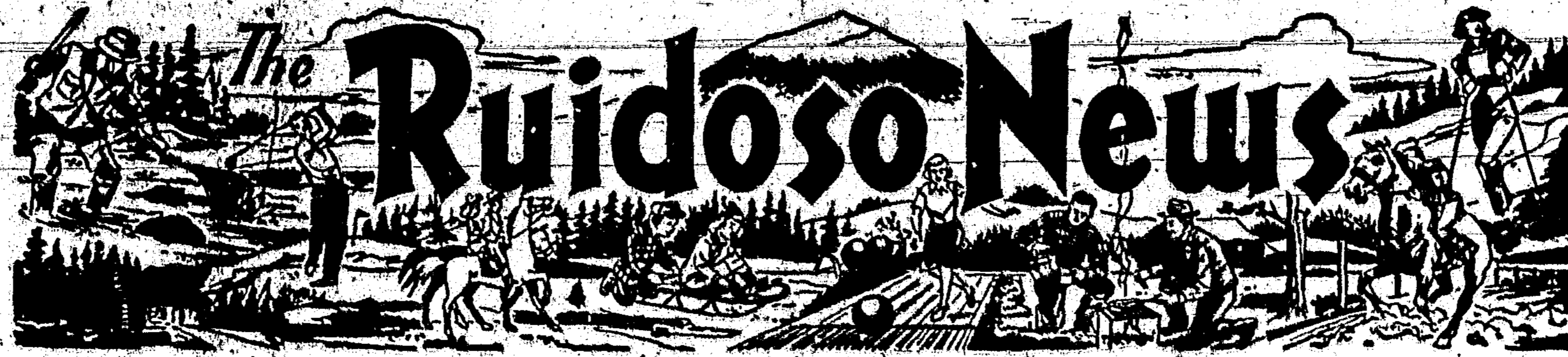

Sheriff To Question Confessed 'Killer'

Lincoln County Sheriff Glen Bradley, who has been assisted by various state, county and village peace officers in an unsuccessful hunt for the body of a man supposedly murdered by a man with a criminal record now lodged in a Texas jail, said Wednesday morning he is making plans to go to Big Spring to further question the "confessed murderer"...

"I hope I can get Assistant District Attorney Don Hancock to accompany me to Big Spring to talk with the man in jail there," Bradley said. "If there is any inkling that there might possibly be something to his story that he killed a man and buried the body in a dry wash in Gavilan canyon, we will attempt to bring him back here to show us the spot," he concluded.

State and area law enforcement officials came up empty handed in several days of searching Gavilan Canyon, near Ruidoso, for the body of a murdered man, a confessed slayer, claimed he hid there last June 22.

The sheriff said Peters told him he had beaten a woman to death at Marshall, Tex., in 1965. Officers said her body was found where Peters said he had buried it. But other parts of his story did not fit the facts, it was declared.

Funeral Services Set In Roswell For Horace Britton

Funeral services are scheduled to be held in Ballard Funeral Home in Roswell Friday, Nov. 27, at 2:30 p.m. for Horace Britton, 68, of Ruidoso, who died late Sunday on a ranch near Capitan. K. A. Huey, Justice of the Peace in Capitan, conducted an inquest and a coroner's jury returned a verdict of death from a heart attack. Mr. Britton had been hunting on the Herbert Lee Traylor Ranch when he was stricken.

A former Roswell resident for 30 years, Mr. Britton had moved to Ruidoso 17 years ago. He had made his home here since that time. A retired carpenter, he was married to the former Alta McMahon in Roswell on Oct. 2, 1919. Survivors include the widow, two brothers, A. M. Britton, Ft. Smith, Ark., and Bryon Britton, Roswell; and three sisters, Mrs. Jewel Zollicoffer, Plainview, Tex.

Hubert Hatch, operator of Pine Lodge accommodations on Capitan Mountain, found the body after Mrs. Britton had called him to institute a search after Britton's lengthy absence. Floyd Hale and Chalk Norton also helped in the hunt for the man.

Four Are Fined In Deer Case

Four men from Roswell were fined for hunting illegally by using artificial light last Saturday night by Justice of the Peace Alan Gray, precinct 10, Ruidoso Downs. The four charged by State Game Warden Dwight Bowden and Steve Reynolds were Bill Brooks, fined \$50 and cost; Chester Brooks, fined \$50 and cost; Orvil Brooks, fined \$25 and cost; and Steve Ervin, fined \$50 and cost. The four were arrested by the game warden in the Glencoe area while reportedly using the headlights of their pickup truck to spotlight game, Justice Gray reported.

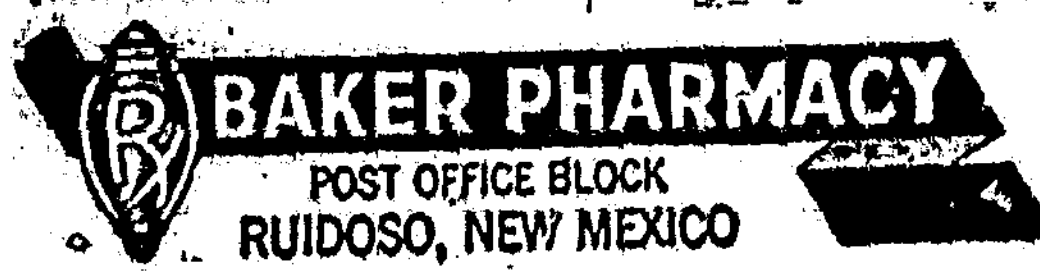

If veterans have exemption certificate they pay only the hospital levy, or if they render a taxable amount over \$2,200 they pay taxes on the amount over the \$2,200.

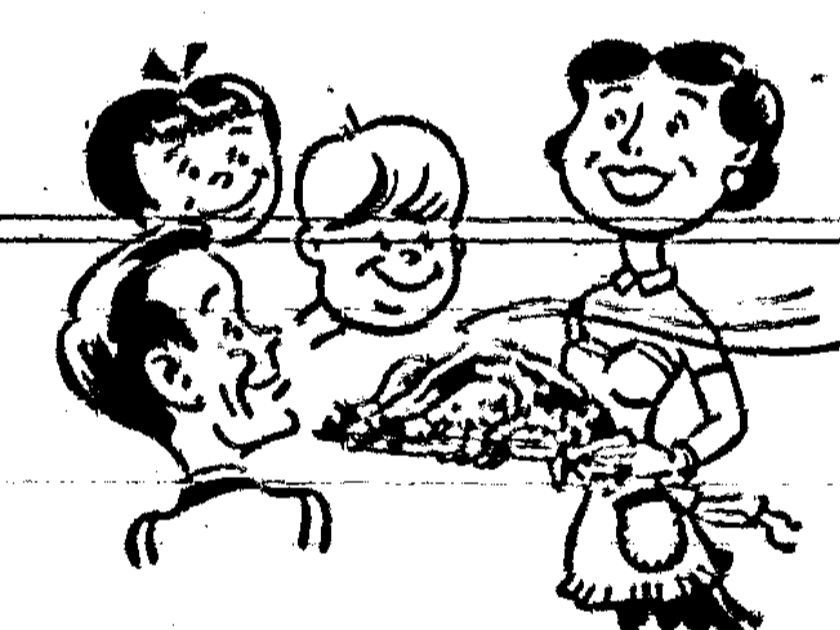

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## 10 Commandments For Check Cashers . . .

1. Don't be afraid to ask questions about a check and its passer. Above all, don't let a stranger hurry you.
2. Never cash a check that shows any sign of alteration.
3. Always demand that a check be endorsed in your presence, if it is already endorsed, make the endorser sign again, and then compare the writing.
4. Make sure that a check is drawn by an existing concern or individual on an actual bank. In Washington, the FBI has on display an enlargement of a bogus check drawn on "The East Bank of the Mississippi," located in "Slippery Rock, Miss.," candidly signed "U R Stuk," AND it was cashed!
5. Be just as wary of certified checks or cashier's checks as of ordinary ones. Washington, D. C., police nabbed a forger who had passed \$1,400 worth of spurious paper in one day. Among his belongings, they found thousands of dollars' worth of bogus cashier's checks.
6. Be very careful in cashing checks for juveniles. They aren't legally responsible, and they may be runners for a forgery ring.

Never endorse a check for anyone you don't know to be reliable.

Merchants should beware of any unknown customer who offers you a check for more than the amount of his or her purchase.

If a bankbook is offered as identification, phone the bank named. A common trick is to deposit a phony check and obtain a passbook for use as identification. The book shows the deposit, but not that the check bounced a few days later.

**KNOW YOUR ENDORSER.** Bear in mind that the successful paperhanger rarely fits the Hollywood version of the criminal type. According to a New York State police study, the typical forger is "Native, white, male, in his late 20's or early 30's. His intelligence is high, he is usually likable and attractive. He ingratiate himself easily and has a knack for convincing others."

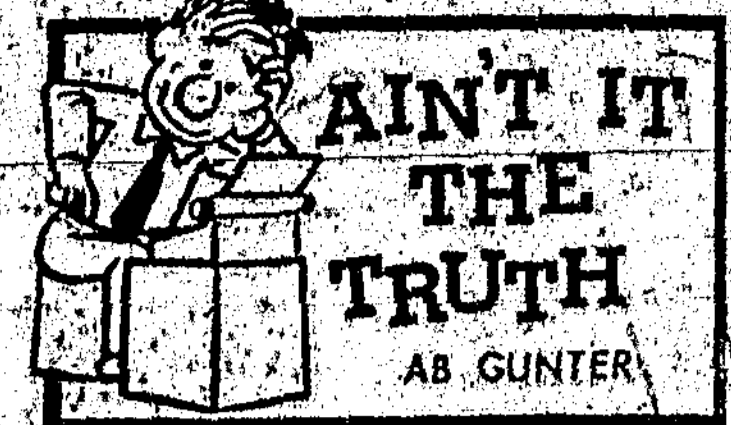

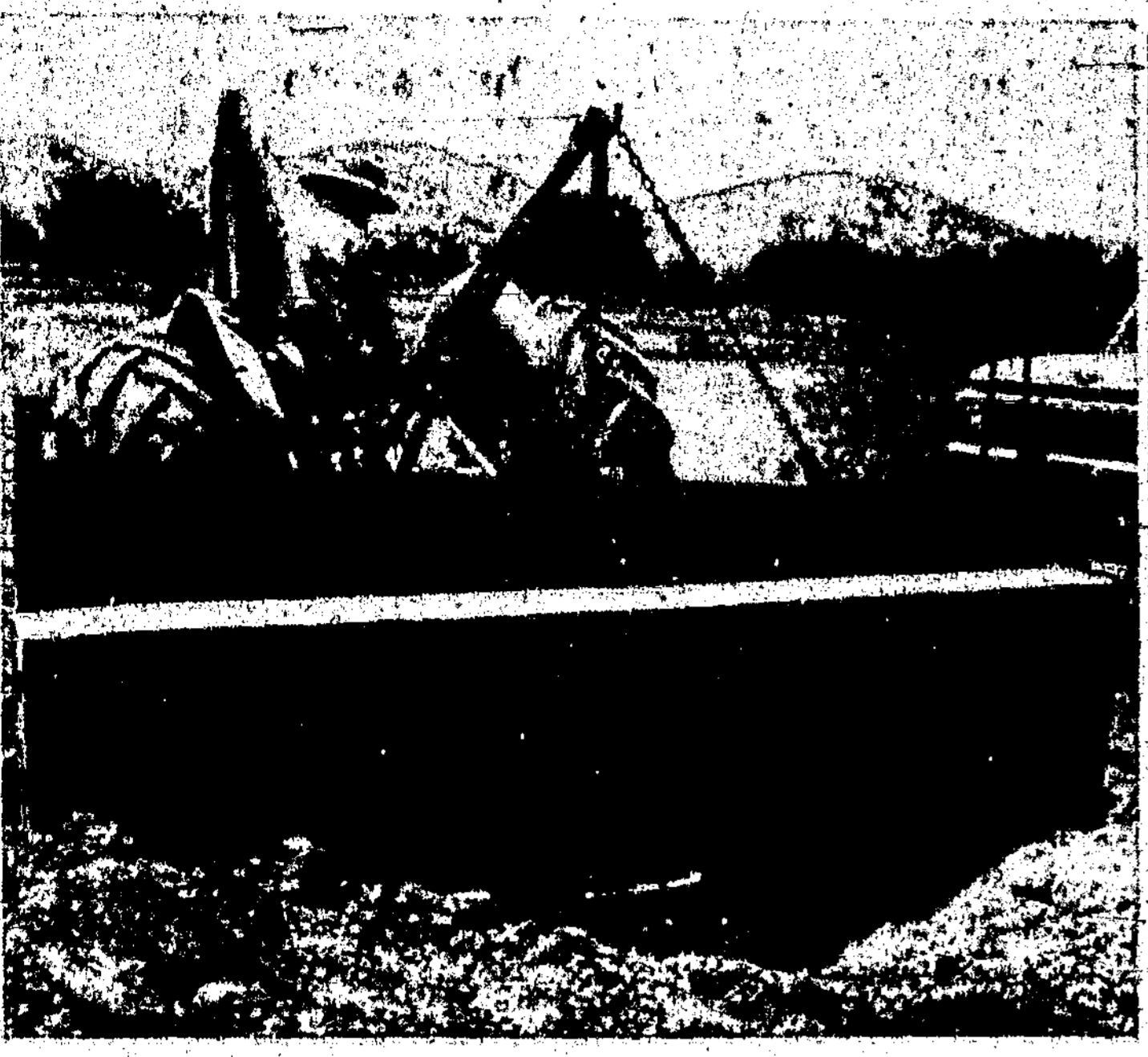

### Tinnie Farmer Redesigns Irrigation System

Carl Radcliff of Tinnie recently reorganized a portion of his irrigation system. The reorganization consisted of 14 acres of land leveling, the relocation of an irrigation lateral and the installation of water control structures in the irrigation ditch.

The purpose of the land leveling he said was threefold: (1) To get better distribution of irrigation water—eliminate over or under penetration in any one area of the field, (2) Eliminate soil erosion due to excessive slopes, and (3) Reduce the amount of labor needed to manage the water. The irrigation lateral was relocated so that two fields

could be irrigated from one ditch. The land had considerable slope and was therefore leveled in benches. It was necessary to place concrete irrigation water control structures in the ditch at the point at which one bench dropped to another. Had these structures not been installed, the ditch would be continually washing out.

Bill Dunlap, land leveling contractor from Roswell, did the leveling. Radcliff is building his own concrete control structures. Technical assistance in the planning and design of the leveling was given by Soil Conservation Service technicians and cost-sharing assistance was supplied through the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

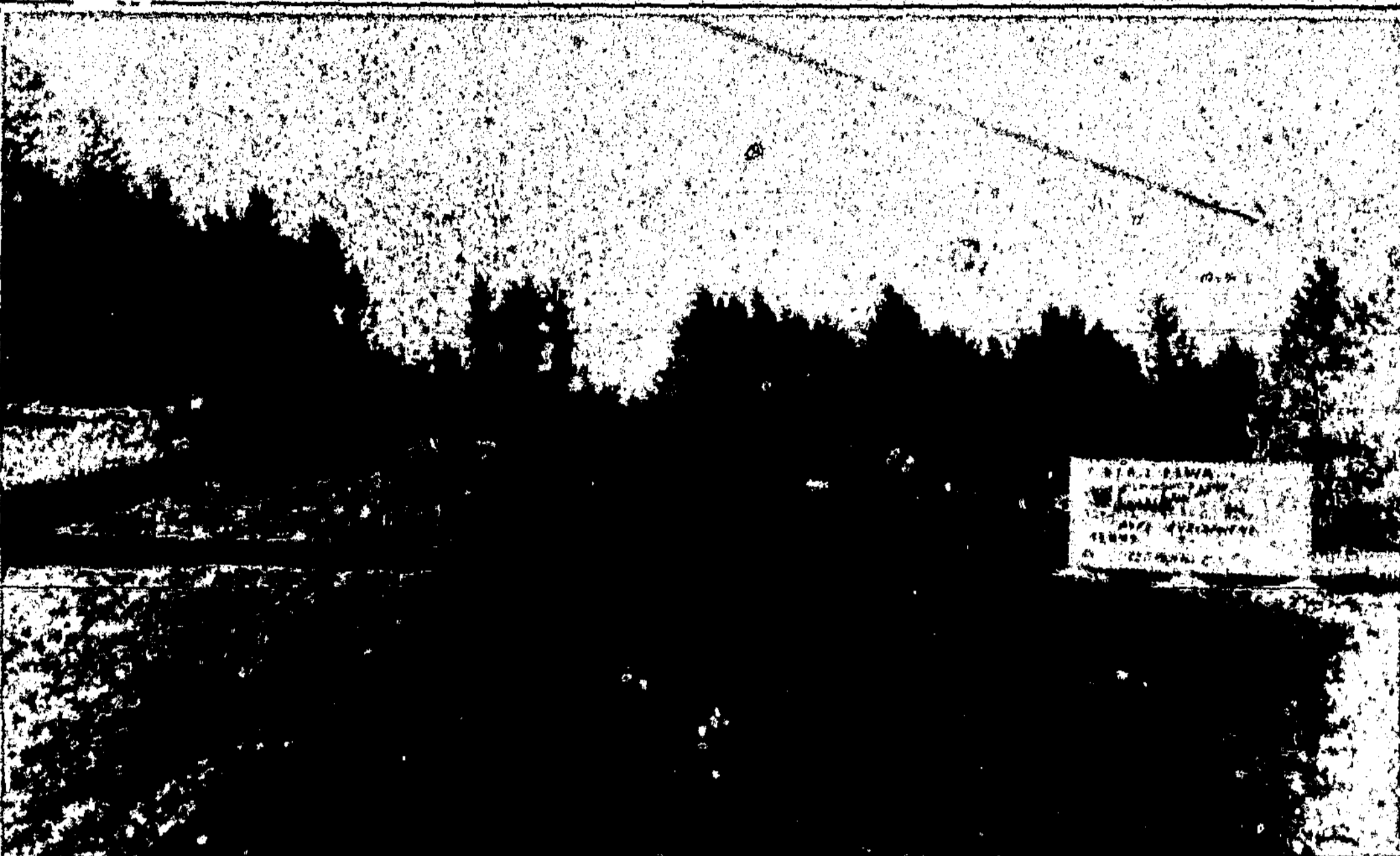

Jan. 3 is the date applications for payment, supported by the required sales documents, are to be filed with the ASCS County Office. Wool growers, particularly those who market their lambs in the fall, need to keep adequate records of their sales so that they will be able to make proper applications for payment under the wool incentive program.

The sales record for lambs sold should include the name of the buyer, his signature, and the number and liveweight of lambs sold, plus the description "uphorn." Lamb payments are made only on lambs that have never been shorn to discourage unusual shearing of lambs before selling.

Current marketings of wool and lambs through December 31, 1964, will qualify for incentive payments under the wool program for the 1964 marketing year. Beginning with 1964, the marketing year is the calendar year.

Treat cattle for lice now. Lice populations are reduced during the heat of summer, but start to reproduce rapidly in the fall and winter as hair thickens and reach a

peak of population in the spring on untreated cattle.

Lice pierce the skin and suck blood causing severe irritation. As the animals' skin becomes raw, nervousness and loss of blood cause lower weight gains.

Insecticides used as sprays that will give good control of lice on beef cattle are malathion, Co-ral, Korlan, and Methoxyellor.

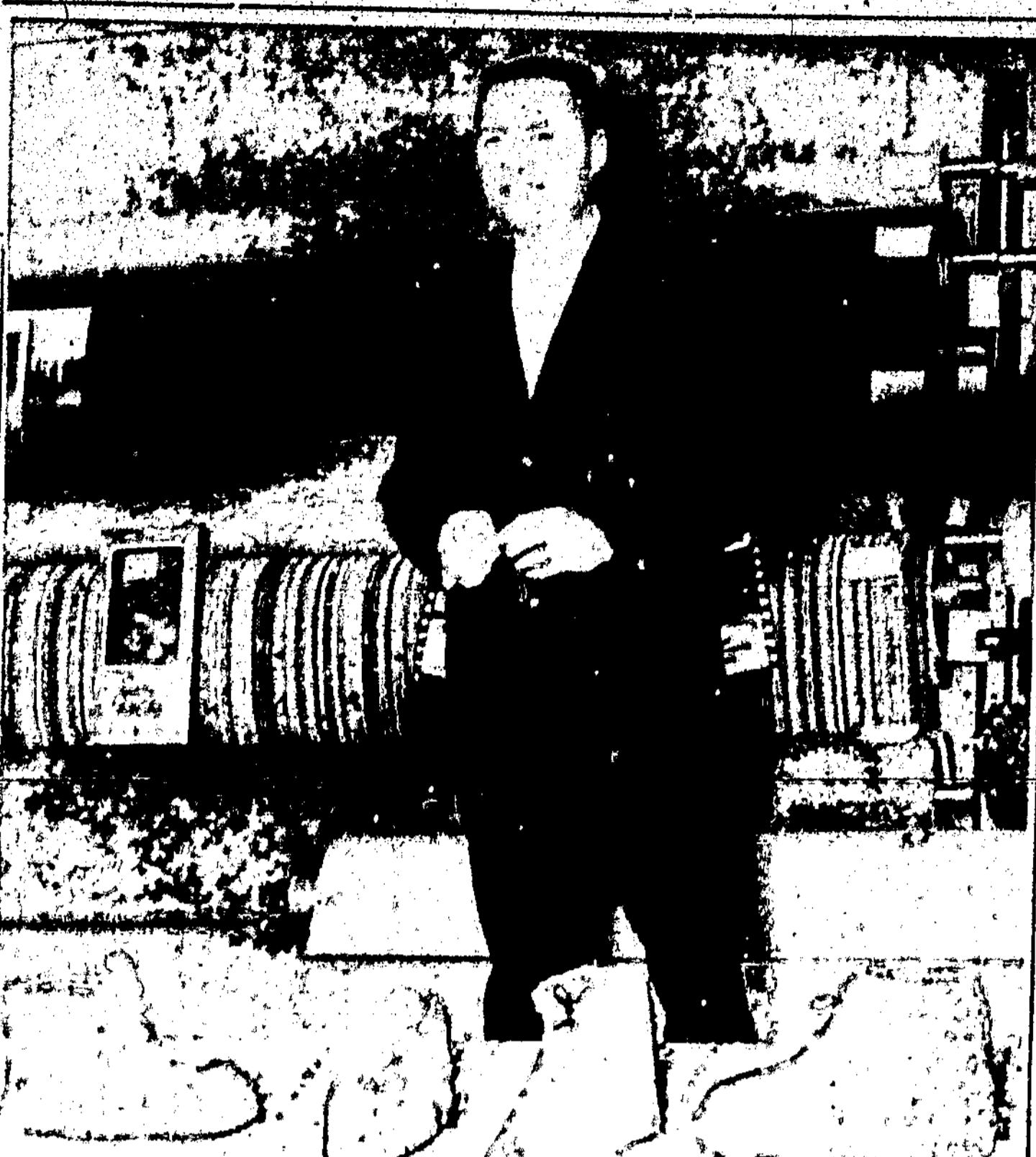

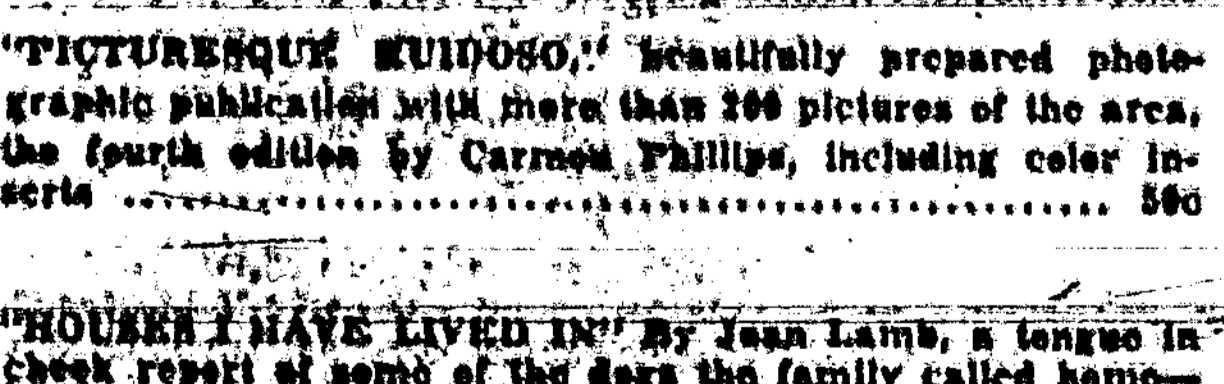
