

Need and Uses For G. O. Bonds For Water In Ruidoso Told

Village Manager-Clerk Jim Hine, engineer Quintin Daniel and water superintendent Arvel Nash, last week outlined the need and the uses for the general obligation bonds which will be voted on in the April 7 municipal election.

Hine stated: "The necessity and urgency of the voters approving the \$200,000 G. O. Water Bond issue is a matter of simple logic—the village needs the money in order that we can do the needed improvements to our water system which will take care of our immediate needs as well as needs which will be created with anticipated growth for several years. With our economy, to a large extent based on summer visitors, we cannot afford to be known as a place where water is in short supply or may, even need to be rationed during the summer months. Plenty of raw water is available but the problem is to trap the water during run-off times in order that we have adequate water during dry periods flowing through an improved distribution system. A vote for the G. O. Bond issue is a vote to assure Ruidoso an adequate water supply."

Village Engineer Daniel listed the following estimates of improvements necessary in the Ruidoso water system and for which the \$200,000 bond issue will be used: Raw water storage \$50,000; Ruidoso filter plant

\$25,000; to replace inadequate and small lines, \$45,000; to loop all six-inch water mains, \$27,000; installation of an adequate number of fire hydrants, \$4,500; install adequate valves in existing lines \$3,000; improvement and connecting Holly-wood well \$3,200; steel storage tank upper canyon 500,000 gallon capacity \$30,000; for future water rights, \$30,000.

Arvel Nash, village water superintendent made the following statement: "It is necessary that we have more water storage and larger water mains, because our water consumption has increased so much in the last few years. We now have one main water line down through town and our water consumption is so large in the Gateway area in summer months that consumers above that area have little water and pressure. Another main line and storage would relieve this situation. The storage we now have is just a little over one day's supply during the summer months."

Both Hine and Nash cited the growth in year-around water consumption due to an increase in permanent residents and the growth in vacation population both winter and summer. The winter consumption of water here now runs as high as the summer consumption a few years ago, Hine said.

Preliminary Engineering Underway On Gas System For City

Hawkins estimated that this work would require approximately 60 days. Application for a hearing with the New Mexico Public Service Commission has been made and a request for a hearing with the Federal Power Commission will be made in the near future, Hawkins said.

SCHOOL BUDGET SET AT BELOW \$480,000 FOR 1964-1965 TERM

Ruidoso's School budget was approved at the first school budget hearings for New Mexico schools for the year 1964-65 which were held in Carrizozo Tuesday, March 31. The budget hearings for school districts at Hondo, Ruidoso, Capitan, Carrizozo and Corona began at 8:00 a.m. in the Lincoln County Court House attended by Gov. Jack Campbell, Leonard DeLayo, State superintendent of schools, along with observers from the Legislative Finance committee, the Department of Education, the New Mexico Education Association and representatives from business and industrial firms. The annual American Cancer Society's Crusade to save more lives through research, education and service, will be launched in Lincoln County on April 1. Mrs. F. B. Lindamood, county publicity chairman, reported. Mrs. Lindamood said preparations for this year's crusade will concentrate on more effective training of volunteers to do the door-to-door bell ringing which is so important in raising funds and educating the public in ways to protect themselves from death from cancer.  
All those wishing to volunteer in this vital struggle against cancer can contact Mrs. W. D. Horton or Mrs. L. L. Davis, Jr. in Ruidoso, or Mrs. Lindamood at Alto. The Society's goal number one, Mrs. Lindamood stated, will be saving those lives which are lost unnecessarily, and that means getting everyone to a doctor for prompt treatment and early detection. A person's best protection against death from cancer is an annual health check-up, she added, and the annual check-up should be observed as regularly as a birthday.  
The Cancer Society's second goal will be to raise money for research, education and service, she concluded, and the hope has been expressed that half of those developing cancer, can be saved.

"Donations, however, are not limited to helping people of Valdez alone," Storm said. "Should they want to send financial aid to Alaska generally, I am sure that there are agencies there that we can turn such donations over to."



dentia from other areas of the state also attended the hearings Tuesday, George P. White, superintendent of Ruidoso Municipal Schools reported.  
 White, together with the full Board of Education, represented Ruidoso Municipal School District No. 3-35. Present were: Miss Wynema Tully, president; Ralph Petty, vice-president; Dave Parks, secretary; Earl Hickam and Jack Jennings, members, presented Ruidoso's School budget which was approved in full.  
 The budget which was approved had been prepared in detail by the Ruidoso School Board and Superintendent White and listed total estimated resources of \$480,150 with detailed budget expenditures of \$420,338 and non-budgeted items of \$41,812 and an emergency budget of \$18,000. This budget which stayed well within the income, allowed for yearly increases in teachers salaries averaging \$300, principals increased \$300 and the superintendent increased \$300. Bus drivers, cooks, clerks and janitors were increased \$150.  
 The approved budget allowed for an increase in the teaching staff from 35 to 38. The three additional teachers include one Core combination teacher of high school level, one junior high teacher for seventh and eighth grade level and one combination art and music teacher for elementary grades. The budget also approves a one-half time registered nurse.  
 Sources of income itemized in the budget included Local Sources, \$20,890; County Sources, \$41,570; State Sources, \$344,500; and Federal Sources, \$14,550. Total anticipated each balance as of June 30, \$61,000. Expenditures in the budget listed:  
 In presenting the budget the Ruidoso School Board first presented its philosophy of education which was stated by the Board president: "The Ruidoso Schools are conscientiously seeking quality education. Therefore, we seek excellence in the achievement of students, a decent working wage for teachers and excellence from all employees in the educational enterprise."




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# Warriors Finish 14th in Texas Meet

**Wool Prices Mixed**  
I went to Roswell last Friday to watch the wool sale. I saw some grease wool that sold at 3 to 4 cents per pound above last year, and some sold below last year. Generally prices are about the same as last year. While watching the sale I noted that the buyers like a uniform lot. In one lot of fine wool there were two coarse fleeces and one heavy greasy fleece in the four show bags. These fleeces very likely cost from 1 to 2 cents in the bid. Too much needle grass is objectional in the wool. I also heard several buyers' comments on the poorly bled fleeces.

A 60-mile tour of the 710 section Mesacero Apache Cattle Growers Association range has been scheduled for April 25, according to Frank Burris, manager of the association.  
Visitors and buyers are invited to join the auto cavalcade at the Mesacero agency office at 7 a. m. in Mesacero. Seven stops will be made along the tour to survey conditions of grassland and livestock. A noon-day chuck wagon meal will be served at one of the stops.  
More than 600 are expected to attend the tour. The association owns more than 6500 head of cattle.

**New Fruit Spray Guide**  
The 1964 Apple and Pear Spray Guide for New Mexico is a 23-page bulletin containing information for the control of insects attacking pears and apples.  
It contains sections on cultural practices and their effect on pest control, general suggestions and do's and don'ts in orchard spraying, dormant and delayed dormant sprays, and pest fall and summer cover sprays.  
Insecticide recommendations appear in tabular form with dates rates of application and the correct time to apply the insecticide. A discussion of each of the major insect pests and plant diseases for apples and pears is also given.  
New sections found in the guide this year include a table of waiting periods for the various chemicals, a table of compatibility and safety information and an orchard spray record form.  
The bulletin may be obtained at the County Extension Agent's office in the Courthouse in Carrizozo or by writing the Department of Information, New Mexico State University, University Park, New Mexico.

**Wool Incentive Announced**  
The wool incentive for the 1963 marketing year was set at 21.8¢ today. This is figured so as to give the wool industry the average price of 62 cents per pound as set by the Secretary of Agriculture. The incentive on lamb is 54 cents per hundred weight of lambs. Out of this, one cent per grease pound of wool and four cents per hundred weight of lamb is used to promote wool and lamb.

**ORDINANCE NO. 151**  
AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO M. W. KNOX OF RUIDOSO, LINCOLN COUNTY, NEW MEXICO, CERTAIN LICENSING, RIGHTS-OF-WAY AND PRIVILEGES TO USE THE STREETS, ALLEYS AND OTHER PUBLIC PLACES IN THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, COUNTY OF LINCOLN, STATE OF NEW MEXICO, FOR THE PURPOSE OF RECEIVING, AMPLIFYING AND DISTRIBUTING TELEVISION SIGNALS AND PROVIDING FOR THE REGULATIONS THEREOF AND FOR PAYMENT FOR USE OF STREETS AND ALLEYS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, LINCOLN COUNTY, NEW MEXICO:

SECTION 1. That there is hereby granted to M. W. Knox, hereinafter called Grantee, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate in the present and future roads, streets and alleys and public places of the Village of Ruidoso, Lincoln County, State of New Mexico, a television signal distribution system consisting of a tower or towers, poles and cables, with all necessary or desirable appurtenances, including underground conduits, for the purpose of supplying television signal service in said Village, for a period of twenty-five (25) years from the date of acceptance hereof by Grantee.

SECTION 2. That said Grantee, his agents, and employees, may enter in and upon said streets, alleys and public places at any time for the purpose of making excavations, filling, removing, repairing, and maintaining such poles, wires, cables and all other structures necessary and convenient in supplying such television signal service. Any and all excavations shall be repaired and restored as quickly as possible under the circumstances. In the event the Grantee does not promptly repair any pits or sidewalks damaged by him, the Village may make such repairs and charge the amount thereof to the Grantee, which, upon written demand by the Village, shall be paid within 10 days from the date of any such notice or demand.

SECTION 3. The poles for such distribution system shall be placed and erected in such manner as not to interfere with the use of the roads, streets, alleys and public places in said Village, or the inhabitants or property owners along such streets or alleys, and the replacing, construction, and manner of erecting poles and lines of the Grantee, as well as fixtures and attachments thereto, shall be at all times subject to the police power of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso; and further provided that if it is necessary for Grantee to place additional poles in the streets, alleys or other public places within the limits of the Village of Ruidoso where there are presently existing electric power, telephone or telegraph poles, the Grantee shall first obtain permission from the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso for the placing of said additional poles; if being deemed, by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso, that it would not be in the public interest to erect any more transmission lines or poles than are absolutely necessary.

SECTION 4. The Grantee shall hold the Village of Ruidoso harmless against any and all damages that may be caused by reason of the construction and operation of Grantee's television distributing system in said Village to any and every person that may be damaged by reason of the construction and operation of Grantee's television distributing system in said Village, and the Grantee shall cause to be defended or defended at his own expense, all actions that may be commenced against said Village of Ruidoso for damages caused by reason of the construction or operation of such system.

SECTION 5. If any litigation is brought against the Village of Ruidoso, its officers or its Board of Trustees, on account of the enactment and passing of this ordinance, then in that event Grantee shall retain legal counsel at Grantee's expense for the purpose of defending said action and shall further hold the Village of Ruidoso harmless with regard to any costs, attorneys' fees, damages or other expenses which the Village of Ruidoso may incur as a result of such action.

SECTION 6. That said M. W. Knox, for and in consideration of the privileges herein granted, and as aforesaid for the occupation and use of the premises over, upon and beneath roads, highways, alleys, sidewalks, streets and public grounds in the Village shall pay into the said Village of Ruidoso each month during the time this provision shall remain in force and effect, a total aggregate sum of two (2%) percent of the total gross monthly receipts derived by Grantee from his domestic and commercial customers. Payment of said sum shall be made on or before the tenth day of the next succeeding month. The Village shall have access to the books and records of Grantee during business hours to audit the same and ascertain that the proper amount is being paid by

Grantee to the Village of Ruidoso. SECTION 7. Failure on the part of Grantee to comply with any of the provisions hereof shall automatically cancel and terminate this franchise; provided, however, that the Village shall give to Grantee written notice of any such default by registered mail at his last known address, and after the mailing of such notice to Grantee it shall have 30 days to correct any defaults pointed out by the Village and continue this privilege in full force and effect; otherwise, it shall be automatically terminated and be null and void.

SECTION 8. The privileges and benefits extended under this Ordinance shall not be assigned or transferred without written approval of the Village of Ruidoso.

SECTION 9. The rights herein granted shall cease, terminate and be void unless proof is furnished by Grantee within twelve (12) months that reasonable progress is being made by Grantee toward the installation and operation of his system.

SECTION 10. That the Grantee shall within ten (10) days from the date of the passage and approval of this ordinance, file with the Clerk of the Village of Ruidoso a written acceptance of this ordinance and at the same time pay to the said Clerk a sum of money sufficient to cover the cost of the publication of this ordinance.
