

935 ACRES BURNED IN CAPITAN GRASS FIRE

Friday around 1:45 P.M. a "freakish" wind picked up burning trash at the Fort Stanton dump grounds and dropped it several hundred feet from the burning dump to ignite a grass fire which covered 935 acres. . . . The Smokey Bear Ranger station personnel led by District Ranger Ralph Solether, rushed to the fire, alerting the Capitán Volunteer Fire Department on the way. Volunteer fire fighters from Ft. Stanton and Capitán were also recruited. The area was "back-fired" to prevent spreading of the fire across Highway 390. By 4:30 there were only a few smoldering bushes left but a crew of seven men, Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management personnel and volunteers, were patrolling Friday night to prevent another outbreak. . . . The overhead and operations plans for a "C" Alert were put into effect immediately upon the fire alarm. This plan for "C" and "D" Alerts has been in operation for a year in the National Forest Service. Schooling on minute details and operations was given Forest Rangers and personnel at the forest school held in Ruidoso in April. "C" Alert consists of fire boss, plans chief, line boss staff boss, air scout and two sector bosses. The dispatcher gives "C" Alert over the communications system and each one follows through with his pre-designated plan. This enables the fire boss to give his full attention to controlling the fire, knowing that even before he arrives at the fire help and equipment are on the way. . . .

District Ranger Ralph Solether stated that "C" Alert was used for the first time in this area, but in event of a forest fire, he knows that he has men and equipment on the way and can give his full attention to the fire. He also stated that he appreciated the volunteers who helped with Friday's fire. His greatest appreciation is for the fact that there have been very few man-made fires in this area.

**Attorney General Answers Inquiry . . .
TEACHERS PRIVILEGED TO SPEAK VIEWS,
WRITE LETTERS, SIGN PETITIONS**

But Cannot Strike, Mrs. Tully Told
The Attorney General's office of New Mexico ruled in Santa Fe last week that a public school teacher has the constitutional right to publish his ideas or opinions, sign petitions, write letters or speak his views unless such actions are found clearly to amount to disobedience of reasonable school policies or regulations.

He also stated a school teacher may not strike against a school system. The report of the ruling appeared in the Santa Fe New Mexican last week-end. The opinion went to Mrs. Wynema Tully, chairman of the Ruidoso School Board. Mrs. Tully was an original member of the board which was involved recently in a heated community controversy over operations of the schools. Asst. Atty. Gen. Thomas A. Donnelly told Mrs. Tully that courts in the United States almost universally have held that in the absence of express statutory authority permitting

school teachers to strike, such a strike is in violation of public policy. Donnelly cited from one court opinion on the matter which stated, "The underlying basis for the policy against strikes by public employees is the doctrine that governmental functions may not be impeded."

Another opinion said that public employees occupy a status entirely different from those who carry on a private enterprise.

"They have the public welfare and not a private purpose. To say that they can strike is the equivalent of saying that they can deny the authority of government and contravene the public welfare," this decision said.

In reply to Mrs. Tully's question about the right of a public school teacher to sign petitions, Donnelly said the distinction between a constitutional right of any individual to express his views, and the duty of a public employe to follow the rules and policies of his superiors must be recognized.

The New Mexico Constitution, he said, "guarantees the right of every citizen of this state to freely speak, write and publish his sentiments on all subjects, being responsible for the abuse of that right; and no law shall be passed to restrain or abridge the liberty of speech or of the press."

"We think that the right of a teacher or school employe to express his views is protected by constitutional guarantee to the extent that such is not detrimental to the employing school system and is not an open, willful refusal of a teacher to obey the reasonable rules and regulations of his or her employing board of education," Donnelly said.

"It is our opinion . . . that a public school teacher has a constitutional right to publish his ideas or opinions, sign petitions or to speak his views, and such does not constitute cause for dismissal, violation of contract, or insubordination unless such contract clearly is demonstrated and found to actually amount to disobedience of reasonable school policies, regulations, orders or rules, or that such conduct amounts in fact to a rebellious, malicious or disobedient action contrary to the best interests of the public school system."





WAR ON CHOLLA IS CONTINUING

The Great Plains Conservation Program administered by the Soil Conservation Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture jointly with land owners in Lincoln County wage a continuing battle against a pest of 1,000,000 acres of Cholla infested rangeland. It is estimated the infestation is increasing at the rate of one percent or more per year.

Ranchers entering into Great Plains Conservation Program contracts will receive technical and cost-sharing assistance in controlling the spread of Cholla Cactus on their range. The amount of cost-

sharing received is dependent upon the degree of infestation of cactus on a given pasture or group of pastures. The Lincoln County average cost for grubbing and stacking cactus in the 30-100 plants per acre category is \$2.50 per acre, 100-300 plants per acre is \$5.00 per acre and over 300 plants per acre is \$7.50 per acre. The Federal government cost-share 50% of the average county cost.

Dear Mr. Lamb:

Reference is made to your letter of March 22, 1964, addressed to the Administrator, Federal Aviation Agency, concerning a direct weather line into Ruidoso, which has been forwarded to this office for reply.

A detailed study has been made at Ruidoso to determine whether an exception to the criterion is required and it was found that sufficient activity at Ruidoso did not justify the

advent of the Third Person of the Trinity mentioned by Christ in John 14:26 and 16:7, and in Luke 24:49. Finally, following His death and resurrection, Christ gathered with friends on the Mount of Ascension and He commanded them that they should not depart from Jerusalem, but wait for the promise of the Father, which He said He would send them.

"I shall be baptized with the Holy Ghost not many days hence." (Acts 1:4-5)

The promise of the baptism with the Holy Ghost was initially fulfilled on the Day of Pentecost, 10 days after the ascension of Christ. Hence, the expression Pentecostal experience. This term is a modern-day one, unmentioned in the Bible. So encompassing was the experience that it was described as "... a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind." (Acts 2:2). The account of the first outpouring indicates all spoke with tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance. (Acts 2:4)

The Book of Acts lists a number of languages spoken by those who received the infilling of the Holy Ghost and states they were recognized by spectators who came after it was "noised abroad." (Acts 2:8). Even today, there have been numerous cases of language being understood by linguists who have heard people speak in tongues. However, there have been thousands of incidents where the languages were not understood, and to untrained ears these might sound like "gibberish." With more than 3,000 languages and dialects currently spoken in the world, it is understandable.

Following the initial outpouring of the Holy Ghost, the Apostle Peter became a spokesman for those (120 in number) gathered in the upper room. When the Christians who had received the new spiritual experience were charged with drunkenness, he retorted, "These are not drunk as ye suppose." (Acts 2:13)

He closed his address to the on-lookers by telling them, "For the promise is unto you, and to your children, and to all that are afar off, even as many as the Lord our God shall call." (Acts 2:39).

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

Relatives of Local Woman Detail Terror of Alaskan 'Quake'

(Editor's Note: Mr. and Mrs. Tom Patrick of Anchorage, Alaska, have written a graphic account of the terror and devastation of the earthquake in that state which occurred on Good Friday. Seismographs have recorded the earthquake as being one of the greatest in this century. The letter, received by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Smith of Roswell, was passed on to Mr. and Mrs. Ray Curry of Ruidoso. Mrs. Curry and Mrs. Smith are sisters of Mrs. Patrick. The air-mail report is given below.)

March 29, Easter Sunday
Dear Sis and Smooty,
It has been 45 hours and 15 minutes since the earthquake struck us. I'm sure you've read of our terrible disaster by now. I'll try to describe what happened Friday afternoon at 2:36 p.m. The children and I were upstairs. They were eating eggs and I cutting up a Easter Tom and a friend were in the basement working. All of a sudden, our house started trembling. We were still for 3 or 4 seconds, then Tommy yelled, "Let's get out of here!" He and Pat took off for the door. I ran over and grabbed Tim. By the time Tim and I had gone 10 ft., our house was swaying so badly Tim couldn't stand up. As we were walking, the ground was moving so much we could hardly stand. We got away from the house. Our car, which was being started about just as if it was in a car wash, side-slipping down a ramp on a running board. The floor was shaking from the middle, away from the side of a 90 degree angle. The steel street poles were doing the same thing. It was the most awful experience anyone could have, and yet our area was one of the more fortunate. We hardly had any damage. One resident of a 100 homes that were located about the cliff edge. The cliff, for several 100 feet inland, just crumbled and disappeared into the lake. The area was so hard hit that they have now established martial laws. Today they have announced that anyone found on the streets in that area after 4 p.m. is liable to be shot. You can see how serious the situation is.

has a four-foot wide crack across the road. The other had a bridge out, but it has been repaired now. We are not allowed downtown and if any unauthorized person is caught downtown, the least they will do is throw you in jail. One grade school was swallowed during the quake. The brand new high school was totally wrecked, along with a new junior high that was almost completed. The tower at the airport, which is near us, collapsed. The air terminal was partially wrecked. The damage in Anchorage runs into the hundreds of millions of dollars. The power of this quake was 10 million times greater than the bomb we dropped on Hiroshima. It was four times worse than the San Francisco quake. The difference was that San Francisco had so many fires. So far the Anchorage casualty list is six dead and about 100 wounded. There may be many more buried in the debris. We have been fortunate in that we have not had the severe tidal waves other areas have had. Tom had been in Fairbanks for a week and a half. He returned home the day before the quake. It would have been so much worse for us without his moral support. We have much to be thankful for on this day.
