God is concerned about linking us with something greater than we are. Any youth can explain the meaning of patriotism but he may do so from a set form and a memorized formula. He may not have any real depth to his understanding of what he is talking about, because he has never really experienced it. . . . he has never had his loyalty tested. But, let that lad be detained by a foreign government, and placed under pressure to testify against his country in order to save his life. Then, if he can remain loyal through love for his country, he will understand patriotism through deep personal experience.

A look-alike brother of Frank Githens, who has campaigned throughout the southwest on a minor scale, LaMonte, or Montie, as he prefers to be called, also conditioned a swiftness named Lupe de Troll, with which he won \$15,000 after claiming for peanuts, and a filly named Valeria Joan, with which he won \$3,000 for a man who was just about broke and ready to get out of the game.

The interruptions in Montie's training career were the result of Noble Sel breaking down three times. The last time, when everything seemed to go sour, Githens went into the bloodstock agency business in Florida and within one year sold it for a handsome profit that enabled him and his wife, Glenna, and a son, Montie, to tour the nation's tracks before their sudden decision to settle in the west.

The yen to return too strong, Githens got back in the game just a few months ago at Turf Paradise. While he doesn't have a Noble Sel he does have a worthy string of six, headed by 8-year-old Jungle Dancer, by Native Dancer-Monsoon, by Mahmoud, perhaps the best-bred warrior on the grounds. Ducked twice by skeptics at Phoenix when Frank Colcord ran and won twice with him at \$1,250 and \$1,600 claiming tags.

Jungle Dancer was purchased for \$2,000 by Phil and Dorothy McLaughlin of Phoenix, and whether he ever wins, just owning his first race horse already has given the McLaughlins more than their share of kicks.

Githens also has Mr. Fancy, Medicine Lad, Pit Fighter, Reno Moon, and Top Honey, the latter the apple of son Montie's eyes and is awaiting the arrival of an untried, well-bred 2-year-old owned by distinguished Phoenix western-music radio station poo-bah, Ray Odum.

County Agent's Report

H. I. Jacobson of the U. S. Weather Bureau in Albuquerque gave a few pointers as to when to predict frost. If daytime temperature is under 70° F. and the 8:00 p.m. temperature is under 45° F., you can expect frost, especially when clear and there is no wind. Also for every 1,000 feet rise in elevation, the average temperature normally is 3 1/2° lower.

The wind is causing a heavy blast of the fruit blossoms but with the heavy bloom indications are now for a full crop. For the best size the apples should be 4 to 6 inches apart or have 20 to 40 leaves per apple.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Ordinance No. 109, Section 18, states in part: Any person who shall deposit or throw into any sewer connection any foreign liquid or material harmful to sewer mains or sewer plants, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor. He shall be liable for the actual cost as submitted by the Superintendent of the Sewer Department for the cleaning and repair of the sewer system damaged by permitting said foreign materials to enter the sewer system.

Oil, kerosene, grease and the like are extremely harmful to the sewer lines and particularly the disposal plant. Most of such material would naturally come from filling stations, and lately oil has been entering the disposal plant which will have to be stopped at once. I am asking all filling station managers to check their sand traps and to be sure they are free of the above mentioned materials. If this oil continues to appear at the disposal plant, its source will be determined and legal action will have to be taken.
