

## Texas Land Is Swapped For Black Ranch

R. A. (Hap) Canning of Roswell and his father, J. R. (Jack) Canning of Eden, Tex., turned over their 38-section Van Horn, Tex. ranch and their 9-R Ranch in Texas to Bruton Properties, Inc., of Dallas in exchange for the Black Ranch 40 miles north of Ruidoso. The ranch is located near Adobe Ranch, another Canning holding.

The Black Ranch includes about 63,000 deeded acres. Included with the ranch are main headquarters, equipment, horses and about 1100 head of Hereford cattle. Properties valued at \$2 million were involved in the land swap.

## TRUCKER DIES IN CRASH MONDAY

A 37-year-old Amarillo, Tex. truck driver was pronounced dead Monday morning of injuries received in a truck accident 4.6 miles west of Apache Summit on Highway 70. A coroner's jury met at the Mullins-Hamilton Funeral Home in Alamogordo following the 1 a.m. one-vehicle accident.

Dead was Charles F. Bebout, Jr., 37, 2704 Northeast 20th, Amarillo. State Police Patrolman Don Schultz said Bebout was the driver of a 1966 Autocar tractor and 1955 Buick semi-trailer.

Bebout apparently went to sleep or possibly suffered a heart attack on the mountain road west of the summit, drove off the roadway, went down an embankment, then skidded sideways, shearing off a tree, Schultz said.

The trailer came to rest on its top. The cab of the tractor was torn off, and it came to rest on its wheels, he revealed.

The officer said the driver apparently was killed instantly. The big rig traveled 237 feet after leaving the roadway, he said. Monday's fatality brought the number of persons killed this year within the Alamogordo District (Otero and Lincoln counties) to 10.

## STATE POSTMASTERS IN CONVENTION

The New Mexico Chapter of U. S. Postmasters State Convention convenes Thursday this week in Ruidoso, with registration at the Holiday House.

Arnold R. Elias, special assistant to the Postmaster General, who is flying here from Washington, D. C., will be the featured speaker in the Saturday evening banquet program at the Holiday House.

The Denver Regional officials to attend will be G. G. Cassan, regional director; Ernie S. Windhigler, postal inspector in charge; Lea L. Lambert, director of local services division; Walter E. Elder, director tenth civil services region; H. F. Kuebelback, postal inspector, Denver region; L. A. Mitchell, Jr., postal services officer; Alfred Arroya, postal service officer; Kenneth Steneman, Frontier Airlines. The officers named will be present at the seminars for the 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 4th class post offices, during which ceaseless questions and problems will be answered and discussed. Postmasters with such are requested to send questions and problems to the chairman in charge of each class post office seminar.

Attending officials of the New Mexico Chapter will be F. W. Sadler, president; and vice-presidents Julius Fitzer, Felix Gauthier, Verna Martinez and Margarito Arellano. Adeline G. Miller, secretary-treasurer; Marion Dummam, editor Newsletter; Arthur J. Meiring, master of Ceremonies and Mable A. Wimberly, membership and convention chairman. Several Texas postmasters have written they will attend the New Mexico convention.

There will be a reception Thursday evening at the Villa Inn. Friday will see a business session and a trip to the Sierra Blanca Ski Area, followed by the seminars for the four classes of post offices. Saturday will see another business session in the morning, luncheon at the Villa Inn, then an afternoon of horse riding, sight seeing or visiting the Ruidoso art centers Saturday evening will be the banquet, during which will be the national and Denver region officials, installation of state officers elected during the business meetings; entertainment of the Hondo Fiesta dancers, song by Mrs. Barbara Pearson, and concluding with dancing by the attending postmasters after the banquet, which will be held at the Chaparral Motor Hotel Inn. Rev. James Saylor will give the invocation at the banquet. The three post offices hosting the state convention are: Hollywood Post Office, Mable Wimberly, postmaster; Ruidoso, Joe Dryden, postmaster; and Ruidoso Downs, Dorothy Parr-Otero and Lincoln counties) to 10.

Village of Ruidoso officials in a meeting Thursday night last week adopted a budget of \$555,669.58 for the fiscal year 1964-65, beginning July 1, and found the total amount was \$40,000 less than the 1963-64 budget. Village Manager-Clerk Jim Hinz said the reason for the smaller budget was that judgments for land taken in improving Sudderth Drive in a paving project, and which cost about \$80,000 in the past year, were paid off, leaving only \$15,000 for the next year as an expense. In the half million dollar budget are these items: \$199,400 for the general fund, which includes salaries, police expense, street, sanitary library and airport expenses; \$8,910 for the fire department; \$9,240 in the recreation fund; \$36,918 for interest on general obligation bonds; \$58,000 requirement of G. O. bonds; \$100,000 airport revenue bonds; \$30,445.50 interest on revenue bonds; \$22,000 retirement of revenue bonds; \$15,000 on judgment payment, and a total of \$102,156 for operation of the utility department—which includes the water and sewer systems.

The regular meeting lasted almost five hours at Mayor G. H. Steneman and Trustees Bill McCarty, Jodie Fillmore, Guy Robertson and Claude Whitehead waded through an agenda loaded with items. Holding much of their attention was the need for new equipment for treating some old and for building bridges badly needed. A discussion of group insurance for village employees was also held. Bids opened on a new truck and garbage bed for the sanitary department were referred to the Village Manager-Clerk and the Sanitary Superintendent, Blair Halladay, to determine which should be accepted. J. C. Capps and Sierra Blanca Motor Co. tendered bids with Sierra Blanca getting the nod on a Chevrolet and Pak-Mor at \$6,553.64. Capps' bid was on a GMC truck and Hobb's garbage body at \$6,879.21.

Confidential Oil Co bid of 2021 cents a gallon on gasoline and 1299 cents a gallon on diesel fuel was found to be lowest of three submitted. For aviation gasoline, L. F. Jennings, Ruidoso Mobil distributor, was successful with a price of 1700 per gallon for 80-87 octane and 1390 cents a gallon on 100-130 octane, with a truck rental at \$100 per month.

The officials discussed costs of installing two bridges on the Rio Ruidoso, one north of the telephone office, the other on North Loop Drive, south entrance. Engineer Quintin Daniel told the trustees the bridges would cost \$1,500 each, and bids were ordered advertised for. The engineer also recommended bids be asked for putting the 300,000 gallon steel storage tank in Young Heights in usable condition, and bids are being asked for this improvement now.

With a prediction by Airport Manager Lowell Morgan that revenues for the city at the airport would be up 50% this year over last year, the trustees voted down a proposal from Ralph Brown, independent aviation service operator adjacent to the municipal port that he would run the airport labor free for the village and remit to the city treasury 6c a gallon on gasoline and 10c a quart of oil sold. The airport problem, with its cost exceeding its income, was discussed for almost two hours by the officials.

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
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

**Multiple Use Research  
Suggested For Fort Stanton**

The Ft. Stanton Research Advisory Committee meeting last week at University Park elected officers and recommended research for the Ft. Stanton Cooperative Range Research Station.

Dr. John H. Knox, head of the department of animal husbandry at New Mexico State University, was named chairman of the committee and Carlton Herbel, research agronomist with the Agricultural Research Service, USDA, at University Park, was named secretary.

Dr. Phillip J. Leyendecker, dean and director of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics at NMSU, and Dr. Marvin Wilson, associate director of NMSU's Agricultural Experiment Station, were named ex-officio chairmen.

The committee recommended long-range research on multiple use of the station's 28,000 acres. Research will include the relationship of livestock grazing, wildlife and recreational uses.

The station's land is cooperatively administered by the Bureau of Land Management, with research administered by New Mexico State University's Agricultural Experiment Station. The BLM, the State Department of Game and Fish, and NMSU will share in financing the research.

More specifically, the recommended research includes grazing management for cattle and sheep, methods of watering livestock, watershed management, studies of deer, antelope, game birds, predators, rabbits and rodents.

The committee recommended development of educational facilities to handle youth groups, student groups, ranchers, and technicians who could see firsthand results of research at the station.

The committee, which Dr. Leyendecker said "represents as completely as possible the agencies dealing with range use," includes Morris A. Trostad, Santa Fe, and William W. Campbell, representing BLM; Ralph Bonnell, Glencoe, representing the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau; Dr. Carlton Herbel, Las Cruces, and Dr. J. L. Gardner, Tucson, Ariz., representing ARS; Frank J. Smith, Albuquerque, representing the U. S. Forest Service; Herman Ray, Las Cruces, representing the Soil Conservation Service; Sam Lamb, Santa Fe, representing the Department of Game and Fish; A. D. Brownfield, Deming, representing New Mexico Cattle Growers; Floyd Lee, San Mateo, representing New Mexico Wool Growers; and Dr. Knox, and ex-officio members Dr. Leyendecker and Dr. Wilson representing the NMSU Agricultural Experiment Station.


The committee toured the station one day and concluded its meeting on the NMSU campus the next day.

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

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

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# Hot Springs Takes Class B Track Crown

## Tribe Trackmen Place Eleventh

Hot Springs of Truth or Consequences combined a total of 61 points to win the State Class B track meet over defending champion Eunice last Saturday night at University Stadium in Albuquerque while the four-man squad of the Ruidoso Warriors placed eleventh in the over-all standings.

The Ruidoso cindermen picked up a second place in the 440-yard relay, fourth in the 880-yard relay and fifth in the 180-yard low hurdles.

In qualifying heats Friday night the Warrior relay team of David Scott, Jackie Garrett, Jimmy Steeles and Bill Stirman turned in 44.7 seconds for the second best time of the night. Hot Springs had the fastest time of 44.0.

In the finals Saturday night the Ruidoso spokesmen bettered their qualifying mark by three-tenths of a second, running the 440-yard relay in 44.4 for second place. Hot Springs won the finals with a clocking of 43.9. Both Ruidoso and Hot Springs broke the existing record of 44.5 held by Texico.

In the 880-yard relay the Warriors placed fourth behind Hot Springs, Tekum and Eunice. Even placing fifth the Tribe tied the state record

of 1:33.0 held by Ft. Sumner and set in 1962.

Bill Stirman ran a 10.4 in the qualifying heat Friday night to place second in the 100-yard dash, but got a poor start out of the blocks in the finals Saturday night and finished sixth.

Little David Scott placed second in his heat in the 180-yard low hurdles in qualifying rounds Friday night and advanced to the finals Saturday night and finished fifth with a time of 20.6 seconds. The winning time was 19.6 and won by Bobby Calhoun of Eunice.

Some 12,000 spectators watched the finals Saturday night as records by the dozen fell in all classes. Eric Christianson of Albuquerque tried for a new national record in the high jump, but missed the mark on three tries. Christianson's best jump of the night was 6 feet, nine and one-half inches to set a new state record and just one-quarter inch off the national mark.

Nearly 700 athletes from around the state were present for the meet. Tularosa placed twelfth in the meet, just behind the Warriors, with a total of 10 points. Winning the points for the Wildcats were Doug Bates with a first place medal in the pole vault and Ron Balliff's third place finish in the mile run. Bates vaulted 12 feet, 2 and one-half inches to win the event.




