

Around Town

Lee Bergeron writes from Elk City, Okla., that the gift subscription to the Ruidoso News is very much appreciated—but there isn't any news about a brother, Bob Gaston, and his wife, Dee, who are in the Ruidoso Downs Feed Concession business at the race track. Well, they're busy as bees, so not much is happening to report about them... This week's issue of the News ends Volume 18, and next week we'll start our 19th year of publication.

Race track talk: The \$1,737.60 daily double here Saturday, which had only five ticket holders in a \$10,222.00 DD handle, included at least one Ruidoso resident, Mrs. Leo (Connie) Pangel, we're told... In Saturday's 9th race, Quico was claimed by Fred H. Fuhrman from Tom Stevens, Gerald Bloss, trainer, for \$2,500; and in the 11th on Friday Bye Bye Night was claimed by Damon Follard from E. J. Burke or Wade Johnson, D. Follard, trainer, for \$3,000.



Every available man in Ruidoso and the neighboring towns of Capitan and Mesaberto was conscripted to fight the giant blaze."

Bankers Elect New Officers; 750 Register

Lawrence W. Walker of Las Cruces was elected president of the New Mexico Bankers Association and Las Cruces was chosen as the 1965 convention city in the closing business session of the 33rd annual convention here Saturday.

The convention opened here Friday and a total of 750 persons registered for the meeting. Walker is chairman of the board of the Farmers and Merchants Bank of Las Cruces. He was elevated from the office of vice president which he had held during the past year, and succeeds Robert L. Tripp of Albuquerque.

Named vice president was Winford Carlisle of Lovington and Harry B. Davis of Santa Fe was selected as the association treasurer. Re-elected to this post as executive secretary was Denton R. Hudgeons of Santa Fe.

A banquet Saturday evening at the Chaparral Motor Hotel, headquarters of the convention, closed the proceedings of the 1964 meeting, which attracted more than 700 persons from banking and allied fields in New Mexico and many other states.

Humane Society Plans Membership Fund Raising Drive

In a meeting of the Humane Society of Lincoln County Wednesday night this week it was announced that the portion of land which the Village of Ruidoso had offered to the society as a location for a permanent shelter, would not be available because of too many complaints from residents of that area.

The Humane Society members laid plans for a concentrated membership drive, and a drive for donations to build the much needed animal shelter for Ruidoso. The society has about \$1,200 in the treasury now, but it was estimated that another \$3,000 or \$4,000 additional was needed.



The Fruit Calendar

By DAN STORM

In the orchards up and down the way, you can begin to see that the earlier promises of a good fruit crop are holding good. For amongst the lush green of the fruit tree leaves—such a treat to the eye along about now, what with the painful picture of drought stretching up and away on either side—you can catch many a bright glimpse of color in the cheeks of the young cherries, peaches, plums and even apples.

The peaches, after a two-year absence from their place in the spring blossom parade and the autumn fruit harvest, are putting on a mighty effort to make up for lost time. The best peach crop that many of us have ever seen in the three valleys beginning to show its size and its colors.

Can You Bake A Cherry Pie Billy Roy, Billy Boy?

First to ripen on the trees is the pie cherry. There are some of these ready now. Adalberto Chavez, at Lupe's Cafe in San Patricio, says he has cherries ripe and soon to be ripe. Now the humble little pie cherry is one of the most healthful of all our fruits; and when they begin to ripen they do not last too long. Johnny Thomas, "The Kid," says he has the best fruit crop of all kinds that he has ever had. I thought I saw other cherries getting ripe on his trees, pie cherries again. He has sweet cherries to be ripe later. Mrs. Mayme Perry says her sweet cherries should be ripe toward the end of this month.

They say the sweet cherries over around up from La Luz and toward High Rolls should ripen about the twentieth of this month. Perfecto Sanchez says the apricots are plentiful and good this year in Tularosa to begin ripening toward the last of this month.






