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

## MESCALERO APACHES ARE PARTICIPATING AGAIN IN ANCIENT CEREMONIAL THIS WEEK-END

(Editor's Note: A member of the staff of the Mescalero Apache Tribe wrote the following story for the reservation's monthly publication, The Scout, for the July issue this year.)

Once again our thoughts are focused on an event we Mescalero Apaches look forward to from one year to the next. Although the event has been modernized or commercialized to a certain extent, it is an annual event which is as children and adults cherish as part of our Apache Indian heritage.

This annual event is the Mescalero Apache Indian Ceremonial held in honor of young Apache Maid

eris who have reached puberty, the aboriginal reckoning of entrance into womanhood. The Apaches still celebrate this one remaining native ceremonial that has religious significance. This rite, filled with sacred and social obligations and is based upon early beliefs. This year the celebration of the debut of young Apache maidens will take place on July 2 through July 5.

The young maidens who participate in this annual event are required to wear the traditional ceremonial buckskin suit. In this respect they are distinguished from other people during the four-day event. The young maidens who don these magnificent buckskin suits are then the center of all activity.

As a part of the most sacred aspects of the ceremonial, the big teepee in which the ceremonial is held is erected. The medicine men chosen will be heard chanting the ancient songs as the big teepee is constructed, pole by pole, limb by limb, until its completion, standing erect facing the east and to the sun as it rises up over the east mountain. The young maidens, in the meantime, are being readied by their attendants. They don the traditional ceremonial dress. As soon as the ritualistic functions of the big teepee are completed, the young debutantes are escorted by their attendants to the front of the big teepee and stand facing the east. They kneel on buckskins ar-

ranged for them. The yellow pollen ceremony takes place. Following this the girls are laid face downward on the buckskins and are massaged and rubbed from foot to head and right to left side by their attendants. Next is the run toward the early rays of sunrise symbolizing physical fitness. The girls run around a basket placed at a short distance. Four times they circle the basket. Upon completion of the last run, fruit, nuts, which have been placed in the baskets are scattered and young and old of the Tribe scramble for these favors. Thus begin the activities of the annual event.

Following the early morning ceremony breakfast is served to everyone. The food is first blessed by the medicine men. After the various food delicacies which have been prepared in the arbor have been enjoyed by all, the fiesta begins. There is social dancing in

which the many visiting tribes take part. The well known war dances, hop, eagle, buffalo, and other dances are performed. There are also games arranged for the children at this time since many of the young children do not participate. A baseball game is usually scheduled in which visiting Indian teams compete with the Mescalero Baseball team. In former times in place of the modern games, members of the Apache Tribe engaged in various Indian games of chance. The horse races, bow and arrow contest, foot races and wrestling. The activities of the first two days are virtually the same. Dances and games are programmed and take place simultaneously throughout the morning and afternoon of enjoyment.

An exhibit of arts and crafts and displays depicting various reservation activities may be viewed at the ceremonial grounds. There are a number of concessions on the grounds to provide cool soft drinks, ice cream, cotton candy, popcorn, and other items of spectators and visitors. An added attraction is the very delicious Apache Indian fried bread since there have been many calls for it in the past.

Each night the "Dance of the Mountain Gods" is performed by Indian men of the Tribe. This dance usually begins soon after dark and the dance takes place around a huge fire. The dancers are in groups similar to clans and are distinguished from one another by the designs on the upper part of their bodies. Each group of dancers is accompanied by one or two clowns.

Following the "Dance of the Mountain Gods", there are social dances in which anyone who wishes may participate. The social dances begin with the round dance. This dance is done by people forming a circle around the fire and dipping to the left by simply shifting the feet at each beat of the drum. The back and forth dance follows the round dance. In former times women of the Tribe danced up to the men who were taking part in the singing and lightly touched them on the back indicating their wish to dance with them. The back and forth dance lasted throughout the night. If a woman danced with the same partner during the night, she was obligated to give a gift of money, blanket or jewelry as an indication of his appreciation. The back and forth dance is performed by the woman placing either her right or left arm through the man's right or left arm, each facing in opposite directions and dancing back and forth to the rhythm of the songs. Although there remains a similarity of this dance as to formation, more recently it has gradually changed. The dancers participating in the dance face one another instead of interlocking arms and facing in opposite directions. All of these dances play a prominent part in celebrating the Coming of Age Ceremonial.

DATE IS CHANGED FOR LIONS PROGRAM  
Chartering of the new Capitan Lions Club has been set for Saturday night, July 18, Holts Cummins, president of the new club announced this week. Originally, the chartering had been set for July 25. Members and officers from the state and district organizations will attend as well as clubs from Ruidoso, Tularosa, Alamogordo and Roswell. Approximately 500 are expected, Cummins said. The Ruidoso Lions Club is the sponsor for the new Capitan Lions Club.

## SMOKEY BEAR STAMPEDE OPENS FRIDAY IN CAPITAN

The sixth annual Smokey Bear Stampede at Capitan will begin with the contest for Queen of Lincoln County Friday, July 3. The crowning of the Queen will take place at the Friday night rodeo program which begins at 7:00 p.m. Farn Hall, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Fletcher Hall of Capitan, will be one of the contestants competing against Claudia Bistell from Ruidoso and June Kilpatrick from White Oaks. Bert McDonough, Stampede parade chairman, announced this week.

The parade entries will form at 10:00 a.m. in front of the Capitan school on the morning of July 4, and will follow a banner guard from Walker Air Force Base and a mounted banner guard from Capitan. The line of march will be from the school east on Highway 280 to the Capitan City Hall and Highway 48 and south to the Lincoln County Fair Grounds. Parade judges will be Dee Bogie, Ruidoso; Fred Grosswell, Ruidoso; and Lieutenant Colonel Willis W. Allison from Walker Air Force Base, Roswell, McDonough announced.

Entries in the parade announced this week will be the Capitan School Band, the Chavez County Sheriff's posse, Wright's Cactus Stickers, Fort Stanton float also an old fire truck, two limos from the Lincoln County Road Department, Capitan Women's Club float, and Citizens State Bank float. Capt. Carrizo. Members of the old club from Roswell and Alamogordo have been invited, McDonough said, as well as Sheriff's Posse from Lea and Eddy County and others have been asked.

All it takes is a little wind to keep the apparently dead ashes very much alive, Smokey Bear warns.

## FIREWORKS BANNED IN NATIONAL FORESTS

U. S. Forest Service officials announced today that fireworks are prohibited on all National Forests in New Mexico and Arizona during the Fourth of July and at all other times. They stressed that the federal law banning the shooting of all kinds of fireworks will be strictly enforced.

"The forests are extremely dry and inflammable and it is obvious that fireworks and tinder dry forests will not mix without some pretty serious consequences," local Forest Service personnel warned.

—Centure of Defense Secretary McNamara for actions which "usurped the traditional military authority of the officers of the armed services which results in loss of prestige of armed services both at home and abroad."

—Advocated a veteran's hospital facility at the new University of New Mexico medical school.

—Called upon the President to reverse the present foreign policy and "substitute instead a determined policy to drive the Communists out of Southeast Asia . . ."





"You Must Die!"

Jesus accepted these words, when he prayed in the Garden of Gethsemane.

These were not harsh words to Him for He heard them from a loving father and out of submission, he heard them out of the love in which He served the world through the Father. That is what Jesus was praying about in the Garden of Olive trees. It was called the "Mount of Olives" or "Mt. Olivet."

"Is There Any Other Way?"

"Father, if it be possible, let this cup pass from me." Nevertheless, His will be done. It is one of the spiritual privileges and treasures that we can see Him with the eyes of the soul, there on the Mount of Olives where He quietly and obediently attuned His will to the will of God. 





## APPRENTICE JOCKEY WINS 4 STRAIGHT AT DOWNS

Veteran railbirds insist that Apprentice Jockey Kurt Minin established some sort of a modern turf record here over the week-end when he crashed the winner's circle for the first time on a recognized track with four consecutive mounts.

A World War II baby born in Munich, Germany, in 1942, the 22-year-old Minin, now a resident of Fresno, Calif., started his phenomenal string Friday with his final two mounts.

In the ninth race, he registered his maiden victory on a recognized track when he booted Jan's Peppy, owned by Bill Weaver of Olin, Tex., to a \$12.60 triumph in 1:07 4/5 for five and one-half furlongs.

Duly honored in all the traditional manners of the jockey's room, young Minin then came back to account for the day's feature at \$5.00, straight on favored Speedy Pearl, owned by his contract holder, Robert L. Cuff of Marysville, Utah.

But Minin was far from letting his string run out there. After a restful night's sleep, the modest, unassuming immigrant came back Saturday to sweep both ends of a rousing \$1,346.40 daily double and stretch his skin to four straight—something veteran observers couldn't recall happening to the likes of such star saddlesmiths as Johnny Long-

den, Bill Shoemaker, Eddie Arcaro, Earl Sande, et al, after riding their maiden winner.

Saturday's daily-double "block-buster" by the soft-spoken Minin included Pink Cork, stumping \$121.20 upset winner of the first race, owned by William Ryan of Iowa Park, Tex., and Regal Pal, \$44.80 winner of the second for J. Rex West of Chandler, Ariz.

As to hanging up the "official" sign on whether Minin's colossal feat

is an all-time turf record for an apprentice rider, the management here would like to rest its case and leave the decision up to Daily Racing Form's efficient statistical department and/or Hollywood Park's "College of Hatbird Knowledge," presided over by Professor R. E. "Lambert" Leightninger.

In addition to his mother, Mrs. Elizabeth Seher, Kurt also has a sister, Mrs. Helga Flores, living in Fresno, and a brother, Igor Minin, 27, currently in Uncle Sam's Army. His father, Andreas Minin, saw Kurt only once when he was seven months old.

"My father became separated from the family during the Russian-German phase of the war," said Minin. "He naturally was in the German army at the time and taken prisoner, but he now is working for the Russian state as a share-cropper in the summer and shoveling snow in the winter. However, we still correspond quite frequently, and I hope to be able to have him rejoin us in this country some day."

The rest of the family came to the United States almost nine years ago and Minin himself became a

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


