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

Extend Entry Date For Fair

Lincoln County Art Association president David Travis said committees planning the first annual Arts & Crafts Fair here Aug. 21-24, decided in a meeting last week to extend the entry deadline from Saturday, Aug. 15 to Wednesday next week, Aug. 19. He added that the association also hopes the public understands the fair is open to anyone anywhere to exhibit whatever arts or crafts they have produced, or own. "Exhibits are not restricted to residence, kind, nor size of the person making the entry," he stressed.

The show will be held four days in the former Ruidoso Telephone Co. building here and there will be no admission charge. An entry blank is printed elsewhere in today's paper for those who wish to have an exhibit. About 20 persons attended a meeting of the association held Tuesday evening this week at the Chaparral Hotel. Speaker was Rutherford Goodwin, art instructor from the Ringling School, Sarasota, Florida, who spoke on abstract art. He was critical, in general, of the trend, but said most viewers of abstract canvases sought to interpret, or find a meaning, in abstract painting when, after all, it was meant to be a bit of color, and give a person pleasure to view it—as a tree or flower. "You don't seek a meaning in a tree," he said by way of explanation.

I managed for our suburban community of Lake View Terrace with a population at that time of about 5000. It is a part of the City of Los Angeles and the City Councilmen sponsor these drives in their districts. Our Councilman has six communities in his district. We had a contest for a Miss First District Beautiful. Each Community had a candidate. Our City Trucks were placed at the Community Disposal for two days as well as several private disposal company trucks. One was stationed at a convenient location at certain hours for people to bring trash picked up along streets in private trucks and un-load into the city trucks.

The Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Cub Scouts, etc., delivered the Door Knock Notices to each house appraising them of the drive and contest, stating the days of free pickup and that anything placed at the curb on these days would be taken. Especially we mentioned old water heaters, refrigerators, old upholstered furniture, even car bodies.

Here, I think the Notices could be placed in the Post Office Boxes. Our Civic Association paid for the Notices, maybe the Chamber of Commerce would do it here. Also we offered a prize for the cleanest community in the District and the street with the biggest improvement. Our Councilman donated a Silver Trophy properly inscribed. Our Community was fortunate enough to win the Trophy. Each Community gave a Street Prize of a Parkway Tree. Our Garden Club donated that prize.

Here, possibly individual residents could compete for an Improvement Prize, possibly a Merchandise order from some local firm for some Garden Supplies. This will encourage City Beautification. Before and after pictures should be taken.

Any contest or project where children participate always creates parent interest. Our Youth Groups picked up trash on certain designated streets and vacant lots as their contribution to civic service.

We had a Lake View Terrace Night and voted for our Miss Lake View Terrace. She was given a Trophy which we later inscribed with her name and a \$5.00 bill. She was then entered in the District Contest. We also gave each of our Youth Groups who helped, a \$5.00 bill. It was a dinner meeting, we had reservations and made enough over the cost of dinners to pay for the prizes.

We had a speaker on "Keep America Beautiful." Mrs. Valley Knudsen, who is president of Los Angeles Beautiful, the Women's Division of the L. A. Chamber of Commerce. A Youth Musical Group entertained. It was a very successful meeting and built up a feeling of good will among many residents who had never participated in community projects before.







The acting postmaster heads a faculty with a substitute employee, Mrs. Eltha Merrell of Captain, and an annual incoming and outgoing mail volume of approximately 124,800 pieces, excluding the volume during the holidays.
