



COMMUNITY CLEAN-UP WEEK STARTS SUNDAY

A well organized clean-up campaign, given strong backing by the Village of Ruidoso which will provide manpower, machines and money to aid in a concerted drive, is due to get underway here Sunday. The clean-up campaign will last a full week, Sept. 27 through Oct. 1, as proclaimed by Mayor G. H. Stoneman. Village trustees, in a meeting ten days ago, agreed with several local organizations that the Playground of the Southwest, if it was to continue to attract many thousands of vacationers as New Mexico's most famous resort, had to have a thorough mop-up of unsightly areas, a clearing away of considerable fire threats in the form of trash that could provide the fuel for a holocaust—as well as a health and safety measure in doing away with possible disease breeding garbage dumps in the business and residential areas. Ed Lane, enforcement officer for the Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department, has pointed out that there are several ordinances on the city's books that could be enforced if necessary to get the co-operation being sought in removing unsightly trash and unhealthy and dangerous fire traps. This week he was busy visiting with some of the local business firms, and property owners in some of the subdivisions, inviting their co-operation in giving their premises a thorough clean-up. . . On a special committee working with Lane, named by the village trustees, are Vic Lamb, Wayne Estes, Guy Robertson, Mike Long, Jim Hine and Blair Halladay. . . Bulky trash, such as large pieces of old furniture and discarded machinery, crates, etc., will be dumped into a large gully made available by the U. S. Tickets are on sale at \$1 each at the C. of C. office, by Chamber of Commerce members and officials and are also available in numerous stores in the community. 

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

Twenty Indian men from the Mescalero Apache reservation began training at Sierra Blanca Ski Area on Tuesday, Sept. 8. The training will be of 16 weeks duration and is financed under the Area Redevelopment Administration and sponsored by the Ruidoso School District, George White, superintendent. The training proposal was submitted by the Mescalero Apache Tribal Business Committee, president Wendell Chino, to qualify Apache people for employment at Sierra Blanca. The 20 enrollees will learn every aspect of ski operation including public relations, first aid and equipment maintenance. Head instructor for the course is Raymond Hied from Steamboat Springs, Colo. Hied is a college graduate with many years experience in ski areas. Two assistant instructors, Jan McElhaney and John Fuchs will assist on a part time basis. Bobby Watkins will act as supervisor and Mrs. Jackie Vaillant is handling the clerical duties. The Sierra Blanca Ski Area is owned and operated by the Mescalero Apache Tribe and is managed by Roy Parker.

CHAPARRAL PLANS 100-UNIT EXPANSION





Rockefeller, the brother of New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller, said his home state, Arkansas, was a one-party state 12 years ago. "We began building a two-party system, and today Arkansas is well on the way to having competition in government," he said.

With GOP Candidates

Rockefeller appeared with New Mexico Republican candidates Edwin L. Mechem, incumbent in the race for a U. S. Senate seat; Merle Tucker, gubernatorial candidate; and Dr. Jack Redman and Mike Sims, both U. S. House of Representatives hopefuls.

The rally followed a barbecue at 1 p.m. attended by about 700 persons. The activities were held in the Ice-O-Rama auditorium.

Tucker, speaking at the rally, asked out at Gov. Jack Campbell, seeking re-election on the Democratic ticket, calling him a "liar" in connection, with his promises regarding taxes.

"In the campaign Mechem stated a temporary increase of one cent in the sales tax was necessary until a commission could study the



entire tax system," Tucker said. "Not Necessary" Campbell said the increase was not necessary, but as soon as he took office he raised the sales tax permanently," Tucker said.

He said there are three main issues in the present campaign, "the Highway Department 'mess', the use of machine politics in anti-poverty legislation, and the fiscal responsibility of the present administration." Hitting at the Democratic machine which, he says, controls New Mexico, he pointed to the part being

played by Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman in getting Johnson elected.

Positive Proof Freeman's entry into the state campaign, as admitted by former Gov. John E. Miles, is positive proof of Goldwater's charge the administration is using its powers as a propaganda machine to re-elect Johnson," Tucker said.

"Regardless of surplus predictions, you can't spend more than you take in without leaving a deficit somewhere," he said. Mechem said this is the year Americans can change the direction of their government "from the road to socialism, down which we have already traveled part way, back to the system of individual freedom that made this country great."





(Continued from Page 1—Sec. A) make the local mine operators as happy as kids watching a candy store being built across the street from school.

Mr. A. Runnels, a local mine operator, told me the other night that the Silverton Mining Co. leased 37 mining claims from him and 81 from his brother S. Runnels. They also leased 769 claims from the Southern Pacific Railroad and two claims from Mr. Spencer C. Ely.

Bear Creek Mining Co. is still very active in the Bonito area and I heard they completed some drill in 27 locations. Runnels has 4 they are looking for large low grade molybdenum deposit.

Phillip Petroleum, according to my information, has drilled two deep test holes in Kraus Gulch and George Canyon. One test is reported 15 copper deposit. Reportedly they drilled into this deposit at 45 feet out at 95 feet back in again at 120 feet and out again at 450 feet.

Some local reported assays are as follows: The Old Hook at the mouth of Bear Canyon 15' lead and 42 oz silver ton. The White Swan \$52.00 silver per ton. The Argentine \$97.50 per ton in silver.

Mr. J. A. Hanley informed me the other day that he intends to go into full scale operation underground at the Silver Plume this October. Mr. Hanley owns 80% of this silver mine at Eagle Canyon. It contains drifts stepped out to an extent I have never seen in this country. There are many visible veins just below the surface containing minuscule azurite, lead, silver and molybdenum. One vein assayed at 50.6 oz silver per ton last Monday. Mr. Hanley bought a new front end loader, compressor combination to expedite the outside surface work preparatory to drifting underground. This mining property appears to be granite and porphyry. The igneous rocks have been intruded into the original limestone deposits. This seems to be common with most of the Sierra Blanca district. The lessee, Mr. J. B. Hightower, has related many interesting facts to me in reference to the Silver Plume. One of which was the existence of a miniature railway circumventing the mountain from the mine entrance to the mill in the canyon below. Mr. Hanley is in possession of reports made by a mining engineer, in reference to this property, made many years ago. One of the most interesting aspects of this report is that in the writer's opinion, the potential of this property a few hundred feet further down at today's silver prices is 45 million dollars.

north of the river up to the traffic circle above the postoffice on Sudderth Wednesday, Sept. 30; the area south of the river in the same region Thursday, Oct. 1, and the area above the traffic circle in the upper canyon Friday and Saturday, Oct. 2 and 3.

Residences or businesses having more trash to be hauled away during the clean-up week than their usual containers will hold are asked to place the surplus trash in boxes, sacks or other containers in amounts no more than one person can lift, and have them in an accessible place, near where trucks can be driven.

Chairman Lane said civic groups would be invited to help clean up unoccupied property and vacant lots in those regions later in the week.

Cleanup of the river will be assigned to several groups. Mike Long said Boy Scouts would assist on Saturday, Oct. 3 in cleaning up the Ruidoso river in the Two Rivers Park area.

At least three trucks, besides the pak-mor trucks, will be used to remove the trash during the clean-up week, but other trucks and pickups are needed, and any that can be volunteered for the drive will be appreciated, the committee noted. Persons having trucks or pickups who can donate their use are asked

to phone the police dispatcher and list the offer with them.

Any bulk trash placed for city truck pick-up that is overlooked will be picked up if the dispatcher is notified of the oversight, it was discussed in the meeting Tuesday.

Ed Lane said he would welcome offers of aid from clubs, civic groups or individuals during the week, and would appreciate their reporting their desire to help to him so he could determine an assignment or an area to work in.







Sixty bow and arrow hunters got a reported 18% kill in the special antelope hunt staged on the Willis Lovelace ranch near Corona last week-end, according to Dwight Bowden, game conservationist of Captain who assisted in patrolling the area.

Bowden said the regular gun season for antelope will be held from Saturday noon this week-end, Sept. 26, through Sunday until sunset, Sept. 27, in the Southeastern part of the state, which includes a large part of Lincoln County.

Another report on the Lincoln County bow and arrow hunt was received this week from the state game and fish department in Santa Fe as follows:

At Corona on the Lovelace Ranch 61 hunters took 8 antelope, for 13.1% success. The antelope were in such poor condition that the hunt was moved on the second day in the attempt to find animals in better condition. In spite of the move, and in spite of rain and fog, most of the hunters got in a few shots. Under the adverse conditions the success percentage is regarded good.


Deer Hunting Set Nov. 14 On Reservation

Jockey Obtains Injunction

Attorney T. B. Keleher filed the petition for Adair against the racing board and its individual members.







ORDINANCE NO. 119
AN ORDINANCE DECLARING WEEDS, GRASS, DELETERIOUS GROWTHS OR OTHER NOXIOUS MATTER TO BE A NUISANCE, PROHIBITING THE MAINTENANCE OF SUCH NUISANCE, ESTABLISHING PROCEDURES FOR THE REMOVAL OF SUCH NUISANCE, FIXING CHARGES FOR SUCH REMOVAL AND ESTABLISHING A LIEN AND PROVIDING PENALTIES.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO:
Section 1. It is hereby declared that weeds, grass, deleterious growths or other noxious matter is a nuisance and constitutes a health menace and fire hazard and is prohibited.

Section 2. No owner of any lot, place or area within the Village or the agent of such owner, shall permit on such lot, place or area any weeds, grass, deleterious growths or other noxious matter to be growing, lying or located thereon.

Section 3. No owner of any lot, place or area within the Village, or the agent of such owner, shall permit on such lot, place or area, any weeds, grass, cuttings, trash or other noxious matter that shall constitute a fire hazard.

Section 4. The Superintendent of Sanitation and or the Fire Chief (or his designated representative), is hereby authorized and empowered to notify in writing the owner of any such lot, place or area within the Village or the agent of such owner to cut, destroy and remove the items set out in Section 2 above. Such notice shall be certified mail addressed to the owner or agent of the owner at his last known address and it shall be the duty of the owner or agent of the owner to forthwith comply with said notice.

In addition to the penalties herein provided upon the failure, neglect or refusal of any owner or agent to notified to cut, destroy and remove the material as above provided in subsection (a) above within 30 days after receipt of the written notice provided for in subsection (a) above, or within 45 days after the date of such notice, in the event the same is returned to the

Village post-office department because of its inability to make delivery thereof, provided the same was properly addressed to the last known owner or agent, the Village Clerk is hereby authorized and empowered to pay for the cutting, destroying and removing of the material set out in Section 2 and 3 of this ordinance or to order the removal by the Village.

Section 5. When the Village has effected the removal of such material in Section 2 and 3, or has paid for its removal, the actual cost thereof plus accrued interest at the rate of six per cent per annum from the date of the completion of the work, if not paid by such owner prior thereto, shall be charged and assessed to the owner of such property based on the actual cost and shall be and constitute a lien against the premises to be benefited by such removal.

Section 6. The assessment provided for above shall be made by the Board of Trustees from the data furnished by the Village Clerk and said Clerk, under the direction of the Board of Trustees shall make an assessment roll containing in columns the name of the owner of each lot or parcel of land separately assessed. If known to him, and the amount assessed separately against each lot or parcel of land. The assessment roll shall be prepared on or before December 1, 1962 and on or before that date each year thereafter.

Section 7. After the assessment roll provided for above is made and filed by the Village Clerk with the Board of Trustees, the Village Clerk shall give ten (10) days notice by one publication in a newspaper of the Village that the assessment roll is on file in the Clerk's office, which notice shall state the property against which an assessment has been made and shall state a time at which the Trustees will meet to hear the appeals or protests arising by such assessments.

Section 8. At the time fixed for such protest meeting the Village Council shall meet and hear and determine upon all appeals, protests and objections which may be made by any interested party; and if the proceedings are found to be regular the Village Council shall

correct any errors which may have been found in the assessments and shall thereupon, by resolution, direct the confirmation of such proceedings and the proceedings and assessments as so confirmed shall thereafter be deemed the final determination of the regularity, validity and correctness of the assessment and the amounts thereof.

Section 9. On or before the first day of February, 1962, and on or before the first day of February of each subsequent year the Village Council shall certify to the Village Clerk a statement of all delinquent assessments describing the land affected, after which the assessment shall be a lien upon each lot or parcel of land described in such confirmed assessment roll, and it shall be the duty of the Village Clerk to make out, sign, attest and file and record in the office of the County Clerk, a claim of lien therefor. Such lien shall bear interest at the rate of eight (8) per cent per annum from the date of filing until paid, together with reasonable attorney fees for the foreclosure of same, and may thereafter be foreclosed at any time in the same manner as provided for the foreclosure of mortgages on real estate.


