



Woman Reported 114 Years Old Dies In Ruidoso

A Hondo Valley woman died in a Ruidoso hospital Thursday. Her family said she was 114 years old. A hospital spokesman said the death certificate of Mrs. Nestoria Lara of San Patricio would list her birth date as Jan. 26, 1850. Her family reported Mrs. Lara's husband died 14 years ago at the age of 82. They said the couple's youngest daughter is Rosalie Chavez of San Patricio, who was born in 1910. Mrs. Lara was born in Santa Rosalia, Mexico on Feb. 26, 1850 and had moved to San Patricio from Mexico about 62 years ago. Her maiden name was Mendoza. Her husband, Jose, preceded her in death about 14 years ago, and one son, Paul Lara, died in 1948 and one daughter, Mercedes Lara Romero, died in 1963. Funeral services were held Dec. 5 in the Catholic Church in San Patricio with Father Laurier Labreche officiating. Burial was in the San Patricio Cemetery. Pallbearers were T. R. Sanchez, Tircio Romero, Jr., Fermin Sanchez, Joe S. Garcia, Jose Herrera and Felix Herrera. Survivors include three daughters, Carmen Lara, San Patricio; Rosalie Chavez, San Patricio and Mrs. Sara Arayugo of Albuquerque, a foster daughter, Mrs. Arguello, Las Vegas, N. M.; and one son, Fred-Lara of Roswell, Chapel of Roses Funeral Home of Ruidoso was in charge of arrangements.

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Vandalism To Lions Club's Star Has Cost More Than \$1,000

This winter, for the 14th holiday season, Ruidoso Lions Club will erect its electrically lighted giant star on Sugarloaf mountain near Two Rivers Park. This season almost saw the end of this custom here. Last Sunday when Pat Valliant, in charge of the Lions committee to get the star blighted for the yule holidays, led a group of men up the mountain to see about the annual project, he found the bulbs burst, sockets for bulbs destroyed, the wiring to the individual sockets cut in several places, and the frame bent. When the Lions Club had its regular supper meeting Tuesday this week he gave a report on the committee's findings and said, "I think it's about time we dropped this project. The star has to be repaired, bulbs need replacing and wiring repaired every year because of destruction by vandals. It provides considerable hard work on the part of our committee of about ten men, who spend more than half a day fixing the star each season. I'm ready to recommend we quit. This project has cost us more than \$1,000 because of vandalism. Each year we are out considerable money because of the thoughtlessness of some people."






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Sorority Sisters Give Surprise Pantry Pounding

In New Orleans**

Lincoln County State Representative W. G. (Bill) Shrecengost, the minority whip in the state legislature, attended the national conference of state legislative leaders at New Orleans, held Nov. 18-21. Others from New Mexico at the conference were Speaker of the House Bruce King; Rep. Austin Roberts, majority leader; Rep. Simon Bustamante, majority whip; Rep. Bobby Mayfield; Rep. Ray Atchenson, minority leader; State Senator W. C. Wheatley, president pro-tem, and State Senator Ike Smalley. Shrecengost gave the following report on the conference: "The very interesting and informative meeting covered several subjects including such topics as: "1. Improving the Public Image of the Legislature. "2. Session on Legislative Control of Budgets and Biennial Sessions. (A) In our last election New Mexico voters agreed that New Mexico should have annual sessions. "3. Session on Reapportionment. The conference adopted a resolution requesting a Constitutional Convention to amend the Constitution to allow States the right to apportion themselves. "4. Session on Welfare and Relief: A great portion of the time was spent on the rehabilitation program, one of education and qualification for jobs being used in Cook County, Illinois. Some of the ideas might well be used in New Mexico. Interesting to note is that Cook County is one of the few in the U. S. that has actually reduced its welfare rolls since 1962. "5. Session on co-ordination between Legislator and Municipal Authorities: This interesting session in summary recommended more home rule, permissive legislation, less State control. Panelists included the mayor of Boston; mayor of Quincy, Ill.; mayor of Oil City, Pa., and the executive director of the League of California. "6. One resolution was addressed to the National Congress requesting that legislation be passed requiring each National Congressional Candidate to be a resident in that state in which he runs for at least two consecutive years prior to his running."

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
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

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

Exactly half of the 12 deaths were related to the carrying of a loaded weapon in a vehicle. "This is the most avoidable of all ways of getting hurt or killed," Gordon said. "It's high time people learned to unload weapons before placing them in a vehicle," he added.

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



Texans' Retirement Ranch At Nogal Gets Conservation Treatment

About a year ago Tom Gore, presently of Sweetwater, Tex., bought 170 acres of rangeland a few miles southeast of Nogal. Gore will be retiring in about a year and plans to build a home and settle down on this beautiful piece of juniper and pine covered land.

An Tom began thinking about how he was going to use his land, he realized that he had several problems. One of the most obvious was the need for erosion control. An active gully ran right through the center of his ranch. He decided to contact the local Soil Conservation Service Office to see what might be done about the erosion problem. An appointment was

made with the Soil Conservation Service technicians to meet with Gore on the land to make an inventory of the ranch resources, analyze the problems, and consider possible solutions.

Gore realized that structural practices such as dams and dikes could not by themselves do the job of stopping present erosion or preventing future erosion. After reviewing the basic principles of plant ecology or "how grass grows" with the SCS technician, an inventory of the kinds and amounts of grass and browse plants available for livestock use was made. A thorough investigation of the watershed drainage area, runoff characteristics and availability of suitable structure sites was also made.

With these planning aids and the consideration of various aspects of his family situation, Tom developed a complete conservation plan for his entire unit.

Gore realized that his range grass was the only resource he had which would bring in any supplemental income after retirement whether it was in the form of red meat from cattle or as feed for saddle horses used for pleasure. For this reason he felt that the most important thing to consider in his conservation plan was how he could improve his range condition. He decided that the practice of Range Deferred Grazing followed by Range Proper Use was what he needed. Deferred grazing is periodically postponing or deferring grazing on rangeland for a prescribed period during any growth period of the year. The purpose of the practice is threefold: (1) to improve the density and composition of the turf; (2) to improve the vigor of the key (most desirable) plants; and (3) to give new seedlings a chance to become established. Range Proper Use is simply the grazing of rangelands at an intensity that will maintain adequate cover for soil protection and maintain or improve the quantity and quality of desired vegetation.

A suitable site was located for an erosion control structure. This structure has now been installed with technical assistance in the design and layout from the Soil Conservation Service and cost-sharing.

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
