



**Catholic Priest Tells of Work of Ecumenical Council**







**ORDINANCE NO. 155**  
**AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE GRANTING AND REVOCATION OF LICENSES FOR VARIOUS OCCUPATIONS PROVIDING FOR THE COLLECTION OF OCCUPATION TAXES AND LICENSE FEES FIXING OCCUPATION TAXES AND LICENSE FEES FOR CERTAIN OCCUPATIONS PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH.**

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO:

**ARTICLE I**  
**GENERAL OCCUPATION TAXES**

**SECTION 1.** There is hereby imposed an occupation tax upon any person who shall engage in the Village of Ruidoso in any of the occupations, professions, businesses, trades or vocations mentioned in Section 2 of this Article. Upon the payment of the prescribed tax the Village Clerk shall issue to any such person a license to engage in the said occupation and the Clerk shall maintain a permanent record of the licenses so issued and the periods covered thereby. Each person owning or operating more than one business or engaging in more than one occupation in the Village shall obtain a separate license and pay the proper tax for each of any such business or occupations.

**SECTION 2.** Wherever the word person is used in this Ordinance such word shall include individuals or more persons operating as joint ventures, partnerships or any other association of persons and corporations.

**SECTION 3.** It is hereby declared unlawful to operate a business or engage in any occupation, profession, trade or vocation on which an occupation tax is imposed or for which a license is required by this Ordinance without first securing from the Village Clerk the prescribed license therefor.

**SECTION 4.** An occupation tax in the amount of one dollar per annum for each one thousand dollars gross volume per annum of business done by such occupations, professions, businesses, trades or vocations mentioned in Section 2 of this Article is hereby imposed. PROVIDED, however, that a minimum tax of five dollars per annum or fraction thereof shall be paid. Licenses issued under this Article shall not be transferable and the purchaser of any business so licensed shall take over such business or engage in such occupation until he has procured from the Village Clerk the required license and paid to the Clerk the minimum tax of five dollars for any year that he is licensed by the Clerk until the applicant has made full payment for prior years.

**SECTION 5.** It is hereby declared to be the duty of every person as herein defined to file on or before March 15th of each year with the Village Clerk a statement under oath showing the gross volume of business done by such person as herein defined for the year ending December 31st prior thereto and on or before March 22nd of each year the Board of Trustees shall fix the gross volume of business done for the purpose of taxing such occupation or business from such statement filed with the Village Clerk and other information obtainable by the Board. The Clerk shall furnish to all licensees for the preceding year and to others shown to him to be engaged in any occupation, suitable printed forms for said purpose. Such forms shall be provided a month after January 1st of each year as may be possible. The Village Clerk shall require from any such person to submit the amount of gross income as reported to the school tax division of the Bureau of Revenue of the State of New Mexico as part of such statement. The Board shall give notice to any such person making application for a license under the provisions of this Article and who may protest the assessment so made of the time and place fixed for a hearing of such protest by the Board which notice shall be mailed to each protestant by the Village Clerk by certified mail in sufficient time for the protestant to receive such mail in due course not less than five (5) days prior to the time fixed for hearing. At the hearings the protestant may appear in person, by attorney or by written statement disclosing in detail the facts on which his protest is based. The Board shall at the closing of such protest hearing consider all of the evidence that the assessment is too high, the Board shall make a reassessment for such lower amount as it may find to be just and proper.

**SECTION 6.** Any person who pays a license fee after March 15 of each year is declared to be delinquent and a penalty of ten per cent of the license tax due plus one per cent of such tax per month or fraction thereof is hereby imposed upon such delinquent person. Any person starting a new business without first obtaining a license and paying the tax therefor is hereby declared delinquent and subject to the penalties imposed by this section.

**SECTION 7.** If any person subject to the terms of this Article shall fail, neglect or refuse to make the statement specified in Section 5, showing his gross volume of business, the Board of Trustees

shall make an estimate of the tax liability based upon any information in its possession, or that may come into its possession, for the period with respect to the period for which the person has failed to file the required statement, and the person so failing shall be assessed with such estimated tax for that year. The Clerk shall give written notice to all persons so assessed of the amount of the assessment and any such person may timely protest such assessment as provided by Section 5 of this Article.

In the event any person subject to this Article shall establish a new business or begin any occupation during the course of any year, then and in that event, such person shall, before engaging in any occupation, file with the Clerk the statement required by Section 5 of this Article, and the statement shall contain an estimate of the anticipated gross volume from such business or occupation for the calendar year. The Board of Trustees shall promptly assess the amount of occupation tax to be paid by such person for that year, taking into consideration the estimate of the applicant and such other information as it may have available pertaining to the matter, provided, however, that should the gross volume of such business or occupation exceed the amount estimated or fixed by the Board, then and in that event, such person shall pay the proper additional amount on or before March 15th of the ensuing year, and on said date any such unpaid tax shall be deemed delinquent and subject to the penalties imposed by Section 6 of this Article.

**SECTION 8.** The occupation tax imposed by the provisions of this Article shall be paid by all persons within the following categories to-wit: Telegraph companies, telephone companies, electric light and power companies, street railway companies, heating companies, railway express companies, gas companies, power companies and cold storage and refrigeration companies, retail merchants of all kinds, commission merchants, coal dealers, ice dealers, lumber dealers, ice cream dealers, milk dealers, livestock dealers, produce dealers, dealers in goods and wares of every kind and character, mercantile agencies, real estate agents, claim agents, adjusters and collectors, financial agents, rental agents, and agents and agencies of every kind and character, abstractors of land titles, guarantors of land titles, bankers, banking corporations, trust companies, investment companies, building companies, loan companies, surety companies, bonding companies, brokerage companies, newspaper publishers, publishing companies, publishing enterprises, electrical supply companies, oil companies, mining companies, garages and repair shops, manufacturing and other corporations, institutions and establishments, poles and wires of conduits and wires of telegraph, telephone, electric light, street railway and electric and power companies, lawyers, doctors, dentists, druggists, confectioners, photographers, undertakers, storage and transfer houses, and sales of unclaimed goods by express companies and common carriers, theaters, permanently located and operated for exhibitions of moving, screen and sound pictures and stage and operatic performances or any of them, contractors of all types of work, motels, hotels, motels, cafes, restaurants, barber shops, beauty shops, laundries, washeries, cleaning and pressing establishments, hat cleaning and blocking and home laundries, mines, mining and exploration for minerals of all types, assay offices, new and second hand automotive companies, automotive agencies, new and used machinery and equipment of all kinds, and all other occupations, professions, trades, pursuits, utilities, establishments and businesses of whatever name or character, like or unlike, excepting only those specifically exempted by the laws of New Mexico or the laws of the United States and those for which a specific license fee is prescribed by Article 2 of this Ordinance, provided, that the license tax upon gasoline and oil filling stations which sell other merchandise of any kind or character shall be one dollar per annum for each one thousand dollars gross volume of business done per annum, exclusive of all gasoline sales with a minimum tax of \$5.00 per annum, or any part of a year.

**ARTICLE II**  
**REGULATIONS OF SUNDRY OCCUPATIONS**

**SECTION 1.** It is hereby declared that the licensing and regulation of the occupations, business, trades and vocations herinafter mentioned is necessary for the health, safety and general welfare of the inhabitants of the Village of Ruidoso, and that all persons as defined in Article I, Section 2 hereof, shall pay to the Village Clerk a license fee hereby required as follows:

Livery, feed and riding stables \$ 50.00

Stage and bus operators and persons transporting passengers for hire, including taxicabs, for the first of any such vehicle 25.00

Each additional vehicle 5.00

Itinerant vendors, who solicit on the streets or other public places or who have no place of business, per diem 10.00

Pawnbrokers 100.00

Billiard and pool halls, each table 5.00

Bowling and pin alleys, each alley 5.00

Circuses, carnivals, menageries, traveling shows and similar amusement devices, per diem 100.00

Wagons, drays, trucks and all types of vehicles used for hauling for hire, first vehicle 10.00

Each additional vehicle 5.00

Gravel, sand and earth moving, first vehicle 10.00

Each additional vehicle, including tractors of all types, bulldozers, graders, trucks, loaders and other items of equipment so employed 5.00

Phrenologists, palmists, fortune tellers, and clairvoyants 200.00

Private detectives, detective agencies, investigators, private patrol agencies 25.00

Boxing, sparring, wrestling and similar sporting matches and exhibitions, per diem 25.00

Second hand stores 25.00

Shooting galleries, skating rinks and amusement parks including golf courses of all types 25.00

Street and sidewalk stands not operated by itinerant vendors 25.00

Bicycle and scooters for hire, each vehicle 5.00

Itinerant doctors and dentists, healers of all types, corn doctors, masseurs, and private hospitals 100.00

Junk dealers 25.00

Coin operated machines, not prohibited by the laws of New Mexico, each machine 5.00

Fairs, exhibits of Arts or crafts, museums, temporary or itinerant theatrical exhibitions or shows, gift enterprises not prohibited by law and all amusements not specifically provided for hereby 50.00

Ticket-brokers, public lecturers, bath-houses, dairies, cattle, horse and automobile shows, concerts, and similar shows and exhibitions 25.00

Auctioneers, auction houses, advertising agencies, billboard and poster operations, public scales 25.00

Trailer courts, minimum not exceeding three spaces 15.00

Each additional space 2.50

Hawkers, peddlers and hucksters, per diem 10.00

Dance halls and public dancing places where admission is charged, per diem 10.00

per annum 100.00

Solicitors of all types of business who enter upon private premises in pursuit of their work 50.00

Tourist camps and camp grounds 50.00

**SECTION 2.** No person shall engage in any of the occupations mentioned in this Article without obtaining the required license and paying the specified fee. The Village Clerk shall maintain a permanent register of all such licenses in like manner as provided by Section 1 of Article I, hereof. Licenses issued under this Article shall not be transferable, and the required fees shall not be prorated.

**SECTION 3.** The Village Clerk shall furnish proper forms for use by applicants to secure a license under this Article.

**SECTION 4.** Every person as defined in Article I, Section 2, hereof, engaging in, acting as, or conducting a business of traveling peddler or itinerant vendor solicitor, before engaging in such occupation, shall make sworn application to the Village Clerk, whereof the applicant shall give the following information: Address, character of merchandise or produce offered or to be offered for sale, or business to be solicited, method of operation, and a statement of all convictions under the laws of the United States, the State of New Mexico or any other State, and under the ordinances of any municipality in New Mexico.

**SECTION 5.** This article shall not apply to, and no license shall be required by any farmer or producer of agricultural products for the sale of his crops or products grown or produced by him in the State of New Mexico, PROVIDED, that any such producer shall file with the Village Clerk a sworn statement that the products offered for sale by him were actually grown and produced by him, and were not purchased for resale. Such statement shall state the home address, and the exact place where the crops were grown or the agricultural products developed in New Mexico.

**ARTICLE III**  
**DENIAL AND REVOCATION OF LICENSES**

**SECTION 1.** The Board of Trustees may, after considering the information available to the Board, and when the Board shall deem it for the best interest of the inhabitants of the Village of Ruidoso, and the general public, deny to any applicant the license prescribed by Articles I and II of this Ordinance, PROVIDED, however, that

in the event any applicant for a license is denied the license applied for the Village Clerk shall promptly advise the applicant of such rejection of his application by the Board, and in such notice, shall advise the applicant that he may appear before the Board at the time and place fixed in such notice, and present to the Board such evidence and information as he may desire in behalf of his application. Such notice shall be mailed to the applicant at his last known address, and the date fixed for hearing shall be not less than five days from the date of the notice. In the event the applicant does not appear at the time fixed for hearing, or in the event that the Board, after giving due consideration to the evidence produced by the applicant, his reasons for granting his application and all other information available to the Board, shall find, by majority vote, that it is not in the best interest of the public that the license be issued, such license may be refused and the Village Clerk shall enter into the proceedings of the Board the action taken by it. At any hearing the applicant shall be entitled to inspect any documents in the possession of the Board and to examine witnesses against him. Such action by the Board in denying an application shall be final.

**SECTION 2.** In any case where a person, as defined in this Ordinance, is required to obtain a license for any calling, occupation, profession, business or vocation, and has been adjudged guilty of violating any Village Ordinance in relation thereto or whenever in the judgment of the Board of Trustees, the public welfare shall require, any license issued under Article I or II hereof may be revoked. Upon a determination by the Board that the license should be revoked, the Village Clerk shall promptly notify the licensee of such action by the Board and of the time and place fixed for a hearing on such revocation in accordance with the procedure prescribed in the preceding section hereof. In the event the licensee does not appear at the hearing, or in the event, after due hearing the Board shall find that the license should be revoked, the Clerk shall enter on the license register that such license was revoked, and thereafter it shall be unlawful for the licensee to operate under such license and the licensee shall promptly deliver such license to the Village Clerk, for cancellation.

**ARTICLE IV**  
**PENALTIES; COLLECTION OF OCCUPATION TAXES AND LICENSE FEES; REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES; DURATION OF LICENSES AND SAVING CLAUSE.**

**SECTION 1.** Any person as defined in Article I, Section 2, hereof, who shall make any false statement under the provisions of this Ordinance, who shall engage in any of the occupations for which has been revoked as herein provided, shall, upon conviction of any such violation, be punished by a fine not to exceed Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00), or by imprisonment not to exceed thirty (30) days, or both such fine and imprisonment.

**SECTION 2.** Each and every day that person, as herein defined, shall violate this Ordinance by operating or doing business without the required license shall be deemed a separate and distinct offense for which he shall be punished as provided by Article IV, Section 1.

**SECTION 3.** Except as otherwise specifically provided in this Ordinance, all licenses shall expire on the 31st day of December of each year, and all licenses required shall be procured on the effective date of this Ordinance for the year 1965 and on the 2nd day of January each year thereafter, PROVIDED, however, that as to persons not engaged in any occupation for which a license shall be procured and the fees or taxes paid before such person pursues or engages in the occupation, calling or business for which a license is required.

**SECTION 4.** The Village of Ruidoso shall have a lien upon the personal property of the person, firm, corporation or business from the time that such license fee or occupation tax is fixed to satisfy the amount payable under this Ordinance. Such lien shall have priority over any lien or encumbrance whatsoever, except the lien of state and county taxes. No sheriff, receiver, assignee, master or other officer shall sell the property of any person, firm, corporation or business subject to such license or occupation tax, under process or order of court, without first ascertaining from the Village Clerk the amount of any occupation tax or license due and payable under the Ordinance, and if there be such occupation tax or license due, owing or unpaid, it shall be the duty of such officer first to pay the amount thereof out of the proceeds of such sale before making payment of money to the judgment creditor or other person at whose instance such sale is had.

**SECTION 5.** The Village of Ruidoso shall institute such proceedings in courts of competent jurisdiction as may be required to enforce the lien imposed by Article IV, Section 4, and to otherwise enforce the collection of all Occupation taxes and license fees due and payable hereunder.

**SECTION 7.** If any part of parts, section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is, for any reason declared void, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portion of this Ordinance, and it is hereby declared by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso that it would have adopted such remaining provisions of this Ordinance, excluding any such void part, parts, section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase hereof.



El Paso Cathedral continued its dominance of the Ruidoso Invitational Tournament here last week-end by winning five games in a six team round robin tourney to capture the crown for the fourth consecutive year.




