

**TWO ESCAPE HURT IN 'COPTER CRASH**

Two men escaped uninjured in a freak accident in Sierra Blanca Ski Area Friday afternoon last week. Bob Walker, manager of Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Chamber of Commerce, and pilot Roy Cooper, had to crawl out from a helicopter that flipped upside down in the deep snow on the upper slopes of the Captain trail.

Cooper was flying Walker around the area to get color motion pictures and black and white still shots for publicity use on television programs and in newspapers and magazines. Walker said he was not sure what had happened, whether a turbulence forced the ship down to where the rotor blade struck snow and turned over, or whether there was a malfunction of the choppers' engine—in any case the accident scouted far more dangerous and exciting than it really was, he said. The ship landed in the soft, deep snow and the two men unbuckled their safety belts and tumbled out. Walker said. Earlier reports that the helicopter had struck one of the Captain lift towers was not correct, Walker declared.

Federal Aviation Agency investigators were here Saturday to view the wreckage. Walker said he understood damage would run from \$20,000 to \$25,000 on the whirlybird.

It is owned by Ralph Gary and the United Helicopters, Inc., of O'Donnell, Tex., and was based here for the winter sports season to carry skiers to and from White Mountain Park. The 'chopper' has been used on many occasions to bring injured skiers directly to a parking area adjacent to the hospital here. It also was used during the holiday season to airlift Santa Claus to various places in the community—and has had other uses here.

The State Corporation Commission recently granted a temporary permit for the firm to carry passengers in this immediate area, then renewed the temporary permit another 30 days. A hearing was held on a permanent certificate in January—but no decision has been announced by the commission as yet on the latter application, Richard Parsons, local attorney for United said this week.

**Local Dogs To Be Vaccinated Saturday, Feb. 20**

Vaccination of all local dogs for rabies will be held in Ruidoso Saturday this week, Feb. 20, from 1 until 5 p.m., in the Scout Room at the Municipal Building. Charge for vaccination will be \$2 and Village of Ruidoso license tags cost \$1 for males and spayed females and \$2 for females. All dogs brought in for vaccination must be kept on a leash and all dogs three months old and older must be vaccinated and licensed. Dr. Stoener, Veterinarian of Alamogordo will give the rabies vaccinations and members of the Humane Society of Lincoln County will issue the Village Dog Licenses.

Parts of the Ruidoso Village Ordinance No. 99, adopted April 18, 1957, which is an Ordinance regulating and licensing dogs, the immunization of dogs and making violations a misdemeanor punishable by a fine not exceeding \$100, reads in part:

Section 3. Licensing: No person shall own, keep or harbor any dog within the Village limits unless such dog is licensed as herein provided. The license shall be issued upon the owner's furnishing a current certificate evidencing the vaccination of the dog.

Section 4-B. The owner shall see that the dog wears at all times a collar or harness to which such tags shall be attached.

Section 7. Impounding: All dogs not licensed and vaccinated to the provisions of this ordinance shall be seized and impounded and if not redeemed by the owner within 72 hours may be humanely destroyed or otherwise disposed of as provided by this ordinance. All dogs found running at large may be seized or impounded.

Section 9. Impoundment fees: Any dog impounded may be reclaimed upon payment by the owner of the sum of \$2 for the first day or portion thereof and \$1 for each day thereafter.

Section 10. The owner shall confine within a building or enclosure every fierce, dangerous or vicious dog, and every female dog in heat.

Section 16. Penalty: Any person violating this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and punished by a fine not exceeding \$100; and if such violation is continuing, each day's violation shall be a second offense.

**Three Men Perish Of Suffocation**

Three residents of Espanola and the neighboring village of Fairview in Northern New Mexico perished in a tragedy far from their homes and fireside here last week-end.

Three men, one of them employed by Lowdermilk Construction Co., currently improving a segment of Highway 70 east of here, and the other two in search of work, died of asphyxiation in a small tourist court room in the heart of Ruidoso. The trio, two of them brothers and the third a foster brother, expired sometime Thursday evening. Their bodies were not discovered until 8:30 Sunday night.

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The dead were identified as: Raymond Gilbert Bustos, aged about 30, a mechanic, from Fairview, N. M., his brother, David C. Bustos, aged about 28, from Espanola, and a foster brother of the two men, Jose B. Macias, 28.

They had rented tourist court No. 32 at Fiesta Courts on Sudderth Drive on Monday of last week, paying for their room in advance. Manager of the courts, James Taylor, reported during an inquest conducted at the city hall Sunday evening in Justice of the Peace H. M. Graham's courtroom, there were several of the tourists' courts rented to Lowdermilk employees.

On the coroner's jury were Willard B. Forbus, Bob Hollis, Ed Lane, E. C. Estes, Blair Halladay and Taylor. They heard testimony from witnesses at the city hall after having viewed the death scene earlier in the evening. Their verdict was death caused by suffocation from lack of oxygen caused by a faulty heater.

Superintendent George P. White presented the 1965-66 school calendar to the board which was adopted unanimously. White also presented to the board a request to adopt a 6/6 school organizational plan. This plan means that grades one through six will be housed at the Nob Hill School and the proposed new school building near the airport and grades seven through twelve will occupy the present High School and junior high school buildings in the Gateway area. After considerable discussion and explanation of benefits and savings in administrative costs the plan was unanimously adopted by the board.

The board requested that Supt. White arrange a meeting with the Captain Municipal School Board to discuss transportation problems in the Alto area after the first meeting of the Captain Board following the recent election. Two dates were suggested, March 10 or 11, as possibilities.

A special school board meeting was announced for March 1, at 7:00 p.m. in the superintendent's office for swearing in new board members and re-organization of the board. The next regular board meeting was set for March 11.

**Information released here Tuesday in the office of Ruidoso Racing Association reveals that possibly the richest horse race ever held anywhere in the world will be run here in 1966. It will be the 400-yard eighth annual All-American Futurity for two-year-old quarter horses.**

The purse is assured to reach \$400,000 plus from the number of nominations that had been received by the race track office at the deadline, January 15, 1965. Racing co-ordinator Gene Hensley had predicted the pile of money might reach that figure. His guess was confirmed this week.

The sprint due to be run on Labor Day a year and a half from now, has had 520 youngsters nominated, assuring the extraordinarily high prize money. It will mean the winner will earn more than \$200,000 for its owner.

Other big news from Ruidoso Downs for the next few months includes an increase in interest, purse money and nominations for the 17th annual Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity, to be run Aug. 8 this year. The purse leaped from \$60,000 in 1964 to \$100,000 plus for 1965. The increase in prize money also saw a big jump in nominations, totaling 124 this season.

Not yet totaled up, but sure to draw a large number of entries, is the world's richest combination quarter horse race—the Rainbow, which is run in two shifts, a futurity for two-year-olds, and a derby for the same bunch of horses, at age three the next year. An estimated \$300,000 is in sight for winners, or \$160,000.00 plus on each race. Closing date for the Rainbow was Feb. 15, Monday this week, the racing association office said, but there hasn't been time to total up the number of nominations at this point. Enough nominations had been received prior to the deadline, however, to assure a wealthy purse, it was said.

Being mailed out this week were application blanks for nominations for a new big feature race, a futurity for two-year-old Thoroughbred—the Road Runner. It, too, will be held in conjunction with an auction sale—as is the Quarterly Horse All-American. The sales are proving as big an attraction for Ruidoso Downs as are the races, and have stirred considerable interest and comment throughout the turf world.

The 1965 season will see 60 race days, starting May 14.

A mining area near Ruidoso, N. M., first written off as worthless, then described as a jewelry store of silver, has been written off again.

Three mining firms headed by Charles A. Steen, famed uranium millionaire of the 1950s, took up claims in the Bonito district near Ruidoso more than a year ago.

Steen said at that time it appeared to be a rich silver strike in an area passed over by many miners. Further drilling indicated the strike really wasn't a rich one after all, Steen said.

Steen said the work was abandoned more than a year ago. He discounted reports that a smelter would be built as strictly rumor.

Steen said first assays were rich, but that the gold ore apparently was limited. The area was worked for gold in the 1880s and again in the 1930s.

The silver was found by Ira Young, a Ruidoso carpenter. Steen helped Young, a friend who once helped Steen in his uranium prospecting days.

**Your Minister Writes . . .**

"Peter-out" is a very expressive phrase meaning to "run out" or "fall". At first the expression was simple "peter", meaning "stop". The Oxford dictionary says that in England as early as 1812 it has this meaning. In Western American mining slang it came to be "peter out" being applied to a promising vein of ore that soon became exhausted of ore. It wasn't long before it was being used figuratively. In 1834 R. H. Riley wrote in "Pied-dieford": "He hoped the pebble meeting wasn't going to 'peter-out'." Since he used the capital letter, it may be inferred that he associated the expression with the name of the apostle Peter.

If so, the origin of this expression would be in the incident where Peter assured Jesus: "Though all men shall be offended because of thee, yet will I never be offended. . . . Lord, I am ready to go with thee, both into prison, and to death. . . . I will lay down my life for thy sake." This was certainly a very promising loyalty, but Jesus saw through the man's weakness and replied: "I tell thee, Peter, the cock shall not crow the day, before that thou shalt deny that thou knowest me." And so it was. When the supreme test came that very night, Peter denied his Master three times. So, with many of us, we "Peter-out" by failing to stand by our Lord and His Church in the critical hour.

### THREE MEN PERISH—

Ruidoso policeman Clovis Perry, first peace officer to arrive on the scene after discovery of the bodies said he noted a vent from the heater was not connected to the stove, being about an inch and a quarter away from the point where it should have been attached to the stove. Perry also said he had not found any evidence that the three men had been drinking. "There were no whisky bottles nor beer cans anywhere in the room," he declared. The three bodies were sprawled on the bed as though the men had realized their lives were in peril and had attempted to arise. One man was nude, the other two clad in light underwear. Two were on a double bed, the other on a cot. The court manager, Taylor, said there were no tracks Sunday night in deep snow leading up the steps into the court where the bodies were found. Thursday night last week the thermometer dipped to below zero in Ruidoso on the heels of a heavy snowfall that day and night.

There was no work done that day on the road project east of here, an employee of Lowdermilk's reported, because of the weather. The hunt for one of the three men was spurred by a telephone call from his wife. Mrs. Raymond Bustos called the Lowdermilk firm to ask if they had any knowledge of where her husband might be, saying she feared he might have been killed in a car wreck—that she had been expecting some word from him and had received none. The Lowdermilk officials noted that Raymond had not gotten his paycheck on Friday so an effort was made to locate him. Raymond's foreman, Earl Archuleta, began to hunt for the man's car, and he recognized it parked near Fiesta Courts. There he learned from the manager that the employee had rented a room there with two other men. The two went to the room at 2:30 p.m., peered through a crack in the door and saw two of the bodies sprawled on the bed—the other wasn't visible to them at the time.

They called for police and hospital aid. Perry said he found the room full of smoke and the butane burning heater still ablaze when he went inside the room. Deputy Sheriff Clyde Alwood, one of the early arrivals among peace officers, said the walls of the room, which measured about 10x12 feet in size, were covered with a film of oily soot, believed to have come from the smoking stove. Joining in the investigation were Ruidoso Marshal O. S. Modjes, Perry, Deputy Alwood, Sheriff Leandro Vega and Deputy Glen Bradley, from Carrizozo, and others.

A physician summoned to the room, examined the bodies and said he found no evidence of any foul play. He further said he believed the men had died 24 hours or more before he was summoned. In the investigation, Ruidoso police were told the last man to see any of the three alive was Andrew Miller who reported he saw Raymond bustos on Thursday afternoon about 8 o'clock.

Further testimony during the hearing revealed that owner of the Fiesta Courts was Moot McCall of Brecksville, Tex., who bought the place, which has about 28 units, in 1944. The bodies of the men, claimed by relatives who arrived Monday, were sent to Esparack by Chapel of Rouse Funeral Home here. Services were set for this midweek at their home town.

Great Falls, Montana Feb. 10, 1955

To Our Friends of Lincoln Co., I am writing to express our deep gratitude and appreciation to each and everyone of you who had a part in making up the transportation money to help bring my aunt back to Montana with us to live. It would be difficult to thank each of you personally by note, so I'm taking this means to say "Thank you" and I hope you will understand.

May I set down in order the events that have transpired in the last two to three weeks and relate them to you for the glory of God and the edification and inspiration of each of you readers.

When Norma and I set out Monday morning, Jan. 18th and headed toward New Mexico, I said to my wife as we were driving along, "You know, I feel like Abraham going out, not knowing whether I'm going" (Hebrews 11:8). We didn't know what we could do for Auntie when we started out, but we knew we could cheer her up somewhat anyway.

We arrived, safe and sound, without incident, at 1:30 a.m. Wednesday. The next afternoon we went to the hospital in Roswell and had a glad reunion with Auntie. She was so glad to see us.

Right then we could see that she would need extensive care. So the cogs in our minds began rolling at once. Needless to say we made it a matter of prayer. But what to do about Auntie's care was beyond our comprehension.

The next morning, while back in our home in Captain, I was having my morning devotions when the very last verse I read from the Bible was Proverbs 18:33 which reads: "The lot is cast into the lap; but the whole disposing thereof is of the Lord." My, how that verse did leap out at me. Surely, this did speak to my heart, because the lot of Auntie's care had indeed fallen into our laps, but here the Lord had promised to dispose of the whole situation, which—very thing He did do, as I shall further relate.

From that moment on we began to see the hand of the Lord in the lives of Rotarians everywhere on the importance of applying the principles of Rotary in their daily lives. "Live Rotary," he urged members, "do your work, in your relations with youth, and in your contacts with people from other countries."

to investigate the possibility of this morning. Naturally, we were sold on the idea of flying Auntie back for her own ease and comfort. But for some strange reason I woke up Saturday morning with a heavy heart, and the heavy heart remained with me as we drove down to Roswell to buy the airplane ticket along with other errands.

We were disappointed to learn at the airport that Auntie was too invalid to fly alone or even with one companion. I saw then the reason for my heavy heart. I couldn't have afforded to be hilarious to meet that disappointment.

We went from there to the train depot to investigate the feasibility of putting Auntie on a pullman coach. But that didn't work out. So only one alternative remained if we wanted to take Auntie home with us, and that was in our station wagon. With her amputation just a month behind we were apprehensive about the trip and how she would stand it. But our "disposing Lord" continued to go on before.

Our final trip from Roswell back to Captain that same Saturday night found us towing a U-Haul Trailer. The load was too much for my generator and it burned up. We were so thankful that this was the only car trouble we had in the total of 4127 miles we drove, would happen at Hondo, familiar territory for me.

With the car needing repair we were forced to delay our trip one day, leaving on Tuesday morning instead of Monday. Here again, we saw the evidence of God's leading. Had we left any sooner or any later we might have run into a storm. As it was, in all the three days' travel we had clear skies and only about \$250.00 has come in, with about 100 miles of icy roads in the northern Wyoming. As we neared

our home of Great Falls, a real good Chinook (warm southwesterly winds) had hit and the snow was melted and running in the streets. So from beginning to end we had no adverse weather conditions to speak of, which is very unusual for January in the Rocky Mountain States.


We spent our first night in Pueblo, Colo. When seeking a motel, Norma and I both breathed a prayer that we might find a motel where a willing and able bodied man would help us with Auntie. In Pueblo, the husband was a husky man and he helped us in and then the next morning we were up bright and early and he was able to help us get Auntie back into the car before he went to work at 8:00 o'clock.

The second day of travel was the most strenuous for Auntie. We arrived in Buffalo, Wyoming where again, an able bodied man was running the motel and he was more than willing to help.


And so after three days and 1400 miles we arrived, at 7:30 p.m. Thursday with Auntie standing the trip far better than any of us imagined.

And now, even since we're home, the Lord is still disposing. We have rented a hospital bed with an overhead "monkey bar" and side rails. The Deaconess Hospital here is moving into their new building next month and we will be able to buy one of their perfectly good used hospital beds for only about \$25 or \$30.

A county nurse came this morning and checked Auntie and she will be coming out a week to see her. The prospects of a happy May here are getting brighter and it is so good to have her in our home. Our children are glad to have her too. (Continued on Page 3, 556. A)



Improvement and management practices as a 4-H Junior grower.

Producing a quality apple was discussed at the fruit meeting held in Hondo last week. To do this the orchard must be managed properly throughout the year, not just at picking time. Foliage is affected by temperature, poor pollen and many other conditions. Only two percent of the blossoms are needed for an apple crop.

Gene Ott, Extension Marketing Specialist at New Mexico State University, talked on the Apple Market—What Ails It. Some of the symptoms of "the illness" that ails the apple industry is that the New Mexico apple is not wanted by the grocer, he prefers Washington apples. He prefers these apples because they are uniform in size, free from worms and pitted mature enough to taste good. Some of the prescriptions he gave for curing this illness are to spray to keep the worms out of the apples, grade the apples rigidly at picking time and keep the apple cool after picking as the orchard heat in the apple hurts its quality.

The new apple spray schedules will be available by March 1. This new schedule will include the new time for the last application before harvest.

The results of the 1964 leaf analysis was reviewed by Dr. Mohsen Nour, Horticulturist at N. M. S. U. Experiment Station at Los Lunas. Potash was found deficient in 70% of the samples. Of the minor fertilizer elements, Manganese, Iron, and Zinc were deficient in many of the orchards.

Selecting high fertility cattle will be discussed and demonstrated by Dr. Jan Bonstma at the Cattle Growers Short Course to be held at N. M. S. U. March 2-3. Many other topics of interest to growers will be covered at this time.

## THE REPUBLICAN CHALLENGE OR THE ONLY WAY FROM DOWN IS UP

Talk delivered at the meeting of Republican Party Officials at the Westman Skies Motel, Saturday, January 9, 1935.

It doesn't take an intellectual to read the handwriting on the political wall: "Change the Republican image or get out a crown." As one of those who speaks from underneath the November 3rd landslide, I recognize as well as any Republican the tremendous challenge we face, now and in the future. How we face this challenge will actually determine whether or not two-party government survives. At the moment we have moved, as a people, closer to one-party totalitarianism than ever before in our Nation's history. It is not for us simply to deny the situation, but rather for us to do something about it.

I would certainly never claim to have the panacea for reshaping the Republican image in the minds of the electorate, but I would like that a few suggestions, learned the hard way, might be helpful when added to other suggestions from other States. Inasmuch as the deplorable situation wrought on the Republican Party—and much of it by Republican Party—on November 3rd was fairly evenly distributed, I feel confident that my observations and suggestions now could be, have been, and will be reflected by Republicans in forty-nine other States. What is the Republican image right now? I am sure that, in too many minds, it is that of a tired, wrinkled, beat-up old elephant which has forgotten, seldom forgotten, and slowly learns, when mere mention of the Grand Old Party caused a thrill, a chill, a clear call to the political charge. Now we hear the endless repetition about the "Party of opposition". How true and how tragic—not to oppose, but to be thus labeled in the minds of men.

I, for one, am sick and tired of being a good loser, both as a person and as a member of a great political Party. The image of O. P. must be changed, from what it is to Government of, by and for the people, Republican plan. To do this will require the greatest effort by all Republicans, starting NOW. The key to this image transformation is the fact that the people are with us—if we do it.

As we do it, we must, I believe, employ a public relations approach often envisioned, but seldom accomplished during the long history of our Party. We have the talent, the issues, the proud heritage, the potential. Put them all together with a dynamic public relations (PR) program, and we can transform the Party of "opposition" to the Party of "Proposition". I believe that at least half of the American people share a deep concern about deficit federal spending, the mounting national debt, wasteful foreign aid, foreign policy, and the Social Security system by adding aid programs to the system, the communist threat. The results of November 3rd do not, I believe, reflect a repudiation of that concern, but rather a repudiation of the way the Republican alternative was presented.

There are those Republicans who now say that, because of this repudiation, we must change our fundamental philosophy. To do so would, in my judgment, betray the very reason for the existence of two Parties in the first place. To compromise fundamental Republican philosophy for political expedience is unnecessary and unwise, and to me unthinkable.

What is fundamental Republican philosophy, then? What are those areas of mutual agreement of the many splendid leaders and of the people of our Party? Equally important, what are those areas of disagreement, and is this disagreement relative or absolute? It is my opinion that we must all combat a very dangerous process—that of condemning a man for his ideas if they happen to be different. The right to be different is as fundamental a part of our American heritage as the right to be free—both free to and free from. As we re-queue our Republican approach to the presentation of our ideas to the electorate, we should make propositions clear enough that they will stand on their own merits both within our Party and before the electorate. Above all, we must always work for a philosophy which must remain greater than any man who expresses that philosophy.

Back to fundamentals. The 1894 Republican Party Platform is probably one of the finest presentations of the fundamental beliefs of a political Party ever put into print. Abraham Lincoln would have been proud of it. Thomas Jefferson would have been proud of it. Our national inability either to shake an image of negativity or to create an image of positivism defeated us. This national image of negativity was

There's a whole herd of young elephants waiting to join the older elephants in taking this message to the people now, and in the future. May all of our leaders realistically remember, forever forgive, and lastingly learn. The preservation of two-party government demands no less.







AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING A TRAFFIC CODE FOR THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO; REPEALING ALL OTHER ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT THEREWITH; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. There is hereby adopted by reference, as provided in Chapter 14-25-8, N. M. S. A., 1953 Compilation, all the traffic provisions of the Traffic Code of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, dated the 11th day of February, 1963.

Section 2. A copy of such Traffic Code of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, will at all reasonable times be available and subject to inspection in the office of the Village Clerk of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, all in accordance with Chapter 14-25-8, N. M. S. A., 1953 Compilation.

### ORDINANCE NO. 150

AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING A TRAFFIC CODE FOR THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO; REPEALING ALL OTHER ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT THEREWITH; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. There is hereby adopted by reference, as provided in Chapter 14-25-8, N. M. S. A., 1953 Compilation, all the traffic provisions of the Traffic Code of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, dated the 11th day of February, 1963.

Section 2. A copy of such Traffic Code of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, will at all reasonable times be available and subject to inspection in the office of the Village Clerk of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, all in accordance with Chapter 14-25-8, N. M. S. A., 1953 Compilation.

Section 3. Any person who shall violate any of the traffic provisions of the Traffic Code hereby adopted by reference shall be punished by a fine of not to exceed \$300.00, or imprisonment for not to exceed 90 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, at the discretion of the court.

Section 4. All other Ordinances in conflict therewith are hereby repealed.

Section 5. An emergency is hereby declared to exist on the grounds of urgent public need and this Ordinance shall therefore be in full force and effect five days after its adoption and publication as required by law.
