

Deadline for obtaining 1965 vehicle license tags without paying a penalty is March 2, says Con Brown, local state policeman. He says anyone driving a vehicle with an old tag is liable for a citation beginning March 3 . . .

Louise Coe Runnels of Bonito says some activity needs to be started towards urging the State Game and Fish Department to plant some fish in Bonito Lake, a very popular spot for anglers every summer. She said at this time last year, there had already been some fish planted by the game department in getting ready for the season opening in June . . . **PATIENTS INCREASE AT FT. STANTON**

A sudden increase in the number of patients admitted since Christmas to the Fort Stanton Tuberculosis Hospital was reported to the board of directors. Hospital officials said Saturday that about 50 patients had been admitted since last Dec. 25, boosting the state hospital's census to 195 persons. Dr. Louis Levin of Albuquerque, board member, said the average census is 175 to 190 persons. He attributed the increase to the state's TB clinics and a greater interest by private physicians in recommending hospitalization for their patients. Patients Listed The hospital, Dr. Levin said, admitted 219 patients last year of which 107 were new TB cases, 62 had been diagnosed previously, 35 were found not to have TB, 10 were unclassifiable, and four were Indians from Arizona. The doctor termed this "about average" for admissions during the year, but he predicted the state would surpass that number in 1965 if the current rate of admissions since Christmas is maintained. He said that 359 cases of TB were reported to the state Health Department (Continued to Page 6—Sec. A)

**FUNERAL HELD THIS WEEK—** Military rites were conducted in Roswell Wednesday for Pfc. Lavon S. Wilson, 21, above, a casualty of the fighting in Viet Nam. He was one of 16 U. S. soldiers killed in an explosion in a military billet. He is the son of James Ray Wilson, Captain, and other survivors include his wife, Marie, Roswell; his grandmother, Mrs. Lorena Wheeler, also of Roswell, and two brothers and two sisters. A sister who lives in Captain said the young soldier attended elementary school in Ruidoso for about six years prior to the family's moving to Roswell and Captain. The body was flown to Roswell, from Viet Nam arriving there Monday. Burial was in South Park cemetery where graveside rites were conducted by the American Legion. Pictures of young Wilson as a child appear in Ruidoso school annuals in the mid 50's.

**Albuquerque Man Painfully Hurt On Construction Job**  
 Odie Smith, Albuquerque resident, who is a serviceman for the Cornellus Co. of that city, suffered a painful injury when his arm became entangled in a soil-cement mixing machine on the U. S. 70 Highway improvement project east of here shortly after noon Thursday. He was brought to Ruidoso's hospital for emergency treatment, and then flown to Roswell for surgery. Attending physicians said the left arm, severely mangled, was amputated. The machine he was working on was leased to the road contracting firm, Lowdermilk Construction Co., by the Cornellus Co.

**HIT, RUN SNOW BRINGS SKI AREA 10-16 INCHES, 7 INCHES IN RUIDOSO**

A "hit-and-run" snow that passed through here Tuesday during the daylight hours dumped from 10 to 16 inches of new powder snow on Sierra Blanca Ski Area trails and left 7-inches of the white stuff in Ruidoso. A warm sun in a blue sky on Wednesday melted a lot of the heavy snowfall here. It brought .32 inches of moisture to Ruidoso, and a very cold drop in temperature, down to 12 below. The thermometer bounced back to reach the 50's on Wednesday.

Heavier snowfall was reported in the Carrizozo, Nogal and Captain country Tuesday, with high winds part of the day piling up drifts around Carrizozo. The snow was heavy down the Ruidoso and Hondo valley areas, too, it was reported.

Local street department workers were on the job and had cleared all roads in the vicinity by late Tuesday night. Although traffic was almost halted, peace officers spent another long night assisting those few motorists who did try to drive in the area.

Village Manager-Clerk Jim Hine said the 13-inch snow that fell here earlier in February over a four day

period cost the city about \$2,500 for street clearing, with some equipment needing to be rented, and with lots of salt used and some manpower working on overtime. This week's quickly moving storm was not so much a problem, he said. The two big snowfalls this month put Sierra Blanca Ski Area in the best condition this season, and hundreds of skiers from a wide area of West Texas, Arizona and New Mexico are expected this week-end.

**NATIVE OF YUGOSLAVIA, SKILLED ARTIST Part of Ft. Stanton Personnel 24 Years, Dan Kusianovich Dies**

A requiem mass for Daniel Kusianovich, well-known New Mexico artist and former administrative officer at Fort Stanton Hospital, was said at 11:45 a.m. Saturday at the Aquinas Newman Center at the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque.

Kusianovich, 60, died Wednesday night at his home, 1829 Sigma Chi, N.E. in the Duke City.

A native of Dubrovnik, Yugoslavia, he served as a sergeant in the Austrian Army in World War I. He left Yugoslavia in 1929 to become a merchant seaman. He began his painting career while still at sea.

He contracted tuberculosis in late 1927 and came to the U. S. Public Health Service Hospital at Fort Stanton where he met his wife, who was a nurse there. He was a patient there for two years and worked there from 1929-53.

He was an administrative official from 1949-53, when the hospital was closed. (It is now operated by the state). The Kusianovichs' home, situated at nearby San Patricio where they became close friends of artist and Mrs. Peter Hurd.

Kusianovich moved to Albuquerque in late 1957 where he joined the accounting department of Creamland Dairies, Inc. He retired from there last year.

His art career included shows in Paris, New York, Chicago and several shows in Albuquerque. He served for many years as vice-president of the New Mexico Art League.

Kusianovich was invited to show in his native Yugoslavia in 1963, and he and Mrs. Kusianovich went to Belgrade. However, the disastrous earthquakes there postponed the show.

He suffered a heart attack while there and was flown back to Albuquerque. His death was attributed to a second attack.

Served as Judge  
 Kusianovich also served as judge of the arts and crafts section of the Eastern New Mexico Fair at Roswell for many years. He was vice-president of the Lincoln County Historical Society.





DOUBLES SIZE—Bennett's Foodliner will be doubled in size when an enlarging program is completed in March here, Proprietor R. A. Bennett said last week-end. The larger store

will increase stocks and be arranged for more convenient shopping, he said. Addition is being made on south and east (rear) of present store on Mechem Drive.

## BENNETT'S FOODLINER DOUBLING CAPACITY

R. A. Bennett announced last week-end that construction work now underway by J. R. Emde, local contractor, on his Bennett's Foodliner store on Mechem Drive, will double the capacity of the firm.

New walls on the south and east are being constructed now, and when roofing is completed to attach the addition to the present structure, Bennett said the grocery will be closed for about two weeks to allow for installation of new equipment and re-arrangement of the store's interior. The present building is 60x80 feet in size, with 3,000 square feet for sales area. The new structure will be 110x81½ feet in the rear, narrowing to the front to 110x57½ feet, and will allow for a 10x56-foot basement for stock storage. The store will have 5,700 square feet of space for retail sales.

Bennett said the entrance will be moved to the east a few feet, that an additional checking stand will be installed, and that all new shelving and refrigeration units will be put in. Tri-State Planning of Phoenix, a firm that designs retail stores for greater efficiency for serving the public, drew floor plans for the new enlarged Foodliner. Bennett said, Frederick Refrigeration units will be used, sold through Hammond Refrigeration of El Paso, he said.

The store will likely close for the two-week changeover period sometime during March, and a formal opening date is tentatively set for Easter week.

A large new parking area on the east is being developed for the larger store to take care of at least 40 vehicles. Bennett said he did not anticipate addition of any new merchandise or lines of retail items, but would increase present stocks considerably. The store boasts a modern meat market, large frozen food display area and shelf goods, along with a notions section, as well as a large stock of fresh fruits and vegetables. Mr. and Mrs. Bennett are pioneer grocery store operators here, having had the Quality Grocery for many years prior to their opening the Bennett Foodliner in its present location about ten years ago.

## Rotary Club's Local History Is Recounted

Carl DeBord presented the Ruidoso Rotary Club's program Tuesday, commemorating the 60th anniversary of Rotary International. J. H. Cooper, assistant secretary reported.

DeBord's subject was the history of the local club and its projects and an increasing and holding Rotary members.

The Ruidoso Rotary club was chartered on March 17, 1905, sponsored by the Alamogordo Rotary Club which was chartered in 1923. Cooper said. It was brought out that in the year 1905 Ruidoso had no bank, no water system and no sewer system. Sudderth Drive was a narrow road of sprayed blacktopping over gravel. The telephone service consisted of a magneto 12-party line. The Methodist and Catholic churches were the only denominations having buildings. (A local axiom was running water was how fast you could go from the river to your house with a bucket, Cooper reported.)

The land which is now Forest Lawn Cemetery was donated by George McCarty and the project was sponsored by the Ruidoso Rotary Club after being brought to the club's attention by the Ruidoso News and Ewald Fuchs that the community needed a burial place.

Currently a loan of \$300.00 is being used by Noel Mathews for attending Eastern New Mexico University at Portales.

The Ruidoso Rotary Club is also currently purchasing shoes for needy children who attend the local schools and is also sponsoring one high school student per month as a Student Rotarian guest at regular club meetings.

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

(Continued from Page 1—Sec. A) ment in 1964, of which 24 were cases that were detected only after the death certificates were signed. "These are the potentially dangerous cases," Dr. Levin said. He said that these undiagnosed TB cases could expose others to the disease.

The board also named George W. Bryan, hospital superintendent for the past year, as the new administrative officer, replacing Dr. H. C. Jernigan, who remains medical director.

Free To Operate  
Dr. Levin said the move left Dr. Jernigan free to supervise operation of the state's TB clinics, which have been increased from 21 to 25 in 1964. Use of the clinics was a contributing factor to the upsurge of patients admitted since Christmas.

Dr. A. Eugene Mann of Fortalese, board chairman, was designated to contact the governor concerning the future of Fort Stanton as a state hospital. The board said it must have this information before it can launch much-needed construction at the installation.

Dr. Levin said that a building housing 37 children needs additional plumbing facilities. But, he said, the directors must know whether to repair the building or whether they can order it torn down and rebuilt.

The doctor said the directors are aware of a state report calling for the eventual phasing out of TB facilities at Fort Stanton and moving them to another medical center, probably in Albuquerque. But, he continued, they need to know when and if such a move will take place so they can plan for the hospital's current needs.

Dr. Mann was re-elected to another term as chairman of the board. Others re-elected were Mrs. Lena M. Pfeiffer of Tatum, secretary; and Mrs. Eleanor Jones, Captain; Dr. Levin and Paul Payton of Carrizozo, members.

### Rocks From Around The World Form Picture of Ruidoso Downs Race

Volney Ray of El Paso, a "rock-hound" who fashions beautiful items from rock, has the "hobby of all hobbies."

Ray, who spends many hours at his hobby, has duplicated from rocks throughout the world a horse race in Ruidoso Downs, N. M., which includes the horses, mountains, clouds, their shadows and other objects.

The table top, especially made for Mrs. Frankie McDougal of Lamesa, Tex., was built from rocks from her own collection, gathered from many outposts during her world travels.

The coffee table top is 40 inches across, 18 inches in height and 48 inches in diameter, with a four-inch border of wood surrounding it. It took Ray approximately 300 hours in cutting the rocks, fitting, polishing and assembling the intricate horse race scene.

Rocks from Mexico, Brazil, Argentina, Canada, India, South America and other countries and from such states as Arizona, New Mexico, Texas, Utah, Idaho and California were used on the table top.

According to Ray, only flawless and transparent rocks were used. He also installed a lighting unit underneath the table top to illuminate the whole picture reproduced on the table top.

The detail of the horse race is marked and the mountain resort

setting of Ruidoso Downs is an exact as could be possibly made by using a photograph of the actual race.

The odds board, monuments, the infield, backstretch and other landmarks are featured in the rock-constructed picture. One of the most unusual features of the picture is the cloud formation and its shadow on the mountains of the resort, all made from rock.

Encircling the big horse race scene are 16 panels of equal size and shape, eight of which are of rock slabs fitted together in colorful designs. The other eight contain reproductions of things that have played a major role in Mrs. McDougal's life including a caribou, moose, bear, mountain goat and stone sheep which she shot.

Ray also has a wide collection of rocks, one which contains a bug believed to be about two million years old.

"I almost didn't see it when I was cutting the stone," he said.

The insect can easily be seen in the rock an amber stone which was made from resin from a fir tree.





### ORDINANCE NO. 11 LINCOLN COUNTY PROCEDURE

Every owner, holder or other person in possession of any tract of land situated outside an incorporated Village in Lincoln County for the purpose of laying out any subdivision thereof, or any part thereof, or subdivide the same into suburban lots or building lots or any lots, or into streets, alleys, parks or other portions intended for public use, or for the use of purchasers or owners of lots fronting thereon or adjacent thereto shall:

1. Give notice to the Board of County Commissioners of intent to plat a subdivision, or to amend or vacate a plat previously filed, such notice to be filed at the regular meeting of the commission, either in writing or by personal appearance. At the time such notice is given, the Commission will discuss with the subdivider, and shall acquaint the subdivider with rules and regulations of such Commission, but without assuming any liability for possible lack of understanding on the part of the subdivider.

2. Submit four (4) legible copies or prints of a preliminary plan of the proposed plat.

3. Following approval of the preliminary plan the subdivider shall install improvements, or arrange for their installation in accordance with section 4 of these regulations.

4. Upon approval of the improvements or the arrangement for the improvements, the subdivider shall submit the final plat in accordance with section 5, which plat shall be duly acknowledged by the owner or proprietor of the land or by some duly authorized agent of said owner or proprietor in the manner required for the acknowledgment of deeds.

5. After the final plat is approved the plat must be filed with the County Clerk within ninety (90) days from date of approval or approval is null and void.

### PRELIMINARY PLAN:

In seeking to subdivide land the owner or his agent shall submit four (4) legible copies or prints of a preliminary sketch plan to the Planning and Zoning Commission before submission of the final plan. The preliminary plan shall include all land which is, or may be suitable for or susceptible to subdivision or development. Plats containing two (2) lots or less are exempted from the provisions of this section. However, a series of three (3) lot subdivisions on a tract of land used to defeat the purpose of these regulations and such plats will not be approved for filing. A preliminary plan is to be drawn to a scale of not more than 100 feet per inch unless the subdivision contains more than 160 acres in which case the plan may be at a scale of 200 feet to the inch.

The preliminary plan shall contain the following information:  
General Land office subdivision lines and corners.  
(a) The location of present property lines and existing streets, buildings, watercourses, and other existing features within the area to be subdivided, and similar facts regarding existing conditions upon land immediately adjacent thereto.

(b) Proposed location and width of streets, alleys, lots, blocks and easements.  
(c) Existing sewers, water mains, culverts and other underground structures within the tract and immediately adjacent thereto. The location and size of the nearest watermain and sanitary sewer and other utilities are to be indicated in a general way upon the plat.  
(d) The title under which the proposed subdivision is to be recorded and the name of the subdivider, the name of the civil engineer or surveyor licensed in accordance with the laws of the State of New Mexico who prepared the plat.  
(e) The names and adjoining boundaries of all adjoining subdivisions.  
(f) Northpoint, scale and date.  
(g) Any Zoning districts affecting the property to be subdivided.  
(h) Contours with intervals of five feet or less referred to a standard County benchmark; provided, however, that where the slope is in excess of 20 per cent a ten foot contour interval may be used.  
(i) Statements in general terms regarding (1) the grades of proposed streets, width, depth and type of surface treatment, (2) Lo-

which if fallen would touch the powerline wires from any direction.  
B. All secondary electrical wires from transformers must have a minimum clearance of five (5) feet from any standing tree or brush.  
C. Water supply outlets will be provided a minimum of one (1) each 1/4 mile throughout the subdivision-area. Pipe shall be not less than one and one-fourth (1 1/4) inches in diameter and shall extend eight (8) feet above ground. A three (3) foot horizontal pipe shall be attached to the vertical pipe with a flexible down spout provided, suitable for filling mobile fire pumps and tanks. Access to these water outlets shall be provided. Pipes comprising the water outlets shall be painted a bright red color.

10. The Forest Service, Lincoln National Forest, will make field inspections relating to fire prevention items, of all public subdivisions in forested areas within and adjacent to the National Forest boundaries, as directed by the Board of Commissioners, Lincoln County, New Mexico.

### PLANS:

For any subdivision, the preliminary plan shall be the Plans, except that in instances where more detail is required than is shown on that preliminary plan additional sheets shall be added. These separate sheets shall be as required by the nature of the additional information required.

### SPECIFICATIONS:

Specifications, rules established by law shall govern where they apply. For all subdivisions the subdividers shall submit a properly executed original and one copy of Dedication and Covenants as prepared by the Planning and Zoning Commission. Said instrument shall be recorded in the office of the County Clerk and ex-officio recorder of Lincoln County. In the event that all improvements as required by the Planning and Zoning Commission have been installed prior to the time of presentation of a final plat the execution of said Dedication and Covenants shall not be required.

### FINAL PLAT:

If the final plat conforms to the approved preliminary plan and if the necessary improvements are constructed in accordance with the approved plans or other suitable evidence acceptable to the Commission, assuring construction in accordance with the requirements of the Commission, the final plat will be approved by the Commission.

The final plat shall be submitted on cloth three prints thereon or cloth and 10 legible paper prints or copies shall be provided the Commission for distribution, together with three (3) copies of any deed restrictions where these are too lengthy to be shown on the plat and three (3) prints of certified plans showing the improvements that have been constructed within the subdivision before approving the plat of all or any part of any subdivision the Commission will require proof that improvements required have been satisfactorily completed. The Commission shall act upon the final plat within thirty-five (35) days after it has been submitted unless the subdivider agrees to an extension of this period. The approval of the Commission shall be shown on the plat with the signature of the Chairman of the Commission.

The final plat is to be drawn at a scale of 100 feet or less to the inch from an accurate survey. Plats shall be drawn on a sheet or sheets with a size of 8 1/2 by 14 inches, 19 by 24 inches, 24 by 38 inches, or 30 by 48 inches. The 8 1/2 x 14 size plat shall require no margin, on all others there shall be a 1/2 inch margin on all sides but the left; on the left side there shall be a two inch margin. If more than two sheets are required, an index sheet of the same dimensions shall be filed showing the entire subdivision on one sheet together with all areas shown on other sheets.

The final plat shall show:  
(a) The boundary lines of the area being subdivided with accurate distances and bearings tied to

some marker such as Land Office marker or to a previously filed plat, which plat shall be tied to a Land Office Marker.  
(b) The lines of all proposed streets and alleys with their width and names of streets.  
(c) The accurate outline of any property which is offered for dedication for public use.  
(d) The line of departure of one street from another.  
(e) The line of all adjoining lands and the lines of adjacent streets and alleys with their width and names of streets.  
(f) All lot lines and an identification system for all lots and blocks.  
(g) Building lines and easements for right-of-way provided for public use, services or utilities with figures showing their dimensions.  
(h) A statement shall be included to show the approval of the right of way by light and telephone company on cloth copy remaining in county clerk's office.  
(i) All dimensions, both linear and angular, necessary for locating boundaries and subdivisions, lots, streets, alleys, easements and building lines, and of any other areas for public or private use. The linear dimensions are to be expressed in feet and decimals of a foot.  
(j) Radii, arcs and chords, points of tangency, central angles for all curvilinear streets and radii for all rounded corners.  
(k) All survey monuments and bench marks together with their descriptions.  
(l) Name of subdivision and description of property subdivided showing its location and extent, points of compass, scale of plan, and name of owner or owners of the subdivider.  
(m) Certification by a registered civil engineer or surveyor licensed in accordance with the laws of the State of New Mexico to the effect that the plan represents a survey made by him and that all the necessary survey monuments are correctly shown hereon.  
Special provisions may be entered in the form of notes on the preliminary Plans, or may be filed as a separate instrument.  
CORNER MARKERS:  
(a) Plans. The Final Plat of the subdivision will serve as plans for these markers.  
Specifications: All lot, boundary and street intersection corner markers are to be set by the subdivider and shall be iron pipe, iron or steel bars, pins or rods. These markers may be painted. If painted, care shall be taken that the color of paint shall be different from that of any adjacent subdivision.  
These semi-permanent markers are to be left exposed, three to six inches above the ground, except where they would be a hazard. In the case these markers fall in a street, driveway, etc., they are to be driven flush with, or below the surface of the ground. All markers that are of public interest such as lot corners and boundary markers are to be witnessed by a wood stake with the proper identification marked on the stake showing what the marker is.  
STREET IMPROVEMENTS  
(b) Plan. The preliminary Plan shall serve as plans for this item except where special conditions are to be considered.  
Specifications. All streets shall be graded and gravelled. The following widths and depths are to be considered as minimum.  
GRADING TYPICAL SECTION:  
Width of Roadway 22 to 24 feet.  
Roadway ditch 4 to 5 feet.  
Fill slopes 1 1/4 - 1 minimum on steep hillsides.  
Cut backslope 1 1/2 - 1 minimum in dirt or loose rock.  
1 1/2 - 1 in solid rock.  
The narrower widths to be used on steep hillsides.  
SURFACING:  
All streets to be surfaced with gravel, or higher type material, 22 to 24 feet wide and 4 inches depth, minimum.  
PAVING:  
Paving shall be optional with the subdivider.  
MAJOR STREETS:  
May require additional street width. A major street is a street that due to its location is expected to carry more and heavy traffic. A major street is to be determined by the Master Plan. The width of road and surfacing and the depth of surfacing shall be determined by the expected traffic load, but in no case shall these roads be

narrower in width nor the surfacing less in depth than the minimum above. To be approved by the Board of Commissioners.  
VARIATIONS AND EXCEPTIONS  
Whenever the tract to be subdivided is of such unusual size or shape or is surrounded by such development or unusual conditions that the strict application of the requirements contained in these regulations would result in real difficulties and substantial hardship or injustice, the commission may vary or modify such requirements, so that the subdivider is allowed to develop his property in a reasonable manner, but so, at the same time, the public welfare and interests of the county are protected and the general intent and spirit of these regulations is preserved.

11. The Board of County Commissioners shall confer with the subdivider regarding the type and character of development that will be permitted in the subdivision, and may agree with the subdivider as to certain minimum restrictions to be placed upon the property to prevent the construction of substandard buildings to control the type and use of structures or the use of lots which, unless so controlled would clearly depreciate the character and value of the proposed subdivision and of adjoining property. The Commission may impose such reasonable requirements as may be necessary to preserve and enhance the scenic value of the County. The Commission shall have power to agree with the subdivider upon the use, height, area or bulk restriction governing building and premises, providing that said restrictions do not authorize the violation of any zoning ordinance of the municipality.

### VARIATIONS AND EXCEPTIONS

Whenever the tract to be subdivided is of such unusual size or shape or is surrounded by such development or unusual conditions that the strict application of the requirements contained in these regulations would result in real difficulties and substantial hardship or injustice, the commission may vary or modify such requirements, so that the subdivider is allowed to develop his property in a reasonable manner, but so, at the same time, the public welfare and interests of the county are protected and the general intent and spirit of these regulations is preserved.

### MINIMUM DESIGN STANDARDS:

(a) Every lot should contain one usable building site.  
(b) All buildings shall be set back at least five (5) feet from all lot lines.  
(c) No lot shall be less than sixty (60) feet in width at the proposed building site and no residential lot shall contain less than seven thousand five hundred (7,500) square feet in area. If you do not have sewer system, lot should be 1/2 acre or more. If you do not have water or sewage system, lot should be 1/2 acre.  
(d) All lots shall conform with the zoning of the New Mexico Health Department. Size of lots to be indicated.  
(e) All angles in the street intersection lines, where the angle is less than 90 degrees on the side (or property side) of the street line shall be rounded. The minimum rounding shall be a semi-tangent distance of 20 feet.  
(f) The street and alley layout shall be such as to allow the maximum ease of access to all lots and shall provide a satisfactory connection with all adjoining properties regardless of whether that adjoining property has been subdivided or not.  
(g) Existing streets in the area shall be continued here reasonably possible and offset streets are to be avoided when practical.  
(h) Easements of at least five

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For all but special cases, the Preliminary Plan shall be considered Plans for this item.  
Specifications of the Forest Service and State Department of Health and Any Public Agency established by law shall govern where they apply.  
The subdivider shall present evidence that it is feasible and practical to produce an adequate water supply for each lot or make a note on the plans and state in his deeds that water can not be guaranteed.  
The Preliminary Plans may serve as all but special instances as Plans for this item.  
Specifications of the Forest Service and State Department of Health and Any Public Agency established by law shall govern where they apply.  
Special provisions may be entered in the form of notes on the preliminary Plans, or may be filed as a separate instrument.  
Where the topography of the ground will permit and the fee is not prohibitive, all subdivisions that are within the county commission's jurisdiction shall provide a sanitary sewer system and make it accessible to each lot or lotter concerning feasibility of sewage system.  
DRAINAGE:  
The subdivider shall provide adequate drainage of storm water. Drainage may be by open channel but shall follow as nearly as practicable the natural drainage of the land. All drainage plans shall be subject to the approval of the Highway Engineer.

(c) No lot shall be less than sixty (60) feet in width at the proposed building site and no residential lot shall contain less than seven thousand five hundred (7,500) square feet in area. If you do not have sewer system, lot should be 1/2 acre or more. If you do not have water or sewage system, lot should be 1/2 acre.  
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
