

Around Town

Roy Baker tells us he was very surprised to see the report in newspapers of the state this week that when the Senate committee voted on a proposal to repeal the liquor fair trade bill, which fixes prices on all alcoholic beverages, that Lincoln County's State Senator Joe Skeen was among the eight voting to kill the repeal measure. "I sure thought he would be for repeal, and I'm surprised and disappointed in his vote. Let's jump on him," Roy said.

Wayne Estes and "Dude" Browning have made road tests of distances and times on their routes to the proposed new elementary school site near the airport (bonds for which local patrons will be voting on next Tuesday) and Estes said as far as they can tell, buses carrying the little ones to the new site will be riding the bus an average of ten minutes less than the trip to the Nob Hill school now. Cite Motorist After Auto Injures Apache

Roy Balatche, an Apache of Mesacalero, was brought to the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital last Tuesday morning with a broken right leg. Balatche's 1962 Chevrolet station wagon had stalled on Highway 70 near the edge of the Mescalero Reservation below Dark Canyon. According to State Policeman Bob Miller, who investigated the accident, Balatche was pushing his car when Lt. Robert L. Meyer enroute to Reese Air Force Base of Lubbock drove behind the stalled car and due to the icy condition of the road was unable to stop. His sliding vehicle crushed Balatche against the Apache's car. Miller said that in spite of Meyer's stated intention of an offer to give aid to the Indian's stalled car, the lieutenant was cited for failure to use due care. After receiving emergency treatment here Balatche was transferred to a Roswell hospital, Miller said.

Mid-Week Storm Again Dumps Snow In Area

For the third consecutive week, a mid-week storm has brought snow to Lincoln County and the Play-ground of the Southwest. A snowstorm, moving in here late Monday, brought about five inches to most of Lincoln County, then moved out, during the day Tuesday, to be succeeded by another on Tuesday night which brought another 6 to 8 inches. Total moisture received was .40, the airport weather station reported. New snow this week on the slopes of Sierra Blanca Ski Area measured another 2 feet or more in depth, on top of an already good foundation of over four feet of base snow. Skiing conditions are rated excellent on all trails in White Mountain Park. Much of the storm this week harassed New Mexico and the Texas Panhandle country, according to reports received here.

School Land Is Annexed

Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso last Thursday approved the annexation of 43,000 acres in the proposed new school site near the Municipal Airport. The resolution passed with a roll call vote of all "ayes." Present for the regular meeting of the Trustees were Mayor C. H. Stoneham, Bill McCarty, Jodie Filleman, C. M. Whitlock and Guy Robertson. Bids were opened by engineer Quinton Daniel for painting the 300,000 gallon Mechem Drive water storage tank and the 100,000 gallon Upper Canyon tank. Two bids were received and read, one from Raymond Miller, local painting contractor, for \$4,823.60; and one from Water Tank Service Co. of Dallas, for \$12,925.00. After considering the two bids, Trustee Filleman made a motion that the contract be awarded to the low bid of Raymond Miller Painting Contractor for the total price of \$4,823.60. The motion was seconded by McCarty and passed with all "ayes." Trustee Filleman introduced resolution 270 pertaining to application for Federal assistance on a proposed sewer main line from the proposed new school to connect with the existing sewer line in Paradise Canyon. The motion was seconded by Robertson and passed with all "ayes." Trustee Whitlock introduced resolution 271 which concerned the leasing of approximately six acres of land on the west side of the airport to Wagner Manufacturing Co. for the sum of \$1 per acre per year for a period of ten years. The motion, seconded by McCarty, passed with all "ayes." The 1964 audit report with recommendations from the State Auditor was received and reviewed by the trustees. Summer and winter recreation facilities were discussed at length and it was felt that a concentrated effort should be put forth to provide more facilities.

Patrons of Ruidoso School District Will Vote Tuesday Next

Patrons of Ruidoso School District will vote Tuesday next week in the proposal to issue \$375,000 in bonds with which to build a new elementary school for grades one through six, to be located on land obtained by the school board in 1964 northeast of the municipal airport. Ruidoso's Board of Education, in calling the election, has declared there is need for additional classrooms at present, with the growth in Ruidoso's school enrollment continuing to climb year after year. The board points out that the use now of sub-standard classrooms, and classrooms with more than the recommended number of students in them, are reasons why another school should be built. The board also pointed out that the election this month is the last one allowed by law on a bond issue until two years away 1967 "If this bond election should not carry, there is no telling in what kind of jam our school will be for lack of classrooms by that time," one of the board members said this week. Floor plans of two buildings to be the first of a proposed complex of several buildings on the extra large new site information on construction and materials, heating, lighting and other items were discussed in two questions and answer sessions held late in January this year. The meeting was called by the school board to give the public the facts in depth concerning the board's bond election call. Nine classrooms, administration office and lunch room are included in the first structures. The voting will be in the home economics building on the high school campus. Polls open at 8 o'clock in the morning; Tuesday will close at 6 in the evening, an hour earlier than in all other elections held in the state. Another qualification peculiar to school bond elections in New Mexico besides the hour shorter voting time, is that voters need not be registered to cast a ballot, as is required in all other balloting. The voter must be a resident of New Mexico for 12 months, in the county for 90 days and in this school district 30 days, and must be 21 years of age. The voter also must own property within the district. Non-resident taxpayers are not eligible to vote under these rules. Edward Lane, Mrs. Wayne Watter and Mrs. George Fisher have been named judges for the election. Clerks appointed are Mrs. B. O. Harris and Mrs. Leon Farrar. It is estimated that more than 1,500 persons are eligible to vote in the Tuesday bond balloting.



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We All May Lose if YOU Don't Vote . . .

For 34 years we've been voting in elections of all kinds—and reporting on elections of all kinds for newspapers with which we worked, and we've found a pattern in voting you have probably noted, too. The citizen who is opposed to a candidate or a bond issue almost ALWAYS casts his vote, while the apathetic citizen—who just doesn't care whether a candidate is elected or not, or maybe is FOR a candidate or bond issue, even, will let his duty at the ballot box slide.

Coming up next Tuesday here is a vote on a \$375,000 school bond issue, and we hear so little discussion about it that we wonder if enough of the FOR voters will turn up to pass the bonds. We know that there will be some 150 people vote against the bonds—maybe more—this we feel pretty sure of. There are about 1,500 eligible to vote in the election. We hope all of them will vote.

This is not the time, in the spring of 1965, for Ruidoso to vote down a bond issue to build a school that will provide much needed classrooms. In all of our 34 years of voting on people and bond issues, we've NEVER failed to vote for a bond issue. And, we can truthfully say, we've never been disappointed in these elections. In fact we never voted in a bond election that DIDN'T pass! We never regretted the passage of any of the bonds we voted for.

We remember once in a small Texas town, a man opposed to a \$150,000 school bond issue to build a new gymnasium (that WAS a long time ago, wasn't it?) came into our office holding a Bible in his hand and said "I want you to show me where it says in this here Bible that we have to build gymnasiums for our children." Well, we couldn't, but we did make sure that our vote cancelled out his at the bond election the next week.

In the many times you've voted FOR bonds for progress in Ruidoso, or wherever you came from, can you actually say you voted wrong?

Ruidoso is a growing town, and has grown every year since we've known it, and has always put one foot in front of the other as it moved ahead. If we are to continue growing and enjoying a continuation of more and better things, then we must support such projects as this proposed new school building. It is essential to the merchant, to the real estate man, to the related businesses that we show we are progressive and that we build for the future. Ruidoso will continue to grow—we better not let our school facilities lag behind. Better facilities for educating our children is always a wise investment.

We once read the logical statement that a recession feeds on itself. A recession can also feed on itself.

Legislative Matters Are Numerous . . .

Despite the fact they are hampered by a mass of liquor bills, members of our 1965 legislature are doing a fine job, working hard and tackling many, many tough problems that need attention.

Here are a few among the more than 850 bills being studied by the Senate and the House of Representatives in Santa Fe.

A room tax of two per cent per room in a special bill (SB273) that would affect Albuquerque only to provide funds for a convention center is finding opposition in Ruidoso, because this community is second only to Albuquerque in the number of rooms it has to rent, being the state's most famous resort area, and having more than 70 tourist courts, motels and hotels. Ruidosans feel the special legislation is a "foot in the door" thing that will find similar legislation passed by the state solons for all of the state at some later date. It's a new source of revenue for tourist promotion, or other needs people here say, and they are opposed to it even though it is classified as a "local" bill.

Another bill that is getting some interest here is the Senate resolution (SJR 5) calling for a constitutional amendment that would set up a general judicial reform. This is badly needed, and has many features that have proven successful in the federal judicial field. The recommendation for changes has been made after a lengthy study by members of the bar and private citizens. Some legislators feel that parts of the proposed amendment are not right for this state—but almost all parts of the proposal have been in use for some time in Missouri, and the state of Missouri is happy with the control of its judicial system as now in effect.

STATEMENT FROM RUIDOSO SCHOOL BOARD

One of the primary and most important functions of the Board of Education is to provide the buildings in which our educators work. No matter how well trained our teachers are, or how hard they try, they can not do the job of educating our children the way it should be done if the sites and classrooms are crowded and inadequate.

Your schools are short nine classrooms right now. There is not enough ground area for a complete physical education and recreation program right now. The schools have had a steady and rapid growth during the past several years. Current increases in industrial activity and tourist business will certainly cause our present buildings and sites to be more and more overcrowded.

The only way school buildings and sites can be paid for is by the citizens of the district voting bonds.

You and your Board of Education must meet the educational needs of our children. We have to be willing to pay for school buildings and sites which they must have. If the bond issue should fail it can not, by law, be voted on again for two years.

The situation is serious now. If the bond issue should not pass there could be no additional classrooms built for almost three years. We will be letting our children and our community down if we do not pass the bond issue and provide them with the quality education they deserve.

STATEMENT FROM SUPT. GEORGE P. WHITE

Ruidoso Municipal Schools are in a position where, if and when, they are to maintain a quality educational program and look to excellence in the future they must have new facilities to take care of the overcrowding that now exists in the classes and the use of substandard classrooms.

School buildings are workshops where pupils, teachers and administrators are engaged in the dissemination and assimilation of information in the business of learning. Certain factors must be determined for the design and the erection of school plants:

1. The facility should be designed so as to aid and facilitate the instructional program.
2. The creation of an atmosphere conducive to good learning is desirable.
3. The safety, health, and comfort of those using these facilities must be considered.

Your board of education took under consideration the above three criteria when planning for the new school facility for the children of Ruidoso. Not only did they consider the

above but they also took under consideration the new concepts of class size, staff utilization, and teaching techniques one would use not only for today's teaching but in years to come. The need for flexibility became very apparent in the early stages of planning. Although it is too early to determine how these changes will affect our present concept of ideal school facilities, particularly as to the physical structure involved, it is not too soon to be sure that the rigid-walled stereo-typed rows of classrooms located on one or both sides of a corridor do not even meet the present need of the educational process let alone those of the future.

Today good education is not enough. We must strive for excellence. Trying to excel or surpass what we now have we must have the new building ready to accommodate changes in curricular instructional material and equipment.





Currently before Congress are two plans of health care for the elderly: Medicare (H.R. #1), and Eldercare (H.R. #3727). 

7-Year-Old Asks for Instructions In Perfecting Skiing Technique

Ruidoso boasts a tense little bundle of determination who some day may reach the heights in skiing. He is 7-year-old Dale Pearson.

His father, Al Pearson, puts it this way: "Dale won't give up." And the little fellow has proven his mettle when under pressure in ski racing competition.

The youngster started skiing when he was four years old. This was the first year the Sierra Blanca Ski Area near Ruidoso was opened. At that time Al was a part-time instructor on the ski run. He took the lad with him and put short strap-on skis on him. That did it!

Dale became so interested in the sport that he would go to the ski school area under the gondola lift and ski down. He immediately walked back up to his starting point. "He kept this up," recalls his father. "Why, I had to go and get him so he would come in and eat. Right there Dale was learning to ski."

Little Dale, who is small and wiry, has been fortunate to have two outstanding instructors in Akip Blazer and Ray Held. The first time Ray observed the youngster in action he was skiing behind him. They were coming down the Capitan run on Thanksgiving Day. Ray opined then and there: "The boy is a remarkable skier for his age and size." Dale's co-ordination, timing and confidence in his ability caught Held's attention.

The boy's progress from then on is better than good. When Al saw how much skiing meant to his son he gave him every opportunity to ski. The entire Pearson family is ski-minded. They spent a 9-day Christmas vacation at Vail, Colo. Deep powder snow covered the ski slope. Dale took it in stride. Despite the fact deep powder snow is difficult for skiing, this determined lad got right with it. "People were amazed," says Al, "at Dale skiing with powdered snow up to his waist. All you could see of him was his red jacket and his helmet above it."

The scamper on the Vail, Colo., slopes took place a month after Dale became seven years old. His birthday is Nov. 16.

The fiercely competitive boy is a member of the Sierra Blanca Ski Club and the Junior Racing Team, both of Ruidoso. He won a trophy sponsored by the El Paso Ski Club in Class 5. (Children up to the age of 9), in the Giant Slalom at Sierra Blanca in 1964. The same month Dale took second in the Giant Slalom at Santa Fe, for Class 5.

On Jan. 11 of this year Dale showed his mettle. He had the best time in the first run, in the second run his time, up to the moment hard luck struck him down, was even better than in the first run. The fighter from Ruidoso had only three gates to go to the finish. As Al points out, "The gates are closer together and there are more turns than in a Giant Slalom. Dale had done just fine."

Suddenly Dale's ski came off. The grim little fellow had trouble making the ski stay on. The 3-minute period elapsed and the lad was still ski-less on one foot. He was disqualified. All Dale had to say was, "I'll win next week."

The tiny 7-year-old kept his word. In a Sanctioned Race at Taos, on Jan. 17, in Class 5 competition Dale won first place against participants from the entire Southwest, including top racers from Colorado and New Mexico. He was given a ribbon and a medal.

In the three meets he entered in February, this season, at Sierra Blanca here, at Santa Fe and at Albuquerque, he placed in his class each time.

When not skiing Dale frequently checks ski equipment in ski magazines. He plans to compete in every race in this area for the remainder of the year. His small, skis will make the snow fly at Sierra Blanca, Santa Fe, Los Alamos, and maybe one or two other runs before the season is gone.

Al is proud of the fact his gifted boy insists on getting all the coaching and experience he can. He adds: "Dale and the rest of the Sierra Blanca Junior Racing Team are taking advantage of a wonderful coach, Ray Held, who formerly coached the University of Wyoming."

The Pearson family all love to ski. Al learned to ski during World War II, while convalescing at Winter Park, Colo. During that same period, Mrs. Pearson learned to ski also. In 1964 on Fun Day at Sierra Blanca, Mrs. Pearson won a prize. George, 10, won second place and a silver medal at Sierra Blanca last year. Last year he won a trophy for second place at Cloudcroft.

Alfred, 13, won a trophy at Sierra Blanca and a second place medal. In addition he won a second place trophy at Cloudcroft.

Al insists, "Skiing is a family recreation. It is one of the easiest sports to learn. One or two lessons and you can do good on the slopes."

It is one of the few family recreations there are. No one should think he is too old for the sport. Men and women in their 50's and 60's learn to ski and really enjoy it."

Dale's comments about the sport is: "It's lots of fun to come down the mountain." At the rate he is garnering honors as he comes down, and his tirelessness in practicing, he may some day have Olympic calibre.


