

It CAN Happen Here . . .

Ruidoso can take a lesson from something that happened in Albuquerque last week end. An Italian named Salvatore J. Spinelli, 25, the father of three children, was arrested at his home in Albuquerque by the FBI agents on federal grand jury charges of racket violence.

We know the underworld is involved in the majority of gambling in this country, and is involved in protection rackets in the north and east, and in a few spots in the midwest and west coast but to learn that it is right on our doorstep is shocking. The Albuquerque man arrested by the FBI was one of three men indicted for "using force and threats of violence to place vending machines in a Tucson bowling alley." The other two fellows were Arizonians. The Albuquerque man was fronting as a real estate salesman.

Now, the question that runs through our mind is - if the underworld racketeers are this close to us in operating protection rackets how much will they be mustering in New Mexico if open gambling is allowed on a local option basis. We know the answer to that. Why our state legislature entertains the notion the people of this state want bookie joints (as proposed in a bill introduced just before the deadline on new legislation) and open gambling is beyond us. Why must they spend their time on bills of this nature when there are so many other urgent matters needed in our growing state? Our state's natural, steady growth demonstrates there is no need for the supposed "business boost" that gambling might, just might, provide and which CAN bring, without anyone being able to contradict this, an increase in crime and violence.

On TAX Matters . . .


We think the gubernatorial candidate, no matter whether he was a Republican or a Democrat, who would espouse a cause to ask for a constitutional amendment in New Mexico that would forever prohibit an increase in the sales tax beyond 5c on the dollar, would be a sure shoe-in. A calling on a sales tax would have all kinds of advantages. It might boost tourism. It could encourage outsiders to invest in New Mexico. It might even cause future politicians to start practicing economy—as a family does when its income is set. A family CAN manage on what the head of the household is making. So, a state might just learn to manage on what it is earning.

And, that same candidate could be sure of a segment of the state's voting population by favoring a levy of 1c a can or bottle on beer, earmarked for one purpose, to hire a crew and truck to keep the streets and roads of the state clear of tossed beer cans and bottles. Driving home from our office the other day we counted more than 300 beer cans in the ditches alongside the streets we traveled. We don't know how many other cans we didn't get to count, hidden in weeds, behind bushes, etc. One cent tax on each of those would have been over \$3.00 towards the cost of their being picked up.

The Teachers' Corner

The "New Math" we hear so much about now can indeed be confusing, but we must remember it is more confusing to those of us who learned arithmetic in the traditional manner than to your third grade children, most of whom now have studied the new method from the first grade on. These children, having no other type of arithmetic in the back of their minds, can usually grasp the meaning of the new arithmetic quickly.

To you parents, however, it may be a different situation. Often, you must interpret, evaluate and solve the problem according to your old method and then transfer your ideas to make them solve in the new manner. Because of the background of traditional arithmetic a parent sometimes finds it hard to know just how he can help his child in the new arithmetic program. Indeed, there are times when the help itself may further confuse the child.

However, there is one way all parents could help their third grade children and that is in the area of arithmetic facts. It is extremely important that the child understands exactly what he is doing when he adds, subtracts, multiplies or divides, and this idea is definitely stressed in the new program. It must never be forgotten though that it is just as important that the child knows his facts, that they are firmly embedded in his mind, and that he can remember them whenever the need arises. This is how the parent can help his third grader. Encourage him to learn by memory these facts at home. Use flash cards, make tests, etc.

To use a traditional word, drill your child on his facts until you feel he has successfully learned them, not just for the next day, but for the weeks and months to come. If our children can understand arithmetic facts and learn arithmetic facts, the new arithmetic in the third grade can be a success.

WATER POWER

John Stewart Collis, in his book "The Moving Waters", reminds us of a strange fact. It is that a soft, fluid substance like water has the power, under certain conditions, to burst the iron pipes that hold it. So it is, he says, that in an atomic age, "we have realized by now that the principalities and powers do not advertise themselves in outward splendor, they are not found in gorgeous palaces—neither physically, spiritually nor politically."

The point is that simple, ordinary things can have unsuspected power. Water may seem plain enough, but it can be powerful stuff. Words are like that. Sometimes they seem so innocent; yet they can cut and burn and explode. Thoughts are like that. We have the idea that it doesn't matter what we think. But sometimes our secret thoughts burst through and cause no end of trouble.

Halo is like that. When we hate we are letting loose a poison that spoils our appetites, affects our sleep, and undermines our health.

In the same way such things as love and kindness and forgiveness seem innocuous enough. But they, too, are powerful forces that can do things nothing else can do. They can break through artificial barriers of suspicion and prejudice and make life sweet and clean.


PLUMBING EXAMS SET APRIL 3

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



New Auto Insurance Rate Plan Fits Driving Record To Insurer

Ruidoso and New Mexico motorists can now buy automobile insurance that pegs insurance costs to the driver's accident potential. This new system, developed by the National Bureau of Casualty Underwriters and the National Automobile Underwriters Association, is a sweeping refinement of the system under which insurance companies assign the lowest premiums to groups of motorists who cost the least in insurance claims and higher premiums to those who cost the most. It is not a general rate increase, Ruidoso insurance salesmen have declared.

By shifting many individual cars from one classification to another, it will help prevent better drivers from subsidizing the costs of accidents caused by poorer drivers, they state.

According to the local insurance agents the major effects of the new classification system upon the new rate structure are:

- 1.—More equitable premiums for most men under age 25, with substantial reductions for older members of this group—particularly those who are married. This modification makes insurance more readily available to younger drivers.
- 2.—Lower premiums for women aged 30 through 64 who live alone or who are the only drivers in their households.
- 3.—Lower premiums for many families that own two or more cars, but do not qualify for multi-car discounts under the present rating system.
- 4.—Lower premiums for many parents of youthful drivers who live at schools or colleges more than 100 miles from their homes.
- 5.—Higher premiums for unmarried young women under age 21.

6.—Higher premiums for unmarried men aged 25 through 29 who are owners or principal operators of cars.

7.—Premiums for comprehensive coverage—now based solely on the sales price and age of the car—will be, in addition to the value of the car, also based on the same rating factors as the rates for liability and collision insurance—age, sex and marital status of drivers, use of cars, number of cars in family, training of certain young drivers, and individual safety records of drivers.

The new classification system, effective in 34 other states, is based on the most exhaustive analysis ever made by the insurance industry of relationships of drivers, cars and accidents. While rates for some drivers will go up, they will go down for others with the result that the average rate will remain the same.

Safe Driver Plan
The Safe Driver plan also became effective March 1. This plan, operative in 46 other states, is geared to reward, with the lowest possible rates, those drivers who maintain a history of no accidents and no major traffic convictions. National statistics indicate that approximately 85 per cent of New Mexico's insured drivers are eligible for the lowest rate under the Safe Driver plan.

The automobile insurance rating plans are based upon the principle that "groups of drivers who cost the least in claims for insured cars should pay the least for premiums and that groups that cost the most should pay the most." This idea has long been the basis behind insurance rates, but until the development of high speed electronic data processing equipment, it was not possible to apply this principle to the degree that it is expressed in the new rating programs, the insurance men concluded.


