

The deaths occurred when a water tank fell and crushed a man, and some stone trim on buildings toppled to the streets, striking pedestrians or people in their cars, fatally hurting them. Mrs. Newton had gone to Seattle by air, was attending ski market Tuesday and Wednesday there, viewing winter sports clothing for buying for her Olma's store here. She returned to Ruidoso the day after the earthquake.



Re-Appoint Three To Planning Commission

Elmer Pirelli, Dr. Bram Vanderstok and Johnny Mobley were re-appointed for additional terms to the Ruidoso Planning Commission by members of the Village of Ruidoso Trustees in regular session Thursday, April 29. Terms for the three re-appointments are for two year terms and will expire in 1967. Don Hart, administrative assistant announced the trustees are also considering a replacement for Mrs. Della Hine whose resignation from the planning commission has been accepted, Hart said.

In discussing the purchase of the Paradise Canyon sewer line at the meeting last Thursday night, the minutes show that Mayor G. H. 





SEVENTH RUNNING OF ALL-AMERICAN MAY SET TWO RECORDS

When everything is said and done, the All-American Futurity for quarter horses at Ruidoso Downs could produce two fantastic firsts here come Labor Day, Monday, Sept. 6.

It has been said before and probably will continue to be said the way things are going, but this time indications point to the All-American taking its place as the nation's richest horse racing stakes of any kind. If not this year, then next year for sure when it figures to top \$400,000.

Yet, this year's seventh running, at this writing, points to a gross purse of \$350,000. Should neither the combined Arlington-Washington Futurity in Chicago nor the Garden State Stakes in New Jersey top this figure, then the All-American will become the year's richest classic. The quarter horse classic is to be filmed this year and shown on NBC's Sports in Action series on Sept. 12. It has been

officially announced. That takes care of one first. The other, equally incredible, would develop if Hugh Huntley of Madera, Calif., should strike again. In the first six runnings, Huntley and Trainer Newt Kirk have led an almost unbelievable 500, winning three times—with Galobar in 1959, Pokey Bar, 1961, and Ooetta, 1963.

Huntley came up with an iron-clad guarantee that he wouldn't win it last year. "No chance," he said. "I only win 'em in the odd-numbered years, so watch out for me in 1965!" And the man was right.

Now the question is, can he be right again? At this time, Huntley has three of the 154 hopefuls currently remaining eligible—Pokette Bar, Thor Rocket and Dimple Deck.

In this respect, Huntley's outlook is none too promising. Texas and California continue to be represented by the greatest number of eligibles, but if there is strength in numbers, then Arizona and Louisiana loom large.

From Arizona comes the largest single nominator, Charles W. Mickle of Scottsdale, whose Mickle's Valley View Ranch has named no less than seven—Rebel Charge, Estravon, Rebel's Sis, Vanena, Vanny's Pet, Vanny's Annie and Vanny's Venture.

In the case of Louisiana, it will be represented by the biggest buyer at last fall's All-American Futurity yearling sale, Harvey Peltier of Thibodaux, with the trio of Goar, Bold Super and Etango, a full brother to world champion Goetta.

Ruidoso Downs opens its 60-day summer season Friday, May 21.

Book of Favorite Square Dance Calls Brought Fame To Herb Greggerson

El Paso's gift to the square dancing world leads a quiet life in Ruidoso only occasionally keeping his voice in the art that once led him to various parts of the world. Herb Greggerson puts it. "I call more than anybody else when I was asked in an encyclopedia on the No. 1 square dance caller in the United States."

Greggerson was born January 10, 1909 in El Paso. He attended school at Yuleta and Texas Western. As a youngster he learned to square dance at the Community Center down the Valley. This was during his depression. "It cost 25 cents a month for dues," recalls Herb, "and this paid for the orchestra. All of the callers were free. Mrs. Greggerson, the former Pauline Orther of El Paso, was my partner."

Robust Herb learned to square dance on ranches and farms around El Paso. He and Pauline teamed up at the Community Center and had a grand time. But a career was being developed. Immediately after learning how to square dance Herb earned to call. There was an agency for this. "No callers were available," Herb points out. "The old time callers got into arguments about how square dances went. They would call you to one side and give their version. So I made a collection of them."

The collection was named "Herb's Blue Bonnet Calls." Herb hoped to have it published as a book.

In 1934 caller Herb Greggerson went to the New York World's Fair with a dance team and an orchestra. The caller happened to be young Herb. "We danced in every town between El Paso and New

York City," remembers this caller. "In streets and in hotels I wore out the soles of four pair of boots on that trip. I wrote to people I was going to publish my book, 'Herb's Blue Bonnet Calls.' Everywhere I went I gave people my card and told them about the book. When I got back to El Paso I had enough orders to pay for the book." The new author went to Guyness Printing Co. in El Paso and had his book published. There were 500 copies put out for El Paso. Less than 100 copies were sold of the first edition. But the book found its way all over the world. Over 30,000 copies were sold. Today the book is out of print but Herb has a few at his residence in Ruidoso.

The trip to New York back in 1934 is one Herb will never forget. The Highway Association, Broadway of America, financed the junket and the Greggersons wouldn't take anything for the experience.

Herb's Blue Bonnet Calls came out in 1935. In those days the au-

Studio Carrizo Is Newest Venture

The newest interest for the Greggersons, Herb and Pauline, is the opening of an artists' studio at their Carrizo Lodge, two miles south of town in Carrizo Canyon. The lodge has been the scene of many conventions, church conferences and retreats, banquets for local organizations, camps for children, stage performances, art classes and classes in other handicrafts. Friday night this week the Greggersons will be host in an open house at Studio Carrizo—a story concerning which appears elsewhere in today's News. The pair will continue to operate the lodge as always, but the studio is an added interest for them and the community. The two also have green thumbs and are avid flower and nursery plant enthusiasts. They opened the lodge as a tourist accommodation about a dozen years ago. The buildings were originally a summer branch of New Mexico Military Institute of Roswell.

Herb worked in the El Paso Post Office and called square dances. Hilma (now Mrs. John Collier of California) and Herb Greggerson, a caller at Texas Western who is married and has two children, went along.

Mrs. Greggerson says, "I went along on these square dance jaunts with my husband for over 10 years, the last five by airplane. I got to see the country and loved to travel for this reason. We taught in all of the 48 states except Maine. We flew to Alaska and called square dancing at the Fur Rondovaux; made one trip on the tanker Aruba to Antilles, West India and taught square and round dancing there. Went twice to India. These schools lasted two weeks and the trips were sponsored by the Standard Oil Co."

On the way to Alaska, Mrs. Greggerson wore a fur coat while in that cool country. Then a trip to India. This was followed by an appearance with her husband in Miami, Fla. The next engagement was Detroit, Mich., and Mrs. Greggerson had no time to get all her things together, especially her wardrobe. She landed in Detroit in the middle of winter in a white dress, white shoes—and a fur coat.

"Herb and I published Foot & Fiddle Magazine in El Paso for 11 years," states petite Mrs. Greggerson. "Herb was editor and I took subscriptions and tended the record shop we had in El Paso. I also had the little chore of taking care of my husband's itinerary as a caller—all over the country. We had 3500 subscriptions for Foot & Fiddle at \$2 a year. I think square dancing

is a wonderful recreation and very wholesome. It helps you become a better round dancer and takes good concentration."

Round Herb can look back on a lot of happy memories—all testifying to his prowess as a caller. He called for and taught the square dance team that participated in the Fort Worth Fat Stock Show Square Dance Contest for five consecutive years.

"I have taught many ministers and their wives how to dance," Herb observes. "For five years I taught dancing for the recreation department of the city of Detroit. Many times I taught youth leaders how to teach square dancing. Members of the Molt Foundation learned to square dance under me and were also trained to be callers."

Herb rates square dancing as holding its own now in popularity. He lists it as a craze at a certain time, then fading out, and now going at a steady pace. "I find the trouble with square dancing," warns Herb, "is that people pick it up and do it strenuously. They dance every night of the week and it is the only recreation they have. Then they get burned out and quit it."

According to the former El Pasoan dancing is a very healthful outlet. He has found that only a certain percentage of square dancers have the desire to call. Some have no desire for this phase of it but could make wonderful callers and need to be pulled out. A certain amount of showmanship is needed to make a person an outstanding caller. Women, in Greggerson's opinion, do not ordinarily have the voice to go with calling. He maintains a voice of the calibre of a man's voice is needed.

With 19 years experience as a postman, Herb Greggerson will retire from the mailman ranks at the age of 62. Meanwhile, he keeps his
