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

BOARD OF REALTORS MAKES SELECTIONS—GEORGE WHITE PICKED 'CITIZEN OF THE YEAR'

Ruidoso's Board of Realtors' luncheon meeting held Friday noon last week in Holiday House was for the purpose of paying tribute to its "Citizen of the Year", an annual custom observed to recognize outstanding community efforts by a local resident.

But, the newest honoree, for the year 1965, was not present. He was busy at his preferred task of serving his fellowmen in the role of Chairman of the American Red Cross Lincoln County Chapter. He was in Tinnie, in the heart of the flood ravaged area of the county checking with citizens on the needs of flood victims following last Thursday's devastating high waters that rushed down the Ruidoso and Hondo valleys.

President of the Board, Tommy Peretz, explained the absence of the man selected—and the honoree received a big round of applause in absentia, Mrs. Tom W. Jones had announced identity of the selection—George P. White, Ruidoso School Superintendent.

Others honored by the board in its session which saw an attendance of about 35 people included Loin Lane, picked to receive the \$250 scholarship in the graduating class of 1965 here; Tommy Peretz, as Ruidoso Realtor of the Year, and Mrs. Isla McLeod was picked for recognition for best property improvement. She was introduced by Mrs. Claude Whitlock, Robert Pearson presented the Realtor plaque to Peretz.

Roy Hovious, realtor from El Paso, was principal speaker during the Friday luncheon. His topic was residential listings.

INSTALLATION OF OFFICERS POSTPONED BY LIONS
The Ruidoso Lions Club met for Ladies' Night as scheduled at Apache Summit last Tuesday night where about 60 enjoyed a barbecue steak dinner. The Lions decided against the planned hayride, previously announced, and instead transported their wives and guests by private car, Loid Jim Hine reported. The Lions also decided to hold the installation of 1965-66 officers at their next regular meeting, June 29, Hine said.

An official estimate released here this week placed the losses at \$12½ million suffered last Thursday in a 35-mile long flooded area from Ruidoso down the Ruidoso and Hondo rivers to Riverside. This figure was announced by Lincoln County Commissioner Max Oliver and Merrill E. DeLonge, principal planner for the State Planning Office. Their figure was arrived at after a day-long tour of the stricken area. DeLonge was here at the request of Governor Jack Campbell, Oliver said, when Oliver had asked the state to look into the area's need of aid following the disaster which was triggered by a severe hail storm and rainfall that measured from 5 to 6 inches in the vicinity of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, putting all watersheds out of their banks.

Chairman Oliver said at least 3,500 houses and commercial buildings in the storm area were damaged from a minor amount to a total loss. At least 25 families in the two valleys were made homeless. Oliver said 52 bridges, from culverts to steel or concrete spans were destroyed or damaged, and many miles of fencing was lost. The two men also figured in this year's fruit crop loss, and the potential losses of about five years' worth of crops that were ruined—the time it will take to get new orchards back into production—plus livestock losses, loss of rich topsoil from fields ravaged and gutted by the tumbling floodwaters. Oliver stressed that the County of Lincoln had neither the equipment nor money to replace the many bridges that must be built, and he added that some of the orchardists, businessmen and farmers would need state or federal aid to go back into business. He said DeLonge told him the state will seek to have New Mexico as a whole declared a disaster area so that help can be secured for this area as well as others affected by the storms and floods in June.

Tours of the area were made Saturday and again Tuesday to compute the losses. In the Tuesday tour were several officials, including John W. Flynn, the State Planner; Lynn M. Miller of Associated Contractors of New Mexico, whose organization will have heavy equipment available for emergency work under a statewide disaster preparedness plan; George E. Hastings, regional director for the Office of Emergency Planning, out of Denton, Tex., and others. They gave Oliver this information:

They would recommend to Governor Campbell that he ask this section be a part of the statewide disaster area, which means the federal government can assist in replacing public property, such as roads, dams, irrigation ditches, city halls, etc., where needed. They also reported that The Small Business Administration is now accepting applications from business concerns suffering losses in the storm for long term loans at small interest rates through the loan specialist, B. J. Averitt, in Albuquerque, and that the Farmers Home Administration, Roswell, is offering the same assistance to farmers and ranchers who need such loans.

Several private agencies are assisting with immediate aid in the form of clothing, food and such help now. Hundreds of thousands of dollars in losses resulted from a ferocious hail and rainstorm in southern Lincoln County last week-end which caused all watersheds, including rivers, creeks and arroyos, to overflow.

Greatest loss financially was suffered by many families in the Ruidoso and Hondo valleys, whose orchards and rich farm lands were seriously damaged. They lost many hundreds of fruit trees, that were either washed away or reported now in danger of suffocation from large deposits of silt left around their trunks. Veteran orchardists say the trees likely will not live if the debris and heavy burden of mud is not removed very soon.

Hail damage to this year's fruit crop has been judged as considerable, and destruction of so many fruit trees will also be felt economically for several seasons, it is predicted.

The storm, which began in the Ruidoso Downs area during the noon hour Friday, increased in intensity and dumped a record six inches of moisture in hail and rain there in a five hour period. Hailstones, many of them as large as golf balls, fell for the first hour and a half with the accompanying rain. Banks of hail that looked like drifted snow, measured several inches deep in ditches alongside roads, beneath the eaves of homes and business buildings and on level ground, too. The hail was still in evidence 24 hours later where it had piled up.

An hour later at about 2 p.m. the hailstorm began its destruction in Ruidoso, where it also was accompanied by torrential rainfall. Moisture measured 5.11 inches 5:30 Friday afternoon in Ruidoso at the Chamber of Commerce building, where an official U. S. Weather Bureau rain gauge is located. The rains were not as heavy in the upper canyon nor in the areas north or south of town, but all parts of this region received a thorough soaking. The rain gauge at the Ruidoso Ranger station on Cedar Creek measured almost three inches falling during the afternoon, Bud Star-

INDIAN DANCES, RODEO ON APACHE PROGRAM

The annual Mesquero Apache Ceremonial to be held this year July 2 through July 6, at Mesquero, will have numerous groups of Indians from Oklahoma, the pueblos from the Rio Grande valley and Apache tribes from Arizona as visitors attending the four-day religious and festive program, Dick Wardlaw, administrative assistant of the Mesquero Apache Tribal Council, said this week.

The four-day ceremonial begins at sunrise July 2, with the puberty ritual ceremony followed by numerous dances during the four days, including: Dance of the Mountain Gods, Eagle Dance, Dance of the Apache Maldeuta, Buffalo Dance and Bow and Arrow Dance.

In addition to the daily dances a rodeo is scheduled each afternoon July 3, 4 and 5, with bull riding, bareback riding, ribbon roping, double mugging, bull dogging and calf roping contests open to Indians and non-Indian ranch hands, Wardlaw said.

Stampede Timetable, Events Listed

Three rodeo sessions—including two afternoon programs and one night session, are planned as part of the Independence Day holiday attractions in the annual Smokey Bear Stampede in Capitan. Rodeo events are set in the arena near the county fair auditorium in Capitan for Saturday and Sunday afternoons, and on Saturday night. Dances are planned on Friday and Saturday nights, and a parade, to roll at 11 a.m., and a free barbecue at noon will highlight Sunday. A Lincoln County Rodeo Queen—also to reign in the County Fair in September—will head up the parade and grand entry at the rodeo. She will compete in the state fair contest as Lincoln County's entry later in the fall.


Ratjen Brus, of Happy, Tex., are producers of the rodeo. On the program will be bareback bronc riding, calf roping, saddle bronc riding, steer wrestling, bull riding, ladies' barrel races, ladies' pole bending, plus a calf scramble for the youngsters, boys and girls 12 years of age and under.



For better grasshopper control, spray the weeds around the edge of the garden and control the grasshoppers before they get into the garden.

How do you estimate damage done by a flood? Especially when it takes out over 250 acres of orchard in one wide swath? Along with this, count the cost of all the diversion dams on the Ruidoso-Honda Rivers. Replacing these dams will come to as high as \$30,000 apiece. I do not know how many acres will need to be relevelled or how many acres of alfalfa were covered with silt. The loss in orchards alone is estimated at \$40,000.







(Continued from Page 1—Sec. A) through that part of the valley at about 2:30 Friday afternoon. Dan Storm, pioneer Ruidoso Valley resident, who was driving towards Ruidoso, upon seeing the approaching wall of water, turned his car around and drove back to warn the Lowdermilk employees who were at work in and alongside the stream bed that the flood was bearing down on them. They all escaped any hurt, but did not have enough time to drive or remove very much of the equipment or machinery out of the path of the flood. Storm said the wall of water was 20 feet high as it tumbled and tumbled down the stream bed, rolling tree stumps, barrels and other debris ahead.

Dean Berry, bookkeeper for Lowdermilk, and who lives in the trailer office where he keeps the company's records, said he had only enough time to leave the trailer with a payroll checkbook. Office machines, his personal belongings and all the company's records were lost when the trailer was rolled over by the surging waters.

Peacocks, hogs and a fine dairy cow were lost by the McTeigue family whose home, as reported above, was damaged severely. There were considerable livestock losses by numerous of the ranchers in the two valleys—including the Robert O. Anderson Circle Diamond Ranch, the Jim and Gerald Tully's Hat-T Ranch, some of the Jones families, and others. Mrs. Ruby Douglass, Hondo, an English teacher at Hondo school who is in New York City at present, had a new car damaged when it was slammed into a tree by rushing water, and there was water damage in her residence. Others in the Hondo area reporting personal losses in water damaged homes included Ernesto Torres and Mr. and Mrs. Delia Herrera. The Charles Hughes family, owners of a ranch west of Hondo, lost thousands of dollars worth of furnishings and personal items when water six-feet deep puffed through their beautiful home. They also lost some livestock as did a son-in-law, Robert Scribner, who had some on pasture on the Hughes' place. A greenhouse at the Peter Hurd ranch suffered some water damage, but the Sentinel ranch house and studio of the artist was not touched. The McDaniel Ranch reported several head of cattle drowned.

Access bridges all along the river were washed away, stranding many families living on the south side of the swollen stream. The large steel bridge in the Alamo Canyon area withstood the flood, but approaches were washed away, and there was debris two feet deep or more on the floor of the bridge. Approaches had been restored last week-end there, and at some of the other bridges that had not washed away. The concrete bridge giving access to the Mayme Perry home and built by the Forest Service about ten years ago, was not damaged, but approaches were washed away. They have been restored, also. More than a dozen wooden bridges washed away completely. Restoration of these bridges and of other public needs that were damaged was being handled by

work crews of the Job Corps camp units brought to the stricken area from Mountainair last week.

The Red Cross had plenty of warm clothing, food, canned water and other needs for those people suffering personal losses. Some of the aid items were brought here from Carlsbad, and also donated by local folks. The work of distributing aid for those in immediate need was directed by County Red Cross Chairman George P. White of Ruidoso, who set up depots in Tinnie at the fly hall, and in Ruidoso in the school gym. The school gym in Ruidoso was also headquarters for the Job Corps workers, being turned into a dormitory at night. The school's lunchroom was used for feeding the youths.

For a few hours Thursday afternoon and night Paradise canyon road in Ruidoso was closed where a sewer main line ditch caved in leaving large holes a couple of places in the pavement. Debris from a nearby gully washed onto Hill road near Cree Manor apartments but was removed by city street maintenance crews. A water line was broken in that area, but service was restored before too long by a crew that worked late into the night.

Many homes in Ruidoso Downs, hardest hit by the hail, suffered water damage to personal belongings when roofs were seriously hurt. Typical cases were those of Opal Roberson, whose ceiling fell in several rooms from weight of water leaking through the roof, and the Neal Smith's Sundowner Teen Center, where water poured into the building because of roof damage.

Doris Wright, forest fire watcher who mans the Monseau Lookout tower at 10,000-foot elevation northeast of Ruidoso, was reported to have had a ringside seat to watch the storm as it moved into the Ruidoso area from the East, then curved back to hit the country around Lincoln. Part of the time she was looking down on the mass of storm clouds from her "crow's nest" according to a report from the Ruidoso Ranger office. Insurance agents in this vicinity had hundreds of claims to process from storm damage, and brought appraisers here from several places to speed up the processing of the large number of reports. Temporary offices were set up with large staffs, in two unoccupied buildings in downtown Ruidoso.

More than five feet of mud and water rolled through the picturesque St. Anne's Chapel, the small rock Episcopal church building at Glencoe, the Lincoln County Episcopal minister, the Rev. William R. Brown, reported. He was observed on Friday morning conducting a communion service, using a car radiator for his altar, for communicants of the Glencoe area across the road from the flood damaged church. He said the interior of the church was a jumbled mass of church pews, organ, altar and other furnishings.

Dick Fresques of Tinnie told of an incident occurring at his home which may have been typical of other orchardists' families' reaction to the flood. He said 250 fruit trees were lost at his place, and that his three children, who have helped in the orchards each season for many years, in fact from the time they were large enough

to be of help, had cried a bucket full of tears over the loss of the orchards, as though it were a part of the family.

Rainfall in the Hondo valley was measured on two ranches by E. J. Meyers as follows: 5.36 inches on a place a mile from Hondo, and 4.68 at another place two miles from Hondo.

Late Thursday first reports were drifting into police offices that there was some pilfering, or looting, of flooded property, and State Police were instructed to assist in patrolling the distressed area. State Policeman Conn Brown said he had orders from State Headquarters to be on the lookout for pilferers, since there had been reports of such losses during the night Thursday in the Glencoe area.

was scheduled to attend a meeting in Roswell on Friday night on another matter, flew the length of the flood area, the next day to observe the situation. The county Red Cross chairman, White, said the governor had authorized the state to pay for costs of feeding the 70 Job Corps men engaged in restoration work.

White said that donations for flood relief had been received at the disaster scene from Artesia, Carlsbad, Roswell, Capitan, Ruidoso and from Hondo and Ruidoso valley residents who were not victims of the flood. N. W. (Norm) Shiver was in charge of the shipment of Red Cross disaster relief items from Carlsbad. Brigadier H. L. Nadu of the Roswell Salvation Army office was on the scene Friday seeking out families needing immediate assistance. The National Guard from Roswell brought tanks of water for use as well as the Red Cross. The Guard also brought a generator to power a Mountain States Telephone system in the valley that was not operative because of downed power lines. Otero Rural Electric Administration, Co-operative repair crews, aided by crews from other REA organizations were on the ground making repairs when reports of power failure were first heard. Ruidoso Telephone Co. also had a crew patrolling its phone lines in the Ruidoso Valley, making repairs where needed to restore communications service.

During the height of the storm, Frank Titworth drove the Hondo Valley ambulance to Ruidoso bringing a heart attack patient, Fernin Baker, to the Ruidoso Hospital. He said it was a ride he will always remember, seeing the flood waters racing down the river bed towards his home valley.

County and state road crews were occupied frequently in removing rocks, some as large as office desks, from roads in the rain-washed vicinity on U. S. Highway 390 and 70. The huge boulders tumbled onto the roadbeds from towering banks as water loosened them. There were no reports of any damage to vehicles from this source.

Moore Sanchez of Hondo said he thought the flood was the worst he has seen in the Hondo valley, and he had seen two before this one.

Mrs. Mayme Perry of Glencoe, whose orchards were severely damaged, said this flood was no worse, she thought than others experienced in 1941 and 1945.

The water coming into the Ruidoso from Devil's Canyon's Eagle Creek contributed many more gallons to wreck damage in the lower Ruidoso and the Hondo valleys, below Glencoe.

Ben Sanchez at San Patricio, who suffered orchard losses, and Frank Titworth, Tinnie, were among residents of the two valleys aiding in directing Job Corps volunteer work crews where needed, as did County Commissioners Joe McKnight and Max Oliver. State, county and precinct peace officers did yeoman's work in patrolling, assisting in rescue, directing traffic and many other chores during the long afternoon and night Thursday.

Radio Station KRRR handled dozens of emergency messages during the storm. Ed Hyman said he believed the station was responsible for saving at least one life. A request was made by KRRR for help to rescue a woman, aged 20 or more, who was alone in a small cabin near a stream that was rising in the Ruidoso vicinity. A 4-wheel drive vehicle made it to the cabin where the woman was standing on a table to avoid high water, he said, and as the rescuers drove away with their charge, the cabin crumbled from the action of the water. He said he had no name out of the incident, that the matter was handled as an emergency.

agency and there was no time to keep records of who did what where.

Red Massey's body shop reported early this week more than 75 claims for insurance by car owners whose vehicles were dented by the huge hail stones. Two auto firms in Ruidoso staged hail sales this week, discounting new cars that had hail dents.

Bill Boone, manager of Ruidoso Municipal Airport, stated that there was no material damage to planes at the airport during last Thursday's storm. Two planes were slightly dimpled by the hail but there was no structural damage, Boone said. Brown Air Service said there was no damage to planes at their facility.

Two nursery firms here, C. W. Byers' Ruidoso Nursery and E. S. Hardy's Cañon Canyon Nursery and Greenhouse, each had extensive losses of growing plants and shrubs and damage to some of their buildings.

Several people reported seeing a tornado form during the turbulence overhead here. It is believed a small funnel touched ground in the vicinity of the Wilbur Coe Ranch. The News was told that a large tree and a small building were knocked down, neither of which were touched by flood waters there.

A rain gauge at Jack's Waffle Shop, east of Ruidoso Downs measured 11 inches of rain, it was reported. The gauge ran over at 6 inches, was emptied and it filled again to 5 inches according to Clara Jester.

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

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

"She was a little tense in the gate at first, but then she relaxed. She broke out on top and held the lead all the way. I never put a stick on her. Several horses came to her about midway down the stretch, then she came on again, which shows she's got a lot of heart. We were pulling away again at the wire. I would like to ride her again in the Rainbow and All-American if Mr. Huntley decides to supplement her for both these futurities. I don't think there's anything on the grounds now that can top her."

Otherwise, a new leader appears atop the Ruidoso Downs jockey standings—sharp-jawed Larry Byers—after 14 days of the current 60-day meeting. Byers edged ahead of Elbert Mincey with a total of 10 winners, 13 seconds and 10 thirds.

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


