



Market Ticker Brings Latest News

From Chicago Board to Local Resident



DIRECT WIRE—The market ticker in foreground brings latest commodity market quotations direct from Chicago Board of Trade to Earl Crow, Pecos, Texas livestock man, while he vacations in Ruidoso. Ticker is in trailer near Crow's home in upper canyon. Crow conducts business via phone with Chicago board, buying and selling thousands of dollars in beef and pork futures every week.

A stock market ticker, bringing news of commodities direct from the Chicago Board of Trade over a leased wire, is operating five days a week—the days the Board is active. Here in Ruidoso in a trailer beside the vacation home of Earl Crow.

The Pecos, Tex. livestock breeder is one of the sponsors of the successful move to bring trading in futures in beef and pork contracts into the commodity market structure.

Crow, who lost a small fortune when the cattle market broke a few years ago, helped formulate plans to bring the future trading into being thus providing insurance for America's food producing ranchers and processors. He said trading in pork bellies has only been in existence for four years—and in beef FOR ONLY SEVEN AND A HALF MONTHS. It is almost inconceivable, he declares, that there has been no market for futures in these two very important basics of the world's food commodities up until the very recent past, as have other agricultural items, such as wool, cotton, peanuts, soy beans, grains, etc.

Today in Ruidoso, with the information brought him by the ticker, Crow can buy and sell via long distance telephone, thousands of dollars worth of beef or pork belly futures.

He is one of several men in the West Texas area, including San Angelo, Lubbock and Pecos traders, who have been carrying on an educational program concerning the trading in futures in this new field. He said growth in trading in both commodities has been phenomenal, just as the proponents had predicted.

Crow is representative in New Mexico for Siegel Trading Co., Chicago, one of the several firms involved in the Chicago Board of Trade activities in agricultural commodities. The ticker operates only four hours a day, starting at 7 a.m. New Mexico time and closing at 11 a.m. (or from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m., Chicago time.) He said at present the company he represents cannot serve New Mexico customers, but he said he hopes before long it can, when approved by the state's securities commission.

Crow is a native of Hale County, Texas, and is married and the father of five children. Most of the family is here enjoying Ruidoso's climate, scenery and recreation while Dad carries on with his business. He operates two packing plants, one at Pecos and one at

Lincoln Pageant Is County-Wide Undertaking

First practice for the historical pageant, "The Last Escape of Billy the Kid", starring Johnny Thomas of San Patricio, will be held at 7:00 o'clock in the evening, Sunday, July 25 at the Coe amphitheatre—the pageant grounds at Lincoln, next to the old Court House museum.

This is Lincoln County's annual contribution to the great number of colorful local historical festivals that are brightening up the summer, honoring the pioneers, and keeping alive our traditions in many a village, rural spot, and great city throughout the length and breadth of our beloved land.

It is a county-wide undertaking, this pageant, into which everyone enters with a spirit of fun and good fellowship, hoping to make every one feel at home among us, whether life-long resident or new-comer from the farthest corner of the earth.

Many Ruidoso people have taken part in the pageant through the years. Dave Parks will be narrator. Eric Bruce, pioneer educator, scholar, song composer, long time resident of Lincoln County, will help with voices and other features of the show.

This year's Mrs. MacSween is Margaret Taylor, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Taylor of Lincoln. Miss Taylor is a native of Lincoln and a granddaughter of George W. Coe, beloved and admired pioneer of Lincoln County.

Many others of the actors—who come from all walks of life and are of all ages—are descendants of the real actors in the real dramas of 80 to 160 years ago.

The pageant was originated by Wilbur F. Coe as part of "A Day in Old Lincoln", set aside honoring the pioneers of the southwest and preserving the local color of this region.

Brown and Village Reach Settlement

A controversy of two years' standing between Ralph Brown, operator of a private airplane charter service here, and the Village of Ruidoso was settled amicably Tuesday night.

At one time, differences between the pioneer Ruidoso pilot and the village officials reached a boiling point when the village board of trustees ordered a fence built to prevent Brown having access to the municipal airport's main strip. Brown secured an injunction halting the work.

He had sought payment for land taken, and other damages he was due from the village's construction of an all new airport, including a wider, longer main runway. This occurred in 1963.

Main points of the agreement between Brown and the village were that he would be paid \$7,750.00 for land taken, and the village further would build for him a private access to the main strip north of his office from his hangars which he uses for his personal planes.

He operates an airplane mechanic service in connection with his charter service. He also sells motor fuels and lubricants to many old-time friends and customers who fly here and park their planes at his facilities, which once served as Ruidoso's airport. Brown and his wife, Hettie, operated the airport at no cost to the village as a convenience and courtesy to the people who have flown into Ruidoso, for many years.

The village, with federal assistance and with airport revenue bonds, enlarged the port's facilities, and built a handsome, large terminal building, plus several rental hangars, in 1963, and Brown and the city then battled it out in competition for servicing charges for planes flying into here.

At a part of the settlement, Brown agreed to remit to the city 25¢ per gallon on all gasoline he sells his customers, and 10¢ per quart on oil.

Brown, who met with the council Tuesday night without his attorney, told the men, including Mayor G. H. Stoneman, Trustees Jodie Fillemann, Bill McCarty and Guy Robertson, he would agree to the terms they offered. At one point in the discussion Trustee McCarty said, "Such a long period of time has passed and so many people have become involved that the real meaning and purpose of the controversy has become lost. I feel past hard feelings should be forgotten and an agreement reached." He further said Brown should be paid for the land taken and the damages and that no one had ever thought Brown wasn't due some consideration.

McCarty made a motion Brown be paid the \$7,750, and that the private access be provided, and Robertson seconded the move. It was passed unanimously. Village Manager-Clerk Jim Hino and Assistant Don Hart, and Attorney John W. Thompson were in attendance with the board. Trustee Claude Whitlock was not present, being out of the village on business.

A preliminary discussion earlier with Brown by Mayor Stoneman had led to the settlement talks, it was reported.

A judgment will be sought for money to pay Brown \$7,750 with the amount to go on the tax rolls in 1966, with payment to come in 1967, it was agreed.

RANGER NOTES

How long has it been since you have taken a walk in the woods? If you are not taking advantage of this type of recreation that the Lincoln National Forest offers, you are missing some very enjoyable hours.

Each season of the year has its advantages for the hiker. Late July and August is particularly good time for wild flowers in the Ruidoso area and the rain in June this year has made this a better than average summer.

You do not have to be an experienced hiker to enjoy the trails in this part of the country. Many of the trails are not too steep and the slower you go the more you will see. Most of the mountain flowers are not very showy and require a second close look to appreciate their beauty.

Some of the flowers you can expect to see in areas above 8,500 feet are Harebells, Franciscan Bluebells, Jacob's Ladder, Monkshood, Larkspur, Fairy Primrose, Penstemon, Lupine (Texan) call this one Bluebonnet, Western Wallflower, Indian Paintbrush Skyrock, et Ollia, Mexican Silene, and the most common in this area Western Yarrow. These are just a few of


the many in bloom now. Take this list with you and see how many you can identify. There are many inexpensive books on wild flower identification available at book stores. One of the best is "Flowers of the Southwestern Mountains" published by the National Park Service.

It is interesting to find out how many of these wild flowers had medicinal use for the early Indians. As an example, the leaves of the Western Yarrow have a cooling sensation when applied to the skin. Because of this the flowers and roots are chewed and the mixture is rubbed on the bodies of participants in ceremonies involving fire.

If the Forest Service can be of any help to you in planning a hike, stop by the Ranger Station at Cedar Creek or call 257-2441.

There are short Nature Walks in the Ski Area each Saturday and Sunday. The walks take about thirty minutes and are at 10:30, 12:30 and 2:30.

For a contrast in the life zones in this area drive down to the White Sands National Monument. Inquire at the visitors' center about the location of Nature Walks conducted by John Douglas, Park Na-

Money will be available as soon as the cost estimates are forwarded to Peter I. Hayes, Emergency Coordinator, from the State Planning Office in Santa Fe. All the final plans for letting contracts have not been worked out. Gerald Gordon, with the Soil Conservation Service in Capitan, will have information on these contracts soon.



93 PCT. OCCUPANCY IN '64-'65 REPORTED AT FT. STANTON

Annual reports by administrators for Fort Stanton Tuberculosis Hospital were heard by the hospital board at a regular meeting last week-end, Dr. A. Eugene Mann, board chairman, reported today.

Three areas of hospital service were reported—hospital care, clinical service, and out-patient treatment. Dr. H. C. Jernigan, hospital medical director, told the board that the hospital has 93 per cent occupancy during the fiscal year ending June 30. In reviewing the patient load at the hospital, he pointed out that 404 patients had been treated with an average length of stay of 318 days. During the year 227 patients had been admitted and 248 had been discharged.

Daily average patient population was 173. Clinical service throughout the state—a program conducted in cooperation with the New Mexico Health Department and the use of a mobile x-ray unit—was performed in almost 50 chest clinics in various communities of the state. These clinics are now conducted by medical personnel of the hospital with the assistance of district health officers and nurses. Almost 5,800 x-rays have been taken and/or read by the Fort Stanton medical staff in connection with the clinical program.

The third facet of the program of tuberculosis control being directed by the Fort Stanton staff is an out-patient chemotherapy program. Through this type of program, patients with tuberculosis not requiring hospitalization are able to remain in their homes and receive treatment. At the close of the fiscal year, 664 persons were receiving chemotherapy treatment. During the year 271 were removed from the program and 317 added.

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

repealable until the bonds and the interest thereon shall be fully paid, cancelled, and discharged, as hereinafter provided.

Section 5. Severability Clause. That if any section, paragraph, clause or provision of this ordinance shall for any reason be held to be invalid or unenforceable, the invalidity or unenforceability of such section, paragraph, clause or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this ordinance.

Section 6. Repealer Clause. That all bylaws, orders, resolutions and ordinances, or parts thereof, inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed to the extent only of such inconsistency. This repealer shall not be construed to revive any bylaws, orders, resolutions or ordinances, or parts thereof, heretofore repealed or amended.

Section 7. Emergency Clause and Effective Date. 


