

A new, private school is being founded this fall at the former Camp Geronimo on the Mescalero Apache Indian Reservation about 30 miles southeast of here. The camp was originated several years ago by Ruidosians Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Hart and was bought earlier this year by a group of people, aided by Cloudford's Area Development committee, who will start a new kind of teaching method in this state. Known as Springmount, the school is the only one of its kind in the Rocky Mountain area, and follows the revolutionary lines of the famed Summerhill School in England. Founder of the school is J. Patrick Forrestal, of El Paso, former teacher at Texas Western and a student of the Montessori method of teaching, who will serve as headmaster. Only 35 children, aged six through 15, will be accepted for the 1965-66 school year, with instruction to be in ungraded classes with a teacher for every five students. Classes in the creative and expressive arts will be offered in addition to standard academics, Forrestal indicated. Faculty will include Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Golden, recently of San Diego, Calif., and Mrs. Mildred Stevens, former math teacher at Radford School for Girls in El Paso. Mrs. Golden will teach in the elementary field, and Golden will be the school's recreational director. School term dates for the year will be Sept. 12 through Dec. 17; Jan. 2 through March 23 and April 3 through June 10.

FORM ASSOCIATION TO SUPPLY NATURAL GAS TO SEVERAL TOWNS

The Capitan-Carrizozo Gas Users Association was formed by trustees of the Village of Capitan and Carrizozo meeting jointly last Wednesday night in Capitan. Both Capitan and Carrizozo each appointed three members to serve on the association board, Mayor Gerald Dean of Capitan, and Mayor Vernon Petty of Carrizozo announced Saturday. Named to represent Capitan were Bert Cheney, Ray Province and Valton Hall; Carrizozo's appointments were Jete Voss, Fred English and Albert Roberts. In an organization meeting of the association Bert Cheney was elected chairman, Jete Voss, vice-chairman and Ray Province, secretary-treasurer, Dean said. Purpose of the association is to bring a natural gas line from near Corona to the two villages and to issue revenue bonds for that purpose. The association also proposes to sell natural gas to the village of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs. Joe Hawkins, president of the Lincoln County Utility Co., which has a franchise with the Village of Ruidoso to furnish natural gas to this village was present at the joint meeting Wednesday. Hawkins was accompanied by two members representing Quinn and Co. of Albuquerque, Arthur Quinn, president, and Douglas Henslee, bond department manager of Quinn and Co. Quinn stated Thursday that his company is prepared to arrange the financing for the Lincoln County Utility Company to supply natural gas to Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs through a purchasing arrangement with the Capitan-Carrizozo Gas Users Association.

SEVERAL ARE HURT, PROPERTY IS DAMAGED IN SERIES OF WRECKS

A rash of automobile wrecks in the Playground area last week-end left several persons injured, one of them very critically, and also took a heavy toll in property damage as police were hard pressed to check all the accidents. Perhaps the most spectacular was the one occurring here in Ruidoso on Sudderth atop Carrizo hill when a car traveling at a reported "terrific rate of speed" went out of control and rammed a stop sign and two other vehicles. Lincoln County Fair Is Just One Week Away

Fair Work Days will be held Tuesday and Thursday, Sept. 7 and 9 to get the grounds ready for the annual Lincoln County Fair which is Sept. 10 and 11 next week. Fairbooks are available at the County Agent's office in Carrizozo, Dean Hardware in Capitan and the Chamber of Commerce in Ruidoso. The Fair Book lists the classes in which entries can be made. Admission to the Fair Grounds will be free this year. It is hoped that the income from the advertising in the Fair Book will cover the cost of the fair. The fair will open Friday, Sept. 10 with entry and judging of the junior livestock and home economics, flowers, fruits and vegetable exhibits. Saturday will see the Fair Parade and the Range Sheep Show. Miss Hoyda Croeland, New Mexico Miss Wool is expected at the Lincoln County Fair. With the Fair season getting underway, parents are urged to keep small fry at a safe distance from animals on exhibit. The flailing hoof of a startled horse or cow can be a lethal weapon. Startled animals may also bite or butt. Many small children are injured each year because they are left unguarded and dart too close to livestock. Children are fascinated by animals and usually are eager to move in close and stroke or pet them. Also, in this day of television, children see well-trained animals in the movies and have no way of knowing that the average animal is different. Horses, especially, are innately timid and react to any quick or unexpected movement. Another reason for their skittishness is that they cannot see what is behind them. Their chief means of self-protection, a swift kick, can severely injure a child. Parents should insist that their children stay a safe distance from unknown animals, especially horses. The youngsters should never approach the animal until permission has been given by a responsible adult in charge of the animal.

NBC To Film Futurity For Sport Show

The richest horse race in all the world's turf history will be run here Monday as Ruidoso Downs sponsors the 7th running of the All-American Futurity for 2-year-old quarter horses. The event will sport a purse of \$419,460—the most money ever in a pot for any horse race. Trials Saturday last week provided an even dozen juveniles to race the short distance in this amazing cow-country classic. Such a rich prize justly places Ruidoso Downs on top as the quarter horse capital of the world—a title earned by Gene Hensley, racing coordinator for the local track, who bulldozed the All-American into a place of high prominence in the sporting world. So important is the event that the National Broadcasting Co. has sent a crew of announcers, cameramen and technicians here to film the All-American in color on Monday so that it can be shown on its Sunday afternoon Sports Action feature Sept. 12. In Trials Saturday last week, only one Texas horse, Lester Goodson's Deck Be There, yet to win NBC CAMERA CREW ARRIVING FOR TELECASTING OF ALL-AMERICAN. Worldwide telecasting of the world's richest horse racing stakes Labor Day's seventh running of the \$419,250 All-American Futurity requires an extensive crew. Wednesday, NBC executives Ray March, director; Dick Victory script research; and Arthur White arrived at Ruidoso Downs. Friday and Saturday, cameramen, technicians and announcers will check in to complete the staff. The first race of his lifetime, was able to crack the list of 12 fastest qualifiers. California, on the other hand, came up with five of the dozen elite spots. Yet, it cost them quite a bit to gain controlling interest—such as \$13,000 supplemental entry fees for three of their qualifiers, plus an initial \$50,000 purchase price for Oakdale's Henry Van Ruiten to acquire the racing rights to Miss Gold Angel. This is believed to be one of the few times in history that California has flashed bigger bankrolls than Texas. In fact, Oklahoma, without going to too great an expense, managed to qualify three horses for this straightaway classic, while Florida, Missouri and Alabama matched Texas with one finalist each. Full details on the 12 qualifiers appears elsewhere on the front page of today's News. The All-American Sale will be honored by having Saturday's featured race, a 6-furlong sprint named the All-American Sale purse. Though it is strictly for thoroughbred (Continued to Page 1—Sec. B)

Albuquerque Man Dies Near Capitan From Heart Attack





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

Your Minister Writes . . .

By GEORGE F. BROWN
 (Minister, First Christian Church)
 (An Open Letter to the Honest Atheist)
 Dear Sir or Madam:
 If you have arrived at your conclusion that there is no God as a result of humbly studying the facts before the evidence as it has come to you, then you are to be commended for the best beauty of your unbiased. If you have been eager not to believe anything with out adequate evidence, and still use about believing what may be comforting just because it is comforting, then I honor you and I trust that you will continue following the evidence wherever it may lead.
 Your stand if you have been at all vocal about it probably has not made you popular and it is possible that you are not basically a happy person. One who has concluded that man is alone in the world has removed much of the possibility of real joy in life. Although he may yet be what we call a good man.
 Your concern for the truth, whatever it may turn out to be, is really commendable only if it is a continuing search. Evidence as to the nature of the universe and of man is still coming in and our knowledge of anything is still imperfect.

Realizing this, you will go on testing your conclusions.
 Herein lies my hope for you. For though I honor you, I think you are wrong. Your search for truth assumes that truth is possible in the nature of things, and the fact that you are a good man leads me to assume that you value goodness. If then you should discover that both truth and goodness lie at the base of things, then you may yet respond to the exciting news that you have been valuing an highest virtue also deep in nature. If, on the other hand, truth is not possible, the only other alternative is sheer meaninglessness, and you and I both are wanting our time.
 Some 40 years ago, Bishop Charles Gore pointed out that there are basically only two alternatives in belief concerning the nature of the world: (1) that there are no acts of a universal spirit or reason with which we can hold communion, nothing but blind and unrecognizable about us, within and above us, a universal and eternal reason or purpose with which we can and ought to correspond. You recognize these of course as the atheistic alternative and the theistic alternative. There really is no live third option.
 Perhaps you ought to consider taking out a new option.



**7-Mile Stretch
Of Paving Due
In Reservation**

The first seven-mile project of paving Highway 74 from Clouderot to Highway 70 near Mesalero should be completed within a month if weather permits work to continue, Highway Commission Chairman John Sudderth told a group of Alamogordo people last week. The segment will be from the north end of what is commonly called the "solar furnace" road to Elk Silver.
Workmen are on the job there now, Sudderth said, but recent rains have hampered their work. If the weather cooperates, two to four weeks of work is all that will be necessary for the completion of this segment, he said.
Beyond that, there remains about 18 miles of road to the Highway 70 junction. Sudderth said that he would commit completion of about half that section next spring, and the rest of it would follow.
"I am of the opinion we might be able to surface all that portion of the road next spring, but I cannot commit that much," he said. "I will therefore make a firm commitment to the first half, just as fast as we can," he continued.
Sudderth has said on several visits in Ruidoso in months past that this is a project in which he has been interested for a long time, and "I intend to see that it is completed," he said.
Work on the road has been hampered by many things, he explained. Part of the road is on the Mesalero reservation, and it took some time to obtain rights-of-way, and also for the Indians to come up with their portion of the work. This is now all done, and the state has accepted the project, so the first seven miles will be done now, another segment next spring, and the remainder as soon after that as is possible, Sudderth said.
He said he would send a highway engineer to the area right away to begin making plans for the second segment of the highway.
This type of work is done with contingency money, Sudderth said. He explained the state's financial problem in highway construction, saying that there are 181-million miles of critically deficient roads on the primary highway system, and 144-million miles of secondary roads with similar deficiency, yet the budgets are far below what they need to be to take care of such deficiencies.

A total of 146 quarter horse yearlings are catalogued for sale, along with approximately a dozen Thoroughbred youngsters eligible to next year's inaugural running of the Ruidoso Roadrunner Futurity.

Fluid drive may be a question, but horsepower surely figures to play a big part in next Monday's holiday running of the world's richest horse racing stakes—the \$419,460 All-American Futurity.

The reason is that three of the 12 qualifiers are owned by automobile dealers — second fastest Rapid Volley by Fred Beckham and L. V. Casey of Anaheim, Calif., fifth fastest Savannah, Jr., by J. R. and R. E. Cates of Tulsa, Okla., and 10th fastest Deck Be There by Lester Goodson, Magnolia, Tex.

When Southern California dairyman Henry Van Rullen purchased Miss Gold Angel recently for \$50,000 and contributed another \$13,000 supplementary fee to make her eligible to Monday's running of the \$419,460 All-American, he was taking a big gamble.

As it turned out, the Oakdale, Calif., horseman couldn't sleep a wink all night after Saturday's trials, until he learned that Miss Gold Angel, fifth to fastest qualifier Moore Co., made the grade for the All-American at 20.63 seconds, equalling Swanee Bar's time for the final two positions in the field of 12.

For the first time in its six-year history, a brother act may figure prominently in Monday's running of the \$419,460 All-American Futurity. It concerns Henry Van Rullen's Miss Gold Angel, which Daxzell Banks trains and brother Ronnie Banks will ride.

Owner Hugh Huntley of Madera, Calif., whose Ruby Charge was eighth fastest qualifier for Monday's running of the \$419,460 All-American Futurity, is nearing the \$500,000 mark in stakes earnings at Ruidoso Downs.

Winner of three of six previous runnings of the All-American with Galobar (1959), Fokez Bar (1961) and Goetta (1963), Huntley has picked up additional jackpots here with Nippy Bars in this year's \$88,000 Rainbow Derby and Ruby Charge in this summer's \$112,000 Kansas Futurity.

Although, counting \$4,000 earned by Nippy Bars in last year's All-American, the Huntley-Trainer Newt Keck combine has amassed approximately \$417,500 in gold here.

Horses claimed last week-end at Ruidoso Downs included: Sunday Ruddyama, claimed by Mrs. Retha Coon, tr. R. L. Cuff, from Walter H. Miller, Jr., for \$2,000, and Bonus, by E. J. Burke and Wade Johnson, tr. from Larry Speck for \$4,000. On Friday Dugan's Low was claimed by Calvin Mims, c/o. from Harold T. Hornbuckle for \$3,000, and on Saturday Kingsize was claimed by Leon Hout, tr., Bob Arnett, from Richard C. Ross, for \$1,800.

It doesn't happen often and you won't find him in the jockey standings, but 19-year-old Clifford Thompson, apprentice rider from Fort Gay, W. Va., is Ruidoso Downs most recent "Jockey of the Week".

A shy, quiet, gentlemanly youngster, Thompson won his first race on a recognized track only a week ago Thursday, Aug. 18, when he hustled Byebound to a powerful 11-length victory.

Having gained this momentum, Thompson, whose contract is held

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by Ann Ellis and increases in value daily, came back to win three races, finish second once and fourth twice in only eight mounts over the past week-end—quite a feat considering he is competing against tougher, more seasoned riders.

Thompson's parents, Ott and Ruby, now residing in Albuquerque, are downright proud of the boy, who never really started riding until about five weeks ago.

Among the regulars, Larry "Fearless Fosdick" Byers continues to lead with 52 winners, but his position is somewhat shaky following five victories last week by onrushing Danny Whitted that shot him into second place with 48.

Bob Arnett, with 49 winners, holds a commanding lead over his nearest training rival, Joe Wade, awarded a pair of long overdue winners (through clerical errors) that gave him a more solid hold on runner-up honors with 27 triumphs.



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



A new "Scheduled Service" system which provides overnight delivery of Zip Coded parcel post five days a week for parcels between all of the 397 post offices within the State of New Mexico was announced today by Postmaster L. F. Dryden.
The program which covers the entire state—121,510 square miles—will mean that a parcel deposited in any of the 379 offices will be available for delivery in any one of the other offices within the state the next day.
Deputy Assistant Postmaster General August C. Hahn announced the dramatic new program at a press conference in Albuquerque followed by a meeting of the Albuquerque Mail User's Council, where further details were discussed.
Hahn emphasized that the success of the program depends to a large extent on precision timing in the transferring of bulk mails at major cities throughout the state. "The New Mexico system forms a western nucleus for an eventual nation-wide tie in of scheduled service areas which will result in dependable scheduled delivery for parcel post from coast-to-coast," he stated.
Extensive testing has assured the success of this dramatic new program, which in effect offers "first rate service" for fourth-class mail according to Postmaster Dryden at Ruidoso.
Mailing deadlines for this service will be 4:30 p.m. Monday thru Friday of each week here.




