



### Construction Is Underway On Restaurant

Construction has begun on a new restaurant for the area, a dining room to be a part of High Country Lodge, Charles Rumbaugh, owner of the lodge, said last week Jones Construction Co., owned and operated by Stansell and G. A. Jones, a local firm, is doing the work, which will include remodeling the interior of the office, and adding 1,000 square feet of floor space to the office building to provide for a kitchen.

He said plans are to have the dining spot open by Thanksgiving, "when the skiers begin arriving." The restaurant will serve breakfast, lunches and dinners.

High Country Lodge is located on State Road 37 at its junction with the Sierra Blanca area road at Alto.

The Chaparral Motor Hotel in Ruidoso Downs is now under new ownership, according to an announcement made this mid-week by Frank Wolfe, a Dallas banker, following a conference between Wolfe, Harry Whipple who is the retiring owner, and T. R. Hood, president of Ruidoso State Bank.

Wolfe said he was not at liberty at present to name the new owners, but that this information may be available in the not too distant future.

Harry Whipple is to devote his time to his other interests, which include the operation of the Gateway Shopping Center, a several-unit complex in the eastern part of Ruidoso on Sudderth Drive.

Wolfe's statement added that there would be no change in personnel at the Chaparral, scene of dozens of conventions, conferences and other such gatherings in recent months, and many local events of varying sizes.

The Chaparral was built here four years ago by Wiley Culppepper and associates of El Paso and has been operated through three summer seasons. Whipple and his wife, Leona, who first had the coffee shop and a gift store concession, later became owners of the full operation, including the Ice-Rama which was converted into a huge convention center early this year. The Hotel has more than 100 rooms, a barber shop, beauty shop, dress shop and the gift store and coffee shop, along with a large banquet room, and other conference and/or dining rooms in the main structure. Wolfe said there is no financial problem concerning the hotel's operation—that it has funds to continue all its services.

### 20 Quartets Compete Here

## COUNTY TO VOTE ON LEVY FOR HOSPITALS NEXT WEEK

Lincoln County residents go to the polls Tuesday, Sept. 23, with their fellow New Mexicans to vote on eight proposed constitutional amendments. In addition, in Lincoln County, there will also be a vote on a proposed hospital levy for providing funds for claims under the Indigent Hospital Claims Act. The amount of taxation to be levied against property could be in excess of the 20 mills constitutional limitation, the proposal declares.

In both Ruidoso and Carrizozo, the two voting boxes have been combined into one in each community for this election. Paper ballots will be used for the voting rather than voting machines for the special election.

Polls open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. In Ruidoso voting will be in the city hall with Ed Lane as chairman of the election judges. At Ruidoso Downs, voting will be in the village hall with Clara Jester as chairman. Other polling places in the area include Nogal, at fire station, Mrs. David E. Alexander, chairman; San Patricio, school house, Mrs. Juanita R. Sanchez, chairman; Bonito, Angus school house, Sam Allen, chairman; Lincoln, school house, Elligo T. Orlego, chairman; Hondo, high school, Robert G. Gutierrez, chairman; Picocho, school house, Mrs. George Clements, chairman; Capitlan, village hall, Miles E. Williams, chairman.

### NM Voters To Mark Ballots Tuesday on Eight Amendments

(Editor's Note: Below are printed comments, pro and con, on proposed Amendments Nos. 4 through 8, as a service to readers of the News. This is the last of a two-part series discussing the proposed eight state constitutional amendments which New Mexicans will ballot on Tuesday, Sept. 23.)

#### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 4

**SUBJECT:** To provide for weighting of votes of members of the state senate.

#### ARGUMENTS FOR:

1. This will enable compliance with federal constitutional requirements for representation based on population, but retain a voice for

#### ARGUMENTS AGAINST:

1. The amendment is a "self-interest" designed to perpetuate present senators in office.

2. The heart of legislative action rests in committees. Without weighted voting in committee, the

smaller counties which would be underrepresented if they were combined with larger ones for election of senators (There is no assurance that the constitutional requirements are met.)

2. This system preserves the traditional groupings of mutual interests along county lines. (Traditional only since the 1940's.)

3. This will allow the voice of the people to speak through their elected representatives with mathematical precision. (So will many other plans.)

4. This system will allow easier and almost automatic reappointment of the senate in the future as the state's population shifts.

## Mescalero Gets New Hospital

The Bureau of the Budget and the Division of Indian Health have approved construction of a 15-bed hospital for the Mescalero Indian Reservation, Senator Joseph M. Montoya, (D-New Mexico) announced last week-end.

Senator Montoya said planning of the \$151,000 hospital will be accomplished this year, with construction to be scheduled during the next fiscal year.

"This has been a long struggle," Senator Montoya said. He has been working for approval of the hospital for a year.

The Division of Indian Health of the Public Health Service provides medical care for the tribe. The present clinic facility, Senator Montoya said, was built in 1914 and is "totally inadequate to meet the needs of the 1400 people that it serves."

The new hospital will have an X-ray department and a small surgery, and will provide obstetrical care. The latter is a major need of the reservation, where the infant mortality rate is high, the Senator's news release said.







Here's the way we'll mark our ballots:

- No. 1. Increase compensation for legislators. We think they deserve more, all right, but don't like the pattern of this one and will vote against it, hoping one more suitable will come forth very soon.
- No. 2. State Investment Council Powers. We will vote for this one.

"The principal of the permanent school fund, and other permanent funds, shall be invested by a state investment officer in accordance with policy regulations promulgated by a state investment council. The legislature may by a three-fourth vote of the members elected to each house provide that said funds may be invested in interest bearing or other securities. All losses from such interest bearing notes or securities which have definite maturity dates shall be reimbursed by the state."

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 1**  
 A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 4, SECTION 10 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO INCREASE COMPENSATION OF LEGISLATORS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 4, Section 10 of the Constitution of New Mexico to read:

"Each member of the legislature shall receive as per diem expense the sum of not more than twenty dollars (\$20.00) for each day's attendance during each session, and ten cents (.10) for each mile traveled in going to and returning from the seat of the government by the usual traveled route, once each session as defined by Section 5, Article IV of this Constitution, and in addition, two hundred dollars (\$200) a month for each month he is a member of the legislature."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 2**  
 A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 12, SECTION 7 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO PERMIT THE SALE OF INTEREST BEARING NOTES OR SECURITIES FOR LESS THAN THEIR ACQUISITION COST, AND TO REINVEST THE PROCEEDS IN HIGHER-YIELDING SECURITIES IN ORDER TO REALIZE INCREASED INCOME TO THE STATE PERMANENT FUNDS; AND AUTHORIZING THE STATE INVESTMENT COUNCIL TO INVEST NOT MORE THAN FIFTY PER CENT OF THE PERMANENT FUNDS IN CORPORATE SECURITIES.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 12, Section 7 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The principal of the permanent school fund, and other permanent funds, shall be invested by a state investment officer in accordance with policy regulations promulgated by a state investment council. The legislature may by a three-fourth vote of the members elected to each house provide that said funds may be invested in interest bearing or other securities. All losses from such interest bearing notes or securities which have definite maturity dates shall be reimbursed by the state."

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 3**

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 9, Section 11 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"No school district shall borrow money except for the purpose of erecting, remodeling, making additions to and furnishing school buildings or purchasing or improving school grounds or any combination of these purposes, and in such cases only when the proposition to create the debt has been submitted to a vote of such qualified electors of the district as are owners of real estate within the school district and a majority of those voting on the question have voted in favor of creating such debt. No school district shall ever become indebted in an amount exceeding six percent on the assessed valuation of the taxable property within the school district as shown by the preceding general assessment."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 4**

"Notwithstanding any provisions of this constitution to the contrary, the legislature may provide by law for the weighting of the votes of the members of the state senate on matters coming before that body, in such manner that equal protection of the laws is secured to the people of this state."

"The judicial power of the state shall be vested in the senate, when sitting as a court of impeachment, a supreme court, a court of appeals, district courts, probate courts; justices of the peace and such courts inferior to the district courts as may be established by law from time to time in any county or municipality of the state, including juvenile courts."

Section 2. It is proposed to amend Article 6, Section 2 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The court of appeals shall consist of not less than three judges whose qualifications shall be the same as those of justices of the supreme court and whose compensation and election for terms of eight years shall be as provided by law, except that an initial term may be prescribed by law for less than eight years to provide maximum continuity."

"A vacancy in the office of judge of the court of appeals shall be filled by appointment of the governor for a period provided by law."

"Three judges of the court of appeals shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and a majority of those participating must concur in any judgment of the court."

"When necessary, the chief justice of the supreme court may designate any justice of the supreme court, or any district judge of the

state, to act as judge of the court of appeals, and he may designate any judge of the court of appeals to hold court in any district, or to act as a justice of the supreme court."

Section 4. It is proposed to add a new section to Article 6 of the constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The court of appeals shall have no original jurisdiction. It may be authorized by law to review directly decisions of administrative agencies of the state, and it may be authorized by rules of the supreme court to issue all writs necessary or appropriate in aid of its appellate jurisdiction. In all other cases, it shall exercise appellate jurisdiction as may be provided by law."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 1  
 A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 4, SECTION 10 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO INCREASE COMPENSATION OF LEGISLATORS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 4, Section 10 of the Constitution of New Mexico to read:

"Each member of the legislature shall receive as per diem expense the sum of not more than twenty dollars (\$20.00) for each day's attendance during each session, and in addition, two hundred dollars (\$200) for each month he is a member of the legislature."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 2

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 12, SECTION 7 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO PERMIT THE SALE OF INTEREST BEARING NOTES OR SECURITIES FOR LESS THAN THEIR ACQUISITION COST, AND TO REINVEST THE PROCEEDS IN HIGHER-YIELDING SECURITIES IN ORDER TO REALIZE INCREASED INCOME TO THE STATE PERMANENT FUNDS; AND AUTHORIZING THE STATE INVESTMENT COUNCIL TO INVEST NOT MORE THAN FIFTY PER CENT OF THE PERMANENT FUNDS IN CORPORATE SECURITIES.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 12, Section 7 of the Constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The principal of the permanent school fund, and other permanent funds, shall be invested by a state investment officer in accordance with policy regulations promulgated by a state investment council. The legislature may by a three-fourth vote of the members elected to each house provide that said funds may be invested in interest bearing or other securities. All losses from such interest bearing notes or securities which have definite maturity dates shall be reimbursed by the state.

"The state investment officer, in order to realize increased income, may, with the approval of the state investment council, sell interest bearing notes or securities at less than their original acquisition cost, providing the proceeds are immediately reinvested in sufficiently higher yielding interest bearing notes or securities, to provide for a portion of the increased interest income to be amortized over the life of the new investment which will restore to the corpus of the fund the amount of the capital loss realized on the sale of the

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 3

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 9, SECTION 11 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO TO ALLOW SCHOOL DISTRICTS TO BORROW MONEY FOR REMODELING AND MAKING ADDITIONS TO SCHOOL BUILDINGS OR IMPROVING SCHOOL GROUNDS OR ANY COMBINATION OF THESE.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 9, Section 11 of the Constitution of New Mexico to read:

"No school district shall borrow money except for the purpose of erecting, remodeling, making additions to and furnishing school buildings or purchasing or improving school grounds or any combination of these purposes, and in such cases only when the proposition to create the debt has been submitted to a vote of such qualified electors of the district as are owners of real estate within the school district and a majority of those voted in favor of creating such debt. No school district shall ever become indebted in an amount exceeding six percent on the assessed valuation of the taxable property within the school district as shown by the preceding general assessment.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 4

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 6, SECTION 1 AND 2 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO; AND ADDING NEW SECTIONS THEREBY; CREATING A COURT OF APPEALS AND DEFINING JURISDICTION OF APPELLATE COURTS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 6, Section 1 of the Constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The judicial power of the state shall be vested in the senate when sitting as a court of impeachment, a supreme court, a court of appeals, district courts, probate courts, justices of the peace and such courts inferior to the district courts as may be established by law from time to time in any county or municipality of the state, including juvenile courts."

Section 2. It is proposed to amend Article 6, Section 2 of the Constitution of New Mexico to read:

"Appeals from a judgment of the district court imposing a sentence or death or life imprisonment shall be taken directly to the supreme court. In all other cases, criminal and civil, the supreme court shall exercise appellate jurisdiction as may be provided by law; provided that an aggrieved party shall have an absolute right to one appeal."

Section 3. It is proposed to add a new section to Article 6 of the Constitution of New Mexico to read:

"The court of appeals shall consist of not less than three judges whose qualifications shall be the same as those of justices of the supreme court and whose compensation and election for term of eight years shall be as provided by law, except that an initial term may be prescribed by law for less than eight years to provide maximum continuity.

"A vacancy in the office of judge of the court of appeals shall be filled by appointment of the governor for a period provided by law.

"Three judges of the court of appeals shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, and a majority of those participating must concur in any judgment of the court.

"When necessary, the chief justice of the supreme court may designate any justice of the supreme court, or any district judge of the

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 5

A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 16 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF NEW MEXICO BY ADDING A NEW SECTION TO PROVIDE FOR TRIAL DE NOVO IN DISTRICT COURTS UPON APPEALS FROM DECISIONS, ACTS OR REFUSALS TO ACT OF ANY STATE EXECUTIVE ON MATTERS RELATING TO WATER RIGHTS.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is proposed to amend Article 16 of the Constitution of New Mexico by adding a new section to read:

"In any appeal to the district court from the decision, act, or refusal to act, of any state executive in matters relating to water rights, the proceeding upon appeal shall be de novo."

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for that purpose.

(Continued from Page 1, Sec. A) whole purpose of weighted voting is defeated. There is no indication of committee weighted voting being implemented.

3. Weighted voting satisfied neither the "one man, one vote" nor traditional "one per county" positions on reapportionment.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 5**  
SUBJECT: To establish an immediate appellate court between the district courts and the supreme court.

**ARGUMENTS FOR:**  
1. The court of appeals should speed up the administration of justice and reduce the cost of litigation.

2. Establishment of a court of appeals will relieve the workload of the supreme court and enable a final decision within a shorter time.

3. This new court will free supreme court justices from having to be burdened with a great number of minor and insignificant cases.

**ARGUMENTS AGAINST:**

1. If provision is made for further appeal to the supreme court in all cases, the new court would just be another step in the legal process and only add to existing delays.

2. The new court would be an expensive burden on the taxpayers and would require about \$100,000 a year for salaries alone.

3. Provision might be made for finality of appellate court judgments and leave the existing supreme court with little or nothing to do.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 6**  
SUBJECT: To authorize the appointment of a legislative auditor

**ARGUMENTS FOR:**  
1. Since the legislature must impose taxes and appropriate money for state government operation, it should have a legislative auditor to find out how the money is spent. The congress and 24 other states have a legislative audit system.

2. This would give constitutional sanction to an agency created by the legislature, thereby providing it with more stability to understand the political vicissitudes of New Mexico government.

**ARGUMENTS AGAINST:**

1. This is an unnecessary amendment merely authorizing a legislative auditor. The legislature could accomplish the same thing by statute. (See No. 2 above.)

2. The auditor should be elected by the people and be responsible to them instead of to the legislature.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 7**  
SUBJECT: To repeal the section requiring a constitutional convention to change the requirements for amending certain sections of the constitution.

**ARGUMENTS FOR:**  
1. Requiring a convention to amend present requirements for such things as the frequency of newspaper advertisement publication is too restrictive.

2. The constitutional convention is a cumbersome and expensive method of amending the constitution. There has never been a convention in this state since the adoption of the constitution in 1910. This would remove an unnecessarily restrictive provision.

**ARGUMENTS AGAINST:**  
1. This amendment would remove

one of the protections against amendment of the constitutional sections relating to elective franchise.

2. This is an indirect attack upon the extraordinary vote requirements in Article 7, Section 3, and in Article 19, Section 1. It is doubtful that it will accomplish this purpose since "you can't do indirectly what you cannot do directly".

**AMENDMENT NO. 8**

SUBJECT: To provide for district court trials de novo upon appeal from any state executive in matters relating to water rights.

**ARGUMENTS FOR:**  
1. Water rights involve economic life or death for many people, and this would allow the district court to receive new evidence on appeals from the decisions of the state engineer.

2. The state engineer has entirely too much power. This will put a check on his discretion and allow the court to get at the truth of the matter by receiving new evidence or evidence not allowed by the state engineer.

**ARGUMENTS AGAINST:**  
1. This provision would be contrary to modern legal concepts of administrative law. Litigants should present all of their evidence

at the state engineer's hearing to enable him to make a proper decision. On appeal, the district court should review the record of the hearing to determine proper application of the law, and new evidence should not be introduced as a surprise.





**FRANCHISE ORDINANCE NO. 68**  
**AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO LINCOLN COUNTY UTILITIES, INC., OF RUIDOSO, COUNTY OF LINCOLN, STATE OF NEW MEXICO, ITS LEGAL REPRESENTATIVES, SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, CERTAIN LICENSES, RIGHTS OF WAY AND PRIVILEGES TO CONSTRUCT, OPERATE AND MAINTAIN IN THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO DOWNS, COUNTY OF LINCOLN, STATE OF NEW MEXICO, AS NOW OR HEREAFTER CONSTITUTED, WORKS, SYSTEMS, AND PLANTS TO STORE, BELL, DISTRIBUTE, CONVEY OR OTHERWISE ESTABLISH, CONDUCT, SERVE, SUPPLY AND FURNISH SAID VILLAGE, ITS INHABITANTS AND OTHERS, WITH NATURAL GAS, AND TO USE THE STREETS, ALLEYS, HIGHWAYS, BRIDGES, OTHER STRUCTURES, AND PUBLIC GROUNDS OF SAID VILLAGE, FOR A PERIOD OF TWENTY-FIVE (25) YEARS, AND PRESCRIBING CERTAIN RIGHTS AND REGULATIONS, LIMITATIONS, TERMS AND CONDITIONS HEREIN MENTIONED.**

**BE IT ORDAINED** by the Village Council of the Village of Ruidoso Downs, County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico:

**SECTION 1:** That the Village of Ruidoso Downs, County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico, hereinafter designated "Village", hereby grants unto and vests in Lincoln County Utilities, Inc., hereinafter designated "Grantee", which term shall include its legal representatives, successors and assigns, the authority, license, power and privilege to construct, build, equip, conduct and otherwise establish, maintain and operate in said Village, works or systems to use, store, sell, distribute, convey, conduct, serve, supply and furnish to the inhabitants of the Village and others, and to said Village, natural gas for domestic and other useful purposes. Grantee in hereby granted passage, rights of way and the right to occupy and use in any lawful way any streets, avenues, alleys, highways, sidewalks, bridges and other structures and places of public grounds of said Village, both above and beneath the surface of the same, for such services, uses and lawful purposes as are herein mentioned for a period of twenty-five (25) years.

**SECTION 2:** That Grantee is hereby authorized, licensed and empowered to do any and all things necessary and proper to be done and performed in exercising the powers and utilizing the privileges herein mentioned and granted by this Franchise, provided the same do not conflict with other Village-owned utilities now existing, and that all works done in said streets, alleys, highways and other grounds of said Village by Grantee shall

be done with the utmost diligence and the least inconvenience to the public by individuals, and Grantee shall, within a reasonable time, repair such streets, alleys and public grounds excavated by it to the original condition as nearly as possible, and said works shall be done subject to the approval and supervision of said Village, or such employees as it may designate; provided however, that in laying pipes or other construction and in the repairing of the same, the Village shall be held harmless from all damage on account of all excavations for pipes or other construction, and Grantee shall assume and pay all liability or risk of damages to persons or property which may arise from the construction of any of said structures or other works, and shall save the Village, its officers and agents, harmless from any and all liability that may arise or be incurred from the erection, construction or operation of the same.

**SECTION 3:** That this Franchise may be transferred only with the written consent of the Village. However, consent will not be unreasonably withheld.

**SECTION 4:** That upon the request of any person, firm or corporation owning or occupying property along the route of any main of Grantee, Grantee shall forthwith construct a pipe of proper size and capacity from such main to the property line, or for a distance not to exceed one hundred and fifty (150) feet in length, at such a point as applicant may designate, and thereby furnish such person, firm or corporation connection with Grantee's main.

**SECTION 5:** That Grantee shall extend its main to any part of the Village when there shall be at least five bona fide customers for natural gas for each 500 feet of main extension required, and a lesser distance on the same proportionate basis. The term "bona fide customer" shall mean a resident or a business whose occupant or occupants shall agree to take or use natural gas at the legally established rates.

**SECTION 6:** That Grantee, for and in consideration of the grant-

ing of this Franchise and as a rental for the occupation and use of easement over, upon and beneath streets, highways, alleys, sidewalks, bridges and public grounds in the Village, shall pay unto Village, during the time this Franchise shall remain in force and effect, a total aggregate sum of two (2%) per cent of the gross receipts of Grantee for natural gas sold from the main through a meter within the corporate limits of Village. Such gross receipts shall consist of the total amount collected (excepting sales tax) from the consumers on account of gas sold within the corporate limits of the Village (hereinafter excepting any gross receipts for gas sold for use in the generating of electricity for resale to the general public). This Franchise shall be in effect as of the 1st day of October, 1965, and the Grantee shall make such payments quarterly on or before the 15th day of each quarter in each year while the Franchise shall remain in force and effect. For the purpose of determining said revenue, the books of Grantee shall at all times be subject to inspection by duly authorized Village officials.

**SECTION 7:** That Grantee may make and enforce reasonable rules and regulations in the conduct of its business and may require, before furnishing service, the execution of a contract therefor.

**SECTION 8:** That if any section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, or phrase of this Franchise shall be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, the same shall not affect the validity of this Franchise as a whole, or any part or provision other than the part so decided to be invalid or unconstitutional.

**SECTION 9:** That Grantee shall in writing, filed with the Village Clerk, within thirty (30) days from the date of the passage of this Franchise, signify its acceptance of the terms hereof, and upon such acceptance being so filed, Grantee shall, as hereinafter set forth, make available to the inhabitants of the Village an adequate supply of natural gas for domestic and other useful purposes. Grantee shall thereafter make every reasonable effort to maintain an adequate supply of natural gas throughout the life of this Franchise, and a failure to do so shall, after thirty (30) days' notice to Grantee, terminate this Franchise.

**SECTION 10:** That any lines in-

stalled by Grantee shall be so placed as not to interfere with any Village water or sewer lines, and in conformity with present Village water and sewer Ordinances as to distance from pipes. Any gas lines installed which may in any way interfere with future water or sewer lines which may be installed by the Village shall be removed at the expense of Grantee. Any street or other maintenance work that is done by the Village that will cause Grantee to remove or change their lines will be preceded by a ninety-day notice in writing to Grantee, so as to allow Grantee adequate time to effect the work.

**SECTION 11:** That the rates to be charged by the Grantee shall be those from time to time on file and in effect with the New Mexico Public Service Commission applicable to such service. It is understood that rates may be established which are different for different classifications of service, but there shall be no unreasonable discrimination in rates as between consumer using gas in like quantities under like conditions in the Village.

**SECTION 12:** That Grantee shall be entitled to require any consumer of gas, before gas service is connected, a deposit of one and one-half times the amount of an estimated average monthly bill, but in no event to be less than TEN (\$10.00) DOLLARS, which said deposit may be retained by Grantee until service is discontinued and all bills therefor have been paid. Grantee shall then return said deposit to the consumer, together with interest thereon at the rate of six (6%) per cent per annum from date of said deposit. Grantee shall be entitled to apply said deposit with accrued interest to any indebtedness owed Grantee by the consumer making the deposit.

**SECTION 13:** That Grantee, as part of the consideration for the granting of this Franchise, shall furnish FIFTY (\$50.00) DOLLARS worth of gas each month free of charge to the City Hall or Municipal Building as long as this Franchise is in effect.

**SECTION 14:** That Grantee shall furnish good service to the public and a good quality of merchantable gas for the lighting, heating and fuel requirements of the Village and its inhabitants. Said gas shall be commercially free from dust and other solids or liquid matter which might interfere with its use or cause injury to or interference with proper operation of consumers' appliances.

**SECTION 15:** That this Franchise is effective until September 30, 1960, provided however, that if natural gas has been brought to Village and a gas distribution system installed, or, in the event there has been substantial completion of a gas distribution and gas transmission system in and to Village, then and in such event this Franchise shall be in full force and effect for a period of twenty-five (25) years from October 1, 1965. In the event that the above-requirements have not been met, this Franchise is null and void as of the 1st day of October, 1966.

**SECTION 16:** That this Franchise shall take effect and be in full force thirty (30) days after its passage and approval and publication as provided by law, and shall continue in force for a period of twenty-five (25) years from the effective date thereof, and Grantee shall, within ten (10) days from the date of passage and approval of this Franchise, deposit with the Clerk of the Village a sum of money sufficient to cover the cost of the publication of this Franchise.


