

## State, Federal Flood Aid Funds Total \$178,442 In County

(Ruidoso News Staff Writer) Max Oliver, Lincoln County Commission chairman, announced this week that emergency State and Federal funds totaling \$178,442 have been received in Lincoln County to expedite repair of flood damage to bridges and roads in the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley watershed which occurred in two floods: in the spring and summer this year. Oliver listed Federal emergency grants received as follows: Lincoln County for roads, bridges and abutments in the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley, \$57,000; Village of Ruidoso Downs, for roads, bridges abutments and damage to water system, \$55,300; Village of Ruidoso for roads and flood clean-up, \$3,600; Vector (fly and insect control), \$11,882. A state grant of \$50,000 in flood emergency money, for repair of roads and bridges, has also been received by Lincoln County, Oliver said.

Road and bridge work in the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley is scheduled to be completed by Thanksgiving. Two new 50-foot bridges became operational this week. One crossing the Rio Ruidoso at the Fred McFeigue place which serves about 20 families living south of the river and another at the Peter Hurd ranch which serves about ten families, Oliver said. Construction on another bridge up the river which will have a span of 125 feet was started this week. Bridge and abutment work is being done by W. T. Smith Construction Co. of Ruidoso Downs. In all, six new bridges and two concrete overflows, which also will serve for crossings, will be constructed from the emergency funds, and, according to Oliver, Smith Construction Co. is in need of additional workmen at the present time to complete the project.

Another project for which an additional sum of approximately \$250,000 in Federal funds has been approved is for repair of flood damaged irrigation ditches and dams which is scheduled to begin soon. The repair to the damaged ditches and dams in the Ruidoso, Hondo and Bonito valleys will be under the supervision of the Upper Hondo Soil Conservation Service District office in Captain. Repair of the dams and ditches will involve mostly labor and target date for completion is about April when water will be needed in the repaired ditches. The SCS is now in the process of recruiting a labor force to handle the task of this repair and construction, Oliver said he had been informed.

"Socialized America is the next step to a communized America," he said.


The GOP women of New Mexico also passed a resolution during a business session which backed the U. S. policy in the war in Viet Nam.









Section 1. The Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico was incorporated on the 18th day of November, 1945 by order and proceedings of the County Commissioners of Lincoln County. Said proceedings are properly recorded in the Commissioner's Record 4 pages 10 and 90. A certified copy of said proceedings are on file in the office of the Municipal Clerk.

**Section 2.** The first Municipal Election was declared and ordered for Tuesday the 13th day of December 1945 as provided for by New Mexico Statutes.

**Section 3.** That at said Election there was elected the following officers to wit:  
One (1) Mayor  
Four (4) Trustees  
One (1) Clerk

**ARTICLE 2**

**FORM OF GOVERNMENT, ELECTIONS, DUTIES, ETC.**

**Section 1. GOVERNING BODY**

The Governing Body of the Village of Ruidoso shall consist of a Mayor and four (4) Councilmen, known as the Board of Trustees, all of whom shall be elected as provided by law and all legal powers of the Village of Ruidoso shall be vested in said Board of Trustees. The other elective officers of the Village of Ruidoso shall be a Municipal Judge whose term of office is two (2) years.

of Trustees shall hold regular meetings on the second and last Thursday of each month at the hour of 7:30 p.m., and may hold special meetings from time to time, if business requires, upon the call of the Mayor, or Mayor Pro-Tem who is elected and named by the Board of Trustees at their organizational meeting after each municipal election. A majority of the members of the governing body may also call special meetings upon proper notification of same to each member.

**Section 3. TERMS.** The regular term of the Mayor shall be for a period of two (2) years, and the regular term of the Trustees shall be for a period of four (4) years, and the election for a Mayor and the Trustees shall be held on the first Tuesday in March in each even numbered year. The term of office for the members of the Board of Trustees shall be staggered so that the term of office for one-half (1/2) of the members of the Board of Trustees will expire every two (2) years. The newly elected officials shall, within ten (10) days after their certification of election by the Clerk, as provided by law, take an oath or affirmation to support the Constitution of the United States, the Constitution and laws of New Mexico and to faithfully perform the duties of his office. The governing body, consisting of the newly elected and qualified officers, and the officers whose terms have not expired or whose successors have not been elected and qualified, shall meet on the second Monday following the Municipal Election to organize itself.

**Section 4. ELECTIONS:**

A Members of the Board of Trustees shall be elected on an at-large basis.

B Any qualified voter residing within the corporate limits of the Village of Ruidoso shall be eligible for election to the office of Mayor or as a member of the Board of Trustees and may have his name placed upon the official ballot by filing with the Clerk, after the publication of the notice of the election and before 5:00 p.m., not less than thirty (30) days before the day of election, a declaration of candidacy containing the following:

(1) Name and address of the candidate for office.

(2) Office and position to which the candidate seeks election; and

(3) Signature of the candidate seeking that particular office and position.

C The Municipal Clerk shall determine if the candidate filing a declaration of candidacy is a qualified elector and resident of the Village of Ruidoso.

D All election proceedings for the Village of Ruidoso elections shall be conducted in the manner prescribed by the Laws and Statutes of the State of New Mexico in force and as the same may from time to time be amended.

**Section 5. DUTIES AND POWERS:**

A The duties and powers of the Mayor shall be in accordance with the Laws and Statutes of the State of New Mexico in force, and as the same may from time to time be amended.

B The duties and powers of the members of the Board of Trustees shall be in accordance with the Laws and Statutes of the State of New Mexico in force, and as the same may from time to time be amended.

**Section 6. ORDER OF BUSINESS, ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS.**

A. The Order of Business at all regular meetings shall be in accordance with the agenda as prepared by the Clerk and/or the Governing Body.

B. All Ordinances and/or Resolutions enacted by the governing body of the Village of Ruidoso shall be done in accordance with the Laws and Statutes of the State of New Mexico in force, and as the same may from time to time be amended.

Section 7. A SEAL, the impression of which shall be as follows: In the center of the word "SEAL"; around the outer edge the words, "Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico"; shall be and hereby is declared to be the SEAL of the Village of Ruidoso.

Section 8. Ordinances 1, 2, 5, 7, 72 and all other Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.



ORDINANCE NO. 163  
AN ORDINANCE STATING CERTAIN APPOINTIVE POSITIONS AS OFFICERS OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO; METHOD OF APPOINTMENTS, ETC.; DUTIES OF SAME; AND ESTABLISHING A BASIS FOR THEIR SALARIES AND/OR COMPENSATION; AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HERewith.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO THAT:

ARTICLE 1  
VILLAGE OFFICERS— APPOINTMENTS:

Section 1. The OFFICERS of the Village of Ruidoso, other than those elected, shall consist of a Clerk, Treasurer, Manager, Attorney, Marshal and Police-men, and others as may be deemed necessary for the welfare of the Village.

Section 2. At the organizational meeting of the governing body the Mayor shall submit, for confirmation by the governing body, the names of persons who shall be employed to fill the appointive offices. If the governing body fails to confirm any person as an appointive official or employee of the municipality, the Mayor at the next regular meeting of the governing body shall submit the name of another person to fill the appointed office or to be employed by the municipality.

ARTICLE 2 — DUTIES OF APPOINTIVE OFFICERS

Section 1. CLERK DUTIES. The clerk of the municipality shall perform all duties as required by the Laws and Statutes of the State of New Mexico and as required by the Municipality and/or governing body of the municipality. With the approval of the governing body, the Clerk may name deputy clerks.

Section 2. TREASURER DUTIES. The Treasurer of the Municipality shall perform those duties as required by law. The office of Clerk and Treasurer may be combined.

Section 3. MANAGER DUTIES. The manager of the municipality shall perform those duties as provided for by the Laws and Statutes of the State of New Mexico, and policies of the governing body of the municipality. The offices of Manager, Clerk and Treasurer may be combined.

Section 4. ATTORNEY DUTIES. The Attorney of the Municipality shall perform those duties as provided for by the Laws and Statutes of the State of New Mexico.

Section 5. MARSHAL, POLICEMEN DUTIES. The Marshal and other Police-men shall perform those duties as provided for by the Laws and Statutes of the State of New Mexico and other duties as required by the governing body of the municipality.

Section 6. OATH OF OFFICE, ETC. Section 1. Any officer appointed or employed by the municipality shall take an oath of affirmation to support the Constitution of the United States, the Constitution and laws of New Mexico and to faithfully perform the duties of his office.

Section 2. The municipality shall require a corporate surety bond from any officer and/or employees designated by the governing body. The municipality shall pay for the surety bond.

Section 3. The governing body of the municipality may declare vacated the office of any person who falls within ten (10) days after he has been notified of his appointment to office, to take the oath of office, or to give bond when required.

ARTICLE 4 — SALARIES AND/OR COMPENSATION

Section 1. The governing body of the municipality shall prescribe and approve the salaries, fees, and compensation to be paid municipal officers and employees. This may be done on a merit system, if same exists or is enacted.

Section 2. The governing body shall enact and/or approve, if same exists, vacation and sick-leave policies as a form of extra compensation for the employees.

Section 3. Each member of the governing body may be paid compensation not to exceed ten dollars (\$10.00) for each meeting he attends. No compensation shall be paid for attending more than four meetings a month.

ARTICLE 5 — REPEAL ALL ORDINANCES OR PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HERewith ARE REPEALED.




