



### TRUCKER KILLED NEAR BENT

A Texas truck driver attempting to avoid a station wagon that had stopped on U. S. 70 at Bent was killed Thursday last week as his truck-trailer rig crashed down an embankment into an irrigation ditch. The accident occurred about 20 miles west of Ruidoso. State police identified the victim as Max Raymond Crain, 34, Littlefield, Tex. The truck, loaded with grain and peanuts, belonged to M. K. Hall & Co., Portales. State Policeman Coy Brisco said the truck topped a hill on a curve leading into the small highway community of Bent northeast of Alamogordo and there was not time for him to stop after seeing the station wagon.

The driver of the station wagon, Mrs. Grace Norwood Winston, 28, of Mesalero, said she had stopped to make a left turn onto a side road.

The right rear wheel of the truck-trailer rig caught the left front of the station wagon, but damage to the vehicle was slight and Mrs. Winston was not injured.

### Clovis Airman Dies In Crash In County

A Clovis serviceman on convalescent leave from William Beaumont General Hospital in El Paso, was killed Friday and his companion critically injured when their car plummeted over an embankment 43 miles east of Ruidoso in Lincoln County at Border Hill on U. S. 70 and 380.

State patrolmen Bob Young and Dale Housley said the dead man was identified as Jerry Anson Bowers, 24, Clovis, the driver. In critical condition at Walker AFB Hospital in Roswell was Carl J. Beckner, 24, of Floydada, Tex.

Bowers was pronounced dead on arrival at Eastern New Mexico Medical Center in Roswell from severe injuries.

Investigating officers said the eastbound car was descending Border Hill when it went out of control, ran off the right side of the highway, careened back to the left side and then skidded over a 20-foot embankment and flipped over on its wheels. Police said Bowers was thrown from the car from impact when the vehicle hit the bottom. Beckner was found inside the car when police arrived at the scene.

### Car Slams Rock, Driver Is Cited







**The Disinterested**

Regarding your curiosity about "ginseng diggers"—ginseng is an herb (originally from China) growing wild in many of the mountain regions of the Eastern States. It is hard to find and harder still to dig up without tearing up the roots. In the Kentucky mountain region where I grew up—ginseng has been reduced to the simple word "cang," and owing to the "complex root system a "cang hoe" was used—a narrow pronged hoe mostly hand-made by a blacksmith. The roots are dried and sold to the local herb house. Owing to the scarcity of "cang" it brought more money than the more common herbs such as Lobelia, Life-







Included in the project will be replacement and cleaning and repairs of three miles of irrigation ditch.

This report was made last weekend by Gerald A. Gordon, with the Upper Honda Water and Soil Conservation District office in Capitan, who said the San Patricio project was given top priority over 12 others. Gordon said the 32 irrigation systems along the Rio Ruidoso and the Rio Honda all suffered damage. The 32 systems were combined into 13 groups for emergency repair projects. Supervisors for the WSCS district met to establish priorities, based on such things as numbers of farms and ranches using from the ditches, how many or how few waterwells available for irrigation in addition to the ditch water, how seriously damaged were the ditches, dams and other facilities and the acreage covered, etc.

It was determined after studies of all 13 groups that San Patricio should have top priority, and surveying and design for the restoration was begun immediately, and is now completed. The log crib dam should be underway very early in 1966. Gordon said the San Patricio project is one of the biggest in the 32 in the three valleys. Next priority goes to Tinnie, also a big one.

Gordon said there will have to be 15 new dams to replace that many destroyed and ten to be repaired. He said cost of the overall flood restoration work will amount to about \$245,000.00.

A call for bids will be made within the next 25 days with notices going to seven or eight construction firms, on construction of the San Patricio dam on the Rio Ruidoso for the irrigation system destroyed by the flood of June 17.

**Progress Report On Village Projects Given**

Current status of improvements now under way in the Village of Ruidoso was prepared this week by Village Manager-Clerk Jim Hine, as a progress report to the Village of Ruidoso Trustees:

Extension of the sanitary sewer system from Paradise Canyon and Hill Road intersection out to White Mountain Elementary School should be completed in two weeks. Construction of a fire substation at the entrance to Ruidoso Municipal Airport. On schedule and should be completed by January, 1966.

Providing a six-inch water main to airport facilities for fire protection: This work, consisting of the installation of approximately 1,100 feet of six-inch pipe is being performed by our Water Department and should be completed by January, 1966.

Providing water for Forest Lawn Cemetery: This work of approximately 1,400 feet of two-inch pipe is being installed by our Water Department and should be completed by early summer.

Improving the airport taxi-strip: This project is scheduled for completion by April, 1966. And in co-operation with the State Highway Department in the re-surfacing of Paradise Canyon Road: This project is scheduled for completion by April, 1966.
