



Lincoln County War Movie Made In Original Locale

The best place to make authentic western movies is in the West using westerners as actors, according to one Roswell Little Theatre cast member.

Eight members of the Roswell troupe, which is now producing "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?" in the Roswell Little Theatre, took part in the production of an art western which was shot in Lincoln and Sierra Counties in New Mexico.

The film, tentatively titled "The War of Lincoln County," is being produced by Chadd's Ford Production of Pennsylvania. Denny McCoy, nephew of New Mexico artist Peter Hurd, is the producer-director.

The film is scheduled to be released next spring and the Roswell group is trying to arrange a premiere in Roswell according to Richard Morgan who was a member of the cast.

"The Roswell people weren't just extras," Morgan, a New Mexico Military Institute history instructor, declared.

"We had lines and action and will receive screen credits—Harold Kingrey played U. S. Army Col. Dudley, Jim Welch was Bob Beckworth, Brent Caldwell was J. P. Wilson, Phil Nickell did Sheriff Wilson, Sally Segovia was Mrs. Charley Bowdre and I was J. J. Dolan (of the Murphy-Dolan faction)," he said.

"These are all fairly important roles. Terry Lunn and my wife, Jackie had smaller parts.

"There were lots of other New Mexicans in the cast, too. Fermin Chavez of San Patricio, Red Denton from Ruidoso and dozens of extras. Johnny Melgs, the painter, built sets and collected props," he said.

Morgan said some of the scenes were shot in the town of Lincoln, which was the county seat at the time of the Lincoln County War, and some were shot near Hondo. During August, the set location was the abandoned town of Chise, northwest of Truth or Consequences.

"Most of the people in the area," Morgan said, "particularly from

Winston, N. M., were involved with the film—they were wonderful, welcomed us in, really were part of everything.

"The scenery was spectacular. I understand the early morning light was perfect. Night scenes were shot with a filter on the lens in daylight.

Production Problems
"There were problems," Morgan said.

"Flash floods kept washing out the trail between Winston and Chise, one camera broke down and as part of the authentic bit, the cavalry was supposed to be a Negro unit. McCoy tried to hire some Negro men, but they refused to come, because they thought the wages were discriminatory.

"They were offered the same rates as everyone else, and on a strictly time-cash basis, they would have received more than most of us from Roswell," he said.

Describing the film as an art western, Morgan said there are a lot of unusual things such as camera angles.

"We didn't use any artificial light, even on interiors. There was a tremendous emphasis on authenticity—the idea was to have the movie look exactly like a series of photos in the 19th Century. It is in black and white, of course.

"Then the scenes are real wild stuff, sometimes symbolic like flash floods and tarantulas or cowboys swimming in a water tank.

"Some scenes are for contrast. For example, a shot of a man being killed then a switch to an old woman and a child in a church waiting for the battle to end. To indicate the passage of a night during the big gun fight, a scene was made of my wife, Jackie, as a Mexican woman walking off to milk a cow," he said.

Comparing movie making to acting in the Little Theatre, Morgan said, "It's great not to be limited by the stage; especially on action shots.

"You can run and ride freely, and there are always the close-ups a stage audience may miss subtle facial gestures, but the camera

catches it all." He said the talent impressed him the most. "These people were acting one minute, saving costumes or taking sound or just playing a guitar for fun, the next.

"The director swung a shovel when a grave was needed. We could not afford electric charges, so when a bullet kicked up dust it was a genuine bullet."

"This is one western with horse manure in the streets and sweat stains on the hats," Morgan declared.

"The cast," Morgan said, "was headed-up by three professionals who are hoping for the big break. It was their first full-length job—they have made one short art film and a historical documentary on the Civil War.

"They were very cordial and interested in us and New Mexico. Nobody acted the snob. I think they were as curious about our past Roswell Little Theatre productions as we were with their experiences," he said.

Historical Significance
Describing the plot and its historical significance Morgan said the story begins with the body of John Henry Tunstall being carried into the town of Lincoln, and ends with the death of his partner Alexander McSween.

"The actual war ended with McSween," he said. "The Tunstall-McSween faction was ended, and it was then a matter of restoring peace and order and catching fugitives like Billy the Kid."

He said the film does not favor either side—"at least that wasn't the intention. The plot evolves around Mr. and Mrs. McSween and the 'regulators' but it shows their good intentions, their bad judgment, their ambitions and their occasional tragic indecision.

"Nobody wears a white hat and here both factions were at fault," Morgan said. "Billy the Kid" is portrayed by Jimmy Lynch as a rough one, crude as his environment. His instinctive solution is violence.

2,000 Trees Cut For Christmas Last Week-End
 Good weather over the Thanksgiving week-end, with just a hint of snow in the air, brought Christmas Tree cutters in goodly numbers to all parts of the Lincoln National Forest. As reported by Timber Management Officer Tom Loring, at Forest Headquarters in Alamogordo, some 2,000 trees left the Forest during the five day Thanksgiving period.

While a majority of the Christmas Trees cut to date are from commercial sale areas being shipped to nearby cities, at least 800 people obtained permits for individual use Christmas Trees and cut their own tree on designated areas of National Forest land.

A limited number of commercial tree units remain available as of November 30, Loring stated. These range from 200 to 500 trees, principally Douglas and white fir with some pine pine. Remaining units are in the Capitán, Ruidoso and Sacramento areas.

Personal use Christmas trees are available on all six Ranger districts of the Lincoln National Forest. Trees may only be cut in designated areas after obtaining a one dollar permit and instructions as to location of cutting areas from one of the Ranger Stations. Limit is one tree per family. District Ranger Stations are located in Capitán, Ruidoso, Cloudcroft, Carlsbad, Mayhill and Sacramento. In addition to regular week day hours, offices in Capitán, Ruidoso, Cloudcroft and Sacramento will be open on Saturdays and Sundays for the first three week-ends in December.

Uncertain weather conditions in the mountains make it advisable to be prepared with tire chains, warm clothing and proper footwear on any tree cutting expedition.

In order to avoid congestion on some of the narrow mountain roads people seeking to cut their own trees are urged to do so during the week if possible. Organizations and groups seeking a considerable number of trees will only be handled on week days.

Christmas Trees Must Bear Tags

New Mexico Statute 62-1-13 requires that all Christmas trees cut or removed from public or private lands in New Mexico and being transported or offered for sale in the state must bear a tag purchased from the New Mexico Department of State Forestry. In the past, the U. S. Forest Service has distributed these tags in this area. This year, private vendors have been selected, and they will be the sole distributors of the Christmas tree tags. The vendors are as follows: Lewis Chevron Station, Clouderoft; Mayhill Mercantile, Mayhill; Sonhey's Enoo, Corner Mechem and Sudderth, Ruidoso, and Virgil's Garage, Capitlan.

State law further requires that any person removing trees from land other than his own, whether publicly or privately owned, must possess written consent from the landowner. The written consent must include the legal description of the land where the trees are cut and the name of the legal owner. The person cutting or transporting the trees must have in his possession the original or a true copy of the written consent.

Individuals wishing to cut Christmas trees from private lands for commercial purposes may obtain a sample sales contract, which includes all provisions required by law, by writing to District Forester, P. O. Box 277, Capitlan, N. M.




Training "King of the Road" Truck Drivers

The average automobile weighs slightly less than two tons. The average loaded truck weighs under 40 tons. Driving these vehicles requires training and skill. But what training and skill are needed to drive a loaded truck weighing nearly 140 tons?

The Chino Mines Division, which is converting part of its haulage systems to the big trucks capable of carrying a payload of 85 tons, has the answer: Start with inexperienced truck drivers and provide five weeks of concentrated training.

For the first week, the drivers attend classes for several hours and then work six hours with experienced drivers in the field. They learn operational characteristics of the 700 h.p. diesel engine that drives an electric generator supplying individual power to the two rear wheels.

They are surprised to find there are no transmissions, converters or differentials; that the trucks are about 17 feet high, 15 feet wide and 33 feet long, and that the tires are eight feet tall.

Trainees next spend a week with experienced drivers, being tested for skill in backing up, maneuvering around obstacles, and safety practices and procedures. They then "solo" for one week and are checked closely by two supervisors, and for the next two weeks they continue to gain supervised experience before being assigned to a regular job.




