

Planners Pick Albuquerque Firm

Ruidoso Planning Commission at a special called meeting Wednesday noon, Dec. 8, at Whispering Pine Restaurant approved the proposal of the Chambers and Campbell Planning Firm of Albuquerque for up-dating Ruidoso's comprehensive plan. The commission will forward the recommendation to the Village of Ruidoso Trustees for action at the regular meeting Dec. 9. The commission recommended that total cost for the up-dating of the comprehensive plan shouldn't exceed \$7,000 or a cost to the Village of \$2,300 for its share.

Plans Underway to Convert High Country Lodge at Alto to Condominium Apartments

Announcement was made this week by owner Charles Rumbaugh that legal papers are being prepared now for offering the 32 units of High Country Lodge on State Road 37 at Alto as condominium apartments. In preparation are contracts to be used in selling the units to buyers.

Rumbaugh made the announcement after a conference with Keith B. Romney, an attorney of Salt Lake City, Utah here on Thanksgiving week-end. Romney is recognized as the pioneer legal advisor for condominium development in this country, having handled the paper work on "this new

idea in home and apartment ownership for some of the earliest such complexes. He has served developers of about 25 condominiums in six states, including Utah, Colorado, Nevada, North Carolina, Texas and Tennessee. He authored the Utah state law which sets up condominium ownership there, and has been a speaker on this subject at conferences of mortgage officials, home construction concerns, building contractors, real estate dealers and related trades. Besides assisting in legal work on setting up the private unit ownership apartment developments in the several states, he has been a consultant for several others in other regions of the U. S. since he became recognized as a specialist and leading authority on this subject. Recently he authored a book on this new concept in apartment living that is becoming the top reference work for developers in this field.

Some remodeling and redecorating is being done now on High Country Lodge in preparation for the changeover, expected to be completed shortly after the first of the year, Rumbaugh said. The apartments are all alike, with two bedrooms, a living room, with adjacent dining and kitchen area. They are in duplex fashion, and have such features as swimming pool privileges, a game and recreation area and tennis courts.

941 Names Purged From Voter List







Mrs. Edward Boyer at the organ provided appropriate music preceding the ceremony and also accompanied her husband, Edward Boyer as he sang, "More", "Because" and "Always". She played the traditional wedding processional and recessional.







Another significant problem is the number of packages delayed or actually undelivered because of poor wrapping or packaging. Postmasters in the local area urge that special care be taken to see that each package is tightly stuffed and that nothing rattles around inside. Parcels are generally shipped in bags and often heavier items rest on top of smaller, lighter packages. The postmasters encourage mailers to be a bit cautious and insure all packages.

All parcels should be addressed on only one side and should have the address written somewhere on the inside of the package in case the exterior wrapping should come off. It is a good idea to also enclose a list of the contents.

Poor packaging and illegible or incorrect addressing accounts for about half a million undelivered parcels each year.
