

\$68,425 Grant Signals Large Recreation Development

Skiing is 'the Greatest' After Several Snowfalls



'EXCELLENT' SKIING CONDITIONS — Sierra Blanca Ski Area reports the series of snow storms last week-end, early this week and again this midweek have brought 'excellent' ski conditions for the holiday season upcom-

The greatest skiing conditions so far this season are offered at Sierra Blanca for the holiday season ahead. The fine snow pack came from a series of snow storms, including one last Friday, another early this week and a big one at mid-week. The latter brought the greatest number of inches of the white stuff.

Ruidoso and neighboring area received a heavy coating of snow in the mid-week storm—measuring more than eight inches, during Tuesday night and Wednesday. Moisture measured in the snow in Ruidoso this mid-week was .52 inches.

Roy Parker, manager of the Sierra Blanca Ski Area reported Wednesday skiing conditions are excellent and base snow is also excellent. Snow depth in the parking area is 30 inches, and 40 inches at the higher elevations. Road to ski area is snow covered and chains are required, Parker reported.

The gondola, Lincoln and beginner lifts have all been operating this week, and all lifts will be in operation this week-end. It snowed at the ski area all night Wednesday and Thursday morning, also.

The best week-end of skiing for the new winter sports season was enjoyed by hundreds of persons last week-end here on the slopes of Sierra Blanca Recreation Area. A storm that whistled across southern New Mexico Thursday and Friday dropped 20 inches of snow on the upper trails and 14 inches on the lower trails, and according to an official report from the Sierra Blanca area, skiing conditions were "excellent."

While snow was falling in the mountains Friday, Ruidoso and the canyon country received a good soaking from a slow falling rain. Moisture measured 1.25 inches in Ruidoso. C. A. Culver, observer for the U. S. Department of Commerce Weather Bureau said.

Confirmation was received by telephone here Tuesday morning from Santa Fe that the Village of Ruidoso had been included among several cities given grants for development of a variety of recreation projects in New Mexico. A total of \$700,000.00 was allocated to various communities for a number of projects, provided through the Recreation Division of the State Planning Office, Manager-Clerk Jim Hine reported here.

Ruidoso's application was given a top priority, Hine said, and work should begin early in 1966 on developing a large number of facilities in School House Park on lower Sudderth.

To match the Recreation Division's grant, the Village board Thursday night last week passed authorization for issuance of \$78,000.00 in revenue bonds, to be prepaid from income from the cigarette tax of 1c a pack. The grant and the revenue bonds will provide better than \$140,000.00 for the development of recreation which will be of benefit to both local citizens as well as the thousands of vacationers here in all seasons.

Foremost in the various items to be installed in School House Park will be a swimming pool. Other facilities include two tennis courts, a multipurpose court, a nature trail, improved picnic facilities, a softball field, horseshoe pitching courts, paved parking and possibly other things. All are to be lighted for night use as well as daytime.

A tentative plan has been drawn by Engineer Quinten Daniel for the village for developing the project. A straw vote poll called for by village officials earlier in 1965 in which the residents' opinions of items needed for recreation here were asked brought in more than 450 replies—topmost of which was a request for a swimming pool. Hine said the results of the poll were used to impress officials in the planning office at Santa Fe of the demand for a much larger amount of recreation than is available here now.

The program here is a part of one of the several new pieces of Open Space legislation passed by the Congress to develop outdoor recreation, Hine said.

COMMISSIONER CHARGES WORKMANSHIP IS FAULTY ON COUNTY COURTHOUSE

Lincoln County Commission Chairman Max Oliver of Ruidoso Downs announced this week that a meeting of the county's three trustees with a representative of a bonding company has been called for Thursday this week in the courthouse at Carrizozo to discuss what he declares is faulty workmanship on a new courthouse that was completed early in 1965. The new building was dedicated in a county-wide program in May this year. It cost almost half a million dollars, Oliver said.

Oliver said "even a layman can see that the work is not what it should be—the glass in some of the large windows is bowed to the point of being a hazard to people and to local schools. . . ."

Ruidoso Telephone Co. provided this bit of information for readers of this column this week: Most of your Federal Excise Tax is removed on local and toll telephone service, starting with your January telephone bill. Federal Excise Taxes are being reduced from 10% to 3% during 1966 to 2% in 1967 and to 1% in 1968. Tax terminates in 1969. . . .

working in the offices, or to people walking by; walls are bowed and not true, and we also have trouble with the ceiling settling. All this indicates to me that there was fault on the part of the architects or the contractor. It may be they did not have the time to watch every piece of work done, but then someone, somewhere in this project, is to blame for what I call improper construction."

Oliver, Joe McKnight of Picocho and R. M. (Bob) Shafer, Carrizozo, all Republicans were elected as an entirely new board in the 1964 election. None had served in this capacity before. They succeeded Charles A. Jones and R. C. Nunez, Democrats, and Kenneth Nosker, Republican.

Oliver said typical of the work that he is criticizing is some of the terrazzo tile which is showing large cracks in some of the rooms where it is laid. He said also that changes had to be made in the courtroom before construction was completed, when its design proved impractical.

Oliver said representatives from the contracting firm of Ballard and Bates and from the architectural firm of Voll, Buffington and Nolan have also been requested to be present when the commissioners meet with the bonding company representatives. He said the bonding company handled the performance bonds for the construction.



CITY INSTALLS NEW LIGHTED DISPLAYS

Three new lighted decorations were installed here this week to spread holiday cheer for home-folks as well as visitors. The additional displays include a 27-foot tall star that employs 120 light bulbs, an eight foot tall NOEL, with almost as many bulbs, and an outline of a tree with colored bulbs in its interior to simulate tree ornaments. The star is atop the hill where one of the village water tanks stands west of the golf course, the tree is in Pine Cliff overlooking the Gateway area and the NOEL sign is in Schoolhouse Park on top of one of the picnic shelters that coincidentally resembles a stable.

The three new lighted displays were made and installed by the Village of Ruidoso. Two other displays here, a bell and a cross, have been a part of the Christmas nighttime scene for many years—erected and maintained by the Lions Club.



Dean of ENMU Dies After Crash; Retreat Cancelled

Dr. Gary Anderson, Eastern New Mexico dean of students, was killed late Thursday in a one-car accident on US 70, one mile west of San Patricio.

State Police said Anderson was a passenger in a car driven by ENMU student Craig Ezell which swerved off the road to avoid striking a trailer.

Anderson took over the post of dean of students in 1963, ENMU authorities said. He formerly held the same position at Arizona State University at Tempe. Survivors include his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Carl Anderson, Clearwater, Florida, and a sister, Mrs. Donald Delude, Minneapolis. The approximately 80 students from the Fortales college stood in the lobby of the Chaparral at about 2:30 p.m. Thursday evening stunned by the news that the popular dean was dead on arrival at a Roswell hospital. A meeting was held briefly that afternoon, but during a session later that evening it was decided to cancel the retreat.



ORDINANCE NO. 70
AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO MUNICIPAL SALES TAX ADMINISTRATION; AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 64 TO INCORPORATE BY REFERENCE THE NEW MEXICO TAX ADMINISTRATION

ACT (BEING LAWS 1955, CHAPTER 248, SECTIONS 1-84), AND REPEALING ALL SECTIONS OF ORDINANCE NO. 64 IN CONFLICT HERewith AND PROVIDING PENALTIES.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO DOWNS, LINCOLN COUNTY, NEW MEXICO:
Section 1. Any municipal sales tax imposed by Ordinance No. 64, the liability for the payment of which will first arise on or after January 1, 1966, shall be enforced and collected by the New Mexico Bureau of Revenue pursuant to the provisions of the New Mexico Tax Administration Act, section 72-13-12 through 72-13-22, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953 Compilation (being Laws 1955, chapter 248, sections 1-84), as it may be amended from time to time.
Section 2. The provisions of the aforementioned New Mexico Tax Administration Act, as amended from time to time, shall apply to and govern all persons subject to the tax imposed by Ordinance No. 64, except that the criminal penalties set forth in sections 72-13-85 through 72-13-87, New Mexico Statutes Annotated, 1953 Compilation (being Laws 1955, chapter 248, sections 1-84), as it may be amended from time to time, are restricted to

lines not exceeding three-hundred (\$300.00) dollars or to imprisonment not exceeding ninety (90) days and may only be enforced by suit or prosecution before a municipal judge of the Village of Ruidoso Downs, Lincoln County New Mexico.
Section 3. As reasonable compensation for its enforcement and collection services, the New Mexico Bureau of Revenue may deduct an amount not exceeding three percent (3%) of the tax imposed by Ordinance No. 64 and actually collected by the New Mexico Bureau of Revenue. The difference shall be remitted by the Village of Ruidoso Downs, Lincoln County, New Mexico not later than the twentieth (20th) day of each month following the month it was actually collected.
Section 4. SAVINGS CLAUSE—Sections 1 through 3 hereof do not apply to any tax imposed by Ordinance No. 64, the liability for the payment of which will first arise prior to January 1, 1966. Any such tax shall be enforced and collected as provided in Ordinance No. 64, as in effect prior to the enactment of sections 1 through 3 hereof.
Section 5. SEVERABILITY—If any part or application of any part of (1) Ordinance No. 64, or (2) this ordinance amending Ordinance No. 64, or (3) the aforementioned New Mexico Tax Administration Act, as it may be amended from time to time, is held invalid, the remainder or its application to other situations or persons shall not be affected.
Section 6. Copies of the Tax Administration Act will be on file in the office of the Clerk of the Village of Ruidoso Downs.
Section 7. REPEAL—All Ordinances, and all Sections of Ordinance No. 64, in conflict herewith are hereby repealed; provided however, that the date of repeal of such Ordinances or Sections of Ordinance No. 64 shall coincide with the effective date of this ordinance.
Section 8. EFFECTIVE DATE—The effective date of this ordinance shall be January 1, 1966.





Planning Work Given Praise By Village Board

Chairman of the Village Planning Board Elmer Pirelli appeared before the Trustees in their meeting here last Thursday evening to explain or answer any questions the trustees might have pertaining to the Planning Commission recommendation that Chambers and Campbell of Albuquerque be given the contract to up-date the Village's Comprehensive Plan. Pirelli explained that of the three firms who submitted proposals, the Commission felt that Chambers and Campbell were the most qualified in personnel, experience and facilities. Village Manager-Clerk Jim Hine noted that the contract for the up-dating of the plan would cost \$7,000.00 with the Village's share being \$2,333.00 and the monies for this would come from the

Recreation Bond in a large part with a small amount coming from the Water and Sewer Bond Fund. Pirelli suggested that in the one-year contract a condition be drawn that payments be made every three months and the Village would have the right to cancel the contract at that time if the work the firm was doing was not satisfactory. Hine stated that the State Planning Office would have to endorse the contract in order for the Village to receive state and federal matching funds. After further discussing the up-dating of the plan Trustee Jodie Fillemann moved that the firm of Chambers and Campbell be awarded the contract. The motion was seconded by Trustee Claude Whitlock and carried by a vote of all eyes. Trustee Whitlock made a motion that the Village Planning Commission be complimented on its outstanding work, time and effort being put forth in making Ruidoso a better place in which to live. The motion was seconded by Fillemann and carried by a vote of all eyes.

Engineer Quinten Daniel gave a progress report on the work on the water and sewer projects and

the airport taxi strip. Hine read and explained Resolution No. 281, concerning the upcoming 1966 Municipal election. Trustee Whitlock introduced Resolution No. 281, an election resolution of the Village of Ruidoso. Fillemann moved that the Resolution be adopted. The motion was seconded by Trustee Guy Robertson and carried by a vote of all eyes. Hine read and explained an ordinance to be numbered No. 184 relating to Municipal Sales Tax Administration; Amending Ordinance No. 141 to incorporate by reference the New Mexico Tax Administration Act (Being laws 1965, Chapter 248, Sections 1-84), and repealing all sections of Ordinance No. 141 in conflict therewith; and providing penalties. Trustee Fillemann moved that Ordinance No. 184 be adopted. Trustee Robertson seconded the motion and the motion was carried by roll call vote.

The bills for the month of November were presented for the council's consideration and were approved to be paid.

Hine requested that the council approve a \$20.00 per month salary increase for Frank Potter, assistant airport manager. The suggestion was adopted.

Hine presented a request that Airport Manager Bill Boone and

assistant Potter be paid for accumulated vacation time rather than take off. Hine explained that if time was taken off, the Village would have to hire additional help at the Airport while Boone and Potter were off. He further explained that both men had expressed their desire to be paid for their vacation time rather than take the time off. The board ap-



proved the plan. Hine and Attorney John W. Thompson presented a request from the New Mexico Municipal League asking that the Village donate \$40.00 as a portion of the court cost to be incurred in a test case concerning the right of out of state property owners to vote on O. O. Bond issues. After discussion of the issue, Mayor Pro-Tem Bill McCarty tabled the request until further study could be made by the council.

Hine asked for permission to close the Village offices at noon December 24th, Christmas Eve. Permission was granted by a motion duly made, seconded and passed.

Hine presented on behalf of Walter Meeker a request for annexation into the Village limits a certain portion of land. The council voted that the legal steps were not proper, that the petition should be resubmitted.

The village's audit for 1964-65 fiscal year's spending was presented to the board members for their study. It was prepared by local accountant Bill Dean and was approved by the state auditor recently. Hine reported.

High pointer for the champs was Richard Carrasco with 20 and for Canutillo, J. Lujan dropped in 17 points.


