

Floyd Haake, Roswell and Ruidoso road contractor, was awarded

To be known as New Mexico Project No. F-021-1 (10) is to begin almost immediately, it was announced at the bid letting ceremony at the State Highway Commission building in Santa Fe last Friday. The project runs from the

Income tax returns.

He was indicted last Tuesday on the eight-count charge. He surrendered early Wednesday morning last week with one of his attorneys, J. W. Neal of Hobbs, and was freed on \$1,000 bond. He is on leave for a year from the corporation's track at Ruidoso Downs.

The indictment charged Hensley with attempting to evade \$38,573 in corporation income taxes—\$9,957 for 1959 and \$28,616 for 1960—and filing false corporation income tax returns for those years.

The indictment said Hensley filed a joint income tax return for 1959, listing a taxable income of \$35,297 in 1959 and \$19,020 in 1960 and filing false joint income tax returns for those years.

Listed \$28,499 income.

For 1960, the indictment said, Hensley filed a joint income tax return showing a taxable income of \$28,009 with a tax of \$8,151 due, when his actual taxable income was \$46,087 with a tax of \$27,141 due.

Two other counts alleged Hensley filed false and fraudulent joint income tax returns for 1959 and 1960.

Another count said Hensley, as secretary-treasurer of the racing association, filed a corporation tax return for 1959 showing a taxable income of \$470,330 on which a tax of \$135,073 was due, while the corporation's actual taxable income was \$426,481 on which a tax of \$145,030 was due.

Cites 1960 Return.

In 1960, the indictment said, Hensley as secretary-treasurer of the racing association, filed a corporation income tax return showing a taxable income of \$158,583 on which a tax of \$47,963 was due, while the corporation's actual taxable income was \$213,616 on which a tax of \$106,579 was due.

Two other counts accused Hensley of filing false and fraudulent corporation income tax returns for 1959 and 1960.


Texas Firm Low Bidder On Sac Peak Telescope

Recent drying winds, low humidity and high temperatures have rapidly dried the Ruidoso area in the past three weeks. Forest fire index has climbed into "high." Fire risks and hazards common to our forested area might be touched off into a raging fire at any time unless all precautions are taken to avoid their occurrence.

A run-down of fire causes the past year continues to show that the home fireplace without any spark arrester and the dumping of hot ashes are causing the highest percent of fires in the Ruidoso area. These fires almost always start under the worst possible conditions. Why? Because when dry air conditions exist to keep sparks alive from your chimney to the ground fuels, the burning conditions are such to contribute to extreme burning conditions and the large fire potential. Your local fire department, the boys who have contributed so much around the clock to suppress these fires, would like to solicit your help by installing needed spark arresters on your fireplaces and precautions for dumping hot ashes from the firebox.






