\$139,000 Expansion OK'd for Phone System



An expansion program to cost \$139,000 to beef up the services of Ruidoso Telephone Co. here, at Ruidoso Downs and in the Ruidoso Valley, at Mescalero, Ft. Stanton and to the Sierra Blanca Ski Area, was reported this week by Guy Robertson, manager for the firm which serves a large area of southern Lincoln County. Tentatively proposed for 1967-68 is a new dial exchange office, with its own pre-Tix, for Alto, and additional cable for Capitan and a new exchange building and equipment for the latter community.

Work will get underway very shortly on the expansion for Ruidoso, Mescalero, Ruidoso Downs and for the ski area. Robertson said. It will include additional lines, or cable beef-up, from Hollywood east through Ruidoso Downs almost to Blacutt Hill; additional cable beef-up in Ruidoso and central office equipment additions here; a new central office and cable beef-up at Mescalero; cable beef-up and automatic dial PBX at Ft. Stanton.

Two new lines, to cost in the neighborhood of \$12,500 will be constructed into White Mountain Park to serve skiers (with a pay phone) and the office of the ski management.

Robertson said also in the planning stage for installation within a few months are pre-pay type telephone booths of the kind Ruidoso's tourist visitors are most familiar in their home communities in other parts of the Southwest.

The 1967-68 expansion program for Alto and Capitan will cost many additional thousands of dollars above the \$139,000 figure Robertson quoted for the increase in facilities to be done in 1967-67.

TWO WOMEN PERISH IN COLLISION

Fourteen persons lost their lives and many more were injured in accidents on New Mexico highways last week-end. Included in the toll were two women who were fatally hurt Saturday afternoon in a collision on U. S. Highway 70 a mile west of the Mescalero Apache Summit Lodge.

Dead were Mrs. Jean Huse, 36, wife of a Baptist minister of Ruidoso Downs, and Mrs. Nancy Coleman, 51, of Dona Ana, near Las Cruces. Mrs. Huse was pronounced dead on arrival at the hospital here and Mrs. Coleman, dead on arrival at Alamogordo.

Brought to Ruidoso hospital for treatment of injuries were the minister, the Rev. James Huse, 37, and Joseph Coleman, 45.

Witnesses to the accident included passengers in two vehicles that drove into a ditch around the wreckage to avoid striking one of the disabled cars, who told investigating officers that the Huse panel truck skidded on the wet paved road across the highway into the path of the oncoming passenger vehicle. The panel truck plummeted off the opposite side of the road ending upside down in the ten-foot ditch. The passenger car was left standing at an angle crosswise on the paving.

Funeral services for Florence Jeanie Huse, 36, were held in the First Baptist Church in Ruidoso Downs Wednesday morning at 10 a.m. with Rev. Hugh Bilge officiating, assisted by Rev. Mike Mojica. Burial was in the Forest Lawn Cemetery in Ruidoso.

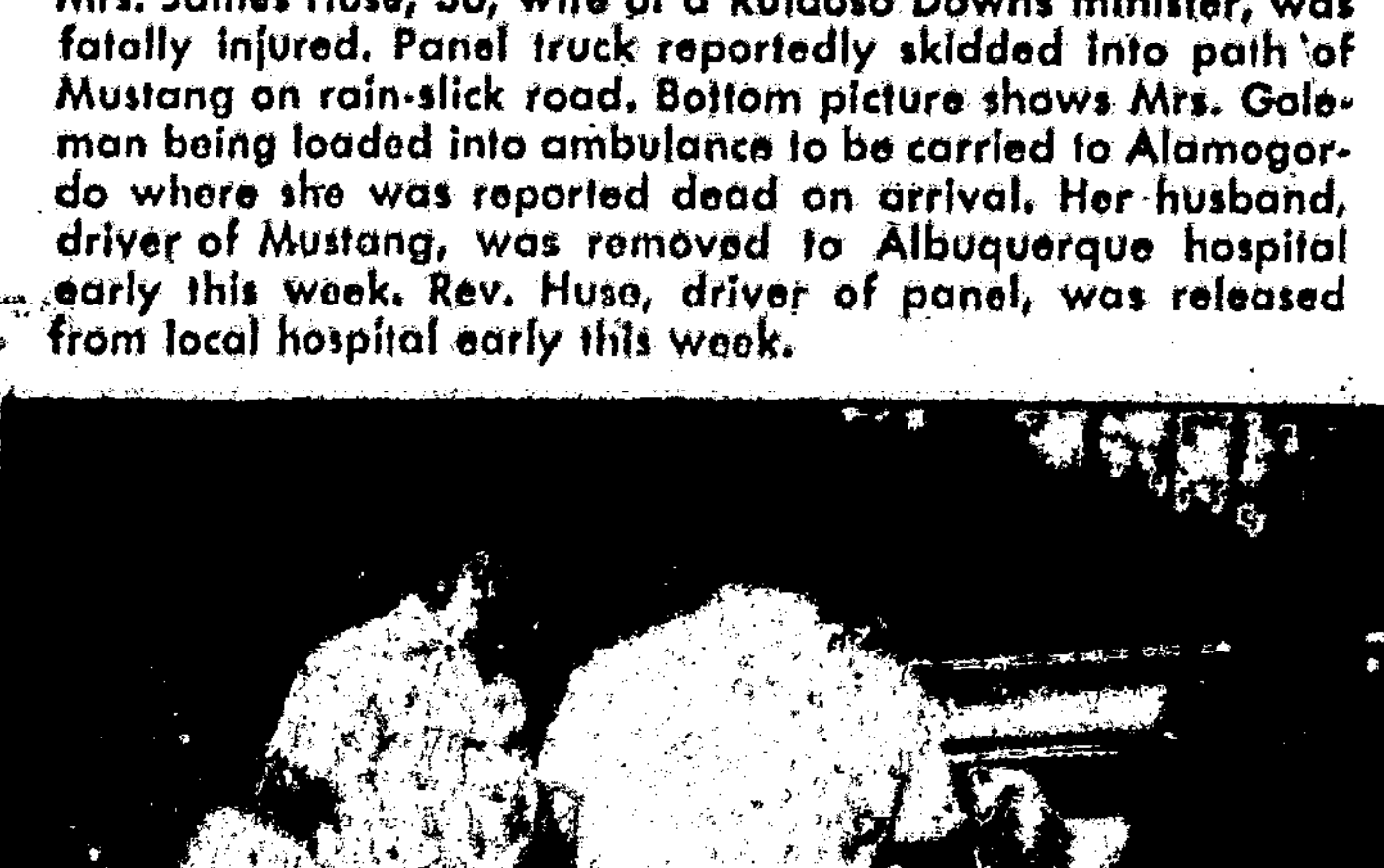

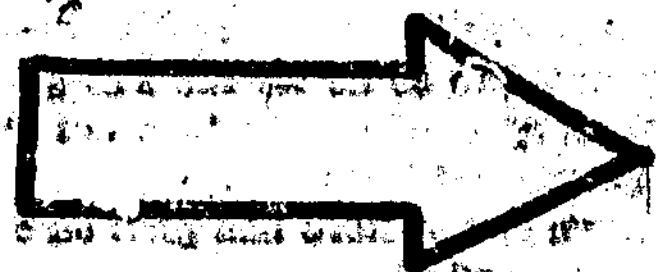

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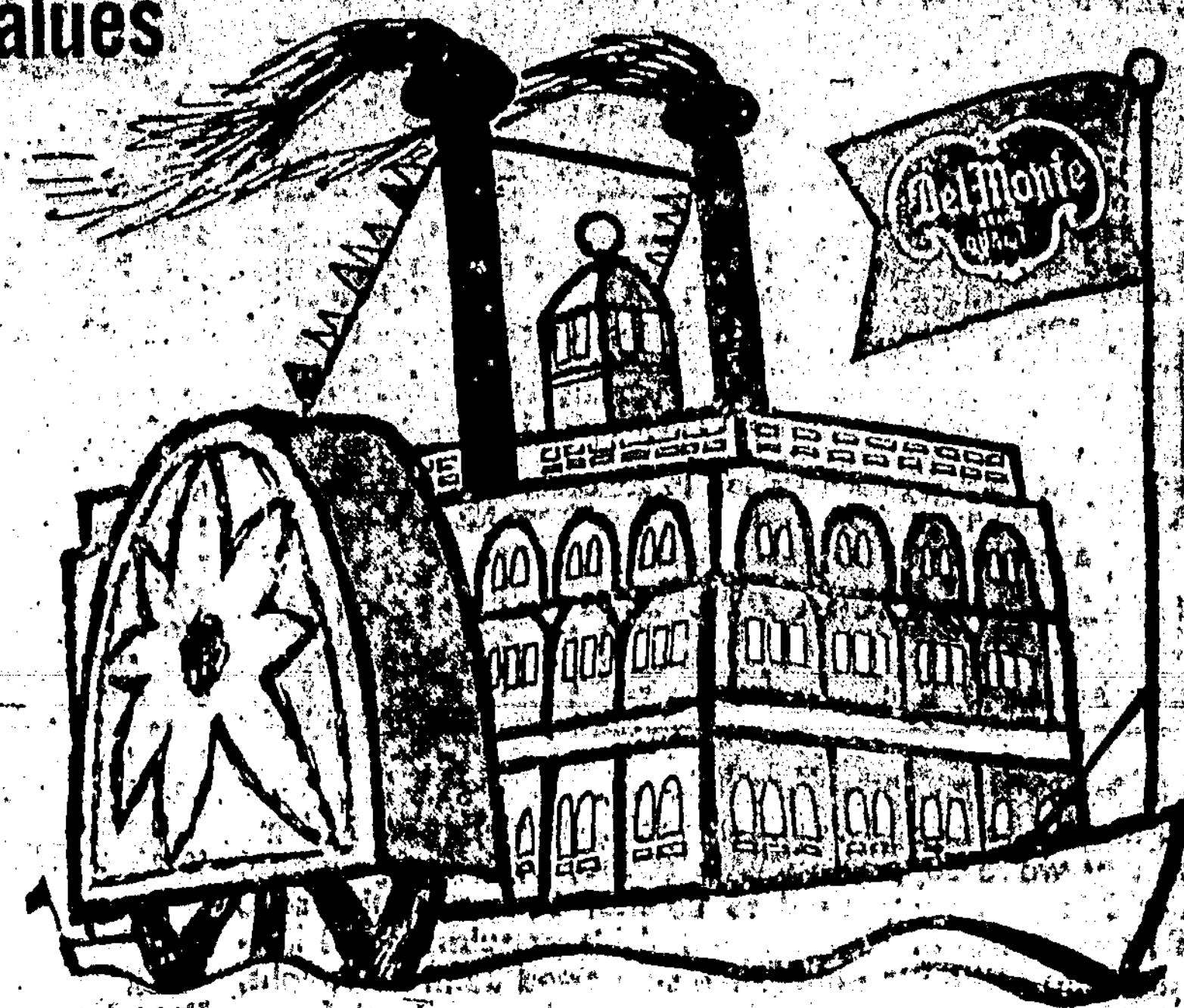

Educating Daughters In Home Economics

The education of girls for a dual role of homemaking and pursuing a career is a relatively new idea, especially at the secondary level, and the development of special programs for girls in the public schools is even newer. Classes in home economics have become the focal point for these programs which, increasingly, are aimed at helping high school girls understand and appreciate their various and complex roles as girls and women.

Home economics is that area within the curriculum that focuses on the girl as she lives from day to day, progressing from girlhood into young womanhood with insight into her future role of parent, homemaker, and wage earner.

Some calves were contracted during the past week at 28 to 27 cents per pound for heifers and 28 to 29 cents for the steers. Some of these were with an overnight dry pasture shrink and others trucked over 50 miles and no shrink.

Fred Provine returned Sunday from a week at the State Conservation Camp held at Scott-Able 4-H Camp south of Cloudfort.

Apple picking starts this week with the main shipments to start toward the end of this week or early next week. The sugar content in some apples last week was 9 to 10 percent in the apples I tested. For the best selling apple, it needs to be around 12 percent. A fully ripe apple tests 14 percent.

Rain covered most of Lincoln County over the week-end. The Corona area reports six inches in a short time and several other areas reported two inches. It is time to start getting livestock ready for fall delivery, apple picking and getting ready for the county fair—so it starts raining!

If you are planning on buying some cows, heifers or bulls, check and be sure the entire herd where they are bought is free of Brucellosis, scabies and other contagious diseases. and construct it. It's learning about good grooming, enjoyment of color, and how to be a wise consumer and producer. It is an enterprise in which young people may sometimes experience failure without necessarily feeling defeated. The first garment may, or may not, be a disaster; the next one, a triumph.

Home economics is the one subject in which a girl can learn about relationships between mother and children and about feelings between brothers and sisters and can gain understanding of herself and her friends and prepare for marriage.

Home economics is often the avenue for strengthening values already established by home, and church. It may be the one class in which a girl may talk about the physical or emotional problems she is facing. It offers the opportunity for students blessed with intelligence, with a fine wholesome inheritance, with economic security, and with social acceptability to assume responsibility in sharing these values, beliefs and abilities with others. It is in home economics classes, because of the informality of the setting and the techniques of instruction, that girls often find motivation to improve mentally, socially and physically and to emerge from a status quo knowing that life can be better than they thought it could.

And don't forget the career possibilities, behind the mixes, canned foods, appliances, patterns for clothing, and textiles—things that touch our lives every day—are home economists, making life simpler and happier for all of us.

Home economists work with health and welfare services, serve in the Peace Corps, work in the space program, do research and living under the sea, and help in many facets of rehabilitation. In short, home economists work with people in education, research, nutrition, food enterprises, textiles, clothing, child development, journalism, advertising, television, hospitals, school cafeterias, restaurants, industry, fashions and interior design, merchandising, decorating, business—wherever people need them for the enrichment of home and family life.

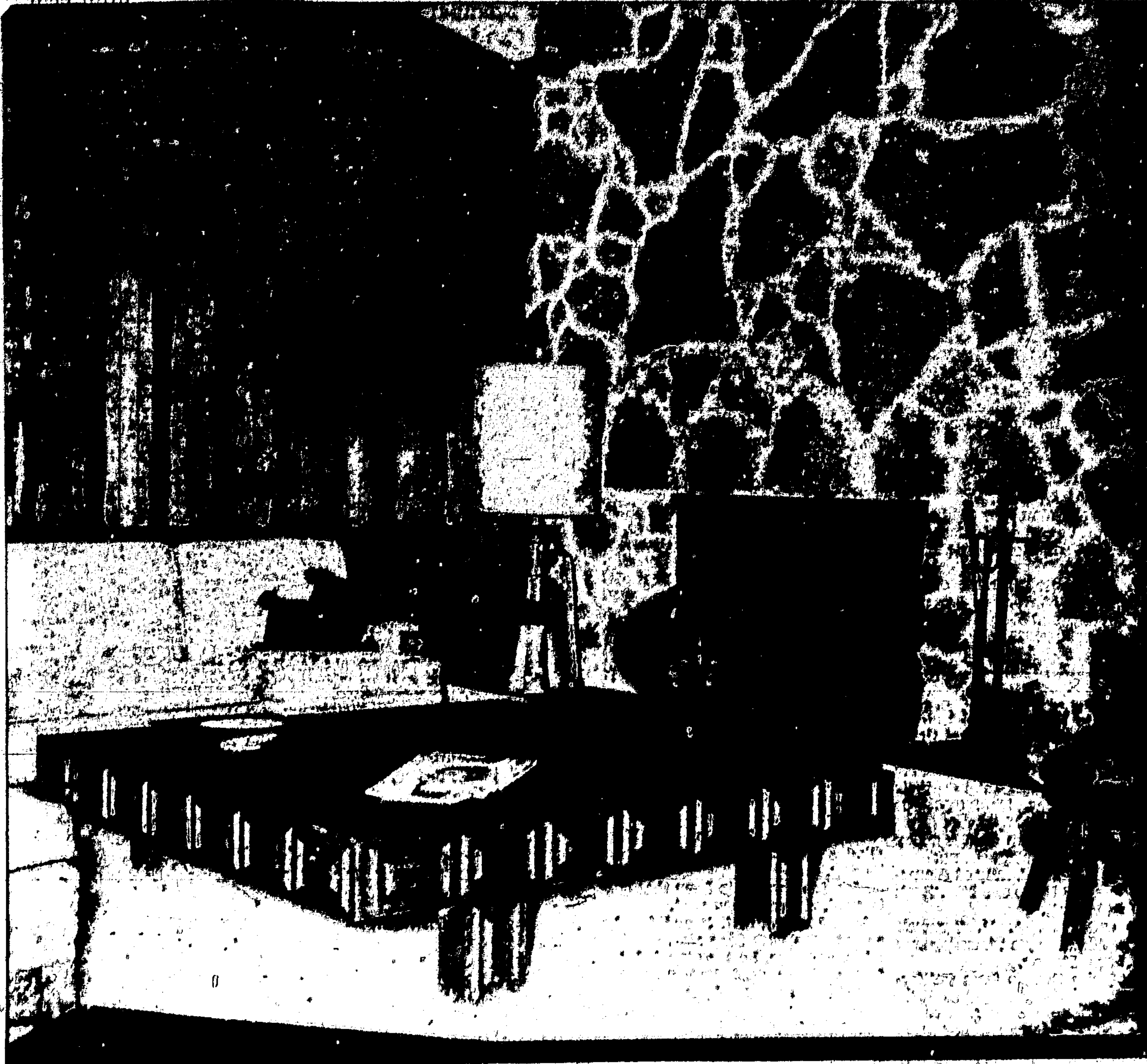

Mr. Knox is also a smoker, enthusiastic to such an extent that the game room of the home contains a full regulation size snooker table. To take care of its weight the floors had to be especially reinforced.

Jodie Fillemann built the house. An antique English coachman's lantern, approximately 4 1/2 to 5 feet in height graces the entrance to the home. One enters the home via a large lever with plate covered ceiling and hanging on one wall is a wood carved picture by Madona of Spain purchased from a house in San Francisco. The living room has a ceiling 14 1/2 feet high with clerestory windows and one of the most outstanding and interesting features are the huge fir beams that were cut especially for the home in Oregon. Each one weighs 1300 lb. and there are 18 used in the house. Being carried on the railroad car they arrived here blackened with smoke and all had to be candied down to their original color. The floor is of pegged white oak, accented with area rugs of white goat's wool imported from Greece.

A sectional sofa upholstered in gold fabric is of viking oak and a huge coffee table five feet square with an eight-inch band of black iron around it was made in Mexico. Adorning it is a most unusual votive holder by Reynut of California which holds amber colored votives. Color accents of gold and orange found in the dried artichoke blossoms are used discriminately in the room. The large fireplace is built of lava stone with slate hearth and the same use of material is employed in the master bedroom fireplace. The walls are birch with walnut finish paneling, used also in the game room, one wall of the master bedroom and down the stairs that lead to two bedrooms and bath, and a future play room for Lynda.

Between two chairs in the living room on a table stands a large brass lamp that was originally an antique Egyptian urn. The dining area contains captain table and chairs of viking oak upholstered in black leather designed by Tom Webber. They are centered on a round area rug like those in the living room and over the table hangs one of the largest and most handsome chandeliers that we have ever seen in a private home. This chandelier, with amber colored lights, was purchased in Mexico by Dan and Georgia Griffith of La Pinata. A painting "Autumn Paintbrush" by Fred Harman of Santa Fe is a favorite of Mr. Knox's, and hangs

In the game room just off the dining area is, as mentioned, the snooker table. Furniture and accessories in this room we found most unusual. One is a bench designed by Mrs. Knox and made by Madrid of Spain. The seating area of the bench is carved then filled with liquid vinyl which then solidified to give a most unusual and colorful finish. On one wall hangs what was originally an old carved wooden screen evidently used in a chapel in Mexico, but which has been disassembled and hung in individual panels. Although old the colors are still vivid and contain carvings of various saints including the Virgin of Guadalupe, Saint Juanita, Lady of Help, Virgin Mary, Saint Christopher and Saint Lazarus.

The lower floor of the Knox home contains the maid's room and their daughter's bedroom which is delightfully decorated with twin beds, gold carpeting, yellow drapes and table, chairs and bed heads of wicker painted in a bright sunshine yellow.

The Knox's have named their home "Palomero," it being the name of the home of Mr. Knox's parents when they lived in Idaho. When the parents later moved to Colorado they gave the same name



to their mountain home and thus is derived the name of the Knox home here.

To complete a final elegant touch to this lovely home is a deck that extends the length of the house. It is 70 feet long and overlooked from the house itself by a 20 ft. expanse of glass.

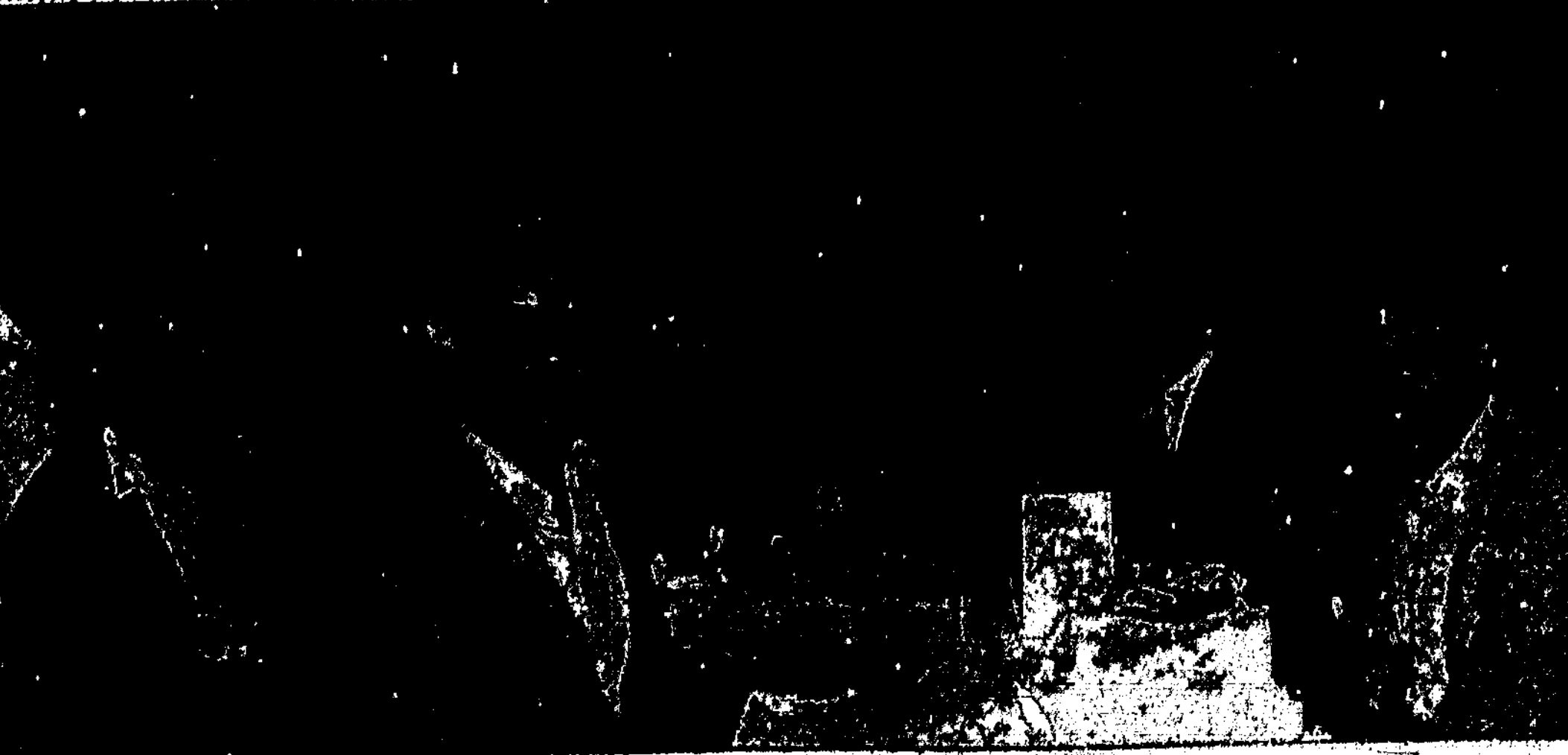

Cloudercroft's high school athletic field has been lighted for night football and the new facilities will be used for the first time this season.

The Cloudercroft Refuge, which surrounds the village of Cloudercroft, will be open to bear hunting from Sept. 10 to 18. Hunters who utilize the refuge are cautioned to be extremely careful of other recreationists in this area.

Trials for the world's richest horse race, the \$475,000 All-American Futurity, will be held Saturday at Ruidoso Downs and from the eight heats 12 of the fastest quarter horses in the country will contest the Sept. 5 classic over 400 yards.

First post for the 12 race program is the usual 1:30 p.m., although for the Labor Day weekend of racing the first race will start at 1 p.m.

A total of 72 two-year-olds were named Wednesday morning for the trials at Ruidoso Downs.

Headed by such brilliant performers as Top Ladybug, Doll Bid, Go Dick Go and Off Limits, the group will be seeking the 12 finalist berths in the Labor Day Classic that will gross a new record of approximately \$485,000.

Racing secretary A. C. Kemp split the 72 entries into eight heats with the 12 fastest, judged on a time basis, to enter the finals. All heats will be over 400 yards with \$1200 in added money at stake in each event.

Top Ladybug comes into the trials with standout credentials to be favored for the big one. The daughter of Top Deck has already posted victories in the Oklahoma and Rainbow Futurities while winning more than \$80,000 and narrowly edged Doll Bid in the Rainbow after a tremendous duel.

The latter had scored four wins in a row before succumbing to Top Ladybug and she seems at her peak right now.

Top Ladybug and the California invader Off Limits both drew into the third heat along with another strong contender, Dream Rocket. All three will be favored to gain the finals.

Doll Bid is in the fifth heat along with Go Dick Go and Mr. Savannah, the latter a full brother to last year's winner, Savannah, Jr.

Strongest of the first heat contenders appear to be Chickamauga, a late supplement and Go Always while in the second heat the stick-outs appear to be Harlequin, Femme Fatale and Never Ending. Doer, Evangeline Downs Futurity champion, heads the fourth trial while Jet Too, Watch Eli and Vanny's Lady are in the sixth heat. The seventh drew Go Coon Go, winner of the Raton Futurity; Laurita Bar and Mr. Deck Moore; Kansas Futurity winner Roma

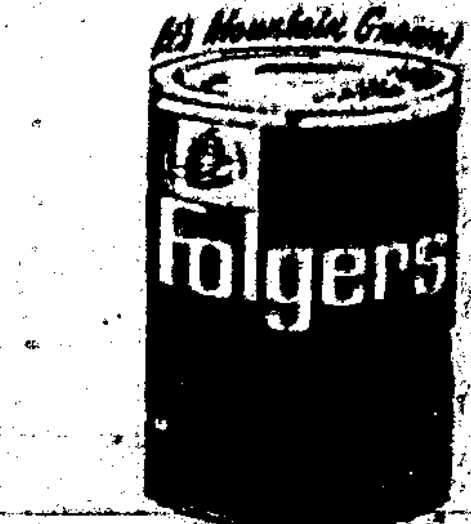

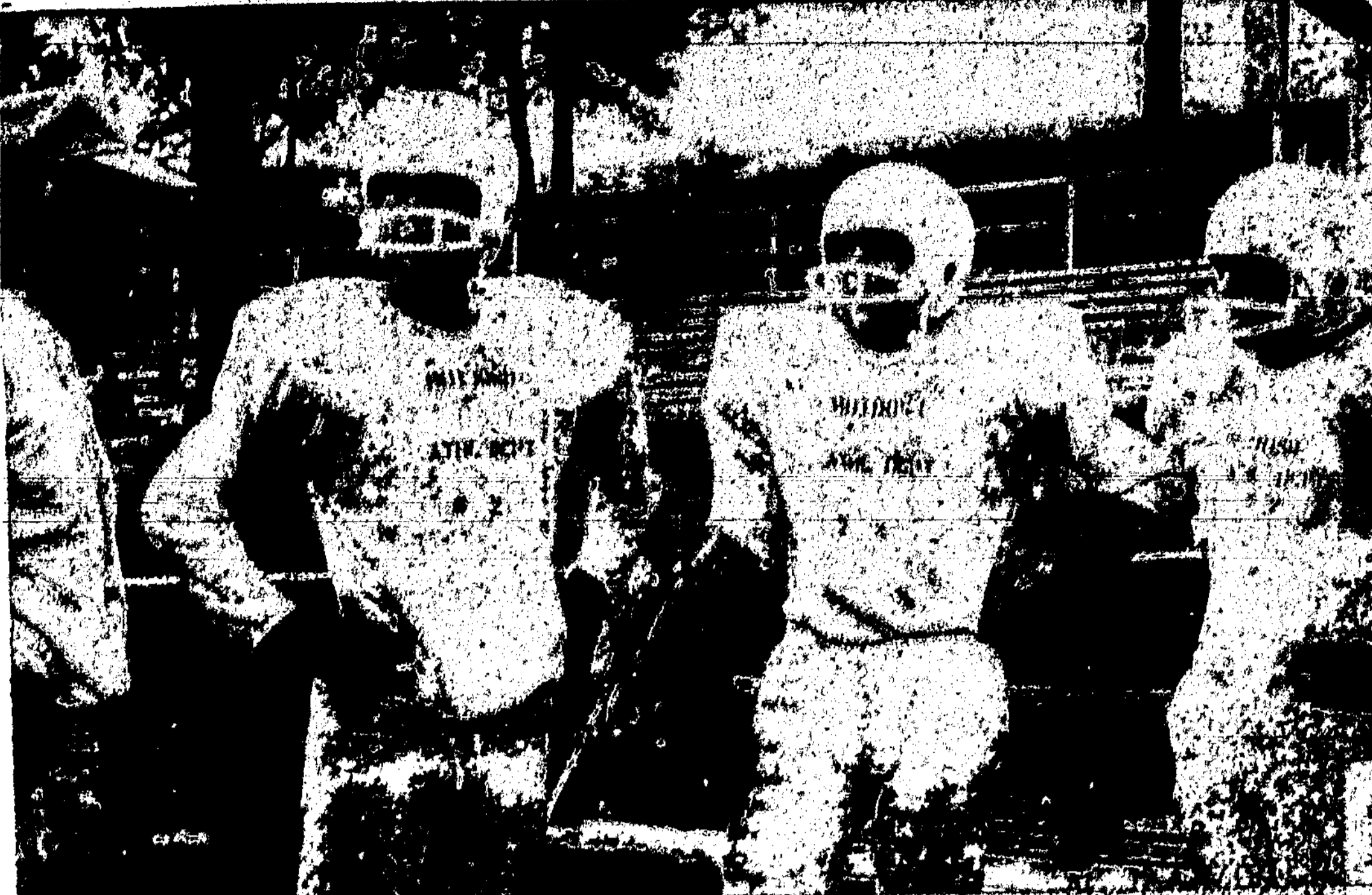

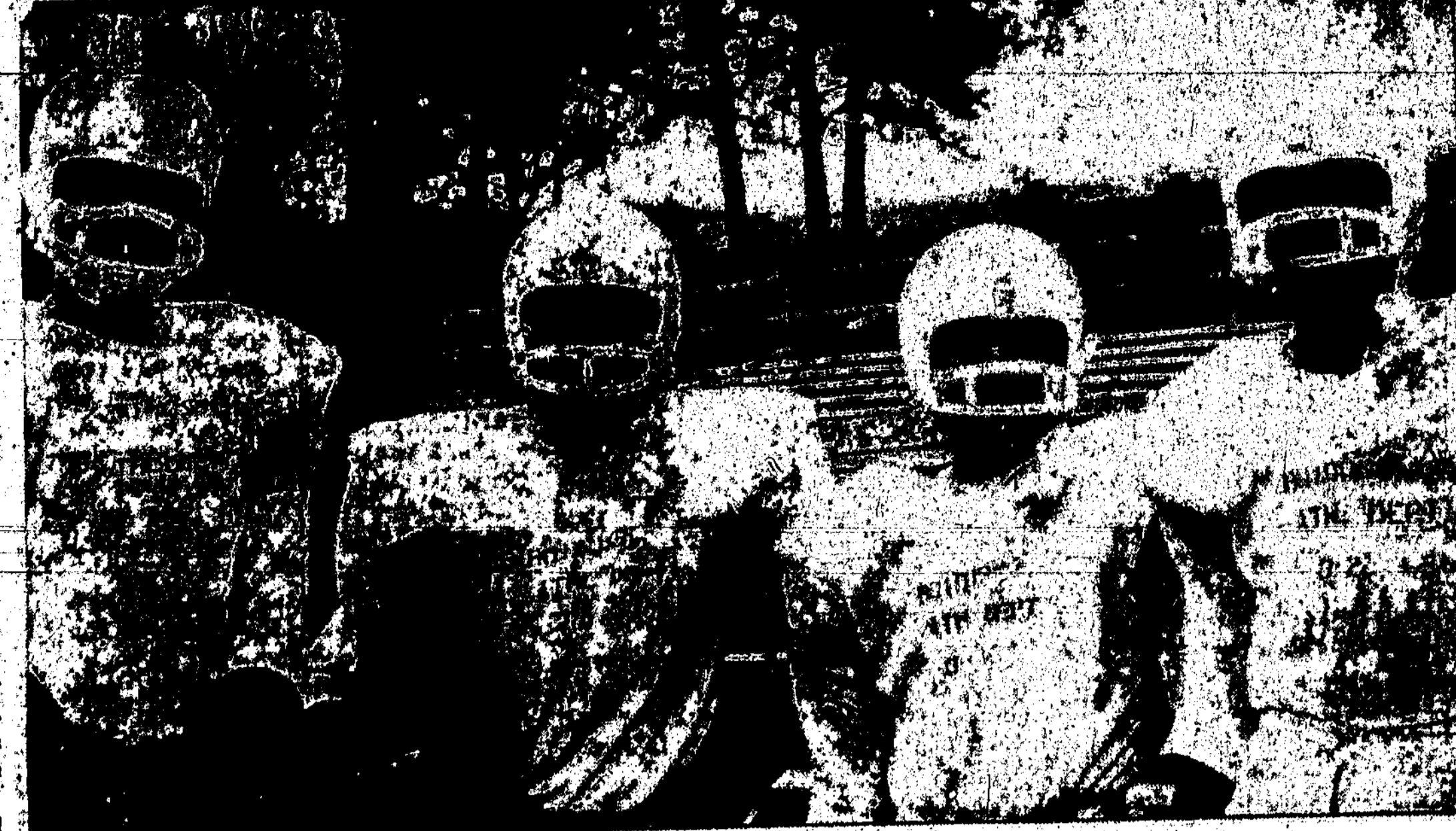
CAPITAN HAS 24 ON FIELD

Burns Rides Rock Island To Ruidoso Downs Derby Win

Veteran stakes rider Eddie Burns made two trips to Ruidoso Downs this summer and the second one, Sunday, saw him guide favored Rock Island to a masterful win in the \$15,350 Ruidoso Downs Thoroughbred Derby over 7 1/2 furlongs.

The previous week Eddie had flown in to Ruidoso Downs for the Derby Prep in which Rock Island scored narrowly over Nepanta.

Sunday with the big money on the line it was the same story.

Rock Island, owned by A. C. Taylor of Malabar, N. M., and trained by Cecil Harrell, was sent off as the even money choice by the crowd of more than 6,000 and he didn't let his backers down, going wire to wire on a heavy track in 1:38 flat.

It was no pushover for the Wyoming-bred son of Bright Liberty who won by a straining three quarters of a length over Nepanta with Ebonullah closing well for third in front of Kancity Kid.

In order behind the first four came American Time, Up 'N Off, Patsy Shronne, Ima Bet and Iron-ail.

Rock Island earned \$7,685 for his owner while Nepanta took home second money of \$3,842 for John Dillard. Third was won \$1,844 with Ebonullah's owner Lynn Barnes with Ralph Feller's Kancity Kid garnering \$622 for fourth.

Burns shot Rock Island into command right at the off but was pressed most of the way around first by Nepanta, a Kentucky-bred daughter of Neptune, and in the latter stages by the grey Kancity Kid. The latter made a menacing move as the leader swung into the final turn with Ebonullah ranging up on the inside and Nepanta getting a short breather from rider Boyd Morris.

Kancity Kid heavily drew away with Rock Island as the field straightened away but his bid failed in the heavy going on the rail as Nepanta stormed back on the outside and Ebonullah closed stoutly but Rock Island still had three quarters of a length to spare at the finish.

"This is a good colt," a smiling Eddie Burns said after dismounting in the winners circle. "He handled the off track beautifully and gave me his best."

Rock Island, a successful campaigner at Ak-Sar-Ben and Centennial Park, was shipped in from the Colorado track three weeks ago and supplemented for the derby at a cost of \$1,150. He more than rewarded his owners and probably enhanced his stud possibilities with a derby win on his record.

In two years of campaigning Rock Island has won \$20,450 while winning seven of 15 starts. Eddie Burns and Ebonullah turned in excellent efforts. Both have been lightly raced and probably have yet to reach their peaks. The former was making her ninth start while Ebonullah, a fashionable bred son of Amanullah, is still a maiden after seven tries. But he figures to be a winner soon.

Kancity Kid ran strongly but lost second in the final two strides. Biggest disappointment was the well favored Ima Bet. The daughter of Stambler was much closer to the pace than usual and faltered badly in the drive to wind up eighth.

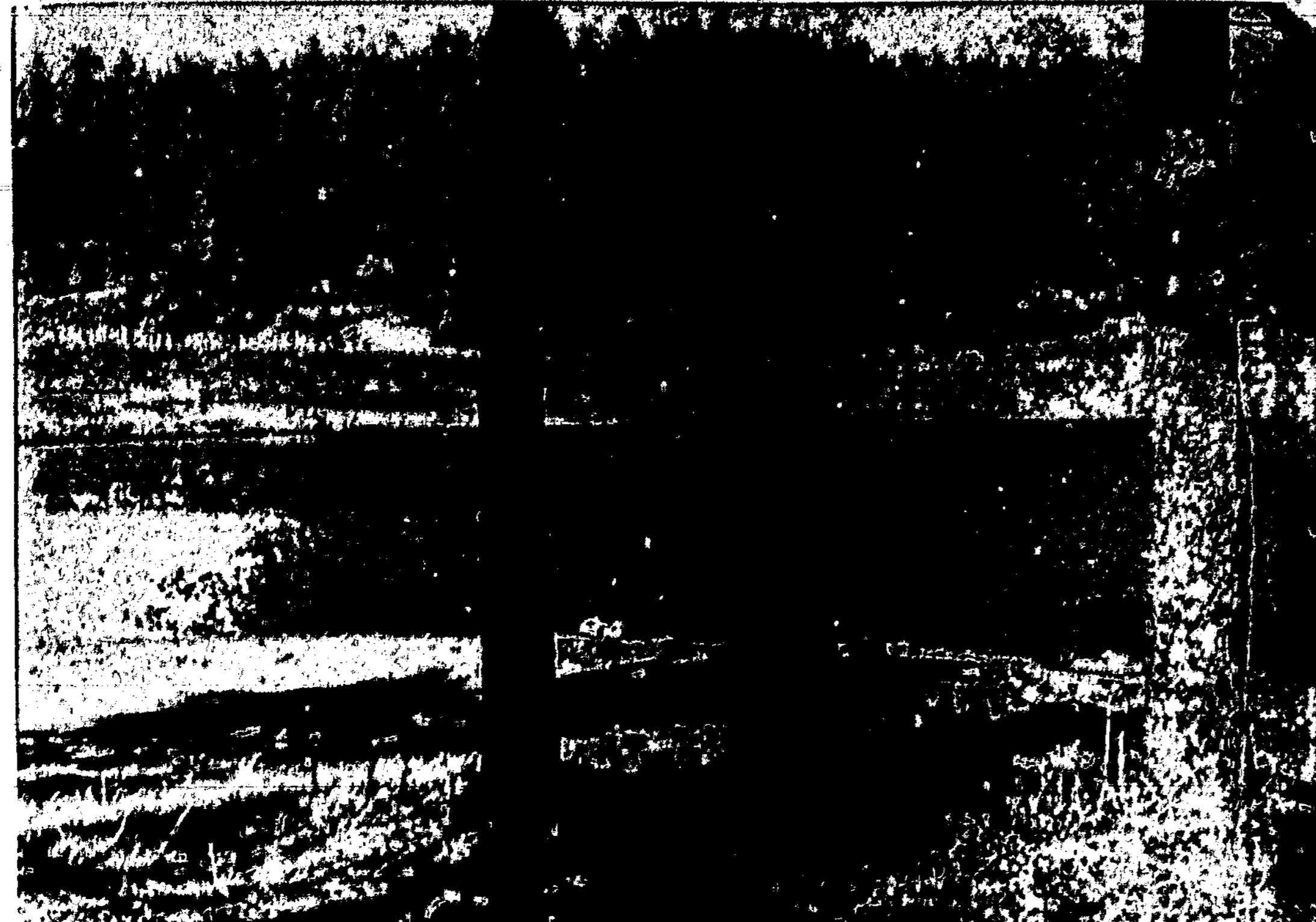

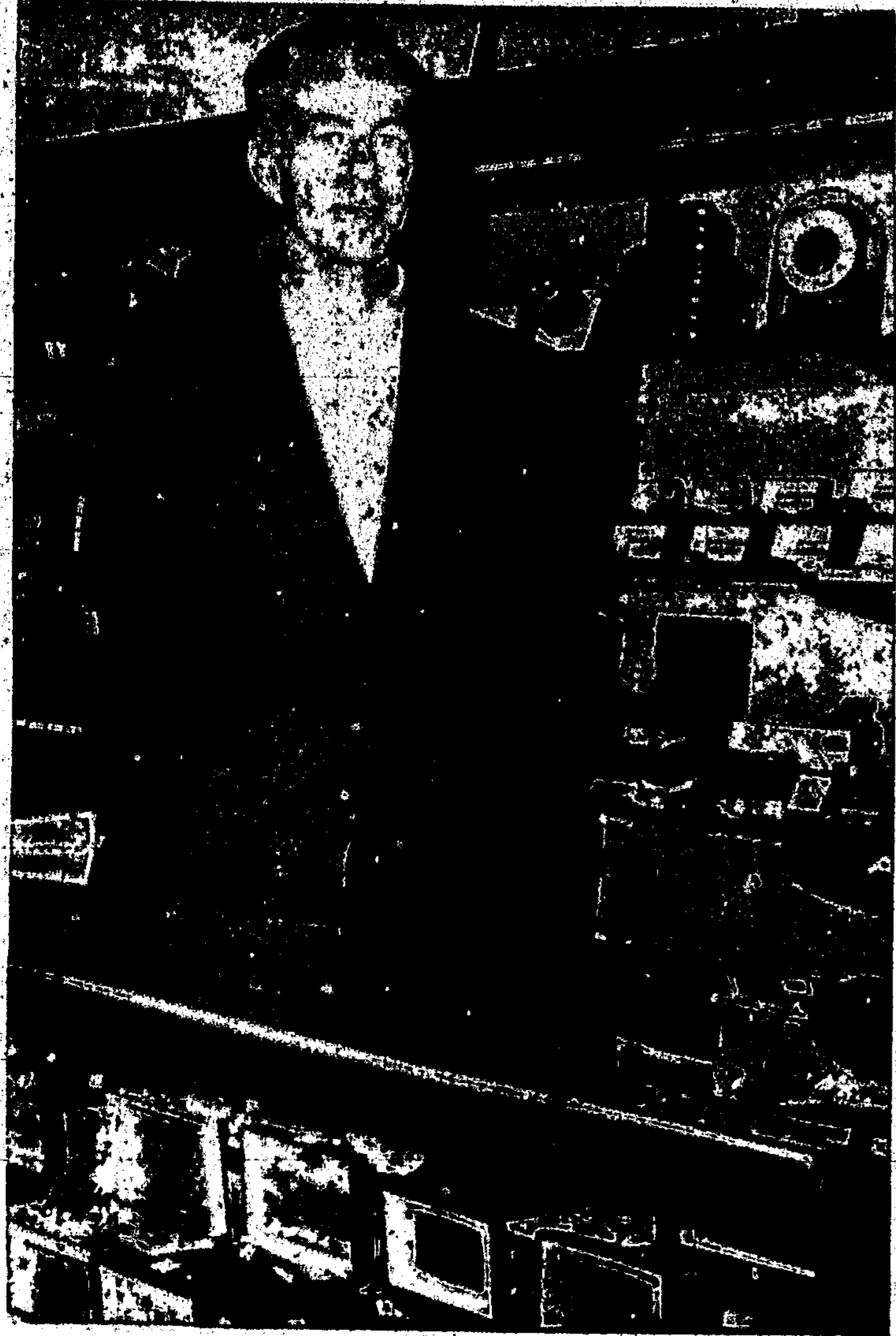

Change In Name Of Jewelry Planned

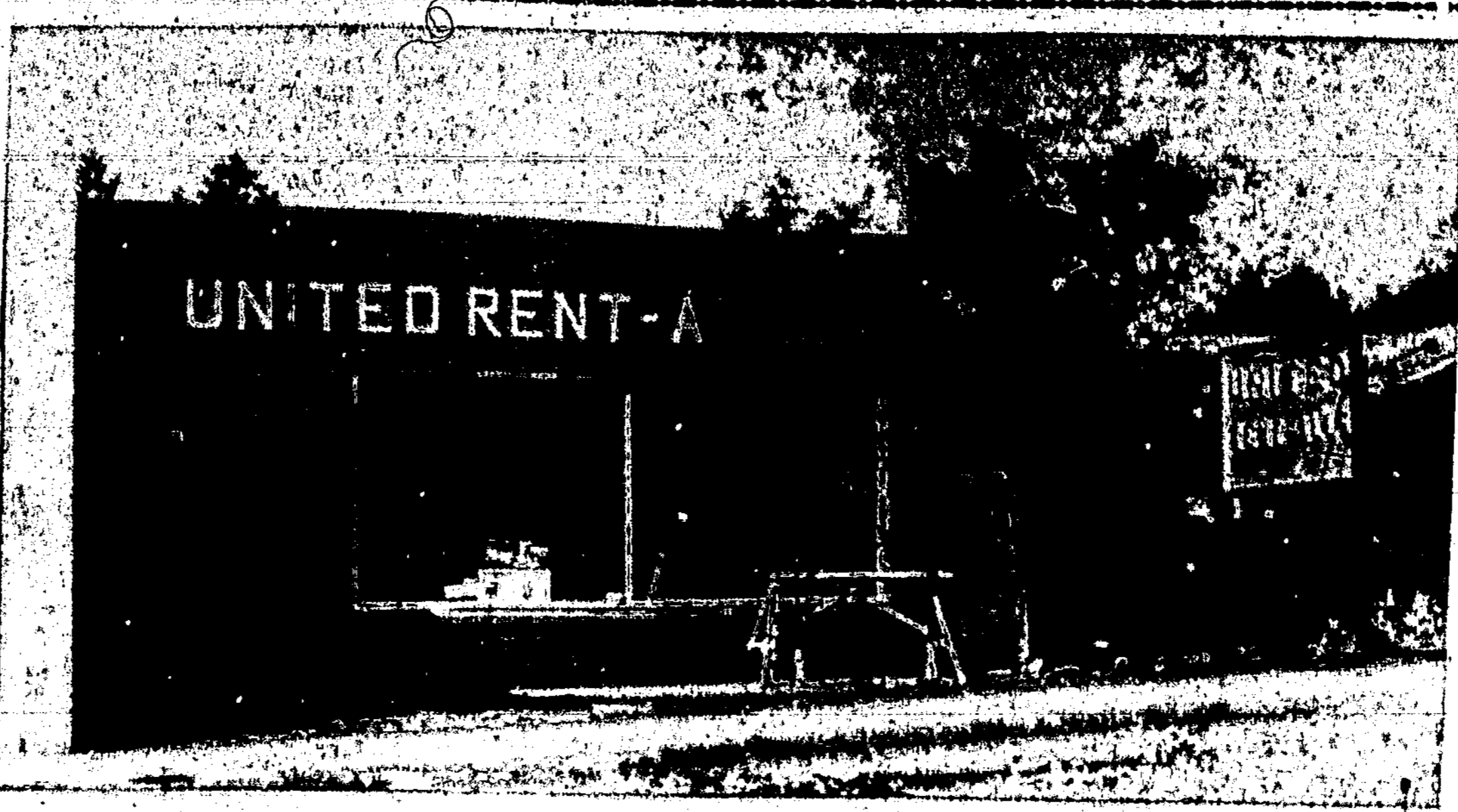
