

New White Mtn. School To Be In Use January 14

Around Town

From 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. Saturday, the Teen-Agers Car Trip to collect funds for this year's March of Dimes campaign will be staged near School House Park. Linda Fortner, chairman for the TAF part of the drive, reported this week...

These are some interesting side-lights concerning the heroic search and rescue efforts last week-end which engaged almost 200 people for many hours when six skiers became lost after they wandered too far from Sierra Blanca Ski Area trails:

Conn. Brown, State policeman, was a passenger in the Hiller helicopter, one of two sent here by the Army's Search and Rescue group attached to Holloman Air Force Base, which had to set down on the Cree Meadow Golf Course when the machine malfunctioned. The pilot said he thought it best to be cautious and land rather than continue on flying when he smelled smoke. Bill McCarty, watching the machine take off from the municipal airport said he saw a puff of smoke and the chopper seemed to wobble a lot. On landing, Police- man Brown said "I liked that. Let's go up again." It was his first flight and Bill McCarty cracked that Conn just didn't know any better!

One of the three youths brought here and hospitalized was given a big slug of corn squeasas to thaw him out after several hours in deep freeze by one of the local residents here, a true mountaineer. The boy went into orbit when the liquor hit his empty stomach, and the local radio station operator, Ed Hyman, thought it best to give the boy's mother advance warning of her boy's condition before she saw him the first time in his hospital bed. By the time she got to see him, he was pretty well lubricated.

Someone suggested that a bell, or a siren, or maybe a big searchlight beam turned skyward might help lost skiers in the future come back to the lodge. The clouds and snow were so thick on the slopes during the search Thursday night that several people reported they suffered vertigo. "I didn't know if I was standing up, leaning sideways, moving or still," one young skier said when he described the swirling snowflakes in his flashlight beam to the dark mountaineer.

There are at least four pairs of skis buried in a snowbank on the lost skier's route down the north fork of the Rio Ruidoso. Young Terry Noyes "ditched" his—hid them away for later retrieving—when he got out of the deep snow—and it's a good bet he won't go back after them. Others who were lost did the same.

The father of one of the boys who is a college professor, Ted Noyes, said as he arrived at the hospital and talked with some friends, Mr. and Mrs. Jaster, that he had hallucinations the latter part of the ordeal, reporting he plainly saw one of the youngsters, Terry Noyes, lying in a snowbank as though dead, but when he went for a closer look, he was not there. (Terry had been brought in ahead of Mr. Noyes, much earlier in the day with the older, college boys.) The elder Noyes also reported he saw what he thought was a skier standing at one side of the canyon they came down, and when he called to the skier, and got no answer, he went closer to talk with him—and the image faded away.

There are so many individuals who spent time, money and effort on the search it will never be possible to thank them all, but special mention should go to Manager Bob Walker and Secretary Mrs. Emma Redmann for their losing so much sleep standing by the Sierra Blanca radio communications equipment, and answering three tele- phones in the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce office. Walker and Mrs. Redmann answered hundreds of such calls. Ed Hyman put his radio station K-R-R-R back on the air Friday night when it was learned there was difficulty in getting the last two snow-bound youths down the canyon to the hospital. Local armen including Lowell Morgan of Alpine Avia- tion, and R. H. Hedgecock, old hand here to stay in the air as long as possible in the mountains, but found they couldn't rise too much

The new White Mountain Elementary School is scheduled to be turned over to the Ruidoso Municipal School Board at a special meeting Jan. 10, at 5:00 p.m. when members of the board will make final, on the ground inspection of the new building. Elementary grades one to six are scheduled to move into the new building during the afternoon of Friday, Jan. 14, which is the ending date of the first semester. Supt. George P. White announced this week.

Division line for elementary students who will attend White Mountain School is the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Building. Children living east of the Chamber building will continue to attend Nob Hill Elementary School and those living west will be transferred to the new school. The line is not a "hard and fast" one. White said, and he requested parents and students to bear with the board, administrative staff and teachers during the transition period.

The White Mountain School will open with two first grade classes with teachers, Nancy McCarty and Mary Svinger. Mary E. Dunagan will teach one second grade class. Two third grade classes will be taught by Marie McNeil and Susan Miller. Two fourth grade classes under Bernice Morrison and Lor- line Samuelson; one fifth grade class taught by Nelle Mosley, and one sixth grade class under A. J. Thompson.

Teachers remaining at Nob Hill are: First grade, Kathleen Thompson and Nelle Jones; second, Bernadine Cheney and Elsie Matthews; third, Ruth Moore; fourth, Marcelle Cunningham; fifth, Thomas McNeil and Thomas Cook; sixth, Judy Bishop and E. flying in the scudding heavy clouds that kept sweeping through the area, that needed to be blown over. They did get in quite a few hours, however. did they suffer exposure as critically as did the original six. The drama began unfolding late Thursday when it was noted that some of a party of people from the Texas Gulf Coast area had not returned to Sierra Blanca Ski Lodge to ride back to Ruidoso to their motel accommodations. At about the same time two other young men were reported as not having returned to the lodge when they were expected.

The original four reported lost included Ted A. Noyes, 42, and his son Terry, aged 12, both of Bryan, Tex., where the elder Noyes is a professor at Texas A. & M. College; a nephew of the older Noyes, Tim Noyes, aged 15, of Corpus Christi, and Randy Jaster, 17, of Austin. The latter youth is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. A. Jaster. Terry became separated from the other three when one of the young skiers twisted a knee and seemed to need help, it was reported. He had volunteered to go ahead to get some help, but in following some tracks he noted in the snow-

PRECIPITATION IN '65 FAR ABOVE AVERAGE

Moisture received in Ruidoso during 1965 was far above the average for the last 20 years according to figures given the News this week by C. A. Culver, co-operative observer here for the U. S. Department of Commerce Weather Bureau. Culver said precipitation the last 12 months totaled 34.81 inches, and that the 20-year average is 20.46. He added that snowfall during 1965 totaled 38.35 inches.

The highest temperature last year was 89 degrees on June 28 and the lowest was 10 degrees below zero on Feb. 12. In December of the year just ended precipitation measured 4.19 inches. The heaviest in the last 20 years for a December was in 1961, Culver said. In 1965 there were 246 days that were partly cloudy, 30 days that were overcast and 89 days that were clear.



Across my desk in December came this letter from a dear friend and dedicated Christian. While attending the Cook Christian Training School of Phoenix, Arizona, an interdenominational Bible school for Indian Americans, I became acquainted with Dr. Harry Van't Kerkhoff, and his wonderful wife. This is their letter to me and four of their children who are all engaged in the life and witness of the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Dear Children
 I don't know how I can put into words what has been in my heart the last days. I guess it all began with a special meeting we attended in Tempe, where some others of our little new field gathered. The Bible lesson was from Romans, and while we had known this



fields that are known as "the meadows" southwest of the main Sierra Blanca trails, he ended up going away from the lodge. The tracks he was following were those of two Texas Tech students of Lubbock, William Dana Juett of Amarillo, Tex., and Phil Dettle, Stratford, Tex. The college students were lost, and were heading down

the north fork of the Ruidoso when young Terry overtook them. When night descended, they holed up under a large overhanging rock to keep dry. It alternated rain and snow throughout the night, the older boys reported. About noon on Friday they were spotted trudging down the Ruidoso canyon, north and west of Ruidoso, by a party of horseback riders who were searching for them. They were

brought in to Ruidoso shortly after noon. The older two boys had been reported missing on Thursday afternoon about four p.m. by two young women with whom they had a dinner date at Sierra Blanca Lodge for the evening. The young women, Patricia Eilert, Houston, and Cheryl Garner, Amarillo, said they were among a large number of Texas Tech students here for winter sports activities during the

holidays last week. After unsuccessful "sweeps" of all the ski trails by about 150 persons in the Sierra Blanca area until the wee hours Thursday night and Friday morning, a group of 12 experienced skiers, including ski instructors, ski patrol members and members of the Mescalero started down the north fork of Rio Ruidoso, which originates in White Mountain Park, where the ski

lodge is located. It was this group that located the second trio, including the elder Noyes, his nephew Tim, who is the son of John A. Noyes of Corpus Christi, and young Randy Jaster. The elder Noyes was brought out with very little delay because he had walked ahead of the boys, reporting, he said, he knew they would spend another cold night in the canyon in deep snow if he didn't get to

some habitation to summon help. He said they had no knowledge of any search or rescue being attempted—"we never saw another human, nor heard a plane or had any indication anyone knew we were lost," he declared. He said they had followed the same tracks his son, Terry, had in coming down from the ski area into the Ruidoso canyon. He said they had used their ski poles as uprights to hold a wall of snow they built to keep out the cold as they huddled and slept fitfully beneath a large rock overhanging in the upper canyon.

The professor was brought to the hospital here at about dusk Friday. He had been in the open and in deep snow for about 22 hours. The first three brought in had been lost for about 18 hours.

Then began an ordeal of waiting for the Austin, Tex. couple, whose son, Randy, and for the John Noyes couple whose son Tim, were still to be rescued from a difficult situation.

One casualty among local rescue personnel was reported when Harlan McCraw who had helped bring the elder Noyes by horseback to a spot where a 4-wheel drive vehicle could transport him to the hospital here, suffered a serious leg injury when his horse fell with him. He was hospitalized at about nine o'clock Friday night.

The last two boys of the original lost party were not brought to Ruidoso hospital until 8:30 Saturday morning. A rescue and search party had worked with them for many hours. They had been exposed to the cold for more than 40 hours counting the time they had been skiing on Sierra Blanca slopes before they became lost.

The latter two were very hungry and cold, and were put to bed as were the college professor and his son the day before, for observation by the attending physician.

When Schar Ward, young Ruidoso school student and member of the Sierra Blanca Junior Racing team thought he heard voices on the west slope of Baldy as he hunted for missing skiers late Friday, he started down that side of the mountain, and encountered two other skiers in separate locations, who also were on the hunt for the lost Texans. He and Randy were brought out via Eagle Creek, carried by Landians, then with a trackmaster. Jim Brown was pilot of the snow cat, assisted by Clifford Chee.

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

MEDICARE BEGINS NIBBLING PAYCHECKS

Residents of Ruidoso will soon become aware of how much they will have to pay for medicare and for more generous pension checks voted by Congress.

Beginning this month local wage earners and their employers will be hit by a big increase in payroll taxes to finance the new benefits. On January 1st, working people who are covered by Social Security began paying at the rate of 4.2 percent on the first \$6,000 of earnings. Matching contributions are made by their employers.

This represents a big hike over the present rate, which is 3.625 percent and is limited to the first \$4,800 of earnings.

As for those who are self-employed, the present tax rate of 5.4 percent on the first \$4,800 will jump to 6.15 percent and will affect income up to \$6,600.

For a person earning \$4,000 a year, the tax will be \$168, or \$23 more than he paid last year. At the \$2,500 level, the new tax will be \$105, a rise of \$14. Those with incomes of \$6,000 or over will pay the maximum, \$277, which is \$103 more than at present.

The frequent extension of benefits provided under Social Security has been accompanied over the years, by corresponding increases in costs.

As an example, a worker who will be paying \$277 next year was



COURTHOUSE CONSTRUCTION IS REVIEWED




