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


New Minister Here For Methodist Church

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

The Teachers' Corner

by SUSAN MILLER
Of all the teaching aids now available, to me the most valuable aid is a small class. Not that every teacher wouldn't like to have all the other aids. If used correctly, they can be of great benefit. But to have a small class, say of twenty children is this teacher's dream. You may say "Why, thirty children is just ten more. How could ten more children make such a difference?"

Just stop and think—out of a teaching day, by the time we take up money of various sorts, sharpen pencils before each class, go to the restrooms and get drinks, get our desks cleaned off, doctor minor injuries plus recess and noon—we have left approximately five hours of actual teaching time per day. If we use half of this time, or 2½ hours for presentation of material, this leaves us another 2½ hours for the children to work on what they have learned and for the teacher to have a chance to work individually with the children. This individual work is one of the most important facets of teaching, for by this we can really learn to understand a child, and to know the best way to help each one.

Bill Sands, in his book "My Shadow Ran Fast," Prentice-Hall, Englewood Cliffs, N. J., tells how life left him with parents who divorced when he was 12. From that point on until the age of 23, and an inmate of San Quintin, Bill Sands led a hard life. As I read the book I would weep on one page and laugh on the next!

Bill Sands was a solid "con." Meaning he could be depended on and that his word stuck. In prison Bill learned to size men up for what they really were, for in the grey of prison all props and pretensions are taken away. Men are known for what they really are.

Here is a look into the life of prison that many have never seen before. For many here is an opportunity to see the "inside" of things to come to know a man who for two years was the cell-mate of Caryl Chessman, and came to know the "red-light bandit" of California better than anyone.

In the scene concerning Warden C. T. Duffy, who often walked among the prisoners in the open yard I got the impression of Christ, walking among the poor, the lame, the halt, the blind, the needy of the world. When Warden Duffy told Bill Sands, "Bill—I care", this started Bill on the road to freedom. Norman Vincent Peale said: "I could hardly put it down. One of the most interesting human stories I have ever read. . . has extraordinary readability." This book ought to be in every home! Bill Sands is now devoting his


for these children, the future-leaders of our country! Not that this kind of work is harmful—it isn't—but there are so many activities that could benefit the fast student so much more. Unfortunately the teacher needs to be with him for many of these and as I said, women are usually busy with what seems to us to be the children who need us more.

One solution to this problem, I believe is a smaller class, and I say this not from a college education course, but from personal experience: Since teaching here in Ruidoso, I have had as many as forty-three in a classroom designed for thirty. Last year I had around thirty-nine students all year. With a class that large there was time only to help those that had to have it and a prayer that the others could manage somehow. I had good students both of those years and I'm sure there were days when some of the good, quiet workers never got more than a personal hello from me.

This year, we have a new third grade which cut my class to twenty-six. What a difference! As a whole, my class this year is not any higher a group than in previous years, but we seem to go faster, cover material more thoroughly and even have time for a few extra things we like to do. I feel each day as if I have learned more about each child, not just a few, and that I have done a better job teaching them. The room is cleaner, quieter, and just generally provides a more congenial atmosphere for teaching and learning. This, to me, is one of the most important teaching aids several times before. What a waste

Petition Asking School Funds Increase Talked





Upper Hondo Pilot Watershed Tour Sponsored By SCS

Eleven persons made a tour of the Upper Hondo Pilot Watershed Thursday last week, sponsored by the Upper Hondo Soil & Water Conservation district officers.

The group, which included Mr. and Mrs. Bert Pfingsten, Ernest McDaniel, Ralph Bonnell, Charles Jones and Jack Higgins, all of the Upper Hondo SCS district; Valton Hall, representing Capitan Lions Club; Daulton Morgan, SCS employee; Mrs. Daulton Morgan, SCS auxiliary; and Luther McDougal and E. J. Myers, both SCS employees, left the Capitan office of the SCS at 10 a.m.

First area visited was the Spencer property north of Capitan where structures were toured. Spreader dams had collected considerable water, it was noted. South of Capitan, the group next visited the Ralph Pearson ranch where debris basins were proving effective. At Salado dam, east of Capitan, part of the group went on a tour through the principal spillway pipe of the dam. The pipe is 720-feet long and 44-feet tall. No damage was noted from recent floodwaters. A history of and purpose of the Salado dam were given to those on the tour by E. J. Myers. He reported it is 78-feet high, 690-feet long and 750-feet thick through the base. When full the dam will hold 4,990 acre feet of floodwater and sediment. It will release floodwater at a rate that will run only 1 1/2 feet deep in the creek channel below it.

For a break in the tour, a delicious luncheon was enjoyed at the Worley Hotel at Old Lincoln.

After lunch the group went down the Bonito river to inspect flood damage to the stream revetments and debris basins on the Bert Pfingsten property.

Next stop was the Robert O. Anderson ranch below Hondo where inspection was made of stream revetments along the Hondo river. Even though some of the revetments were damaged by the flood last spring, there were still some of them in good condition, it was noted. Work that was needed to be done on the structures and revetments was determined. The tour ended at the Anderson ranch at 5 p.m.


