



SON OF FORMER COUNTY RESIDENT GETS CITATION IN VIET NAM ACTION

Bernard W. Armstrong, 20-year-old Marine corporal of Tucumcari has been cited for gallantry in Viet Nam. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. M. W. Armstrong of Tucumcari.

Armstrong's citation was approved by the U. S. Department of State for "unhesitatingly" rushing to the aid of three injured Marines during the thick of a battle "despite their exposed position."

Armstrong, a Tucumcari High School graduate of 1963, joined the Navy in June of that year. Later he transferred to the Marines.

U. S. 70 on Interstate System Is Goal of Conference Here

The designation of U. S. 70, Ruidoso's transportation lifeline, as a part of the federal interstate highway system is the goal of a conference called for Friday noon here and sponsored by the Roswell Chamber of Commerce.

In the event the Congress of the United States should extend the mileage of National Interstates and Defense Highways, it is believed that serious consideration should be given to the highway from Las Cruces to Clovis and Amarillo, as an addition to that system.



Ted Bennett Nominated To Naval Academy

Theodore Maxey Bennett, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Bennett of Ruidoso, last week was named by New Mexico's U. S. Congressman E. S. Johnny Walker as his principal nominee to the U. S. Naval Academy.

Two days earlier word was received via telegram from New Mexico's U. S. Senator Joseph M. Montoya that young Bennett had been named as one of Montoya's alternate nominees to West Point.

Cadet Bennett maintains very high academic standards and as a result was cited on the latest Superintendent's List. To earn a place on the Superintendent's List a cadet must show top proficiency in academics and thus appear on the Dean's List as well as top proficiency in military matters to earn a place on the Commandant's List.

Cadet Bennett is an ROTC Contract Student. He stands number two in the top 10 per cent of the Army's Military Science Training Program for the first semester. He has been designated as one of three cadets from the Institute to compete for a West Point appointment in the Honor Military School Competitive Program which will take place in March.

Fund is Budgeted For Paid Firemen

Ruidoso's village board of trustees voted Thursday night this week to include a \$14,000.00 item in the city's budget for the fiscal year of 1966-67 to provide salaries for three paid firemen. The amount was decided on by figuring wages of beginning firemen at \$1.50 per hour, plus the additional cost of matching social security expenses.

The move was an adoption of a proposal offered by representatives of Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department at the beginning of the regular session of the trustees. Presenting several recommendations urging the hiring of three men for around the clock duty were Fire Chief Wayne Estes, Assistant Chief Gerald Waltrip, Charles Murray, captain, Dean Janzen, lieutenant and Tom Walker, member.

Must Register By Jan. 31 To Vote in City Election

Residents of this area who have lived in the state a year, in Lincoln County six months and in this precinct a month who are not registered voters, but who want to cast a ballot in the upcoming village elections March 1 must register no later than Jan. 31. Deadline for registering to be eligible to vote will be 5 p.m., according to Village Manager-Clerk Jim Hine, who says registration may be done at the village hall here.

Streat Department Budget Money May Be Increased

Work on the 1966-67 budget for the Village of Ruidoso will be one of the primary considerations for village trustees following the municipal election March 1. Village Manager-Clerk Jim Hine reported this week. During the 1965-66 fiscal year total street department expenditures came to \$40,350 and will probably be increased in the new budget. The budget for fire protection will also show an increase from \$6,400 to approximately \$20,000 for the coming fiscal year. However, Hine mentioned that the Village hopes to qualify for about \$8,000 in state money for fire protection.

10 YEAR-OLD IMMIGRANTS FROM SWITZERLAND

**Ruidoso Downs Couple
Nears 60th Anniversary**

Two young Swiss, each aged about ten years old, came to the United States with their parents in the 1880's and coincidentally came to separate voyages but on the same ship. The two immigrants will observe their sixtieth wedding anniversary on Jan. 27.

They are Mr. and Mrs. Phillip Ramuz of Ruidoso Downs, who have lived most of their life in the Pecos Valley of New Mexico in the vicinity of Carlsbad and Artesia and who moved to Ruidoso Downs in 1964 to a home which gives them a view of the Sierra Blanca mountain, something like their native land of Switzerland.

The two wed at Dayton, New Mexico in 1906 a town that does not now exist but which was located south of what is now Artesia, and north of what is now Carlsbad, according to their daughter Mrs. Arvil Johnson, also of Ruidoso Downs. The Ramuz marriage was during a double-wedding ceremony since one of Mrs. Ramuz's sisters was also married at the same time to Bert Mackay. The Bert Mackay later moved to Canada. They are deceased.

Mr. and Mrs. Ramuz were born in Switzerland. Mrs. Ramuz came with her parents, brothers and sisters to Hagerman, N. M. Her parents were Mr. and Mrs. Jean

(John) P. Latten. Mr. Ramuz came with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Louis Ramuz, to Loving, N. M.

The couple spent most of their years in the Pecos Valley where they operated ranches.

Mrs. Johnson says her parents do not desire any special attention on the 60th anniversary, but that some close friends are expected to call to wish them well.

This is a critical time when Communist propaganda throughout the world claims that democracy is failing because often one-half of the citizens of this great country do not vote. In the free countries of Europe, the percentage of those voting far surpasses that in the United States. In the countries behind the Iron Curtain people cannot exercise the privilege of the ballot. We must demonstrate to the entire world that the United States has confidence in its way of life by fully exercising our franchise.

Local Cable Television Viewing Threatened By FCC

On Feb. 7, 1960, the Federal Communications Commission is planning prohibitions which in the future could affect the cable TV viewers in the Lincoln County area.

According to Fred Volquardsen, Manager of the Ruidoso Cable TV, the new rules, will, in effect, tell all cable subscribers which programs they can watch and which programs they cannot watch.

"Our subscribers may have to miss some of their favorite programs if the new rules go into effect," he said.

In the Communications Act of 1934, Congress authorized the control of broadcasting to insure the public of as much service as possible. However, new FCC rules may severely curtail service in New Mexico.

The Ruidoso Cable system has been in operation for many years. Curtailment of its services would affect not only TV viewers, but the local economy as a whole.

Surprisingly, the FCC has previously stated that it has no control over CATV. In fact, the regulatory agency was twice turned down by Congress in bids for such authority.

However, on April 23, 1958, the FCC suddenly stated that it needed Congressional approval, claiming that it already has authority to control cable TV. As a practical matter the FCC gave an ultimatum to Congress: Either pass CATV legislation by the end of the 1965 Congressional session or the FCC rules will be put into effect.

Embodied in the busiest session in recent years, Congress has been unable to act on this question. Thus, the FCC has indicated it will now adopt its new rules on or about Feb. 7, 1960.

Mr. Volquardsen says that the FCC is exceeding its authority. "No regulatory agency has ever before been allowed to dictate to the viewing public," he added.

We feel that poison is a hazard to domestic animals and pets, and not especially selective for use in areas where game animals and birds may be affected.

This Association wants to offer its free assistance toward following up all complaints that we receive regarding predator nuisances and ask that the State's ranchers and farmers call on us first rather than a tax supported agency. Their complaints would then be carried in our monthly bulletin.

We also would like to be contacted by any sportsman in New Mexico interested in bound hunting, greyhound hunting, predator calling and live trapping to join our association and assist us in this endeavor. We feel it is not good sense to use tax dollars to get a job done when the State's sportsmen are willing to do free for the sake of the sport, not to mention the additional license revenues which might be realized by this approach.

The New Mexico Wildlife and Conservation likewise is in complete support of this program.

By the 15th action-packed episode, I was getting a little shell-shocked, too. For instance, I can't remember if in the last episode America's No. 1 crime fighter took off his cape and doffed his Batman and revealed his true identity to his girl friend.
And I'm not going back to find out.

15 Subdivisions Included In Proposed Sewer District

An expansion of Ruidoso's sewer system, as proposed in a new assessment sewer district, will serve approximately 1,000 lots in 15 subdivisions in the northern part of the community. Engineer Quinton Daniel told the Ruidoso board of trustees in its meeting Thursday night last week that an abstract firm is at work now compiling a list of names of owners of the property in the area to be covered by the additional lines. Work may get underway on the proposed expansion later this year if it is not rejected in a hearing that is to be held. A hearing on the proposal will be scheduled and advertised so that all property owners may know of it, and the estimated cost to the property involved will be outlined in the public meeting. It more than half the property owned is represented by protest—the district may not be set up. Or, the district may be realigned to cover those areas where there was not more than half the property represented by protests. Village Manager Jim Hine displayed a map last weekend in the city hall which noted the proposed sewer lines would serve all or portions of these subdivisions: Highwood, Indian Hills, Country Club Estates, White Mountain Estates, Town & Country, Cree Meadow Heights First, Second and Third additions, Enchanted Hills, Mountain Shadows, Cree Meadow Country Club Subdivision, Buckner's Subdivision, Young Heights and Ponderosa Heights.

White Given 2-Year Renewal Of Contract

The Ruidoso School Board in executive session during the regular board meeting Jan. 13, renewed Supt. George P. White's contract for a period of two years. The board stated that the renewal of the contract was, "in recognition of a job well done".

The following board members were present for the meeting: Ralph Polly, president; Dave Parks, Jack Jennings, Dr. Howard Tate and Mrs. Gerald Tully.

White presented a two-year comparison of actual operational budget expenditures net operational cost per pupil for the 1963-64 through the 1964-65 school years prepared by Harry Wugalter, chief, public school finance division, State Department of Education. The report showed a net operational cost per pupil in Ruidoso at \$415 for the 1964-65 school year. The cost per pupil in Carrizozo, \$584; Corona, \$645; Hondo, \$475, and Capitan, \$518. Membership count as of Jan. 10, showed 935 pupils enrolled in Ruidoso schools.

White also made a report on the proposed methods of changing the state tax revenue in order to provide more funds for local school districts and asked for an expression from the board on the petition now being circulated by the New Mexico Education Association. After some discussion the board endorsed the suggestions made by the State School Board Association: (1) Basic support of \$268 W. A. D. M. (weighted average daily membership). (2) A training and experience distribution factor of not less than \$400 per month for teachers with M. A. degrees and \$50 per year up to 15 years for experience. (3) Permissive legislation for the purpose of increasing local financial support. (4) Incentive program of distribution of state funds that recognizes ability and effort of the local school district.



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GAME AND FISH NEWS

Mountain Water Conditions Favorable

Warren McNall, Southeast Area Fisheries Biologist, composed the following report on mountain water conditions following a trip through the area last week. Nogal Lake, located near Captain, presently has about eight feet of water and is receiving water diverted from Bonito Lake. There are about two inches of ice on the lake and fishermen may find ice thickness sufficient this coming week-end to afford trout fishing through the ice if the cold weather persists. There should be a minimum of four inches of ice on the lake before fishermen attempt walking on the lake and the Department takes no responsibility for "dunked fishermen."

Bonito Lake is about 70 percent ice covered and overflowing. No fishing is allowed until May 7, 1966. Alto Lake is overflowing and Eagle Creek, the main tributary, is flowing about three cubic feet of water per second. Ice covers about 80 percent of the lake.

The Ruidoso River presently looks like a true Rocky Mountain trout stream. Water flow is about 12 cubic feet of water per second. The stream improvement structures placed in the river during recent years have greatly enhanced the appearance of the river and improved its suitability for rainbow trout. Trout were planted in the Ruidoso Jan. 17.



FOUR ARE NAMED ON AVIATION BOARD

Four persons have been named on a new village airport advisory board, set up under Resolution No. 283 passed at the last session of the board of trustees.

Named on the board are Bill McCarty, a trustee, Sunny Edwards, Dr. Don Simms and R. H. Hedgecock.

Portions of the resolution, which outlines the purposes of the board, follow:

"The Board shall consist of not less than three nor more than five members who shall be appointed by the Mayor with the advice and consent of the other members of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso. Upon appointment the members of the Board shall serve until their successors are appointed, and all vacancies shall be filled by the Mayor and Board of Trustees.

"The Board shall choose one of its members as chairman, and the Village Clerk shall act as secretary of the Board but shall not be a member of the Board.

"The Board may adopt and, from time to time, amend its rules of procedure.

"The Board shall act only in an

advisory capacity to the Mayor and Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso; and the members of the board shall serve without compensation.

"The Board's duties shall include, but not be limited to, making recommendations for future construction and improvements necessary to maintain, operate and regulate the Ruidoso Municipal Airport; the necessity for additional air navigation facilities and airport protection facilities; the need for additional services and safety measures for the better protection and comfort of the public; and may make recommendations with regard to airport personnel, records, and the overall financial operation of the airport. (It being the present intention of the Board of Trustees that the Board shall study all matters pertaining to the airport and give the Board of Trustees the benefit of the Board's advice and recommendations relative thereto.)"



CHAMBER OF COMMERCE NEWS LETTER IS OPTIMISTIC

MUCH BETTER FISHING YEAR IN PROSPECT FOR THIS AREA

(Editor's Note: Of interest to others besides members of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, especially those persons who subscribe to the News living in other parts of the Southwest, are some of the items appearing in last week's news letter issued by the C. of C. These items are picked from the letter issued by Manager Bob Walker.)

Reports from Charlie Cockerell of Ruidoso and Ralph Little of Santa Fe, both with the state game and fish department indicate a much better fishing year than ever before.

Bonito Lake will open on May 7 this year and he open until the end of November—quite an increase in season—with NO CHARGE for fishing (other than license). The game and fish department will be operating the lake, and to make the NO CHARGE possible, there will be no camping on the lake. Camping will be in the new Forest Service South Fork Campsite—and other forest sites. By eliminating camping on the lake and the litter that goes with it (even legitimate garbage) the department hopes to be able to afford to continue the free fishing. Hours on the lake will be 5 a. m. to 9 p. m. each day. The department expects to increase stocking allotments for the lake by 75% to 80% over previous years.

Alto Lake will also have new hours; this year—from 5 a. m. to 7 p. m.—an increase of two hours each day.


