

Ruidoso Village Trustees Thursday took under advisement purchase of a gas tank truck from L. F. (Jack) Jennings, local Standard Chevrolet dealer, which is in use at the airport. The village pays Jennings \$100 per month rent on the truck. He was successful low bidder on sale of high octane fuel for planes to the city. The truck has been offered the city for \$450, but needs considerable work. A new chassis is recommended. Village Manager-Clerk Jim Hine reported. MRS. INICE HUST Hust Candidate For Second Term As Clerk

Mrs. Inice Hust has announced that she will be a candidate for nomination on the Republican ticket for re-election to the office of Lincoln County Clerk.

Ruidoso's board of trustees passed two ordinances Thursday night in regular session, one to issue \$80,000 in recreation revenue bonds to help match a \$87,000 federal grant for improvement and added facilities in School House Park here. A swimming pool, tennis courts, nature trail, all-purpose court, parking area and other recreation needs will be installed in the park, with construction expected to begin this spring. Money to pay off the \$80,000 revenue bond issue will come from the 1c per pack cigarette tax. The other ordinance would allow use of money from the city sales tax to assist in retiring the recreation revenue bonds if needed. (Both ordinances are published in today's News.)

Trustees heard a discussion on the need for issuance of a franchise to Southern Union Gas Co. to bring natural gas service to Ruidoso. The plea was made by Gene Little, former resident here, who said he would benefit from sale of by-products from natural gas that would be consumed here—and that the more Southern Union sold to consumers in a new area, the more his business would prosper. The council said they would study his plea, but would prefer hearing such a plea direct from Southern Union officials. A franchise for natural gas service here was granted Joseph S. Hawkins about a year ago, and Little said in the meeting Thursday night it appeared Hawkins would not be able to exercise his franchise. It was also brought out that the village could issue two or more franchises, but that the State Corporation Commission would grant a permit to only one franchise holder, if it was proven one was sufficient and could make performance. Little declared to the council that Hawkins has not applied for a permit.


First Hearing May Be In March On Sewer District

The first of two hearings on formation of a sewer assessment district to cover 1,000 lots owned by 850 property owners in 15 subdivisions in the north part of Ruidoso will likely be held in March this year the village council was told in its meeting Thursday night here.

Quinton Daniel, village engineer; Darrell Fowler, bonding agent representing Sierra Brothers & Co., and village attorney John Thompson reviewed the proposed assessment district and some of the steps still necessary to implement the project.

It was agreed March would be the earliest when the initial hearing could be held. A second hearing at which property owners will be told the approximate cost to them of the sewer service, will be set later in the spring. It was indicated whether the assessment will be made on a front foot basis or zone has yet to be decided, engineer Daniel said. Both methods have advantages and disadvantages, Fowler reported.

Fowler was present at the meeting to work with the council also on passage of ordinances allowing issuance of revenue bonds as matching funds for a recreation project here, as reported in another article in today's News.

'Zozo Soldier Is Killed In Viet Nam

The Defense Dept. Monday identified a Carrizozo man as one of 23 servicemen killed in Viet Nam.

The victim was Army Spec. 4 Carlos Zamora, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Carlos Zamora.

He is the second Lincoln County serviceman to lose his life in the war in Southeast Asia. Last year the son of a Captain family, and a former student in Ruidoso schools, Lavon S. Wilson, 21, was killed in action there.

Skier Wasn't Lost Despite Headlines

At the request of Noble's father, Felix Noblet, an airplane was sent up to seek the youth. He was finally spotted late Saturday afternoon only 150 yards from the ski area.

"He had turned around and climbed back up out of a canyon he was in and by the time we found him he was almost at the ski area," explained Walker. "He was fatigued and hungry, but otherwise seemed alright." R. H. Hedgecock piloted the search plane.

Despite the fact that Noblet had no overnight camping gear, Walker said the youth apparently got through the night's zero temperatures with no problems. Noblet was accompanied off the mountainside by Forest Ranger Barry Hood, Roy Parker, ski area manager, and Jim Isham, also of the ski area.

Describing Noblet's dress and also a discussion held with Noblet's friends, Walker said he believed the young man came here to spend a night in the snow and that he knew where he was all the time and at no time he was lost.

Pritchett Offers Candidacy For Judge

Austin Pritchett last week filed as a candidate for village magistrate in Ruidoso, and said he also plans to file for the office of Justice of the Peace in Precinct 19, subject to the Democratic primary in May.

Pritchett, a retired assistant postmaster from El Paso, has made Ruidoso his home the last several years, but has owned a vacation home in Ruidoso for ten years. He retired from civil service in 1963.

He is a member of the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Rotary Club here. Currently he is serving as president of the White Mountain Jeep Club, an organization of owners of four-wheel drive vehicles who serve in many capacities here, from assisting in search and rescue missions to serving as motor tour guides for visiting convention-goers on occasions. Pritchett says he will endeavor to serve all alike if elected to either or both positions. He has had many years experience working with the public in his post office position in El Paso. He once served in the U. S. Marine Corps, and held the rank of sergeant upon his discharge. He invites consideration of his candidacy for the two offices.

Legal Notice

ORDINANCE NO. 66-2
AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR THE USE OF A PORTION OF THE PROCEEDS OF THE SALES TAX AND OF THE REVENUES FROM A MUNICIPAL SWIMMING POOL IN THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO; PRESCRIBING THE USE OF SAID FUNDS IN CONNECTION WITH BONDS TO BE ISSUED TO PAY FOR THE CONSTRUCTION OF A MUNICIPAL SWIMMING POOL IN SAID VILLAGE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, has made and adopted on the 27th day of January, 1966, an Ordinance for the issuance and sale of recreational improvement revenue bonds, the proceeds to be used for the construction of a municipal swimming pool; and WHEREAS, in order to insure that said bonds and the interest thereon shall be paid according to their terms, and in consideration of the general benefits that will be conferred on the Village at large, the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, deems it necessary and desirable to provide for the use of a portion of the proceeds of the Village sales tax and of the revenue to be derived from the said swimming pool;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. That for the purpose of insuring the prompt payment of the principal of and interest on Village of Ruidoso Recreational Improvement Revenue Bonds, Series February 1, 1966, and in consideration of the general benefits conferred on the Village by the construction of said swimming pool, the Village hereby agrees to deposit into the Juvenile Recreation Fund, as designated by Section 6 of Ordinance No. 66-1 of the Village of Ruidoso sufficient funds to provide for the payments into the Recreational Revenue Bond, Interest and Sinking Fund, and Reserve Fund, as required by said Section 6 of said Ordinance No. 66-1. The Village further agrees to deposit into such Juvenile Recreation Fund such additional sums as may be necessary to provide a total deposit into such fund annually an amount equal to 1.75 times the amount necessary to meet principal and interest payments on the Village's Recreational Revenue Bonds, Series February 1, 1966. Payments into such fund shall be made from (1) the entire net proceeds of the New Mexico tax on the sale of cigarettes distributed to the Village; (2) the entire net proceeds of the operation of the swimming pool to be constructed from the bonds so issued; and (3) any deficiency both in the monthly payments required by Section 6 of Ordinance No. 66-1, as above specified, and the annual payment herein required shall be made up from proceeds of the Village sales tax in such amounts as may be necessary.

Section 2. Any holder of any of said bonds or the coupons thereof may by appropriate proceedings in a court of competent jurisdiction protest the lien and pledge created by this ordinance on any of the revenues in said fund, and may compel the performance of any duty imposed upon said Village by the provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 3. The officers of the Village of Ruidoso are hereby authorized and directed to take all action necessary or appropriate to effectuate the provisions of this Ordinance.

Section 4. If any one or more sections or parts of this Ordinance shall be adjudged unenforceable or invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remaining provisions of this Ordinance, it being the intention that the various provisions hereof are severable.

Section 5. All ordinances, or parts thereof, in conflict with provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 6. This Ordinance is declared an emergency measure, on the ground of urgent public need, and it shall go into effect five days after its publication as provided by law.

The Retail Merchants of Ruidoso, Hollywood, Green Tree and the Ruidoso and Honda Valleys formed a permanent organization with the following directors elected: Mills McCoy, Bill Hart, Raymond Buckner, Roy Anderson, George Fuchs, Maurine Badillo and H. F. Ellis.

Who, because of his religion, was sent to Auschwitz and other infamous concentration camps by the Nazis. As a result of man's inhumanity to man he lost his wife, father, mother and brother. Also as a result of these horrible experiences he developed a school of psychotherapy which says that a man suffers mental and emotional problems because of a failure "to find meaning and a sense of responsibility to his existence." Frankl is fond of saying, "He who has a why to live can bear with almost any how."

This book, "Man's Search for Meaning," tells some of Dr. Frankl's experiences in the concentration camps and how these experiences influenced his scientific work. I recommend highly that you get it (it is in paperback) and read it. You will be richly rewarded.

Dr. Frankl solves one problem that has always puzzled me; how could the guards and other officials of the concentration camp treat fellow human beings as callously and brutally as they did? Did they have no human emotions, no sympathy, no pity? Why were they not moved by the terrible sufferings of other men?

The answer says Dr. Frankl, is very simple. The prisoners were not human beings in the eyes of their captors—they were numbers! As he puts it, "The authorities were interested only in the captive's numbers. These numbers were often tattooed on their skins, and also had to be sewn to a certain spot on their clothing. Any guard who wanted to make a charge against a prisoner just glanced at his number . . . he never asked for his name. A man counted only because he had a prison number. One literally became a number; dead or alive—that was unimportant; the life of a 'number' was completely irrelevant. What stood behind that number and that life mattered even less . . ."

Thus, the captives were no longer men, children of the living God. They were numbers. Things to be used and abused as one does a tool or any other inanimate object. The guards treated the prisoners so horribly because they saw them as things, not as men!

The moral is as subtle as a sledgehammer! Many of the failures in human relations are caused by our insane, stubborn, and sinful insistence upon treating other human beings, not as people, but as things. We see them as "things" to be used and manipulated to our selfish advantage rather than as the most stupendous things in all creation—human beings.

Here is a father who treats his sons, not as persons in their own right, but as extensions of his own ego. Here is a child who sees his parents, not as unique human beings, but as things whose task it is to fulfill his every wish and gratification. Here is a man who insists on classifying people and giving them "labels": "nigger", "whitney", "liberal", "extranist". When we do these things we are but a step away from concentration camps and gas chambers.

One of the magnificent aspects of Jesus' ministry was his stubborn insistence upon treating people as people; never as means to an end, but as ends in themselves. He insisted upon treating sinners, publicans and moral outcasts as people, made in the image of God, worthy of the greatest respect and honor. Thus he was able to mediate to them the love of God. His enemies could never forgive Jesus for this.

We have a great lesson to learn from Jesus. We need to learn once again to see people as people, unique and wonderful. When we can learn this lesson we will have come a long way toward solving our problems of living together.

County Agent's Report

The latest developments in Fruit Growing will be discussed at the Fruit Meeting to be held at the Hondo School next Wednesday, Feb. 9 at 7:30 p.m. The program will include Fruit Tree Diseases of New Mexico by Emroy L. Shannon, Extension Plant Pathologist; Orchard Record Keeping by Gene Ott, Extension Farm Management Specialist; Applying Insecticides by John Durkin, Extension Entomologist, and Renovation of Orchards, by Doug Bryant, Extension Horticulturist.
All fruit growers are urged to attend.
The meeting last Thursday on the repairs to the Community Ditch Systems was well attended by the ditch owners. Representatives from the State Planning Office, Soil Conservation Service, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and Farmers Home Administration explained to the group the status of the emergency flood repair program and the helps available from their agencies.
Peter J. Hayes, State Coordinator for the Office of Emergency Planning explained to the group the plans for repairing the Community Ditch System. The present status of the plans for the repairs to the Community Ditch System was clarified. Herman McKibben said that the A. C. P. flood repairs program was extended into 1966.
Community Ditch Association can do the repairs to their ditches if they make a project application to the office of Emergency Planning. Project applications are available in the County Agents Office for those who want to apply.
The 24 Community Ditches have three choices in repairing their ditches. The first choice is to have the repair to ditch system planned and contracts let by the Soil Conservation Service as originally planned. The second choice is to have the Ditch Association to have the ditch repaired and let the Soil Conservation Service plan and let contracts for the Division Dam. The third choice is for the Ditch Association to have all the repairs done.

Superintendents Study Tax Percentages
Superintendent George P. White met with other Lincoln County school superintendents in Captain Wednesday morning this week to work out percentages to school districts for the five mill county levy. Superintendents present at the meeting were William Hall, Corona; Fermin Montes, Hondo; Duane Darling, Captain, and Ellison Glenn, Carrizozo.
The full county assessment figure on which the five mill school levy is based is \$22,983,274 which includes assessments within the Ruidoso school district of \$7,036,270 as of Dec. 31, 1965, White reported.
The meeting Wednesday of the five superintendents was to work out percentage figures for each of the five school districts. Preliminary estimates figured 40 percent of the five mill county levy to the Ruidoso Municipal School District and the balance of 60 percent will go to the other four county school districts based on their estimated enrollment for the fiscal year, White said.

Joyce Faux, New Mexico State, folk dance specialist, and Fred Hinger, square dance expert and state director of health, P.E. and recreation from Santa Fe, conducted a dance clinic.
Highlight of the meet was the honoring of a scholarship for New Mexico girl students who wish to major in physical education. The award is to be known as the Mercedes Guggisburg scholarship fund honoring a pioneer women's PE instructor at the University of New Mexico.



"The members of the Board of Trustees wish to commend" all members of the Volunteer Fire Department for their unselfish acts and genuine interests in the Village of Ruidoso. Without you, our insurance rates and property loss due to fires would be tremendous. Thanks for a job well done and we assure you of our future cooperation regarding your volunteer status.

"It is hereby publicly acknowledged that the Governing Body of the Village of Ruidoso is very pleased to announce that the necessary financial obligations have been ordered to be included in the 1966-67 fiscal year budget. This obligation amounts to approximately \$10,000.00 to be provided for from the General Fund to pay salaries and a portion of the operating expenses of the department. As you are well aware, the operating expenses of the Department will increase approximately 300% due to the new White Mountain Fire Station and as a result of employing three men.

"The Governing Body wishes to thank the members of the Fire Planning Board for their cooperation as exemplified in their presentation of their Proposal for Paid Firemen, and makes these recommendations—

"1. That the Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department make a list of requirements which they deem necessary and proper for the selection of paid firemen. (i. e. Knowledge of the Fire Fighting Equipment, knowledge of the corporate limits, etc.)

"2. That the Firemen's Planning Board act as an 'employment agency' for the Governing Body of Ruidoso through its designated representative, James L. Hinc, and make recommendations for employment of job applicants to James L. Hinc.

"In the event any person serving on the Firemen's Planning Board becomes an applicant for employment as a paid fireman, the Chairman of the Firemen's Planning Board shall appoint someone else who is not an applicant to the Firemen's Planning Board. (It is suggested that all of your Executive Officers make up the membership of the Firemen's Planning Board.)

"3. That all salaried employees of the Department will be subject to the rules and regulations as same apply to other employees of the Village of Ruidoso.

"4. That the salaried employees of the department will assist and cooperate with the Governing Body's representative in all matters of fire prevention, fire protection and the welfare of the citizens of Ruidoso and strive to assist all other departments of the Village in obtaining a lower and better rate of premiums on Fire Insurance; as follows:

"A. That standard service tests be conducted on all fire fighting apparatus at least two times a year, and that accurate records covering such tests be kept.





ORDINANCE NO. 66-1

AN ORDINANCE RATIFYING ALL ACTION TAKEN BY AND FOR THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO TOWARD ACQUISITION, CONSTRUCTION AND IMPROVEMENT OF RECREATIONAL FACILITIES DECLARING THE NECESSITY FOR ISSUING RECREATIONAL IMPROVEMENT REVENUE BONDS OF RUIDOSO NEW MEXICO IN THE PRINCIPAL AMOUNT OF \$400,000.00 PAYABLE OUT OF THE NET INCOME TO BE DERIVED BY SAID VILLAGE FROM THE NEW MEXICO CIGARETTE TAX FOR THE PURPOSE OF ACQUIRING, CONSTRUCTING AND IMPROVING RECREATIONAL FACILITIES IN SAID VILLAGE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF SUCH BONDS PROVIDING FOR THE PAYMENT THEREOF AND THE INTEREST THEREON AND OTHER DETAILS IN CONNECTION WITH THE ISSUANCE AND PAYMENT OF SAID BONDS REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES, RESOLUTIONS OR PARTS THEREOF IN CONFLICT HEREWITH AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY WHEREAS the New Mexico Cigarette Tax Law adopted by Chapter 203, Laws of New Mexico 1955, provides for the assessment and collection of a special tax upon the sale of cigarettes sold within the said State and for a distribution of a part of such tax to the municipalities in the state and

WHEREAS Chapter 88 Laws of New Mexico 1965, provides that the proceeds of such cigarette taxes so distributed shall be used exclusively for recreational facilities within the municipalities receiving such taxes, with the proviso that no such revenue shall be used for recreational facilities which exclude the use of such facilities by persons under twenty-one years of age and

WHEREAS said Chapter 88 provides that municipalities receiving such cigarette taxes may issue revenue bonds payable solely out of the net income to be derived from such cigarette taxes and

WHEREAS the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso has determined to issue the revenue bonds hereinafter specified for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and improving recreational facilities in said Village of Ruidoso

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO NEW MEXICO

Section 1 That all action (not inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance) heretofore taken by the Board of Trustees of the Village of Ruidoso and the officers thereof directed toward the acquisition, construction and improvement of recreational facilities be and the same hereby is ratified approved and confirmed.

Section 2 That the public interest and necessity demand the acquisition, construction and improvement of recreational facilities in the Village of Ruidoso Lincoln County New Mexico and it is hereby declared necessary that said Village issue its Village of Ruidoso Recreational Improvement Revenue Bonds in the principal amount of \$400,000.00, which bonds shall be payable solely out of the net income to be derived from the New Mexico Cigarette Tax distributed to said Village for the payment of the bonds herein authorized, and the interest thereon, the proceeds of such bonds to be used solely for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and improving said recreational facilities.

Section 3 That to provide the funds and to meet the cost of such facilities, bonds of the Village of Ruidoso, to be known as Village of Ruidoso Recreational Improvement Revenue Bonds, Series 1966, are hereby authorized to be issued in the aggregate principal amount of \$400,000.00, pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 88, Laws of New Mexico, 1965, and all other laws thereto enabling.

Section 4 That said bonds shall be dated February 1, 1966, and shall be payable in regular numerical order, \$5,000.00 on the first day of February in each of the years 1967 to 1982, inclusive.

Said bonds shall bear interest payable February 1 and August 1 each year, as follows:

MATURITIES

1967 to 1971, inclusive 4%
1972 to 1982, inclusive 4 1/2%

Bonds maturing in the year 1977 and thereafter shall be redeemable at the option of the Village on February 1, 1978, and on interest dates thereafter in inverse numerical order at par, accrued interest and a premium of three per cent of principal. Notice of bonds to be redeemed shall be published once in a newspaper of general circulation

Section 5 That the Village of Ruidoso, New Mexico, and shall be mailed to the original purchaser of the bonds, both at least 30 days before the date of redemption.

Said bonds shall be in the denomination of \$1,000.00 each, numbered 1 to 400, inclusive, shall be payable principal and interest, in lawful money of the United States of America without deduction for exchange or collection charges, at the office of Village Treasurer, Ruidoso New Mexico, shall be negotiable coupon bonds payable to bearer and each of said bonds shall contain a recital that it is issued pursuant to the provisions of said Chapter 88, Laws of the State of New Mexico 1965, and all other laws thereto enabling, shall be signed in the name of the Village of Ruidoso by the Mayor and attested by the Village Clerk, with the seal of the Village affixed thereto and the interest coupons attached thereto shall be authenticated by the facsimile signature of the Village Treasurer.

Section 6 That said bonds and the coupons attached thereto shall be substantially the following:

The Village of Ruidoso, in the County of Lincoln and State of New Mexico, hereby acknowledges itself indebted and for value received promises to pay to the bearer hereof

on the 1st day of February, and to pay interest thereon at the rate of _____ per annum as evidenced by the coupons attached hereto, payable semi-annually on the 1st day of February and the 1st day of August each year commencing August 1, 1966, on surrender of such coupons as they severally become due and thereafter, until this bond is paid. Both principal and interest on this bond are payable in lawful money of the United States of America, free of exchange or collection charges at the office of the Village Treasurer, Ruidoso, New Mexico.

The holder of this bond may not look to any general or other fund of said Village for the payment of principal or interest on this obligation, this bond being payable and collectible solely from the income so pledged.

This bond is issued for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and improving recreational facilities in the Village of Ruidoso, and is issued under and in strict compliance with the provisions of Chapter 88, Laws of New Mexico, 1965, and all other laws thereto enabling.

It is hereby certified that all conditions, acts and things required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of New Mexico to exist, to have happened and have been performed, precedent to and in the issuance of this bond, exist, have happened and have been performed, and that the issue of bonds of which this is one does not exceed any limitation prescribed by the Constitution or Laws of the State of New Mexico.

Section 6. All of the income and revenue to be derived by the Village from said New Mexico Cigarette Tax shall be placed in a special fund designated the "Juvenile Recreation Fund." So long as bonds of this issue are outstanding, for the purpose of paying the interest on and principal of said bonds and a reserve therefor, the Village Treasurer shall, each month, commencing February 1, 1966, withdraw from the Juvenile Recreation Fund one-sixth (1/6th) of semi-annual interest next due, one-twelfth (1/12th) of principal next due, and deposit the same in a special account entitled "Village of Ruidoso Recreational Revenue Bond, Interest and Sinking Fund, Series February 1, 1966", in the Ruidoso State Bank, Ruidoso, New Mexico. At the same time the Village Treasurer shall withdraw from said fund the sum of \$137.00 to be placed in a special account entitled "Village of Ruidoso Recreational Revenue Bond, Reserve Fund, Series February 1, 1966". Such sums shall be deposited until such account reaches the sum of \$2,200.00, at which time no further deposits need be made unless the account is depleted to pay principal of or interest on the bonds herein issued. In such event monthly payments shall resume until the account again reaches the sum of \$2,200.00. After said monthly payments, Cigarette Tax moneys in the Juvenile Recreational Fund may be used to pay operation and maintenance expenses of the recreational facilities, or for prior redemption of said bonds, or for recreational facilities.

If collections are not sufficient to pay principal of and interest due on said bonds in any year, the pledge or revenue herein specified shall continue until all of said bonds shall be paid, and bonds shall continue to bear interest as carried on said bonds until paid.

Section 7. So long as any of said bonds remain outstanding, the Village shall not issue any additional bonds having a lien on the income in said Juvenile Recreation Fund, which lien shall be superior to or on a parity with the lien of the bonds authorized herein.

Nothing in this Ordinance contained shall be construed in such a manner as to prevent the issuance by the Village of additional bonds or other obligations payable from the income or any revenues derived from the operation of the recreational facilities and the New Mexico Cigarette Tax and constituting a junior lien upon said revenue.

Section 8. That the bonds herein authorized shall be sold and delivered to Stern Brothers & Co., Albuquerque, New Mexico, for cash, at par plus accrued interest. The proceeds from the sale of the bonds shall be deposited promptly in a separate account in the Ruidoso State Bank, and said proceeds shall be used solely for the purpose specified in this Ordinance.

Section 9. That on written request the Village shall furnish Stern Brothers & Co. complete operating and income statements of the said Juvenile Recreational Fund, in reasonable detail, covering any designated period, and within ninety days after the close of each fiscal year, the Village shall cause to be prepared a complete financial audit of said Fund covering said fiscal year, such audit to be certified by an independent registered accountant. A true and correct copy of such audit shall be promptly mailed to said Company. Said annual audit shall be in substantially the same form as is required by Ordinances and Resolutions authorizing revenue bonds of municipalities, and shall show, among other things, whether or not the Village has complied with all of the requirements of this Ordinance.

Section 10. The provisions of this Ordinance shall constitute a contract between the Village and the owners and holders of said bonds or any of them, and such owners and holders or any of them may compel compliance with such provisions in any court of competent jurisdiction.

Section 11. All costs and expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of bonds as provided by this Ordinance shall be paid exclusively from the proceeds of, and in no event shall any of such costs or expenses be paid out of or charged to the general funds or tax levy of said Village.

Section 12. That if any one or more sections or parts of this Ordinance shall be judicially held to be invalid or unenforceable, such judgment shall not affect, impair

or invalidate the remaining provisions of this Ordinance, the intention being that each provision hereof is severable.

Section 13. The officers of said Village are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver all requested certificates, affidavits, and documents relating to the bonds authorized herein and the security thereof, and to take all steps and proceedings fully to carry out the intent and purpose of this Ordinance.

Section 14. All ordinances, resolutions, or parts thereof, in conflict or inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed to the extent only of such conflict or inconsistency.

Section 15. This Ordinance shall be and remain irrevocable until the bonds authorized herein and the interest thereon shall have been fully paid, satisfied and discharged as herein provided.

Section 16. This Ordinance is declared an emergency measure on the ground of urgent public need, and it shall go into effect five days after its publication, as provided by law.

This Ordinance was adopted by a two-thirds vote of all members elected to the Board of Trustees at a regular meeting of the Board of Trustees held on the 27th day of January, 1966, and approved by the Mayor on said date.
