

78 ELK RELEASED ON RESERVATION

A herd of 78 elk was released last week on the Mescalero Reservation. Through arrangements made by Mescalero Tribal officials with the National Park Service the herd was brought from Yellowstone National Park where elk is overstocked and released in Dry Canyon in the Rinconada section of the Mescalero Reservation. The elk were transported by large trailer truck, 40 to a load; the first load arrived Sunday, Jan. 30, and the second load was released Feb. 3. Two female yearlings in the second load were injured during the trip and had to be destroyed upon arrival here.

BANK DEPOSITS HERE UP OVER HALF MILLION LAST YEAR OVER 1964

Deposits in the Ruidoso State Bank increased more than half a million dollars, \$605,000 or 11% in 1965 over 1964 according to the annual financial statement sent to stockholders by mail last week. The report, prepared at the end of each year, carried this statement: "from T. B. Hood, president of equal importance was the increase in capital accounts of nearly \$50,000, or 10%. The increase in deposits reflects the growing economy of the area. Increase in capital accounts was accomplished by an increase in gross revenue because of growth of total assets, accompanied by carefully planned cost control measures made possible by more efficient equipment and a loyal and efficient staff. Per share earnings were \$3.82, of which 75 cents was paid in dividends and \$3.07 was retained as part of the Bank's capital structure, nation-wide as well as in our general area, is in a very certain status. You will see from the figures below that interest paid to depositors was a minor item of expense in 1965. This was before the recent well-publicized developments which will raise our interest rates even higher. We have, therefore, very reluctantly initiated a program to increase our loan revenue by some increases in our loan interest rates in order to offset the expense of this increased interest expense." 
**Unit 12 Members

Hiway 70 Meet Picks Leader From Roswell

John McLelland of Roswell was elected by acclamation as chairman of a committee to work for U. S. Highway 70 to be included in the federal Interstate System of Highways. McLelland was elected by delegations from Clovis, Portales, Roswell, Ruidoso, Mesalero, Tularosa, Alamogordo and Las Cruces who met Friday morning, Feb. 4, at the Chaparral Motor Hotel. The meeting was originally called for January 21, and rescheduled for Feb. 4, due to weather conditions. Approximately 100 city and county officials, Chamber of Commerce representatives and business leaders from the communities named attended the meeting.

John Sudderth, chairman of the New Mexico Highway Commission, addressed the meeting and explained that if the U. S. Congress extends the Defense of National Interstate and Defense Highways that U. S. 70 would be a natural choice and would be recommended by the State Highway Commission if local support is provided.

Acting on Sudderth's suggestion that an association be formed to support the choice of U. S. 70 as an Interstate Highway the group Friday made steps in that direction.

It was agreed that a committee would be formed with one representative from each county commission, one from each city or village council and one from each chamber of commerce. McLelland was chosen chairman of the committee and Bob Walker was elected co-chairman.

People are not slaves to circumstances. The situation and environment in which we find ourselves do not finally determine us. We can, in fact, choose how we will react in any given situation.

We can freely choose to react in a negative manner to the events of our lives. If these events have been, on the whole, good; if we have been blessed with favorable winds and sunny days, we can turn our back on them, misuse them, abuse them. The choice is ours to make.

If, on the other hand, we must face unfortunate and difficult times, we can react in a positive fashion. We can form out of the difficult events that have come our way a positive and constructive response. We can refrain and remold the dark areas of life by our own attitudes. The choice is ours.

It has always seemed to me that people are prone to use the unfortunate events of their lives as excuses. Excuses are never valid reasons. For example, people say, "When I was a child I was made to go to church by my parents. I had to go every time the doors were opened. I got all the church going I need then." There are reasons why one should not participate in worship but this is not one of them! Such an excuse means in essence that you have surrendered your freedom to choose your own response to a given set of circumstances. This is just one possible example.

There is one freedom that we do not have. That is the freedom not to make a choice. We cannot escape our duty to choose. Postponement of choice is in effect to make a choice. Responsibility to choose is part of what it means to be a man.

In the concentration camp some chose to surrender abjectly to their terrible circumstances and gave up the struggle for life. Others chose to turn upon their fellow prisoners as "stool pigeons". Others chose to live an men, with dignity and honor. How will you choose to live your life?

An unobtrusive headline in a national newspaper caught our editorial eye the other day and shook us up to the end. It proclaimed "Wisconsin Lagging in War on Poverty".

An examination of the story revealed that that state has indeed been lagging; and while all these Great Society programs are available those dumbbells from Wisconsin aren't taking advantage of them.

Now we think the state of Wisconsin owes the nation an explanation. Just why isn't Wisconsin performing its proper role in the War on Poverty?

After all, is it fair for one state in our Great Society to be so well off while the rest of us are standing around with holes in our pockets, wearing patched britches and living off food stamps.

Maybe, parts of New Mexico wouldn't have expanded so rapidly and property values doubled and tripled within the last few years if in some of those oldtimers hadn't been here when times were rough, laying a groundwork for a better life.

In my opinion, the oldtimer is the one who should have the credit and also any kind of a "tax break" for our great society rather than a government sponsored "great society" giving credit and cash reward to the ne'er-do-well and others of that ilk who do little or nothing to improve a community, except maybe "gripe" that they are being unfairly treated.

Dear Editor: Thought readers might not tire of one more letter reminding old timers of days gone by. Here are just a few:

Where the Pallo now stands or thereabouts was a small one-room grade school. My brother Joe and I were in the 7th grade and Constance Ward was in the first. Ufa Felts (now Ufa Moseller and still teaching in El Paso) was our teacher. I won't forget when we had to stay after school and learn our states and capitals by lamp light.

A few more years later there was the light plant under the hill from the Cable TV business now. Harry Eckert remembers he and Perry Bates were pretty busy carpenters in those days. Harry was even doing electrical work. One of the cabins he wired was that one owned by Mr. and Mrs. Ed Amoret. The cabin is still there across from the Ruidoso Lodge and has a sign atop "Tall Timber". Ruidoso Lodge owned by Alberts and the Navajo Lodge were the two lodges. Edith and Bob Boyce owned the Navajo.

"Old man Klofider" had a few horses to rent to tourists. He kept them tied to small pines right on the road about where Lonnie's Drive-In now operates.

There were two curio stores in the early days of Ruidoso's growth. Carter and Mr. and Mrs. Paul Mayer owned them. Lois Mayer made charm strings and many other gifts she sold and built her business to a big one. She had, and still has, many Indian friends and could buy from them the real jewelry and rugs to sell to her customers.

On down the river at Hollywood it is pleasant to remember the Fridenblooms who had the post office about where Hollywood Lumber now stands. Later when Brother and Madie Miller had the Hollywood P. O. in front of their home, now C. & L. Lumber Co. Brother put two silver spruces in front. They are still there and are beautiful. On down the valley near where Red Massey has his garage was the Beaver farm. They raised strawberries, vegetables, fruit and cabbage. Mrs. Beavers delivered milk up the river as far as Mrs. Lucille Dougherty's little store close to the Indian Reservation line.

Speaking of milk and vegetables, Mary Coe whose ranch was seven miles northeast of Ruidoso on Eagle Creek, would once a week in the summertime take butter, milk, butter, fresh corn and vegetables to Ruidoso in a "buggy" pulled by two big mules. "Old Bay" our school is as tastefully as not a few small kids would get to go and "peddle" to the good folks in the scattered cabins. The Alberts, "oldtimers are having it good..." Amoretta, Dufos, Swearingins, Bar-

I have your communication with reference to proposed regulations by the Federal Communications Commission of community antenna television systems. The House Subcommittee on Communications of the Interstate and Foreign Commerce Committee held hearings on H. R. 7715 during the First Session of the 89th Congress. This legislation would establish a national television policy and provide a method by which rules of the FCC with regard to CATV may be reviewed by the Congress before they become effective.

The Federal Communications Commission has scheduled a meeting for February 10 to draw up a report for submission to Congress. This report will be carefully and thoroughly reviewed by Congress before any further action is taken on H. R. 7715. I can appreciate your concern and you can be assured of my sincere interest in this matter. I shall certainly give my most careful study to the FCC's report and keep in mind at all times the best interests of the people of New Mexico.

Mr. Hawkins, W. Carlos Powell, Don Kirby, Nicholas Dazzo, Dick Waddell and Mr. Umhally met with the Public Service Commission in December to discuss the Natural Gas application. The Public Service Commission wants Captain, Carrizo and Ruidoso to be in the same hearing and the Ruidoso papers were drawn up waiting on Captain and Carrizo.

Some of the right-of-way work has already been done for the Natural Gas line. We can't start construction work until the weather moderates and that will be the last of May or the first of June. We will have Natural Gas to Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs by Sept. 30, 1966. If Captain and Carrizo do not complete their deal for gas we are prepared to bring it to Ruidoso regardless.

The name of the new natural gas company will be "Ruidoso Natural Gas Co." The stockholders at present are: W. Carlos Powell, Arthur Quinn, Joe Hawkins, Don Kirby, Nicholas Dazzo, Dick Waddell, Mr. Umhally and others.

A supply of natural gas has been arranged for from El Paso Natural Gas Co. Their line lays approximately 53 miles north of Ruidoso. The pressure supply is more than adequate and the size line planned will serve Ruidoso and area until it reaches 30,000 permanent population.

The named stockholders have put up money and Mr. Hawkins has been paid for part of his equity. Mr. Hawkins is keeping the tank delivery of Propane as a business separate from the natural gas utility. Mr. Hawkins does not own a certificate for gas but the corporation has been issued by the Public Service Commission.


Catholic Priest Heads Ministers



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Lincoln Woman, Near 85, Recalls County's War

(From Alamogordo Daily News) Recollections of the Lincoln County War are still vivid in the mind of Mrs. Rufina Montoya Maes, pioneer resident of Lincoln, where she was born almost 85 years ago and where she still presides as matriarch of a large clan of descendants.

Mrs. Maes, who will observe her 85th birthday April 6 of this year, was the daughter of Lucio and Maria Inez Montoya, and her father from whom she heard the stories of the Lincoln County War she still remembers, figured in the stormy activity of that period of the area's early history.

As a matter of fact, Lucio Montoya has been reported killed in the fighting attendant to the struggle for control of the Lincoln county economy, notably in a book written by Walter Noble Burns, "The Saga of Billy the Kid." Burns wrote, to the amusement of Mrs. Maes and other members of the family, that Lucio Montoya and Frank Crawford were shot and killed on a hill south of Lincoln by a man named Herrera.

Actually, Mrs. Maes recalls, her father died at her home in Lincoln, of natural causes, in 1928, although Crawford was shot and killed instantly in the affray mentioned.

Mrs. Maes remembers that her father related that he and Crawford had had trouble of some sort in Lincoln the preceding night, but he was reticent over details. He did say that he barely escaped with his life after Crawford was killed. Montoya said that years later, when queried by Burns regarding events of the time, he told the writer he didn't remember.

"My daddy said he'd rather by-gones be by-gones," Mrs. Maes recalls.

Nowadays, however, Mrs. Maes is more interested in her expanding group of grandchildren and great-grandchildren, and the more recent addition to the clan—great-grandson Steve Shorter, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Steve Shorter, Sr., of 1101 Bellamah Drive, Alamogordo.

Mrs. Maes' husband, Enrique, passed away in Lincoln May 31, 1944. She has four sons and two daughters, Hilario Maes and Mrs.

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


