

Lincoln County Paired with Otero In Sharing Two State Senators

Lincoln County has been paired with Otero, in a new redistricting plan for election of state senators. The newest arrangement, which nullifies one previously passed by the state legislature in which Lincoln was paired with Torrance County, was announced last week-end by a three-judge federal court commission at Santa Fe.

Advices from Santa Fe were that senatorial terms under the court's plan would be for four years, and that candidates in multi-county districts—such as the Otero-Lincoln district set up—would run on a strictly at-large basis, without geographical limitation.

The filing date for candidates is April 1, moved back from the original March 1 deadline to allow the court to review the legislature's plan.

The court's plan is to be in effect for the 1968 elections and until the legislature alters it, if the houses choose to do so.

The plan also can be changed by amendments to the New Mexico Constitution. The redistricting provides for 39 districts with 42 members. The legislature's plan also provided for 42 members.

The three-judge federal court panel ruled Thursday in a 3-1 split decision that the Teaportionment plan from the legislature did not "closely enough meet the standards set down by the U. S. Supreme Court."

The panel's 49 districts compare with 31 districts in the legislature's plan.

The court said it adopted the legislature's determination of districts except where it believed discrimination would result.

U. S. Dist. Court Judge H. Vearle Payne of Albuquerque and U. S. Circuit Court Judge Oliver Beth of Santa Fe issued the majority opinion.

U. S. Dist. Court Judge Hatfield Chilson of Denver, in a dissenting opinion, said the legislature's reapportionment bill was not in violation of the U. S. Constitution.

"Therefore this court has no power or authority to establish its own plan of reapportionment," Judge Chilson said.

The court-approved plan has only one district where a county line is crossed by a district not composed of entire counties. This is Dist. 5 where one Senator will represent all of Los Alamos County and 10 voting divisions in Santa Fe County.

There are five multi-county districts with one senator each: Taos and Mora counties in Dist. 9; Union, Harding and Colfax counties in Dist. 10; Quay, Doña Ana and Gaudalupe in Dist. 11; Catron, Torrance and Socorro in Dist. 13; Hidalgo, Luna and Sierra in Dist. 28.

Multi-county districts electing two senators each, at large, include Rio Arriba and Sandoval in Dist. 8; Otero and Lincoln in Dist. 31, and Curry and Roosevelt in Dist. 12.

Chaves and Dona Ana counties each will have three senators, with two elected from designated areas and a third at large.

Chaves County Dists. 14-16 each will elect one senator. Dist. 15 includes the entire county with a senator elected at large.

Dona Ana County Dists. 23-24 each will elect one senator with a senator elected at large. . . . Counties with two districts, with each district electing one senator, include San Juan, McKinley, Santa Fe, Lea, Eddy and Valencia. . . . Single district one-senator counties are Grant and San Miguel. . . . Populous Bernalillo County will retain the 10 senators allotted to the county in the legislature's plan.

POLICE STUDY SHOOTING

Deputy Sheriff Clyde Atwood said early this week an investigation was still continuing in the shooting of Andrew Richardson of Ruidoso in his home here in Ponderosa Heights early Sunday morning. Richardson was in the hospital at mid-week receiving medical attention. He underwent surgery Sunday afternoon and is reported recuperating satisfactorily.

First officer on the scene, summoned about 9 a.m. Sunday, was Ruidoso policeman Jimmy Cunningham, who said he found Richardson on the bed and a 7-mm Mauser rifle on the floor beside the bed. A window pane was also

broken, he said. Cunningham answered a call to the Ruidoso police dispatcher that had been made by Richardson's brother, Philbert. Powder burns on an undershirt indicated the gun had been fired at close range. Deputy Atwood said. They said the bullet had entered the chest left of the heart and emerged from the back under the left arm. Policeman Cunningham said neighbors heard only one shot fired. None of the victim's family was at home at the time of the shooting.

The brother who found Richardson shot said the shooting must have occurred about 30 minutes before he arrived.

To Initiate 37 In Elks

Man's Death Due To Asphyxiation

An autopsy of a fire victim, John B. Stallings, 82-year-old Ruidoso Downs man, whose body was found early Sunday in the remains of his small home two blocks above Ruidoso Downs postoffice, determined that his death was due to inhalation of carbon monoxide and that there evidently had been no foul play.

The report was from Dr. A. S. Blauw of Roswell.

A coroner's jury, recessed after a session Sunday afternoon in which the study was ordered, is expected to be reconvened before the week's end to render its verdict.

State Police, who had continued a search and investigation of the blaze since Sunday reported they believed there was no arson.

In the inquest conducted Sunday afternoon at 5 p.m. at the Chapel of Roses mortuary in Palmer Gateway here, Assistant District Attorney Robert Sanderford questioned some of the witnesses for the coroner's jury—a few members of whom were witnesses themselves in the tragedy.

Justice of Peace Alton Gray impaneled the jury composed of Clavys Perry, Ron Shriver, Albert Jay, Claude Peterson, S. D. Scott and Elmer Barcus.

Perry, a neighbor of Stallings, said he and his wife were awakened about 2 a.m. Sunday by the sound of a muffled explosion, "sounding like a big firecracker exploding inside a big can," he described it. "It first thought maybe something had happened to a car of ours outside, but as I passed a window and looked out I saw the flames at the Stallings' house were ten or 12 feet

high." He said he tried to enter the house, thinking the elderly man was still in it, through a back door, and was able to open it by force. "It was either locked or stuck," he said. He told the others on the jury he had last seen Stallings alive Saturday morning about 10 a.m., and, in fact, might have been the last person to have seen him alive.

"He said he had been very ill, hadn't eaten for a day and a half and hadn't slept much, either, and that he thought he would go to Oklahoma on Saturday. When I told him it was Saturday he said he thought it was Thursday, but said he would make plans to go early the next morning," Perry said.

Sanderford asked Perry if he knew the man had much money about the premises, and he said his father had mentioned he had seen the fire victim with a large amount of currency—maybe as much as \$300, only a few days ago.

No one could shed any light on where the money, if he still had it, was. The body was very lightly clothed, and there was no evidence of a wallet on his person—most of the clothing having been burned off—it, indeed he had anything on

Eight federal charges face Ruidoso Downs' Gene Hensley, one of the primary stockholders in the race track and its general manager for many years. A news bulletin from Albuquerque this mid-week said Federal indictments were issued Wednesday charging Eugene V. Hensley, 63, on leave of absence as general manager of the local track, with federal income tax evasion and filing false federal income tax returns.

Hensley posted a \$1,000 bond in the U. S. Marshal's office after the indictments by a federal grand jury.

The eight counts charged Hensley with attempting to evade \$38,405 in corporate income taxes and \$25,043 in personal income taxes in 1959 and 1960.

The indictment said Hensley filed false corporate returns while serving as secretary-treasurer of Ruidoso Racing Association, Inc.

Investigation Continues In Ranch Couple's Death

A rancher and his wife are dead in a tragedy that stunned their community of San Patricio, about 20 miles east of here, late Wednesday.

Returning home from school about 4 p.m., children of Mr. and Mrs. Pat Chavez found the body of their mother lying on its back in the kitchen of the small residence. Neighbors summoned State Policeman Paul Gibson of Hondo, and also Frank Tinsworth, Tinnie businessman, who is ambulance driver for the community. The two men arrived at the scene at about the same time and Gibson said he found the woman with a small rope around her throat, indicating she had been strangled, and with a bullet hole in the forehead. She was attired in blue jeans and a checked shirt.

Chief Deputy Sheriff Glen Bradley, arriving within a few minutes after the first two, asked neighbors to aid in a search for the husband. Bradley said a 22 bullet, not fired, and a spent 32 calibre shell were found on the floor near the woman's body. Lying near a log foot bridge on the Rio Ruidoso about 100 yards from the house trails, skiing conditions are good to fair, and the base snow depth is good. Parker said. Thursday morning this week Assistant District Attorney Robert Sanderford of Ruidoso, who assisted in the investigation on Wednesday, said a coroner's jury summoned by Justice of the Peace Santiago Herreras, had recessed after ordering an autopsy on the man's body. Sanderford said the route the investigation would take later would depend on the results of a Roswell pathologist's report. He said he could not state at this time if the deaths were a murder and suicide, or were murders by a third party. He said no bullet holes were found in the rancher's body, but that there might be—which would be determined by the autopsy. He said condition of the body and the fact there was no physician present, was the reason it was not determined if death was from gunshot at the scene. He said he did not want to speculate at this time on how the investigation may turn.

At 5:40 p.m. Chavez' body was found, shirtless, face down in the Rio Ruidoso about 75 yards downstream from the footbridge. Ervin Dick Romero, 17, a junior at Hondo High, reported the discovery. The victim's feet were tied with a cord similar to that used around the woman's throat.

A coroner's inquest was called at about dusk. State Policeman Gibson said he had found no one who had heard gunfire during the day. He said the







(Continued from Page 1—Sec. A) more than underclothes and a shirt. State Policeman Bob Miller told the jury a search he and other police officers made did not turn up any money—even though it might take days to make a completely thorough sifting of the fire blackened premises.

A kerosene lamp the victim owned was found intact in an area of the house that had not burned. State Policeman Miller said there was no butane gas used in the house, that a wood stove was used for heating and cooking, and a kerosene lamp for illumination.

"He was very careless with his smoking and his matches—we found matches all over the house," Miller said.

Ron Shriver, with Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department, said the west side of the house and the front (south) were ablaze when the department's equipment reached the scene, and he thought the front door had already burned away—and that he could not tell if it was locked. Miller suggested an examination of the burned lock might reveal if it was.

Another curious incident was noted when Mrs. Jack Shriver was quoted as having seen two young men driving a two-tone passenger car away from the scene soon after the fire alarm had sounded.

Manager Albert Jay of Chapel of Roeses mortuary, in assisting in the jury's examination of the body, pointed out a fractured left arm that had allowed the left hand to lay folded underneath the arm. The exposed bone and flesh around the break showed signs of having been burned, as though the break had occurred prior to the fire. An indentation on the man's skull also had been burned over, he pointed out, but declared, "an autopsy can determine if these were of suspicious nature or not."



5 POSTAL RATES UP SATURDAY

Increases in money orders, insurance, registry, certified mail and COD rates will become effective March 28, 1966, Ruidoso Postmaster L. F. (Joe) Dryden said this week. The cost of operating these five special services now exceeds revenue by \$60 million annually, it was reported. The fee increases will narrow the cost-revenue gap by \$36 million, based on business handled in fiscal year 1965, the post office department says. Fees for money orders, registry and COD were last changed in 1961; insurance and certified mail in 1957.

The fee changes, announced in the January 11 Federal Register and confirmed in the register Feb. 25, are put into effect under the existing authority of the Postmaster General.

The increase includes: Money Order Fees: Domestic and International money order fees will be increased by 5 cents.

Insurance Fees: The minimum fee bracket will be increased from \$10 to \$15 and the minimum fee will be 20 cents instead of 10 cents. The revised insurance fees will be as follows:

0.01 - \$15 - 20 cents.
15.01 - \$50 - 30 cents.
50.01 - \$100 - 40 cents.
100.01 - \$150 - 50 cents.
150.01 - \$200 - 60 cents.

Registry Fees: The present 60 cents and 75 cents fees will be combined into a single fee at 75 cents for value up to \$100. Registry fees for articles in excess of \$100 will remain unchanged.

COD Fees: The present 40 cents and 60 cents fee bracket will be combined into one fee bracket at 60 cents for amounts up to \$10. There will be no change in fees covering items valued above \$10.

Certified Mail: The fee will be increased 10 cents from the present 20 cents through 30 cents per item.

Losses incurred in the operation of special services are paid from funds drawn from the Federal Treasury. The fee increases will shift a substantial portion of the special service cost borne by the public to the users of the services.





Optimist Oratorical Contest Jimmy Booky Wins







Fruit frost forecasts will again be given starting April 1 over a Roswell television station. Mr. and Mrs. Tom Babers will help by giving the local temperature at San Patricio each day. This local temperature helps the weather bureau more accurately forecast the next day's temperature for the area. In the forecast the term "lower valley" refers to the area below San Patricio and the term "upper valley" refers to the area above San Patricio.

Peaches are starting to bloom in the lower part of the Honda Valley and the apple buds are beginning to swell. When the apples bloom will depend on the weather. With continuing warm weather, they could start blooming in two weeks or if it turns off cool, the bloom could be delayed for a month.

In my rambling around Lincoln County, I have found the wool at shearing time to be cleaner than normal. The fleeces in many clips are expected to average a pound less grease wool than last year. I am hoping for some of the lighter shrinking clips to sell for 70 cents per pound this year. Wool sales are starting in Roswell this week and a price trend might be noted from these sales.
