

Murder, Suicide Is Sheriff's Belief

Lincoln County Sheriff Leandro Vega, Jr., released to the press Tuesday noon this week information that a testing laboratory had reported to him paraffin tests of matter from the hands of Pat Chavez, San Patricio rancher, revealed he had fired a gun very recently. Residue from discharged gunpowder and traces of lead indicated he had handled and fired a gun.

Vega said the case of the gun shot deaths of both Chavez and his wife, Esmer, 45, whose bodies were found Wednesday afternoon last week in and near their modest ranch home, will not be closed until a ballistic report is received from the Federal Bureau of Investigation several days from now, but that he would express the belief now that the ballistic findings will substantiate his belief the deaths were a murder and suicide.

Chronologically, these events have transpired in a week's time: The body of Mrs. Chavez was found on the kitchen floor, a cord around her neck as if an attempt at strangling had been made, and a bullet hole in her forehead and in her stomach. A .22 bullet in its casing was found near the body and a spent .32 shell was found nearby. About 100 yards from the house, near a log footbridge over the Rio Ruidoso, a .22 rifle, which peace officers said they did not believe had been fired, was found with three .32 shells on the ground near it.

Funeral services were held Saturday for the pair. Burial was in Hondo, east of their home community of San Patricio. Chapel of Roses Mortuary handled arrangements. Father Laurier Labreche, Catholic priest, officiated in the last rites. The pair was survived by four children. The man was the father of eight other children born in a previous marriage. The rancher was born Feb. 29, 1920, and the woman was born Sept. 30, 1920. Both were born in Lincoln county.

RICHARDSON TRIAL SET FOR APRIL 7

Arraignment Friday For Gene Hensley

Gene Hensley, 53, who has managed the affairs of Ruidoso Racing Association since he gained control through stock purchases in 1953, is to be arraigned in Albuquerque Friday this week in U. S. District Court.

Hensley surrendered in Albuquerque last Wednesday on a federal grand jury indictment charging income tax evasion and filing of false returns for those years.

The indictment charged Hensley with attempting to evade \$25,945 in personal income taxes—\$6935 in 1959 and \$19,020 in 1960—and filing false joint income tax returns for those years.

Two other counts alleged Hensley filed false and fraudulent joint income tax returns for 1959 and 1960. Another count said Hensley, as secretary-treasurer of the racing association, filed a corporation tax return for 1959 showing a taxable income of \$270,330 on which a tax of \$135,073 was due, while the corporation's actual taxable income was \$280,481 on which a tax of \$140,240 was due.

In 1960, the indictment said, Hensley as secretary-treasurer of the association, filed a corporation income tax return showing a taxable income of \$154,533 on which a tax of \$77,266 was due, while the corporation's actual taxable income was \$164,067 with a tax of \$82,033 due.

Recent drying winds, low humidity and high temperatures have rapidly dried the Ruidoso area in the past three weeks. Forest fire index has climbed into "high". Fire risks and hazards common to our forested area might be touched off into a raging fire, at any time; unless all precautions are taken to avoid their occurrence.

A run-down of fire causes the past year continues to show that the home fireplace without any spark arrester and the dumping of hot ashes are causing the highest percent of fires in the Ruidoso area. These fires almost always start under the worst possible conditions. Why? Because when dry air conditions exist to keep sparks alive from your chimney to the ground fuels, the burning conditions are such to contribute to extreme burning conditions and the large fire potential. Your local fire department, the boys who have contributed so much around the clock to suppress these fires, would like to solicit your help, by installing needed spark arresters on your fire places and precautions for dumping hot ashes from the firebox.





Must Register By April 4 To Vote May 3

Citizens who plan to vote in the nominating primaries on May 3 this year must register no later than April 4. You must be a resident of the state a year, the precinct six months and the precinct in which you reside for 30 days to be eligible to register.

You may register either as a Democrat, a Republican or an independent—but by registering as an independent (having no party affiliation) you will not be allowed to vote in the nominating primaries next month.

Registration may be done any day during regular office hours in the municipal building here or at the county clerk's office in Carrizozo. The county board of trustees recently named two registration clerks and two alternates for each voting precinct who will be in charge of assisting voters in registering in their own community on the final registration date, April 4. Their names and places of registration were included in a legal notice printed in the county's two newspapers late in March.




