



## Blue Notes From Los Lunas Help Ft. Stanton Folks Set Fire To Floor

"Deck the halls with ivy" could very well have been the keynote when Fort Stanton threw open the welcome doors last Thursday night. The gala occasion was the concert-dance given by the "Blue Notes", a jazz combo, members of the band from the Los Lunas Training School. ... The walls shook, the ceiling groaned and the rafters rang as the jazz rock and roll music swelled the dining room. Frequent comments heard all evening were: "They're good! When can they come back?" During the evening the Blue Notes played a composition of their own which they entitled, "The Blue Note Rock". This arrangement was the best received of all the pieces played. Four girl residents were the vocalists for the combo with boy residents members singing solos also. ... The Blue Notes drove to Roswell on Friday to play for the convention of the National Association of Retarded Children. Returning to Fort Stanton Friday night then on to Los Lunas Saturday morning. A 29-year-old Shakopee, Minn. man, George Henry Reis, crashed his light Aeronca two-place plane into a stand of fir trees in Dark Canyon, 200 feet off U. S. Highway 70 Saturday afternoon about 4 p.m., and lived to tell about it. He received medical attention in the Ruidoso hospital where he was brought after being sawed from the wreckage by passing motorists. His condition was reported as satisfactory at El Paso where he now is. He told rescuers his altimeter stuck at 4,000 feet, and local residents surmised he did not know he was flying at such a high altitude, approximately 10,000 feet, when his ship ploughed into the tree tops. He had been sighted flying at a low altitude only a few minutes before the crash by travelers on U. S. 70 in the vicinity of Fox Cave, about 12 miles east of where he crashed. He also was spotted by folks in the Hollywood area of Ruidoso, again flying at a very low altitude. Heavy clouds may have obscured his view of the height of the summit he attempted to cross over southwest of here. Aiding in the rescue were drivers of three large transport trucks enroute to the West Coast from Oklahoma City. The three men, all of Oklahoma, each reported seeing the plane flying at a low altitude above U. S. Highway 70, and they feared the ship would hit the trees. They stopped, offered aid in releasing the trapped flyer and in chaining the plane to nearby trees to keep it from rolling down the mountainside from its crash site. They also stood by with fire extinguishers, if needed. A physician and nurse from the Mesalero hospital were on hand to assist with emergency medical attention. A Tularosa resident, Ansel Austin, used ropes, also, to help tie the plane on the mountainside. Another assisting in the rescue was Game Conservator Charles Cockerell. A metal saw was used to release Reis from his smashed cockpit. He suffered a fractured leg and severely lacerated face in the impact. The flyer reported he was enroute to Phoenix from his Minnesota base.

Chairman Blair Halladay of the 1966 Ruidoso clean-up drive said this mid-week that the battle against rubbish, fire, health and safety hazards, was swinging along in fine style, with about 40 trucks and pick-up loads of heavy trash dumped into a special garbage pit opened for this purpose this week on a side road in Gaviilan Canyon. The disposal site was provided by the Lincoln National Forest, through arrangement with Ruidoso Ranger Bud Starkey. The village opened the pit and is to close it when the last load is dumped. Citizens have tackled the job of cleaning up and brightening up the city with vigor, Halladay declared. He said the drive, which officially ends Saturday, may go into next week for the city crews who have been pressed into service helping individuals and organizations clean the river, the parks, school grounds, business and residential property. Those persons having trash too bulky for the regular garbage trucks to haul away are asked to call the city hall and leave word of their need—and the rubbish will be removed. Those who might have an extra truck of pick-up to loan to help in the removal of the excess trash are also invited to call the city hall. Boy Scouts, Jeep Club members and some other organizations have already put in some extra hours in the community drive, but some others who had promised aid have not come through yet, Halladay said Wednesday. "However, they may yet give us a lift as a combined fighting force—if they're not engaged in individual clean-ups of their own premises," he concluded.

Other officers include those representing each of the five districts, the state first and second vice-presidents and the state secretary-treasurer. The club will be allowed to keep the banner until next year's festival when it will be turned over to the new winner. ### Stanley, Triviz Are Nominated In Judge Race

Richard (Dick) Stanley, Alamogordo attorney, was nominated the Democratic candidate for Third Judicial District Judge Division II, comprised of Lincoln, Otero and Dona Ana Counties in Tuesday's Primary. He defeated incumbent Judge George L. Zimmerman 6011 to 5450, a tabulation from the three counties showed.

Gene Lusk of Carlsbad received a two-to-one majority in his bid for the Democratic nomination for governor in Lincoln County, almost as strong as the state vote favoring him over former Gov. John L. Burroughs. The vote in this county was 349 for Burroughs and 630 for Lusk. In Ruidoso, the vote was equally as strong for the Southeastern New Mexican. Other races in this county saw Fabian Chavez, Jr., win over Jack Jones for lieutenant-governor; Albert Romero win over Max Sanchez and Robert Castner for state auditor; Floyd Cross win over Ed Murphy for corporation commissioner; George Abbott sweep past Jim Huntzinger for state senator in Lincoln-Otero county at-large district No. 23; Leon Johnson win over W. E. Rush for state representative in the Lincoln-Sierra county at large district; Edward Triviz lose to his opponent Bill Bivins in the Third judicial district division I judge's race, and in division II, George L. Zimmerman won over Richard Stanley (both the winners in this county, however, lost in the district count); Grady Mayfield won over Ed Gary in the board of education district race in this county, and in the only county race that saw opposing candidates, Mary E. Lynch, walloped former county treasurer Lewis Cummins in seeking nomination for that post. The only Republican race that saw two opponents was in the governor nomination scramble—and in this county Clifford Hawley ran 'way out front ahead of David Cargoe. Voting on contested races, by boxes in this county is given in a chart elsewhere in today's News. Lusk Wins in Landslide. In state voting Lusk defeated Burroughs for governor on the Democratic ballot and Cargoe led Hawley on the Republican ticket. In other races, Fabian Chavez won the Demo lieutenant-governor nomination, Floyd Cross won his corporation commissioner bid. Romero won for state auditor.

George Abbott, Alamogordo banker, won the Democratic nomination for the 23rd Senate in the at-large district 23 over Jim Huntzinger by a wide margin. Abbott will face Lincoln County's Republican incumbent Joe Skeen in November. Skeen did not have an opponent in district 23, and Aubrey Dunn, Democratic incumbent from Otero County, will have Lester B. Hayden as an opponent in November, but had none in the primary race. ## One of Willie Benavides' Pair of Horses Saved from Quicksand in Rare Rescue

What would our valley be without Willie Benavides? "The Last of the Wagon Drivers?" It is always good to see Old Dunny and Old Gray pulling Willie, together with children and dogs, up and down the highway. Many folks depend upon Willie every spring-time to plough up their flower plots and garden spots. One of these customers whom Willie greatly admires is Mrs. Floyd D. Haake, also known as "Helga, The Nordic Queen". I wonder if Helga knows how close she came not to have her garden spot ploughed up by Willie's team this spring. Little thought you might think it, the great 1965 flood left quite a bit of deep quicksand along the banks of the Ruidoso. And it was Willie grazing happily along the banks of the river down near Bluecut Hill that Old Dunny, the Zebra Dunn who is the senior partner of the team of Benavides and Benavides, became mired in the quicksand. Louis Smith to the Rescue. For no telling how long Louis Smith has been rescuing folks with his wrecker. He has pulled cars up from bluffs and banks, out of rivers, out from under bridges, out of tree tops. He is a pretty hard man to surprise on things like this,

But imagine if you can what Louis must have thought when 78-year-old Willie Benavides, trembling and in tears showed up at his place in Ruidoso Downs. "When we got there," says Louis, who brought along his right-hand man Lawrence Tafaya, "There was nothing left showing out of the quicksand but that poor old horse's head and neck." Willie, in telling about it all afterwards, had all but given his horse up. And Louis Smith, veteran of many tough situations in helping folks out, says that he knew right away that he had his work cut for him. "What worried me," said Louis, "Was how I was going to keep on from breaking every bone in the poor horse's body, hard as we were going to have to pull with the winch to move him from the death grip of that quicksand." Willie and Lawrence and Louis worked and they worked. Louis happened to have a large soft hitch and a half rope. They dug down and looped the rope around the animal's hind quarters. Louis would pull a little and dig a little. "The horse was too weak to help any at all," says Louis. "And I could see that it was just killing him every time we pulled. Finally we were ready to get him out and I told the boys to be sure not to let him fall back into the quicksand. With a big pull we got him out, but he got away from us and back he went again. And we had to start all over."

Many another would have given up right here, but not Louis Smith. "Finally we got him out and dragged him a ways to solid ground," says Louis. "Then we all got around him and raised him up on his feet." Again the tears—tears of joy this time, ran down Willie's swarthy cheeks. "Old Willie just hugged my neck ...," said Louis Smith. "Was glad we finally made it. I felt so sorry for the horse. And Willie is such a good old man!"

## County Agent's Report

Last week I visited with some fruit growers in the Hondo area and looked at the orchards. The prospects for an apple crop look good. There is a light set of red delicious apples in some orchards. The Golden Delicious and Jonathan trees have too many apples, and will need to be thinned. Use Sevin in the calyx and fruit-covered spray will help to thin these trees.

Let's have quality apples this fall. To do this, you must follow a complete, thorough spray schedule. Once the worm gets into the apple it's too late. Fruit spray schedules are available in the county agent's office. Let me know and I will send you one.


