

Around Town

Ray Reed is playing for weekend fun at the Chaparral Motor Hotel in the cocktail lounge. The Gene Lambert Trio, with Darrell and Junior, are also on the bill there. Ray Reed is back working with the race track on public relations. He says he's just had a terrific experience out on the west coast, taking the ten-day Rancho Vistadore horseback trek in the area near Santa Barbara. There were 400 men on the ride, including movie stars, industrial leaders, educators, others. He said he became well acquainted with Edgar Bergen, Art Linkletter and Slim Pickens on the ride. He added there's a darn good chance Slim may be here for the opening of the 1966 race season, if Slim's schedule of personal appearances is flexible enough to let him slip out here. Ray said the tour included some well known New Mexicans, such as Skipper Rigdon, Elmer Hepler, Jimmy Coleman, Chuck Maddox, George Rancho and Max Prestridge (some of them from El Paso), but they're counted as being from New Mexico, Ray says. Hepler, of Carlsbad, was voted the outstanding horseman and Ranchero—which means he was the best all around man in the ride. He had some horses entered in races held in connection with the ride which won the walking race, placed second in the Big Jack Mitchell race and then he had a mule that came in third in a mule race. The riders camped out each night in camps that classified them as dentists, actors, bankers, real estate men, or whatever trade they were in—so they could talk shop, says Ray. Ray says he thinks this year's program at Ruidoso Downs just might include a mule race. Also, he says he's hoping interest can be whipped up locally so that a big parade can be held here, through downtown Ruidoso, on Labor Day to advertise the \$500,000 Alamogordo Race. One of the ideas being talked at the track this year is setting up an Indian Village in the infield as a colorful adjunct to the track's entertainment for the fans. He said there may be some special acts introduced later in the season on the track, out in front of the grandstand to help boost attendance. Ruidoso may be the subject of a feature article in the next few weeks in the New Mexico Reformer magazine, Mrs. Betty Locke told us the other day.

Jimmy Whipple, formerly of Ruidoso and now at Elephant Butte, said the high winds in the micro storm of last Thursday evening which tore up considerable property at Alamogordo, also caused some losses of boats and other damage at Hot Springs landing at the big New Mexico lake. We saw this news item and thought it might interest you. Kennecott Copper Corporation will begin construction this month of a \$25-million smelter at the Huley smelter, Frank C. Woodruff, general manager of Kennecott's Chino Mines Division, announced today. The new chimney will supplement the existing 500-foot stack, which has been a landmark for the past 25 years. More than two and a half million dollars will be spent on the project. The new stack will have an interior diameter of 44 feet at the bottom, tapering to slightly more than 22 feet at the top. Outside diameter will be 48 feet at the base. It will be built of reinforced concrete and lined with fire brick. The project will take about two years to complete.

The Al Pearsons at Gateway Motel are due for a pat on the back for another good deed last weekend. Three Fatally Hurt In Mescalero Crash

Two women, one a young Ruidoso mother and the other an elderly El Pasoan and an El Paso man have died of injuries received in a collision of two vehicles about a mile west of the Mescalero post-office in the Apache Indian reservation Saturday afternoon about 6:30 p.m.

There were eleven persons in the two vehicles which collided when a wheel reportedly came off a pickup driven west on U. S. Highway 70 by a Ruidosoan, causing it to swerve into the path of the east-bound family van.

Dead are Mrs. Melvin (Patricia) Vick, 23, Ruidoso, and Mrs. Zora Edwards, 70, of El Paso who died last Saturday night. Both died in Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital here where they were brought for treatment.

Dying in an El Paso hospital was the father of a family of six children, James Leasure of El Paso, who was driver of the family van. Also in the same hospital is his wife and a son, James, Jr. The latter two are reported as improving. Others in the Leasure family, including five other children, have been released from hospitals following treatment of a day or two.

CANDIDATE WITHDRAWS

Lester B. Hayden, Republican candidate for the District 24 State senate position, last week announced his resignation from the race because of ill health.

He sought election in the at-large district composed of Lincoln and Otero counties. A retired electronics engineer formerly employed at White Sands Missile Range, Hayden is a 10-year resident of Otero county, making his home in Orogrande.

C. O. P. central committees of both Otero and Lincoln are to confer on a choice for a successor candidate to file with the Secretary of State for inclusion on the general election ballot in November.

\$242,672 BUDGET IS PROPOSED FOR COUNTY

Lincoln County Commissioner Chairman Max Oliver reported Tuesday the county budget for 1966-67 is proposed at \$242,672. Formal hearing on the suggested figures for the next fiscal year will be held the latter part of June. The county's road department was allotted \$102,400; and the next largest proposed expenditures is \$61,386 for salaries for county employees and some elected officials.

General fund budget was proposed at \$50,250. The 1966-67 budget is about \$4,000 above what expected revenues may be—and there will be some slashes in some areas to bring the proposal into balance, Oliver said.

Hunt stated that Memorial Day (originally Decoration Day) originated with the practice of decorating the graves of soldiers of both the Blue and Gray, after the Civil War, with flags and flowers in the springtime. As Memorial Day, it is now a U. S. legal holiday, dedicated to the memory of departed loved ones, Hunt declared. Veterans and veterans organizations observe it particularly to keep alive the memory of the patriotic service of departed comrades of all wars, Hunt said.


Ranch Scenes Displayed In Chaparral Exhibit

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

Mexican-Flavor Found Throughout Lovely New Sunny Edwards' Home

On a slightly rising knoll overlooking the Ruidoso airport and with an unbelievable view of the whole White Mountain range sits the beautiful new home of Mr. and Mrs. Sunny Edwards. Just recently built but looking as if it was built 100 years ago and looking as if it would last three times as long, so beautifully does the home fit this city landscape. Captain Bob's used in construction not only on the outside of the house but variously throughout the interior, including the fireplace which measures 10½ feet long, is 7 feet long on the inside and can be seen and enjoyed from both the living and dining room.

Avocado is Jane's favorite color and this coupled with the soft brown of the ponderosa beams, the antique elm paneling and the Arizona flagstone floors, polished while submerged under water, the neutral colored drapes and the neutral carpeting give the home an air of serenity and calm that would be hard to duplicate anywhere. Jane's love of the arts is shown in a beautiful painting of Sunny done several years ago by George Patrick Dooley who once taught painting here. A relatively young man, he is now studying portraiture in France. It is a magnificent picture of Sunny in his western clothes and as Jane says, is her favorite not only because it is of Sunny but because the pose is so typical of him.

Another lovely painting of Mexican flavor hangs over the couch and was painted several years ago by Sunny's mother, Mrs. Ova Mae Edwards. Incidentally it won a blue ribbon at an art show in Dallas and is framed by a most elaborate and lovely gold antique frame. Flanking the large sofa in the living room, upholstered in avocado are two marble tables which are very interesting. The marble came from the Ruidoso State Bank when it

underwent remodeling and Dr. Summs mounted the marble on wrought iron legs. It is very beautifully done. A Mexican nativity scene painted by Jane on wood was used on her front door at Christmas with Sunny arranging the lighting for the painting. It is most charming.

In the hallway to the right of the front entrance is a beautiful cradle, once used by the Edwards' children and as Jane says, "by all my friends' babies in years gone by." It is now planted with greenery and somehow not only seems to belong there, but must bring back many happy memories to the Edwards.

Sunny's love of flying has been a pilot for three years) is shown by the intercom they have installed in the kitchen. While the sector around the town of Capitan is not in a class with the beautiful Ruidoso, the White Mountain country's grandeur nor the Alpy loftiness of Nogal peak and canyon, it is surrounded by scenes of great beauty, as witness the picture. And it possesses advantages not so apparent in the others—quick access and less rugged terrain after one arrives. Two and a half hours by Tin Lizards will take one there and a car will negotiate most all the countryside except the mountains.

The rainy season, when there is one, is the same as other mountain sectors, covering from July to the middle of September, inclusive, with frequent but not long continued showers. This was more important in those "good old days" because then the migration was by horse drawn vehicles and the showers made fine grass and put out water in small lakes for the horses and for cooking. This is still a very important item because, with rain water, the festive frijole can be cooked to the queen's gustation while if "hard" water is used a six hour boiling makes them more like galvanized buckshot than the Aztec desert which made Boston famous. The only drawback about wood in this region is having to walk or drive around it or to camp for enough from tall trees so the wood will not fall all over one during the night when the cool seepers play symphonies on Nature's pipe organ.

Even 38 years ago, before Henry had perfected his Lince or the Buick outfit had begun to tell the world "We'll Make 'em Better When They Get That Way" it was the kids with girls as usual predominating, who led in the wild chase for pleasure or riding the hill country, and the frisky pony remains the safest scenery all-weather and requires neither Rockafeller fluid nor attention to brake linings to negotiate the slopes.

There is a lot of practically level and fairly open country around the town of Capitan and plenty of rough stuff over on Tucson range. The picture was taken at the edge of "commercial" timber on the slopes of Tucson and in the beginning of hundreds of pretty glades just built for camping purposes. Every ranch has shallow wells with fine water and a car can navigate most any place as long as one stays away from the rugged hills with heavy timber.

Dates for the general deer season had previously been set as Oct. 29 through Nov. 13 in the northern part of the state and Nov. 12 thru Nov. 20 in the southern part.
Antelope season dates are Sept. 10 and 11 in the northeast quarter of the state and Oct. 1 and 2 in the other three-quarters. Bow season for antelope will be Sept. 10 and 11.
The general bull elk hunt in the northern part of the state is Oct. 8 through 10. An unlimited number of permits for this hunt will be available by application to the Santa Fe office. In the Southeast area, 20 permits will be available for the southern Guadalupe Mountain's season Oct. 8 through Oct. 10.
Bear seasons in the Southeast area are Sept. 3 through 13, with or without dogs and Nov. 12 through 20 without dogs. The Guadalupe Mountains are closed to bear hunting.
Grouse and squirrel season in the north and southwest areas will be Sept. 17 through 25.
The fall turkey seasons will not be set until the September Commission meeting.

Two of Stan's broodmares are in Kentucky at the Mars Reef Farm while three others are in California. One broodmare, Eikaki, a full sister to the crack sprinter Blodge, will be bred to Crally Admiral while the other goes to the court of Spy Song.

In California Stan has mares being served by such classic stallions as Three Bars, Go Man Go and Moolah Rex.
Looking forward to his return to Ruidoso Downs Snedigar was hopeful that in the near future plans could be made to increase the size of the track to possibly six furlongs or 13/16th from its current half mile, a move that would bring better thoroughbred stock to the mountain resort track.

Stan had earlier served at Ruidoso Downs when he was the presiding steward during the 1952-54 seasons, and he predicts the halfmiler in 1966 will not be only one of the safest in the nation but will continue to grow as one of the most popular.

Big Ideas Big Man,

If one word best describes Ruidoso Downs' Stan Snedigar it would have to be the word "big."

Not only is Stan big in size (6-4, 220 pounds), but he has big ideas and a big task ahead of him as he begins his first year as executive secretary of the Ruidoso Downs Racing Association, operators of Ruidoso Downs.

Along with Robert Scribner and T. A. Spencer, both members of the association, Snedigar makes up the three man executive committee whose job it will be to make the track operation function on all cylinders in 1966.

Ruidoso Downs' greatest claim to fame has long been its fantastic All American Futurity which will gross in the neighborhood of half a million dollars for its eighth running on Sept. 5.

Snedigar, long recognized as one of America's real authorities on the quarter horse, feels big things are in store for the future at Ruidoso Downs.

"I honestly look for the All American to hit the \$1,000,000 mark within the next 10 years," Stan confidently predicted recently.

"And it is a good bet the Rainbow Futurity and Derby will get on a par or pass the All American."

The Derby has been climbing in both stake money and prestige and the 1966 edition figures to be worth \$175,000 for its Aug. 7 running.

Stan, elected to the Ruidoso Downs board of director last winter, was the strongest advocate on the board for changing the minimum purse structure for the 1966 season.

This year the minimum purse will be \$1,000, compared to the \$250 plus 5% figure in the past.

"A flat purse figure to be better all the way around," said Stan. A glance at Snedigar's background makes it obvious why he is so highly thought of by his fellow horsemen.

As a breeder, owner and trainer the California-born but Kentucky-Tennessee raised Snedigar has traveled all the routes down the racing road of success.

One item, more so than anything else, sticks out in his mind when delving into the past.

"I claimed Three Bars at the old Fair Ground track in Detroit back in 1944 for \$2,000 and one win and seven months later sold him to Sid Vail for \$10,000," Stan remembers.

Needless to say Three Bars, a thoroughbred son of Percentage, has been one of the king pins of the quarter horse industry as a stallion.







County Agent's Report
— BY RALPH DUNLAP
The fruit crop in Lincoln County looks the best in several years. Although early freezes killed over 85 percent of the blossom in some orchards, the remaining blossoms have set a commercial crop of apples. Many growers are using chemical thinners on the Golden Delicious and Jonathan trees. I would estimate that Lincoln County will have over 275,000 bushels of apples this year.
A thorough insect spray schedule should be followed if you expect to have a worm-free apple this fall. Apply a codling moth spray at 10 to 14 day intervals and use sprays recommended in the fruit spray schedule.
Range conditions are extremely varied in Lincoln County. The southeast corner of the county had a good rain about two weeks ago


