## A Taste of Reality for the High School Age . . .

Our Mr. Bennett wrote a part of this editorial:

"This idea came to me while I was doing a little convalescing recently and while my two granddaughters, ages one and one-half years and four years were paying us a visit. It was during this time that the Home Economics department at the high school held a one-hour child care clinic in which our two little darlings were invited to participate for the 'whole' hour. At the appointed hour and as my wife was hurrying the two out the door, all freshly bathed and dressed in their Sunday best that the younger one had an accident in her fresh clean diapers. Why occurrences like that are called accidents, I'll never know because among children of that age its really fairly standard procedure, as everyone with any experience with small children knows. But it is. And my wife said 'I simply haven't time to bathe and dress her again. You can change her and keep her here.'

"I said, 'I would think that the child care clinic would welcome a baby with messed up pants since that should make the hour or part of it more practical with a little bit of the 'seamy side' of child care.'

"Don't be silly," my wife said, as she hustled the four-year-old off to the clinic, leaving me to gain the extra experience of changing the dirty diaper. That is when the thought came to me that the first thing impressionable home economics students should learn is that child care is A TWENTY-FOUR HOUR A DAY deal, not only in the daytime but in the wee hours of the night, and that the romance of caring for young children is just plain constant and even downright inconvenient some of the time."

**TO WHICH WE ADD:**

Another point in this discussion — the student, being introduced to ground-the-clock care of little children might, just MIGHT, get the idea that maybe it isn't as romantic as she has dreamed having the care of such dependents all the time and that an early marriage at high school age is something to stand back and take a second look at.

## Rolling, Rolling . . .

Ruidoso Police are amazed that there have been no serious injuries nor fatalities from a common occurrence here in the accident category. That is the oversight on the part of many drivers in parking their cars here and not setting the parking brake. More and more vehicles roll away from where their owners left them when they are not properly braked.

The accident happens most often when visitors here from the prairielands of the Southwest just don't recognize that wherever they are in Ruidoso, they are on a slope. But, quite a few home-folks have failed to learn the trick of parking properly every time they stop their car, also. Most drivers who live in hilly areas learn soon enough you can't trust your own idea of whether the place you park is absolutely level, so they do one or two or all three things. They cut their wheels into the curb or chock them with a rock after setting the hand brake (or park on automatic transmission) and then, if their car is a standard transmission, they take extra precaution of putting their car in reverse gear.

With the extra large amount of vehicular traffic Ruidoso's streets are carrying this summer, it is a compliment to the work of our police, and the motorists, also, that we have had so few serious accidents. Let's all continue to be as careful as possible, and once again, remember, you are parking on a slope, every time you stop your car in Ruidoso. When you leave it, be sure it will not roll away.

Jimmy Durante is one of my favorite people. His zest and joy and enthusiasm are a delight and a privilege to behold. Durante is well known, of course, for a number of famous expressions. We all know "What a revolt in development this is!" and "Good night, Mrs. Calabash, wherever you are." The expression I like best is "Why can't everybody leave everybody else alone?"

There is real profundity in that statement. The greatest of the freedoms is the absolute right of every person to spend his life as he alone desires. Or as Professor Henry Higgins puts it "doing whatever he thinks is best for him." God gives each of us the right to use our lives as we choose.

We live, however, in the day of the "do gooder". The day when people do things for other people in the name of "their own good." How I hate that expression! Much too often it has been used as an excuse for some of the most cruel acts in human history. Remember that the "Grand Inquisitor" burned people at the stake in order to save their souls.

We live in the day of conformity. The pressure of all agents of society—law, custom, religion, etiquette, public opinion—combine to force people into pre-determined molds. Everybody is supposed to dress in certain "styles", behave in certain manners, have the same goals and ideals, attempt identical accomplishments. If a person chooses not to live in the approved manner he is labeled weird and strange.

What a horrible world this would be if everybody were exactly like everybody else! Life would be dull, barren, monotonous and unvaried. The tragedy is that most of us want to be left alone ourselves, but will not grant the same right to others. Much too often we interfere in the affairs of other people which are none of our business. We invite ourselves into people's lives without waiting to be asked or invited. We presume the right to tell other people how they should spend their lives. "We give them advice", we go on about them, we criticize them, we complain about them, and we butt in where we may not be wanted.

Wasn't Jesus addressing us when he said, "Hypocrite! First take the log out of your own eye . . .?" What do you think?

Looking out my window, we saw the boys and girls start to fall as they were shot and I knew that it really was a sniper on the tower. A girl running onto the computer center—the walk goes over it—crumpled a hundred feet away and called 'Somebody please help me!'

I worked my way around under the cover to try to, but somebody was already there behind a parapet holding her in his lap and I didn't make the last dash but retreated to the Geology Building. The sniping went on until 1:30 p.m. when two heroic police and one heroic civilian worked their way up to him and killed him. An unbelievable day at the University!"

Apple picking starts this week in the Hondo Valley. A record crop of 300,000 bushels is expected in the area. John Thomas started picking pears last week. Pears for canning should be available for the next three weeks.

A. T. Pflingsten is adding to his apple shed at Hondo. He is adding a receiving shelter and a cold storage unit on the White Mountain shed. Also, he plans to have a federal inspection at the shed during the picking season. The federal inspector certifies that the grade of fruit is correct and increases the market acceptability.

I did a few quick visits with Dr. Nour, Monday in the Hondo area. The apples are sizing well, but I noticed some worms in these visits. Mites were found in one orchard. Kelthane is the only chemical that can be used now and it requires a 14-day waiting period.

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# Mr. and Mrs. Cowan Have Kindred Hobby In Gardening Around Cabins

 Editor's Note: This is another in a series of articles about interesting Ruidoso residents and their lovely homes.

Nestled among the tall pines and right on the banks of the Rio Ruidoso is the comfortable, and old-timey home of Mr. and Mrs. Cap Cowan whose lovely yard attests to Mr. Cowan's life time hobby of gardening.

"Cap," as he is affectionately known to his many friends (far and wide, it is truly an old thing) having come to Ruidoso in 1927 to make this his home, but who had been coming to Ruidoso even as a youngster where he spent the summers camping out in the Gateway area with his family. As Cap is now 82 years old, the memories of early Ruidoso are many. He has seen unbelievable changes here during the city's growth.

Some of Cap's memories include celebration on the Fourth of July. One he recalls in particular was that, there being no jail here, a man on getting drunk was tied to a tree when arrested.

All food supplies were brought in from Roswell and to go to Roswell after supplies he recalls that they traveled "not down" the river, but through Gavilan Canyon, Ft. Stanton and the Block Ranch.

The original Ruidoso post office was where Cedar City is now, he recalls. And all the area from Lazy T Inn down to the Wingfield house was farm land and three gates had to be opened and closed before he

could get to his cabin. One summer Cap recalls when they were camping in the Gateway area where there was a spring, he remembers that the son of Lord Cree and his wife were also camping there and were always inviting the children to come to their camp for some candy. All camping supplies from one year to the next were stored in the Old Mill.

Cowan moved to Ruidoso from Roswell where he worked at New Mexico Military Institute for ten years. He established and managed the Roswell golf course for ten years, also.

One of the interesting features of the Cowan home is the collection of Kachina dolls made by Cowan's daughter, Marion Jo, now deceased, who had a studio in Albuquerque and was a scientific illustrator for the government. Cowan prizes highly the maps she made of various parts of the world. Other articles of value in the Cowan home are two beautiful Indian jars said to be 1600 to 1800 years old from the northern part of the state, that so far no one has been able to identify.

Cowan owns some of the most beautiful arrowheads we have ever seen and a piece of Indian Art (pictured) is a carving of an Indian's head approximately 1-inch high that he found in a cave up Carrizo Canyon. It is made of flint and according to Cowan is the only real Indian art work of that type he has ever seen. It is truly a museum piece. He also prizes a tomahawk that he found in his yard.

We questioned Cowan about the weather now and when he first came here and he reported that it is much the same now as then. We also asked him if he had ever regretted moving to Ruidoso. His answer was "no, the only thing I do regret was not moving here sooner," so much does he love this area.

Mr. and Mrs. Cowan (she is the former Mrs. Bob Jones of Seymour, Tex.) have been married seven years and she and Cap share their love of gardening. They built by themselves all the cabins included in his rental area, but it is their yard that they most enjoy. A drive just before the new bridge, will please you, with the view of an early Ruidoso cabin, a lovely yard and the knowledge that here live a happy contented and interesting couple, Mr. and Mrs. Cap Cowan.



ground of rolling hills is a drawing heightened by washes that accent the rugged character of this earliest structure of protection from the frequent raids of Indians. The San Juan Mission has the simple charm of an early Spanish church and its square bell tower, half in plaster, half in wood, is topped by a quaint open belfry. Tinsall's store, with its sweeping roof lines and sheltered porch recalls vivid memories of the martyred young Englishman who is still buried in back of the building. Perhaps the most individual structure in Lincoln is Dr. Wood's house with its broken roof line, its unique recessed porch and second story.

The drawing of the Wortley Hotel has recaptured all the simple charm of this old hostelry that was unfortunately burned in the 1930's. Rare in plan is the square Z-shaped house with its attractive four sided roof. No aspect of Lincoln would be complete without the colorful La Paloma Bar with its rambling architecture which bears the date of 1901 and its totem pole, cigar store Indian type carvings. The final building in our walk through the town is the historic Courthouse, restored to its earliest aspect without the exterior staircase which was added to give access to the courtroom on the second floor. It was the scene of much of the story of Lincoln, its tragedies, its joys, its intimate association with Billy the Kid.

Because of the faithfulness of these drawings, all the individual charm of Old Lincoln is stressed and made more-real to all who have had the pleasure of browsing up and down the one street. It will immediately become, one of the most popular exhibitions ever held in the courthouse.


## Walter Henn Art On Display At Lincoln

 As the popular song runs, "If you ain't got a dream, how you gonna make a dream come true?" When Walter Henn met Lincoln Town, it was love at first sight and a dream began to form. That was a dozen years ago, but the dream persisted, of a quiet life of painting and depicting the graphic history of Lincoln. Vacation after vacation, in Lincoln County served only to confirm that dream.

During this time he was already established as the Art Director of a thriving advertising agency in Dallas. Soon after he became Production Manager, Art Director for the Dallas branch of Grant, a large international agency headquartered in Chicago. He worked on such accounts as Dodge-Plymouth Motors, Dr. Pepper and Comet Rice. He painted in his spare time, exhibited occasionally in local Dallas galleries, frequently sold paintings or drawings. For nearly eight years before that, he had taught either full or part time at the Ed Young and Art Center schools in Dallas, and led a busy, happy life in general. But then Walter had always been a happy, easy-going individual. One of those "lucky" persons who had always known what he wanted to do, and luckier still, could do it.

He was born in Rochester, N. Y. in 1916. His first art training was at Rochester, Athenaeum and Mechanics Institute—now the Rochester Institute of Technology—and he studied under such instructors as Clifford Uip, and Ralph Avery. Then came five years in the army during World War II. He is now an art instructor at the Center in Santa Ana, Calif. During that time he exhibited in an army group at the Cabildo in San Francisco and his entry, an oil portrait "The General" was sold to a major. In March 1945 he met Nora Johnson of Dallas and they were married in June. Discharged from the army in November 1945, first Rochester and then Dallas became home.

The dream finally came true in July of last year when Lincoln became home. The Henns bought the old Baca house and restored it with great taste and charm. Here they will live and help establish a center of interest in all the arts. Walter will continue to paint, may take a few advanced pupils and he and Nora will open a small art gallery in an attractive L-shaped room. Here visitors can browse, gossip about art, and perhaps purchase one of Walter's drawings or paintings. It is a well-deserved gesture that his first major local exhibition will be held in the Old Courthouse Museum. A group of ink and wash drawings, it is entitled "A Walking Tour of Old Lincoln Town" and opened Aug. 14 and will continue for two weeks. As one enters the temporary gallery at the Courthouse, his eye is caught by a painting that hangs over the fireplace. Although it is not a drawing, but a superbly achieved and finished water color, it is fitting that it is the key of the exhibition as it is a portrait of Abraham Lincoln, our martyred President who gave his name to the town. The "Walking Tour" starts at the east end of Lincoln with the Bog, Low Ellis' house which has been restored with rare taste. His rather rustic porch, its beautiful lawn and flowers make it one of the show places of Lincoln. Walter has caught all the nostalgic flavor of the ruined Luna house which cries for an intelligent restoration. The sturdy Torreón with its back-


