

Engineer Quinton Daniel reported on the status of the proposed sewer assessment district number two in last week's village council meeting, explaining that to date the only major obstacle to implementing the plan are several areas that are not within the city limits. . . . Although the areas are now served by the city with water and garbage collection, these residents can not be assessed for the sewer. City attorney John W. Thompson said that although there were legal channels that could be pursued to force these residents to come into the city limits, he felt that they would voluntarily do so if they were asked to. The council recommended that he write to these people and so suggest. Also it was made a city policy that these residents would no longer be served by the other city utilities if they would not at this time come into the city limits. . . . 

had no jurisdiction over it. The method of picking 20 students to go was explained by the teachers as based on scholarship, maturity of the students and affability and conduct.

The board voted to raise school lunches 5c at the resumption of classes after the Yule holidays on Jan. 3—a necessity since costs had risen so and there is less assistance from the federal government in providing surplus items.

Supt. White said the lunch fund had lost \$1,200 in four months and that other schools had similar problems and many had raised the price much sooner than Ruidoso to balance their books. The lunch program is supposed to be self-sustaining and losses cannot be underwritten by the schools, he said.

Lunches at present are 30c for children in White Mountain and Nob Hill elementary schools and 40c for high school students when bought by the meal—or 35c per meal when meal tickets are purchased.

Rev. Luther Pitts, local Episcopal minister, said he hoped the board would continue to study ways and means of operating the lunchroom without raising prices—that there might even be a special rate offered for families with three or more children eating their noon meal at the school. He pointed out that a family with four children

ating school lunches would have an increase in their costs of \$4 per month.

Supt. White said the problem had been recognized by the school, and that it had studied the raise for many weeks before determining it was the necessary route to cover the losses anticipated for the balance of this school year.

The superintendent reported on school enrollment, noting a continuing decrease, from 887 on Sept. 27 to 860 on Nov. 23, almost 100 less than in 1965-66, but he said he believed the student registration had now hit the low point for this term.





## 'A Builder' is Apt Term to Describe Rev. Joyce

Rev. Wayne Joyce, pastor of Ruidoso Baptist Church, is a hometown boy who has made his dream come true. Since he was a youth, his ambition was to build a church in Ruidoso. He was born in Longworth, Tex. on March 2, 1927, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Coleman Joyce. The Joyces moved to the Ruidoso vicinity when Wayne was six months old. He attended the Ruidoso Village Grade School and the Capitan High School. He left high school to join the Navy during World War II and served two years. After being discharged he came back to Ruidoso and obtained his eligibility certificate. This is left there to enroll in the Bible

a certificate which passes for a high school diploma and entitles you to enter college.

On Jan. 20, 1948, Rev. Joyce married a Ruidoso girl, Louise Kirby, in Handlett, Okla. They lived in Oklahoma for several years. In 1948 and 1949 Rev. Joyce took a business course and in 1951 took an agricultural course. Both were at Devol, Okla., and both were under the O. I. Bill of Rights.

Rev. Joyce was licensed to preach by the First Baptist Church in Devol on Sept. 29, 1952. In early 1953, he was called to serve full time at the Bible Baptist Church, Abbeville, Okla. He was ordained by this church Dec. 17, 1953. He has eligibility certificate. This is left there to enroll in the Bible

Baptist Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas and was associate pastor of Victory Baptist Church at Kennedale while he completed his schooling. He was president of the student body in his senior year and graduated in May, 1957 as salutatorian with a 92 1/2 average, only half a point behind the valedictorian.


Directly after graduation he was called to pastor Mount Pleasant Baptist Church in Mount Pleasant, Texas. He stayed there until Oct. 1958 when he and his family, which at this time included a son, Daryl Wayne and a daughter, Darline, came to Ruidoso to live.

Now his ambition to build a church in Ruidoso came closer to realization.

In Dec. of 1958, he rented a building in downtown Ruidoso which once housed Borrum Hdw. He started renovating the building and making it into a church. The first service there was Sunday morning, Feb. 1, 1959.

The Ruidoso Baptist Church was organized with eight charter members. They met there until July 4, 1962 when they moved into a new building in Palmer Gateway. The church building is 28 feet by 98 feet with a 28 foot by 40 foot basement, a rock veneer front with rock pillar and a wrought iron sign. There are four classrooms for Sunday School use, nursery, office, three restrooms, baptistry and choir section. The building has a paved parking lot beside it and the church properties are now worth about \$45,000. Thirty-nine persons have been baptized into the church and 70 have joined by letter. The present membership is 76.

Rev. Joyce has worked for many years as a carpenter and still works five days each week. While attending the Bible Baptist Seminary, he built a two bedroom home in Ft. Worth, which he and his family still use as a vacation home. They stay in it every May and attend the Bible Baptist Fellowship there. Since coming to Ruidoso, Rev. Joyce, in addition to building



## 15 Years Ago

The ski season opened this week in Ruidoso after a snowfall of 13 inches in town and more than two feet in the mountains. Snowplows were needed to keep the roads open in the vicinity. An estimated 300 persons traveling on Highway 70 had to remain overnight in Ruidoso when travel on Highway 70 was halted by State Police.  
Highway engineers from the District 2 office in Carlsbad arrived here this week and began surveying the hazardous curves along State Road 27 in Ruidoso preparatory to widening and easing the slopes in three places. A construction program of \$49,448 was recently authorized for the project. The three areas in Ruidoso

are from the Old Mill to the top of Carrizo Hill, at Midway near the George McCarty residence, and above the Telephone Office through Navajo and Travis Canyon curves.  
Fourteen varsity letters from the 1951 Ruidoso High School football season have been announced by Coach Cy Leland. The Warriors won five games and lost three. Heading the list are seniors Rex Whiteley, Bill Tucker, Buck Morrison, Ray Clark, Ronald Stewart, Kirby Lewis and Bill Carpenter. Juniors honored were Jan McElhany and George Ferry. Four sophomores received letters, Johnny Barajas, Marion Gayden, Benny Gardenhire and Dean Holman.

"Zorba the Greek". Of course, there were no Americans there either, since they had all gone back to the ship (heh-heh). Hank and I were just sitting in the corner, having a great time watching the goings-on, when a whole bunch of Greek students came over to our table, and MADE us go over and sit with them. Well, Hank and I got up and danced Zorba dances, too, just like a couple of real Greeks. We kept ending up outside, all of us, somehow or another, dancing in the streets, and blocking traffic. We talked to the students, sang Greek songs (don't ask me how Hank and I sang Greek songs, but we did!!!). About 3:30 the owner of the place decided that it was time to close, so we all left the place, still singing and dancing Zorba dances. We all had our arms around each other, singing at the top of our lungs. I guess if anyone did that kind of thing in the U.S., they would be arrested for disorderly conduct, and probably a few other things, too. Oh, I wish I could tell you the feeling I had; it was just like a dream—we were really Greeks, and had been accepted into their own culture—I don't know how to say it, but it's something I'll never forget. Finally, just about everyone went their separate ways, and the two of us were left with two of the students. They took us to a tea-room kind of thing for ice cream, and orange juice, then Hank and I went back to the hotel!—I think it was somewhere around 4:00. I was so excited, I couldn't sleep (had to get up early anyway) to go to a Greek Orthodox Service and discussion with one of the priests for my religious class. So after that was over, I came back to the ship and collapsed. Carol and I had dated with two Greek students we met in Athens the first night we were here, but I just couldn't make it—my heel really bothered me—I guess from so much walking and dancing! and I'm about to drop dead I'm so tired!

## Around the World With Wendy

A Report on a World Tour Aboard Chapman College's Seven Seas Floating School

I mailed the letter about Rome and Athens (the first two days) today from Athens, but we heard that the P.O. is on strike, so it may be a while before you get that letter.  
I guess last night made my whole trip worth while—have to tell you all about it. Six of us (3 girls, 3 boys) took an overnight; we stayed one night off the ship in a hotel in Athens, which is really neat, because you don't have to worry about getting in on time, and there's more time to look around and do things. Anyway, after we checked in at the hotel, Hank and I walked downtown to eat dinner. On the way to the restaurant, some little girl came up to us and gave us a flower—don't know what it was, but it smelled like gardenia. Well, it turned out that she was selling the flowers, so Hank bought it for me (I think he got took—\$1.50). We ate at a really "ethnic" place, the food was great, and there weren't any Americans there, so it was really full of atmosphere. After we finished, we walked up to the Acropolis, and stayed up there for almost an hour, just looking at Athens, and trying to think of some really profound thoughts—an inspiration from Aristotle, since we were standing on his old stomping grounds. But nothing came to us, so we wandered around some more, and then went down into the Plaka area.

The Plaka is a really Greeky district, where all the neat night clubs and restaurants are. We walked past one place, and heard Zorba music coming from upstairs, so we went up the steps to a restaurant. It was jammed with people—all Greeks again—no Americans, and there was a really super Greek band playing all sorts of Zorba music. We ate some of the shish-kababs that Greece is famous for (well, from now on it will be to me). They are little chunks of veal roasted on a spit, then covered with some spices and lemon juice (YUM!!!) I'll have to fix some when I get back home. We also tried some retsina—which is wine flavored with pine resin—sounds horrible, but it's really good (different, too). About 12:00, all Greeks started staggering out of the place, so we decided to leave, too. We walked around some more, trying to find another place to go to. The streets in the Plaka area are little teeny things—almost too small for even a VW to get through, and every building is a little restaurant-bar, or night club. We walked past one place, and saw a girl dancing to some more Zorba music, so we went in to watch what was going on. There was a band of two men playing guitars, and the people who were there were taking turns getting up and dancing. That's what is so great about Greeks—if they feel like dancing, they just get up and dance; and it's really good dancing, too, nothing corny or ridiculous. Mostly men dance, but there were a couple of girls dancing with them. Not modern kind of dances, but really Zorba dances (you'll HAVE to see





## HAVE YOU TRIED . . . ?

### Recipe For Minted Pecans

By LADONNA ROSSON  
(C. P. S. Home Economist)  
Minted Pecans

- 2 cups sugar.
- Few grains salt.
- 1/2 cup evaporated milk.
- 1 tsp. butter or margarine.
- 4 cups pecan halves (1 lb.)
- 1 tsp. peppermint extract.
- Mix sugar, salt, evaporated milk and butter in a medium size saucepan.
- Stir over low heat (double boiler not needed on an electric range) until sugar is dissolved, about five minutes.
- Then cook over medium heat on the electric range, stirring constantly until the soft ball stage is reached (234 degrees), about 7 minutes.
- Remove from heat and stir in peppermint extract and pecan halves being sure to coat pecans well.
- Pour out onto a sheet of aluminum foil and quickly separate nuts, dripping onto additional foil with two forks. Cool.
- Store in tightly closed containers.
