

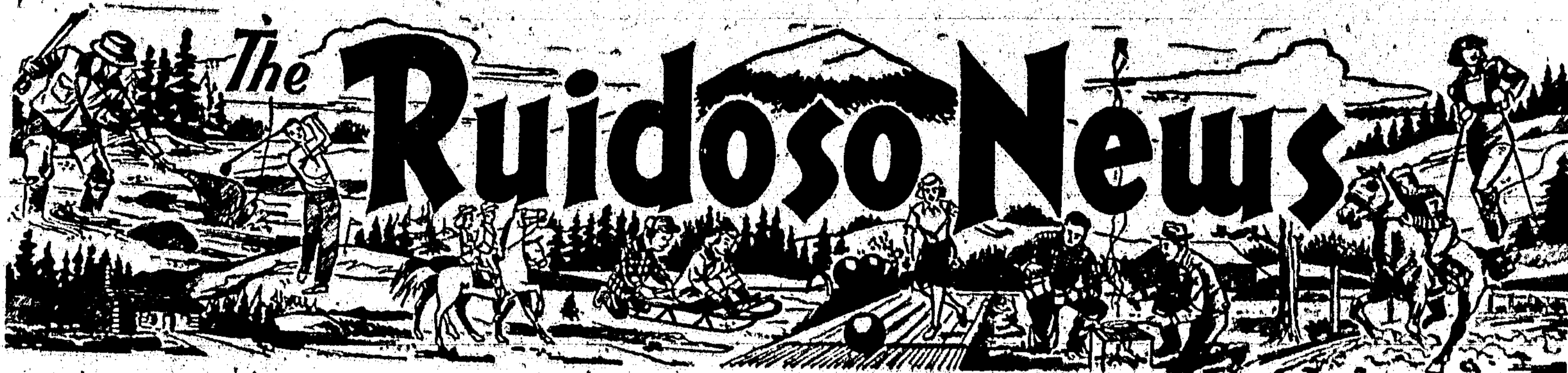

Four Perish In Plane Crash

Two couples from Kermit, Tex., flying here to visit friends, met instant death here Sunday about 1:15 p.m. when the single engine J-35 Bonanza in which they were passengers plummeted to earth near Eagle Creek three miles northeast of Ruidoso Municipal Airport.

The dead, burned beyond recognition when their ship burst into flames after the crash, were E. Wallace and his wife, Jean, and Joe Potter and his wife Sarah.

Forest fire fighters, summoned to the area at 1:45 p.m. when an observer at the R. G. (Bob) Scribner High Mesa Ranch reported the blaze, were the first to discover the downed aircraft at a few minutes after 2 o'clock.

northwest. It sheared off the top of one small pine, knocked a gash in another as it struck the earth in a timbered area about 150 yards from Eagle Creek, a short distance north of a forest service road.

Ruidoso Municipal Airport reported no word had been received from the aircraft when it arrived in this area. The airport log revealed, however, that the plane had landed here on previous occasions, the last time being on Jan. 22 when it was tied down at Brown Flying Service facilities.

Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Adams, formerly of Kermit and residents of Ruidoso for several years, had planned to stay in the Wallace trailer. Mr. and Mrs. Adams visited here a few days late in February

enroute from Napa, Calif., where they have been living for several months, to Kermit to visit. In Kermit on Friday night last week they visited in the Wallace home and were given a key to the Wallace trailer here in which they might stay. They returned here in their car Sunday.

The Adams speculated that the Wallaces and their friends, the Potters, planned a Sunday flying visit to Ruidoso. The Wallaces are also acquainted with Mr. and Mrs. Sam Montgomery in Ruidoso, who knew them in Kermit.

Telephone calls by the Montgomerys and the Adams established identification of the four at about dusk Sunday by calling friends in Kermit. At Kermit, it was determined the two couples had taken off at about 9 o'clock (8 a.m. Ruidoso time). Friends said the Wallace car was still parked at the Kermit airport when the Ruidoso call was received there.

The plane has been into Ruidoso on two other occasions during the fall and winter. Employees at Ruidoso airport were non-committal about the plane or passengers, reporting they had no information at all for the press.

Removal of Segment Of Sewer District May Be Debated

Ruidoso's board of trustees may debate withdrawal of a large segment of the proposed Sewer District No. 3 from the project. Mayor Lloyd Hyatt, who presided, said the project was set up after two years' study. The decision will be made early next week after a two-hour protest hearing at the village hall Friday night last week which saw more than 60 written protests from a crowd of about 50 who attended.

Most vociferous of the protesters were L. F. (Joe) Dryden and Mrs. Samuel Hyatt, who spoke in opposition of the project on several occasions. They objected to the cost, and pointed out that increasing assessments for paving, sewer and perhaps other "progress" would be a detriment to the community's growth, discouraging newcomers from investing in homes here. Retired couples with fixed income could not afford the cost of owning property here, they stressed. Answering one query as to why

the sewer installation had been halted through general objection, rather than on an amendment to the project, Mayor Hyatt said that the project was set up after two years' study. The decision will be made early next week after a two-hour protest hearing at the village hall Friday night last week which saw more than 60 written protests from a crowd of about 50 who attended.

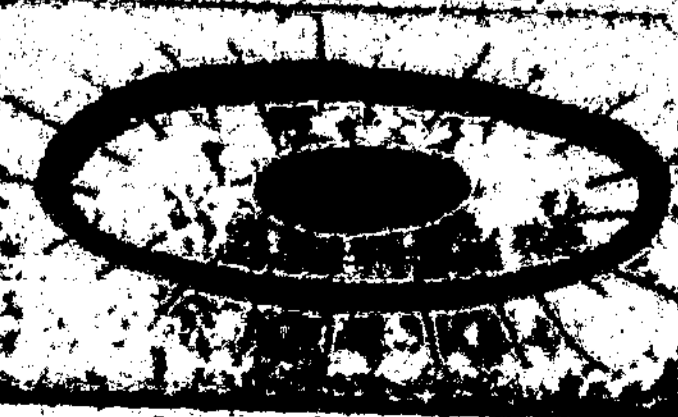
Young Service Station Operator At Mescalero Apache Summit First To See UFO's In Area On March 2

Robert English, 20, an employee at Mescalero Apache Summit's Chevron station, was one of about 30 persons who saw unidentified flying objects in the sides over and west of the Sierra Blanca Mountain range on Thursday morning, March 2. He talked at length of the experience, and told of several other people witnessing the phenomena. He had called them from the restaurant that is operated nearby. He said Jim Ruby, a cook

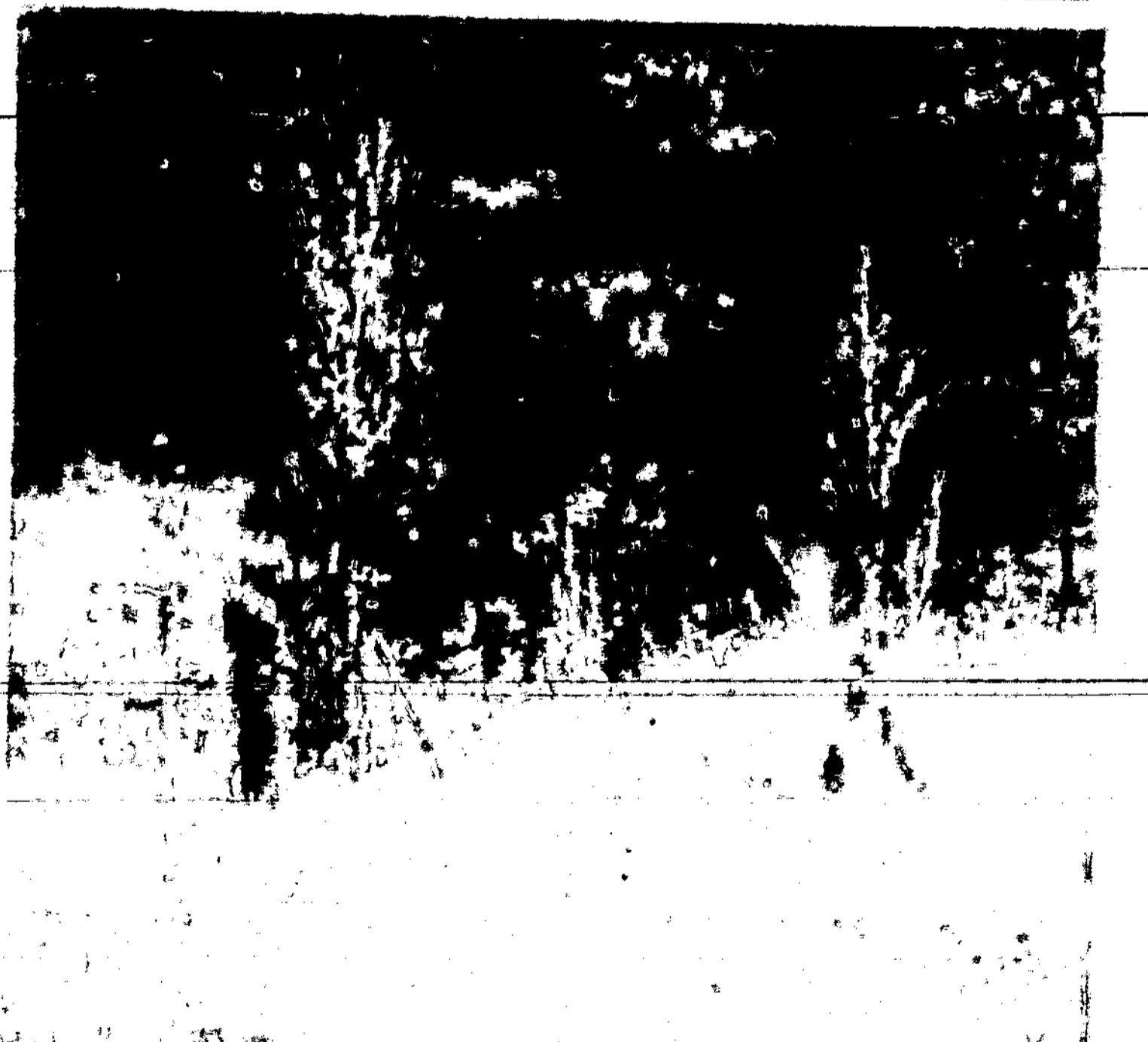
at the restaurant saw them and that others, who were in the cafe drinking coffee also got a good look at them.

He said he saw several cylindrical shaped objects from 11 a.m. until 1 p.m. that day, and since his experience, he has talked with others who have seen them racing over the reservation on other days recently. He said they left no vapor trail, or smoke, and that they flew at a very fast pace—very high. He said he could not estimate how high they were, but were so high it was difficult to see them sharply. "I borrowed a pair of binoculars at one time to watch them, but they were very hard to keep in sight—and they still were at such a height I could not see them very



Eye Bank Month Is Being Observed

Gov. David F. Cargo has signed a proclamation establishing the month of March as "Eye Bank Month" in New Mexico. Ruidoso Lions Eye Bank annually reported here this week.

The New Mexico Eye Bank is a state wide project of the Lions Club of this state. Its president is Dr. Richard Ferdinand of the Albuquerque Northwest Lions Club. Spectacularly, Eye Bank Month is intended to publicize Eye Bank activity and to secure a many additional donors as possible.

The Eye Bank located at 5000 Gibson Blvd. N. E., Albuquerque, was started by the New Mexico Lions about three years ago. During this period, 70 eye transplants have been accomplished. The New Mexico Eye Bank, with approximately 4,200 donors already signed up offering their eyes at death, is not only a non-profit organization, but also is a very expensive service, supported by all of the Lions Clubs in New Mexico.

The New Mexico Eye Bank works as follows: When a donor who has offered his eyes upon his death dies or is killed, the next of kin, the hospital or doctor will call the Executive Secretary of the Eye Bank informing her that a patient has just died who is an Eye Bank donor. This will start a "Race Against Time" involving the doctor who will entreat the eyes, Highway Patrolmen and Lions Club members who aid in transporting, obtaining authorization from the family all of which must be done before removal. The Eye Bank Executive must contact the next two doctors on her list who in turn must examine the patient to the

hospital. Within 48 hours two corneal transplants somewhere in the United States may be made.

Full information on how the Eye Bank operates and what is necessary to become a donor can be obtained by writing the New Mexico Lions Eye Bank, 5200 Gibson Blvd., N. E., Albuquerque.

Magnificent View of Area Is Feature of Ramey Home

Editor's Note: This is another in a series of articles on the interesting homes in the Ruidoso area.

Mrs. Jo Ramey who lives in Country Club Estates has been living off and on in Ruidoso for 28 years. When she built the home she now lives in seven years ago there were only two other houses in that area.

To say that she chose a prime area with a simply fantastic view is putting it mildly. The view from any room of the home is beautiful but that from the living room through a 30 foot glass expanse is breathtaking. Squarely in front is Baldy, seemingly close enough to touch; to the north Mon Jeau and the Sierra Blanca Ski Area and below the White Mountain Ski.

Jodie Fileman, Mrs. Ramey's son-in-law, built the house for her. It is a split level, two-bedroom, reduced and cluster block modern, beautifully constructed home that would be distinctive in any city, but in our setting much more so.

An outstanding feature of the house is the adept use of wood.

The ceiling covering the entire house, is quite outstanding. It is made of hand picked fir panels two inches wide and four inches thick which provides wonderful insulation besides beauty. All other woodwork and paneling in the house is mahogany, which is even used in the

bathroom.

The house may be entered from two levels. On the upper level is the living area with a run around deck made of the same fine fir paneling as is used in the ceiling. The living area, about 20x30, is carpeted in beautiful aqua and green, with a used brick fireplace at one end.

The dining area is centered with an imported Danish modern glass topped table with four chairs. In the living area is a very beautiful kidney shaped English carved desk and chair beautifully arched, and placed artistically in front of the windows. It has belonged in Mrs. Ramey's family many, many years.

Hanging above it, and a recent gift to Mrs. Ramey from a daughter, and which came from California, is a lamp in the form of a cluster of grapes in tones of green and aqua like that of the carpet. Other furnishings in the room are modern.

The large bedroom is furnished in white French provincial furniture, has two closets—one a walk through that leads to the 16x12 bathroom. The bathroom's main feature, other than its mahogany paneling, is a dressing table covered with imported tile.

The kitchen is most outstanding with celestary windows, a bar covered with imported tile underneath 10 feet wide windows which, by being on two walls, allows a view of the mountains, and a pantry. A discriminate use of brick is found around the stove and all appliances, made to order in a very soft shade of brown.

The downstairs part of the house contains a bedroom and bath with the view from this area the same as that of the upstairs.

The yard is landscaped very tastefully requiring very little upkeep. Surrounding a flagstone patio are various shrubs including pyracantha, honeysuckle and spreading juniper, etc. Growing on the ground underneath the juniper—which affords it some protection from severe cold—is English ivy, the start of which came from Red Skelton's garden in Hollywood.

Even at night the house is outstanding for then one can see the lights of cars winding their way down from the ski area, making both day and night living in this home a delightful experience.

Forest Fire Can Be Catastrophe If Rules of Caution Ignored

(Editor's Note: The following article was prepared for the Ruidoso News by the Ruidoso Ranger Station of the Lincoln National Forest.)

The People vs. John Doe

So, you say you don't want to start a forest fire! Then read on. The dry windy days of spring, known to forest employees as critical fire season, are upon us. On the worst fire danger days weather tends to hold the whip hand. Unless a fire is controlled while it is still small, a major catastrophe becomes a very real probability. So what? You live in the desert. Anyway, the Forest Service gets paid for fighting fires. Don't stop reading now, you became involved the minute you became an American citizen.

Remember, you in conjunction with 190,000,000 other Americans, own this forest. Pause and think a moment. Wildfire reduces the productivity of the land for many years. In addition, the cost of re-establishing a forest is quite high. You wouldn't dream of setting a fire that would burn your house! Why allow your campfire or cigarette to destroy your forest? Remember! You are eligible for a fine and a damage suit should your negligence cause a forest fire. Should you own a cabin within the boundaries of a National Forest, the chances of your starting a forest fire are greatly increased. A fire starting on your land can rapidly spread to adjacent lands. Think how you might feel after you tell your neighbor your trash fire

just burned up his cabin.

Fire prevention is a state of mind. If you are fire conscious around your home—in the desert or the mountains—chances that you will start a forest fire are greatly lessened.

Fire conscious at home! What do I mean? Here are a few items that tend to get well intentioned citizens in trouble.

1. Trash Barrels—

(A) Be sure and obtain a burning permit from your local fire department if one is required.

(B) Read and comply with the requirements of the permit. Simple! Why all this yacking? The permit cannot cover every possible situation. For instance, you have your permit and your trusty old garden hose is ready; but, you've waited until mid-afternoon to get around to burning your trash. The wind has really started blowing hard the past hour or so. Worried? Go ahead and set your fire—that is if you want to be up to your ears

in lawsuits. Well, the wind didn't come up and being fairly conscientious you've stayed around until the fire has pretty well burned down. Anyway, your favorite program is on TV—Dear Old Dad—don't leave it now. Spend that few extra minutes and be sure it's dead out.

2. Ash Dumps—

Being a good citizen you've built a small pit to dump your fireplace ashes. Sure you've dumped them all season with no problems so dump them again—RIGHT—wrong! Take a few seconds to see no litter has accumulated that would allow a fire to escape from the pit. Chances are good there are a few live coals in those ashes.

3. Cigarettes—

Here's where we all tend to get in trouble—during the wet months of summer and winter we tend to get careless. So your friend flips a cigarette into the dead grass in your yard. Chances are it won't start a fire. But! If it should, you

may be out a house or a cabin. Give your friend a talking to now—the argument will be mild compared to the one that will take place if your cabin burns. You can see, what applies at home; now apply the same principles when you're out in the forest. Take every reasonable precaution to prevent your fire from escaping (rake a line to mineral soil for at least three feet around your campfire), put that match or cigarette out, never, repeat, NEVER leave your campfire unattended, and be sure your fire is dead out.

If we are fire conscious, we will be able to preserve our homes and our forests for future generations to enjoy.

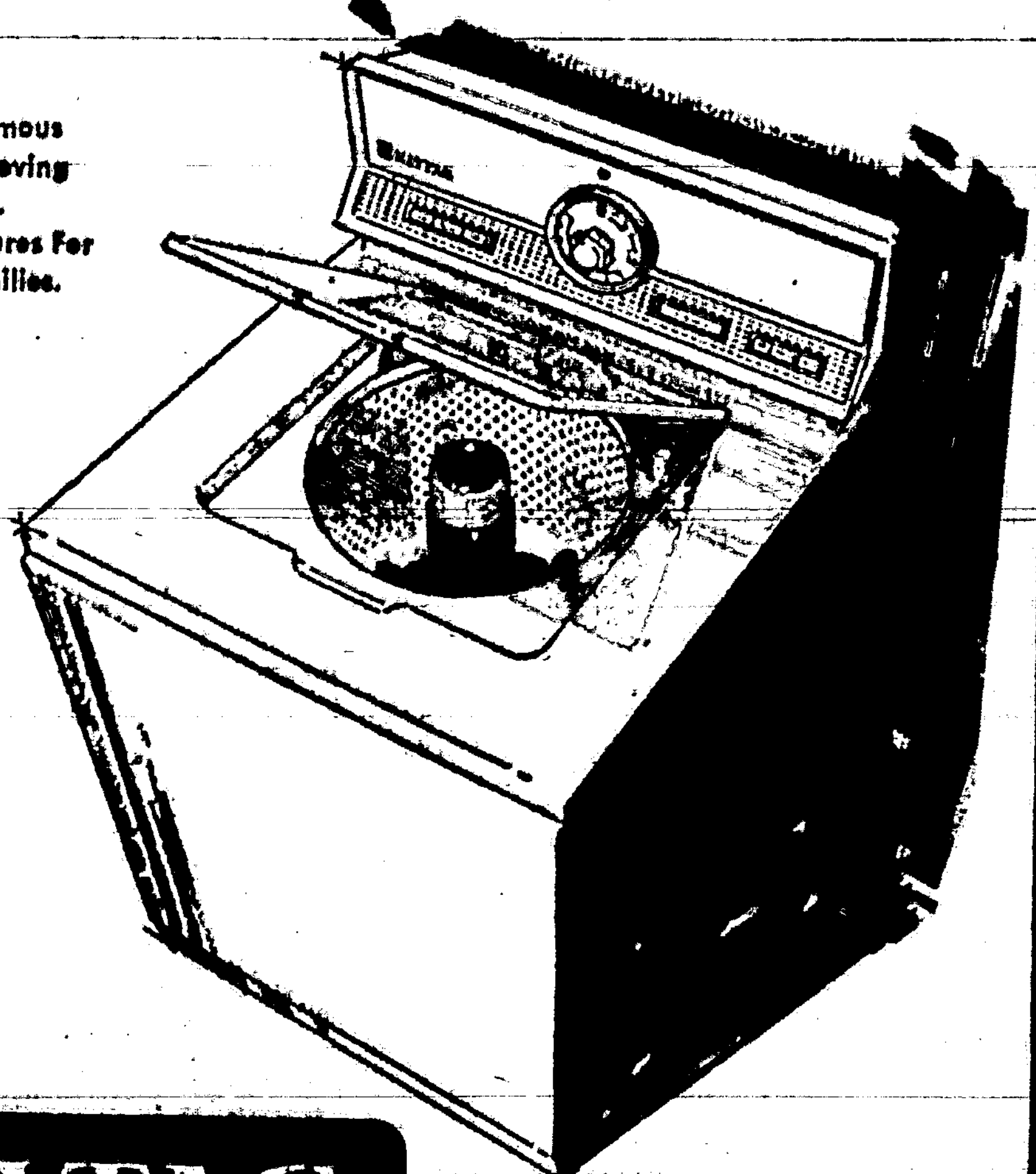

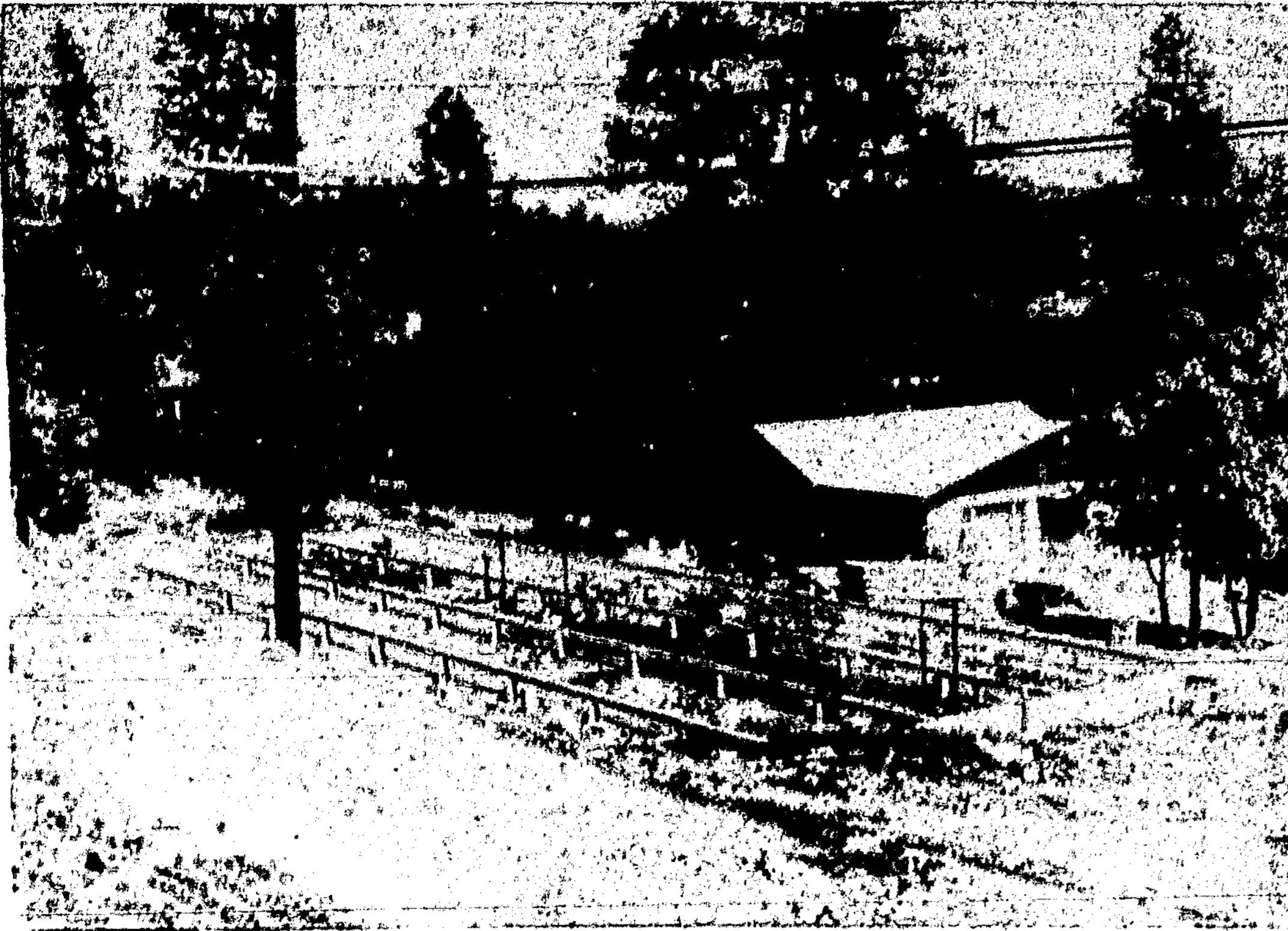

Chapel of Roscoe mortuary employee Albert Jay, assisted by John Harrelson, spent more than an hour removing the charred remains of the four bodies under supervision of the sheriff. There were no identification papers to be obtained from the wreckage—most of it having been destroyed in the fire which even melted most of the plane's metal skin. The wings and tail, torn from the ship, were almost totally destroyed by fire. Only the rear portion of the fuselage remained, and it was crushed. The plane's license number, barely discernable in the crumpled fuselage, was checked with Kermit friends of the couple, as was the plane's make to further establish the identity of the occupants. The Civil Aeronautics Board was to have an investigator at the crash site early Monday to try and determine the cause of the crash. The Ruidoso acquaintances of the Wallaces said he was employed in an important executive position with an oil company and that Fother worked with El Paso Natural Gas Co.

A coroner's jury, summoned by Justice of the Peace Austin Pritchett, returned a verdict of death in an airplane crash for the four who were killed. An autopsy was conducted and identification was established for the quartet through dental records brought to Roswell by Dr. John Graves, dentist at Kermit. The autopsy was performed at Ballard Funeral Home at Roswell where the remains were taken Monday on orders from one of the two federal boards investigating the disaster. The Federal Aviation Agency had representatives here from Albuquerque, and the Civil Aeronautics Board had some officials here from Denver to make inquiries and to try to determine the cause of the crash. Besides Lincoln National Forest personnel from Ruidoso Ranger Station, members of Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department, from the Bonito VFD and a contingent of fire fighters from Sierra Blanca Camp at Ft. Stanton battled the woods blaze that followed the crash. John Abel of the Smokey Bear Ranger district directed the work of the young men from Ft. Stanton. On the coroner's jury were Don Stark, foreman, R. H. Hedgecooks, John Harrelson, Ed Lane, Albert Jay and Sam Montgomery.

Ambulance Subsidy Discussed by Trustees
Whether or not the village can continue to offer a subsidy to help keep an ambulance service in operation in this area is being studied by a committee of trustees, Jodie Filleran and Buzz Whitlock, appointed by Mayor Lloyd L. Davis in last Thursday's village council meeting. The board had previously offered a subsidy to enable the ambulance to continue past a shut-down date announced by the original operators, Chapel of Roscoe here. Joe Lucas and Albert Jay of the Chapel of Roscoe met with the council and urged it study the continuation of \$250 a month offered on a trial basis. They said a subsidy is also being asked of the Lincoln County commissioner. In previous statements issued by the two men, they have declared the ambulance operation lost 200% in 1966 and that it could not be continued at such a cost to the firm, or to Jay, who might attempt to operate it as a private business. Other matters talked by the council included discussion of progress on the municipal swimming pool, and the need to replace the weathered welcome sign at the Y near the exit entrance to Ruidoso off U. S. Highway 70. A prototype of a style of sign being considered is now erected on the municipal building lawn for study. The sign may be copied in style and several similar ones placed at various parts of the city to indicate historical sites, or subdivision entrances. Also discussed was a possible color code in street signs to indicate to motorists they are driving into another area of the village.

Also protested was the method of assessment, by square footage rather than front footage. Engineer Quinton Daniel replied that several methods of assessment were discussed over a long period of time in planning the project, and that the method used in the proposed project was the most equitable. It was contended that the square footage charge was the most fair for all the 1,000 lots that had been included in Sewer District No. 2 when it was compared with a front footage assessment. "The same amount of money to install the system would have to be collected from the owners of the 1,000 lots, no matter which method is used to compute the assessment," it was pointed out.

Two persons at the hearing spoke in favor of the project—T. T. Toon and Ed Wimberly, who expressed the hope that it would be implemented. Problem of Elk Plant by Apaches Discussed by Forest Grazing Board

Problems arising from elk planting on the Mescalero Apache Reservation and the vital need for fire prevention in range country were primary topics discussed at the annual meeting of the Lincoln National Forest Grazing Advisory Board in Alamogordo last week.

The Indians have brought in 160 head of elk in the last two years and plan to add more, the board understands.

Ranchers claim the elk are spreading to land adjoining the reservation, damaging fences and taking an ever-increasing toll of grazing land.

The Forest Service and the State Game Department plan to make an intensive study of the spread this coming summer, according to authorities here. Information obtained will be used to formulate recommendations for future handling of the herd.

"During what was later termed a 'thorough' discussion of the problem, Forest Service officials stated that 'range resources are pretty well obligated with the heavy deer herds and domestic livestock.' They added that they felt heavy stocking with elk eventually would result in over-use of land.

Farris McDermald, range staff authority, pointed out that the same amount of land can support an estimated five deer for every one elk.

Dan McIntyre, fire staff man for Lincoln National, complimented area ranchers for their "excellent cooperation" in prevention of range fires, but warned that "conditions are making this year especially dangerous." He said eight fires have broken out since Jan. 1, seven in grass and one in a cedar. McIntyre asked that ranchers exercise extreme caution. Board members agreed and noted that cooperation of tourists and campers also is needed.

Road maintenance on Forest Service land and range improvement funds were also discussed. McDermald read a proposed program for range improvements totaling \$37,000 for fiscal year 1968. Chairman Charles Walker, Mayhill, advised members that they should cooperate with their district rangers on range management planning.

Walker was re-elected chairman for this year. Bill Edgar, Smokey Bear district, was chosen secretary. Others attending were Paul H. Jones, Ruidoso; Arvel Jernigan, Sacramento; Bill Davis, Cloudcroft; McDermald; John M. Hall, new Lincoln National Forest supervisor, and McIntyre.

Spring Turkey Hunting Season Set April 25-30

The 1967 spring gobbler hunt has been set for April 23 through April 30. Areas open for hunting will be the Sacramento Division of Lincoln National Forest and the Olla-Black Range area of southwestern New Mexico. There will be 1,200 permits issued for the Sacramento hunt area and 3,000 permits for the Olla-Black Range area.

Hunters will be required to have a valid 1967 Big Game license and special turkey tag in order to hunt. There will be no charge for the turkey tag. Applications for tags will be received in the Santa Fe office of the Department of Game and Fish up to 5 p.m. March 27. If more applications are received than there are tags available, the tags will be allotted by means of a public drawing.

The bag limit for this hunt will be one gobbler (male) with a beard extending at least two inches beyond the breast feathers.

The 1967 hunt will be the third spring turkey hunt held in New Mexico. The past two hunts have been very successful, with those hunters using turkey calls having the best luck. Turkeys are plentiful throughout the Sacramento Mountains, with the west central area having the greater concentration.

KITE FLYING IS FUN BUT THERE'S DANGER, TOO. Time-tested harbingers of Spring are budding meadowlarks, red-breasted robins, and long-tailed kites diving and swooping through sunny skies. One of the traditional joys of childhood that continues generation after generation is flying a kite on a windy March day; and, according to the American Kite Association, it is a sport that also enjoyed year-round by many enthusiastic adults.

"Whether young or old, smart kite-flyers will observe the basic rules of safety," says Max McCoy, Community Public Service commercial manager. "One of the most important rules is never to fly a kite where there is a possibility of its getting entangled in electric wires."

Other dangerous practices in connection with kite-flying include using metal string or wire, making the kite frame of metal, flying kites in the rain when even a cotton string can become a dangerous conductor of electricity, and trying to retrieve it if it becomes tangled up in electric wires. As a reminder, CPS has distributed kite safety posters for school bulletin boards.

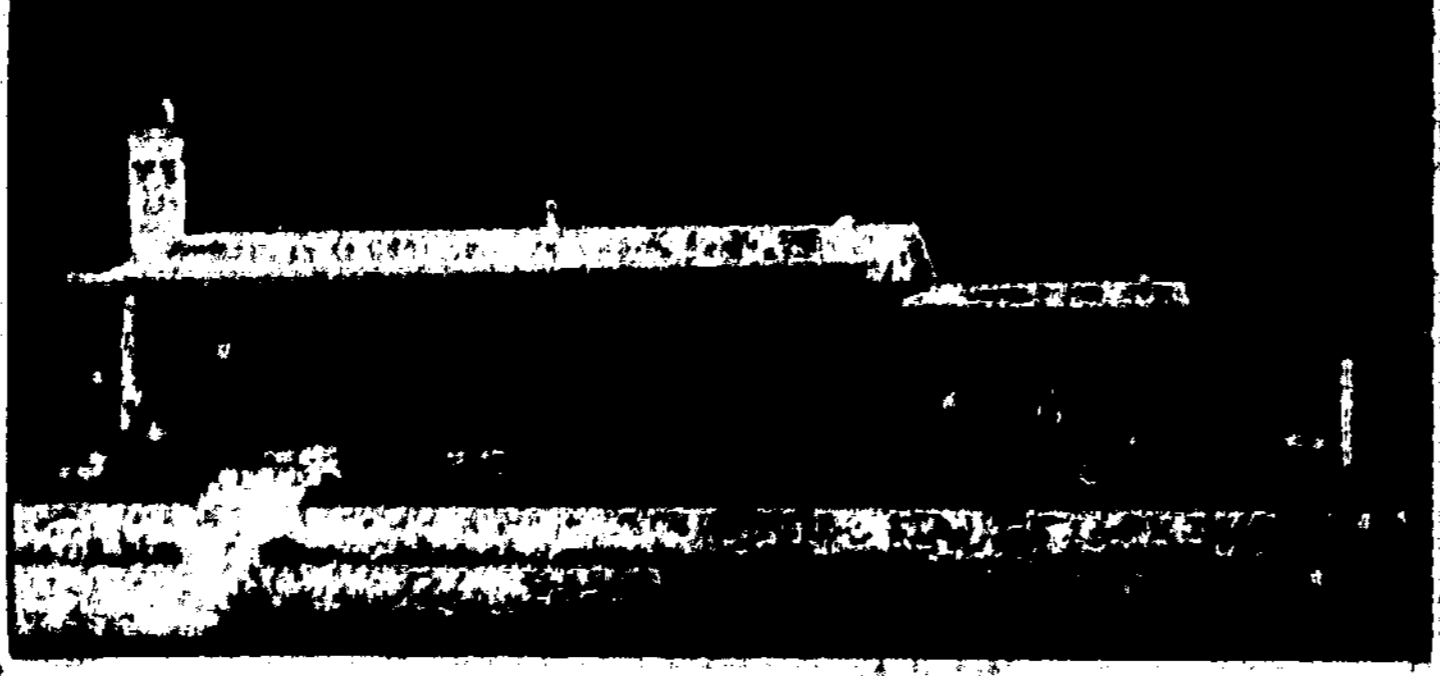

Hart had asked for answers to questions posed to Petty in an open letter. The letter had been received by Petty in advance and had also appeared in the Ruidoso News. The letter asked Petty to clarify the board's position on credit union and their policy on awarding scholarships. Her letter stated that she had "heard rumors" that a teacher would not be rehired because of his stand on these issues.

Petty told her that Cook was not to be rehired, but for other reasons. In an exclusive interview the following day, Petty said Cook was dismissed for insubordination to his principal, Sidney Miller, and also to Superintendent White. Petty said Cook was unable to take constructive criticism and would fly off the handle whenever it was offered.

Petty volunteered, at one meeting between Cook, his principal and the superintendent, the board's lawyer needed to be present to advise Cook to return to his classroom.

Petty said that although the board was not required by law to grant a hearing to a non-tenure teacher, he would vote to give Cook a hearing if he should ask for it. He said he felt certain that the rest of the board would agree to the hearing also.

Cook's wife, along with Mrs. David Travis, was also not rehired. George White stated at the meeting that they were teaching seventh and eighth grade language arts. He said that this is the only area where there is duplication. As the school will receive about \$35,000 less this year, this is the logical place to cut, it was declared.

Petty said later during the interview, that both Mrs. Cook and Mrs. Travis would be offered teaching positions should a position become available. The board accepted White's recommendation to rehire all of the school district's other teachers and employees.

Also the board voted to ask for \$4,000 in federal Title I funds because of increased Indian enrollment in addition to the \$5,471 already received.

Board Offers Hearing To Teacher Not Given Renewal Contract

"Just listen to me as if I were a human being." The plea came from a fifth grade Ruidoso teacher whose contract had not been renewed by the Ruidoso School Board at its regular meeting last Thursday evening.

Tom Cook, the teacher, had been advised by the board's attorney, Richard Parsons, that he could

only be heard at a hearing held at another date. As Cook pleaded to be heard now, the board adjourned. Parsons asked Cook if he would request a hearing. Cook argued that he couldn't get a fair hearing from the board. Parsons flushed in anger, and retorted that he would see to it that Cook received a fair hearing. Cook then berated the board for only discussing his dismissal "behind closed doors." He was referring to a special board meeting on Feb. 22, part of which the board labeled an "Executive Session" and excluded visitors and press. Cook distributed a mimeographed statement to those present. It suggested that the reason he had been dismissed was because of his activities as president of the local teacher association. The paper implied that Ralph Petty, the president of the board, had brought pressure upon the administrators of the school not to rehire him. This had been done, he thought, because of his stand favoring a credit union for the local teachers and his criticism of the procedure by which scholarships were granted to students. 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Enjoyment, Development Are Aims Of Reading, School Head Declares

Editor: Note: This is another in a continuing series of articles in the News, has asked the Ruidoso School Superintendent to prepare for our readers.

By GEORGE P. WHITE (Ruidoso School Superintendent) In any discussion of reading it is important to remember that the first literature classes were called reading. These early lessons consisted solely of oral recitations. The major objective was to see that the pupil could associate sound with symbol and produce the proper sound from the printed page. Whether the activity changed the pupil in any way was not a consideration.

In contrast, today the pragmatic view which says that nothing is important or even exists if it does not make a difference in generally the best on which we teach reading. In applying the pragmatic test to reading we say that teaching the skill is not defensible if it does not make a difference in children.

The good reader is helped to solve some of his more important personal problems through reading. He might not be able to do this in a conversation, for only if he comes to understand his own uniqueness will he be able to understand others. Reading carries him to a hoped quickly beyond himself and into the lives of others.

The timid child finds that others are timid too. The handicapped child finds that other human beings have been handicapped and have overcome the burden. Other children find that loneliness is a common human condition. Still other children learn that our world which is full of beauty has a great abundance of ugliness, too. Accepting this ugliness can be an outcome of reading which has "made

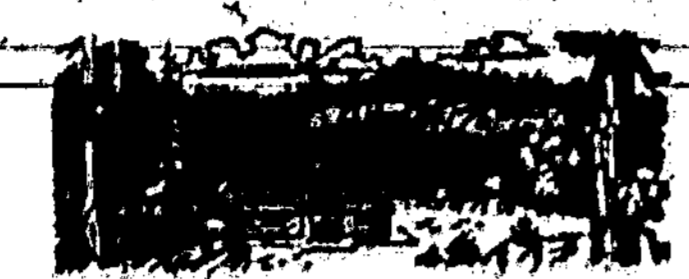

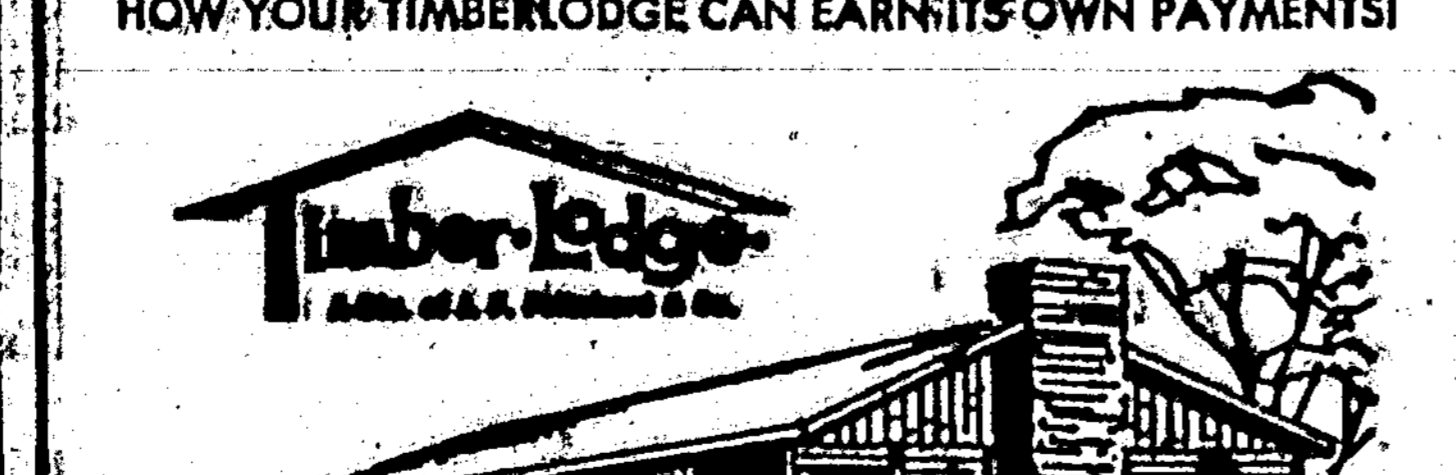

Arizona U. Art Department Head To Be In Symposium

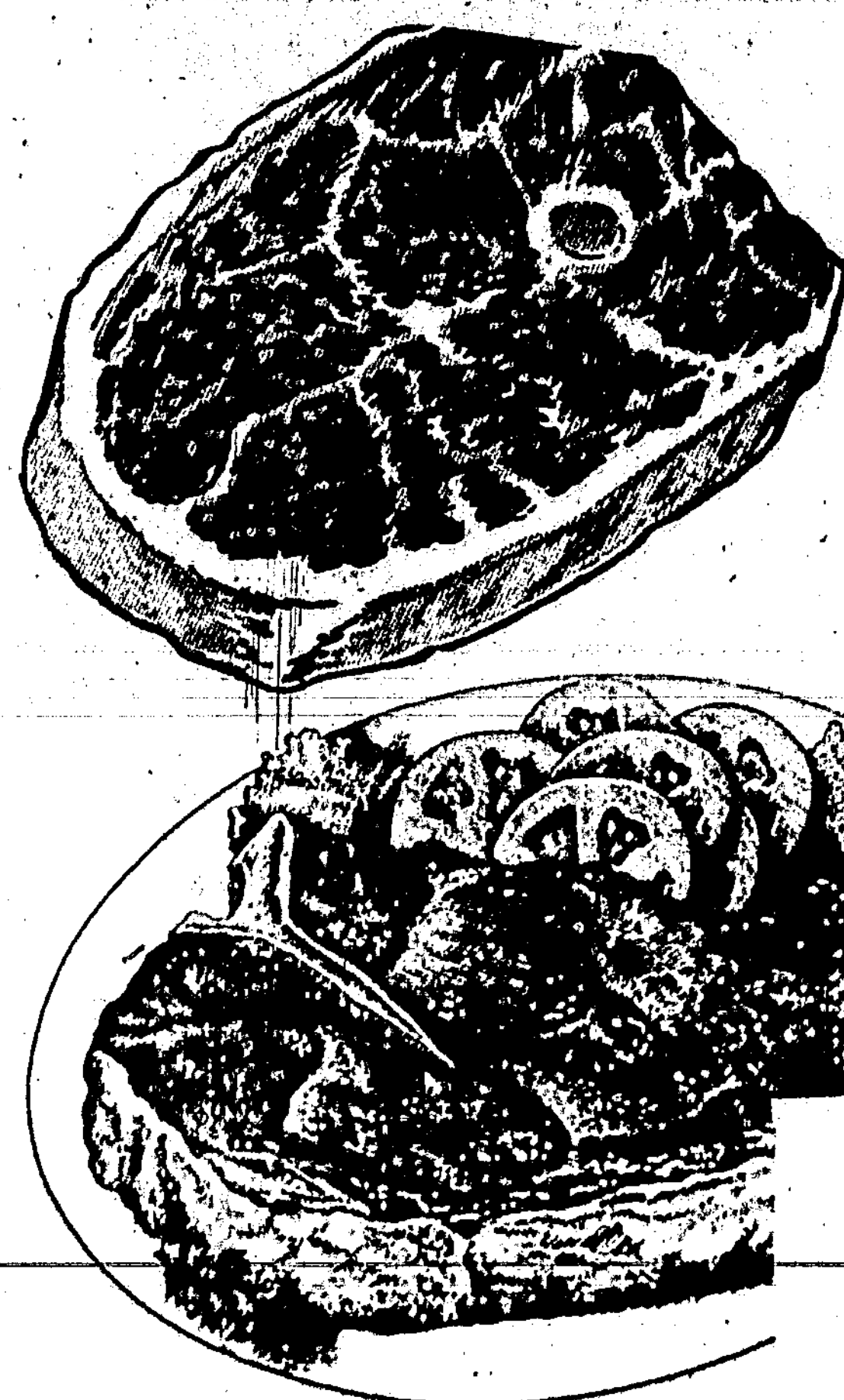
Andrew Rush, associate professor of art at the University of Arizona will join the group of artists and lecturers who will meet in Ruidoso March 24, 25 and 26 for the first annual Southwestern Art Symposium. Rush will speak on "Art as a Process", which related to the fact the artist as a maker of a work and experiences the work from a point of view not always clear to the viewer.

Rush joined the University of Arizona art faculty in 1959. He taught printmaking and design at the University of Illinois and at the University of Iowa where he also taught in 1958 and 1959. He lived and worked in Florence, Italy under a Fulbright grant in printmaking. In the last ten years Rush has participated in over one hundred national and international exhibitions of prints and drawings including the Library of Congress, II Premio Biennale de Gattina, American Art Today (World's Fair), Fifty Printmakers, 100 Prints of the Year (BACA), USIS exhibits to Latin America, Asia and Africa, Graphic Arts USA exchange exhibit with the Soviet Union, and others. He is represented in many collections, among them the Library of Congress, the Brooklyn Museum, Seattle Museum, Dallas Museum, Free Library of Philadelphia, American Embassy in London, the Uffizi Museum in Florence, and the Joslyn Museum of Oklahoma Printmakers.

Currently, Rush is director of the University of Arizona summer residence program in Graphic Art in Italy which was begun in 1960 and will be continued this year.

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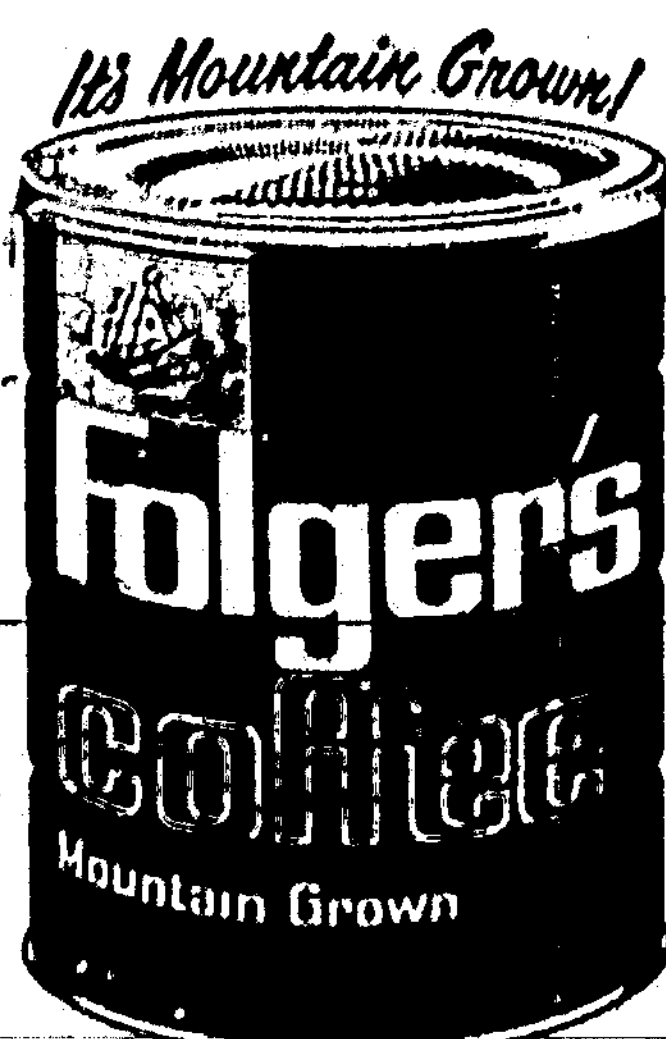
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
