FOREST
CLOSED

No unauthorized travel will be allowed on any "slide road" leading off of state or federal highways in the Lincoln National Forest in this area under an official closing order that went into effect Wednesday morning.

The extreme dryness in the woods, due to high winds and very little precipitation this spring, added to the drought conditions of several months during the winter, has brought the far-reaching order. Two serious forest fires in the last two weeks in the Lincoln forest have pointed up the necessity, Wayne White, public relations officer at the Ruidoso Ranger station said Wednesday.

He said the order means there can be no fishing, picnicking, horseback riding, hiking or similar recreation allowed anywhere on forest lands. Smoking and fires of any kind are strictly prohibited in the region.

Persons having residence within the forest, and others who have legitimate need to travel within the forest may do so, by permit.

Any violation of the closing order can bring a \$500 fine and/or six months in jail, White stressed.

The annual Ruidoso Gun Club's 30 calibre rifle matches, slated this week-end on the Cedar Creek range were moved to Captain's range when the closing order came through.

Fishing at Bonito lake has been halted.

There will be no travel allowed by any person not having a permit into the Bonito Lake area beyond the Nogal highway "Y" and the Bonito creek road, nor up Eagle creek off of the state road there, nor up Cedar creek, nor any other road that is not a state designated or federal numbered highway, he declared.

People may drive to Sierra Blanca area, but cannot make use of any facilities there. Fishing at Nogal lake, logging operations in the forest and work at mines in the area have also been halted, he said. Two meetings were held this mid-week by local officials, forest and village, to discuss problems of coordination and communication in case of future major fires. The meetings were on Wednesday morning and Thursday morning.

In a meeting Wednesday afternoon of village officials with the news media, Tom Jones of Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Supply Assn., Inc. told village officials in the press conference that a part of the banks of the Alto reservoir, to have signs noting limits, will continue to be open for fishing. For CC Fete

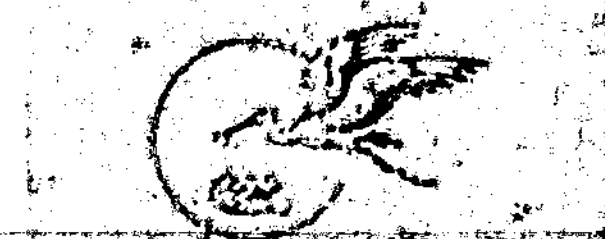

WHEREAS, due to the extreme fire hazard, and for the purpose of preserving our natural forest beauty; now,

THEREFORE, I, Lloyd L. Davis, Jr., Mayor, Village of Ruidoso, do hereby proclaim that all our residents refrain from using fireplaces and that village ordinances prevent outside burning without permits which are not being issued during the period of the closing of the forests, and further proclaim that all persons in the area join with the Forest Service in the safeguarding practices of fire prevention.

CLOSURE

By joint order of the Superintendent Mescalero Indian Agency and Mr. Wendell Chino, President, Mescalero Apache Tribe, the entire Mescalero Apache Reservation will be closed until further notice.

All roads, with the exception of U. S. Highway 70 and New Mexico Highway 24, are closed to all traffic except for residents of the reservation or reservation operations specifically exempted from this order by permit.

The situation in regard to forest and range conditions is extremely

explosive and dangerous and every attempt must be made to preserve the natural resources of the region.

Violator of this order will be prosecuted under applicable federal statutes. The cooperation of the general public and all others concerned is solicited and will be appreciated. Further announcements concerning the extent and duration of the closure will be forthcoming as conditions dictate.

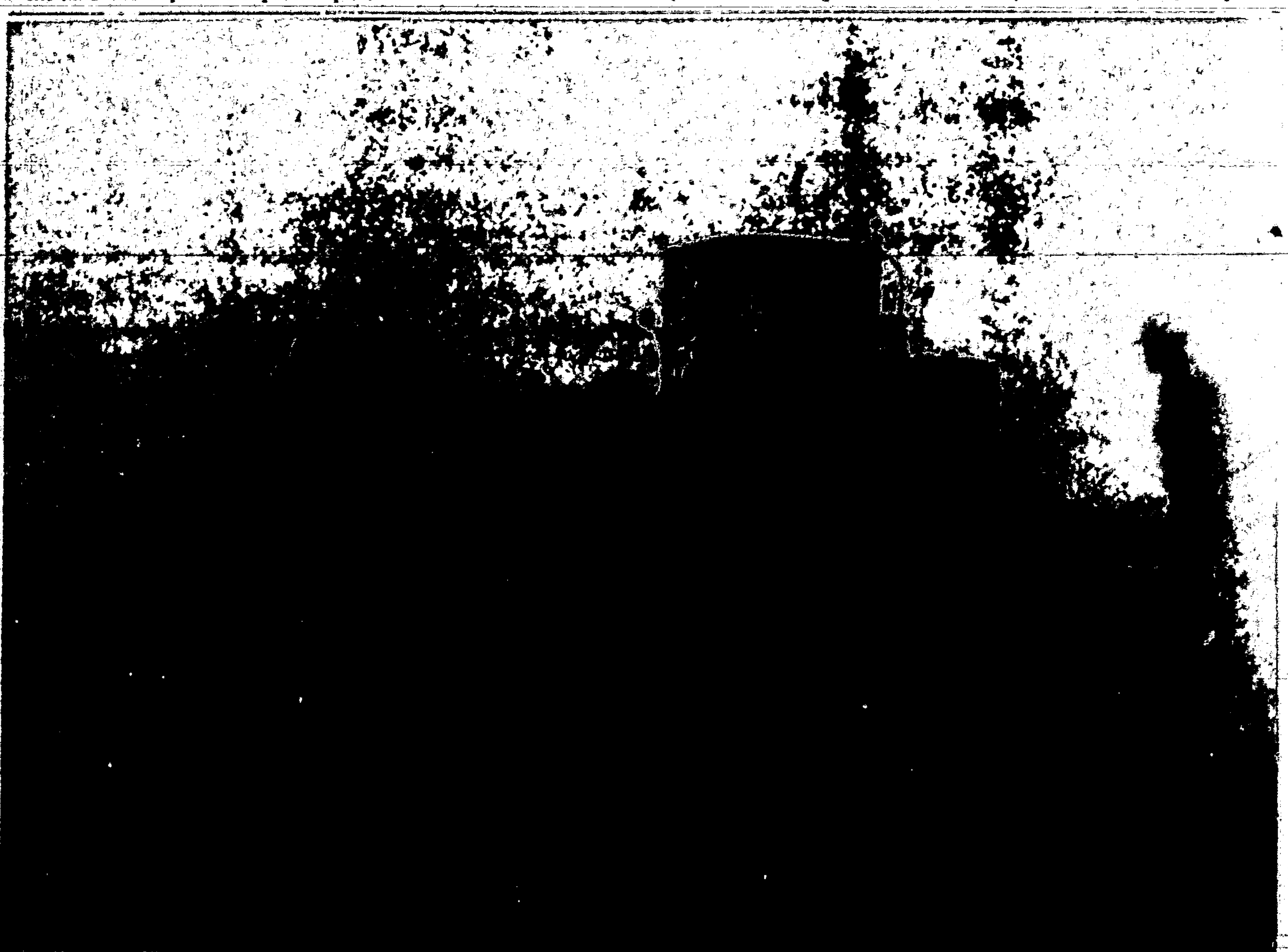

In a 33-hour battle Thursday and Friday, a wind-lashed fire in the Lincoln National Forest of Ruidoso was brought under control with superhuman efforts of at least 1,000 men using machines, planes, helicopters and hand tools. Destroyed in the ravine blaze that was pushed by 50 to 60-mile-an-hour winds, at times in less than men could move ahead of it, was a total of 1,800 acres of timber.

At its height, the fire caused Governor David F. Cargo to declare a state of emergency. In a state last late Friday afternoon, to confer with state and federal forest officials, he said the declaration of an emergency was necessary so that he could obtain additional funds for the state part in battling the blaze. Timber lost was on Lincoln National Forest Lands, state forest lands and considerable private acreage.

Members of volunteer fire department in the area joined with professional firefighters of the federal and state services, and with Job Corpsmen, Sierra Blanca Boys' camp members, trained smoke-eating Indians from several reservations of the Southwest, Airmen from Holloman Air Force Base, state, county and local peace officers, plus Lincoln County and village employees, and a large number of civilians from Ruidoso and neighboring communities, including the local Jeep club Headquarters were established at the Ruidoso Ranger station. Volunteers who were called for late Thursday answered the summons to (Continued to Page 5—Sec. A)

fight and received assignments at the ranger station. The handy Ruidoso municipal airport became the base for four helicopters employed to drop slurry and serve for reconnaissance over the burning area. Tanker planes were also used early in the battle.

The area damaged by the fire was within a 3,000 acre triangle that moved northeast from a point within a few hundred yards of the north Ruidoso village limits. The fire alarm came from the Forest Service's Montezuma lookout at mid-afternoon Thursday, reported by Mrs. Doris Wright, stationed there. The fire began in the canyon across State Road 37 at its junction with Alpine Village road, and spread north and northeast rapidly.

The fire, believed to be man-caused, raced up Alto hill, dropped down into Gavilan canyon, burned up and across another hill and down into Eagle canyon, then climbed north and east from there to the High Mesa Country and to the south boundaries of Lincoln

Women of the community did their part in helping in the battle by preparing sandwiches and food to feed the firefighters. Many worked into the late hours of Thursday helping in this manner.

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

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We Must Have Medicare . . .

Medicare is a fact of life now, as is Social Security and several other governmental functions. Our people are paying for it, yet it is not available to them in Ruidoso. Our neighboring town of Carrizozo has a hospital qualifying for Medicare, and Ruidoso's fine hospital can and should. A group of Ruidosians, representing a large segment of our community, met with the hospital board Monday evening to discuss the prospects of having Medicare come to Ruidoso. Pro and con arguments were given.

When the hospital board asked the public's feelings about the matter in July of 1966 with a front-page statement printed in the Ruidoso News—there was very little, if any, response. Now that the work of Medicare is being noted throughout the U. S., local people are becoming interested—and a large number are now asking for it. The plan has opposition locally among hospital officials, businessmen and others—and their objections in many areas are valid. But some of the bugs in its administration are being worked out for better service. The fact remains Medicare is a part of the American scene, and those who deserve it should be able to have it in their home town.

LARGE PART OF FRUIT CROP LOST IN SUB FREEZING WAVE

A major part of the 1967 fruit crop in the valleys was lost in a cold wave last week of sub-freezing weather several nights in a row.

County Extension Agent Ralph Dunlap said in a statement he mailed to the press this week that more than 80 per cent of the fruit was killed. His statement said practically all of the fruit above Honda in the Benito and Ruidoso valleys was killed. But, he added, below Honda, in the Honda valley the fruit was injured and he said he expected some apples would be harvested in that area.

"The Pecos area did not seem to be hurt by the freezing weather," Dunlap declared. "Around Tumble there are scattered areas of little freezing damage."

In Ruidoso, official weather bureau figures gave the low temperatures for last week as follows: 36 degrees on April 29, 11 on May 1; 14 on May 2; 25 on May 3, 28 on May 4, 28 on May 5 and 34 on May 6. These are the lows as recorded by C. A. Calver at his weather station located at the chamber of commerce office. Figures from the airport were completely different, as follows: 23 degrees for the low on May 1, 17 for May 2, 5 for May 3, 24 for May 4, 21 for May 5 and 31 for May 6.

The house, arrived with or sent out food and drink for the fire fighters, voluntarily added up and herded most of our cattle out of the forest area, offered to care for our children and countless other acts of kindness and good will that we are old-time residents of Lincoln County we might have expected this kind of support but as relative newcomers (only three and a half years) to this locality, such support came as a most heart-warming surprise and left us only with a feeling of humble gratitude in the face of so much generosity. It is sad for us to look now on the ugly ruin of what was once our beautiful woodland, but we are not sorry we settled here for the kind of friends and neighbors we have who are more valuable than trees.

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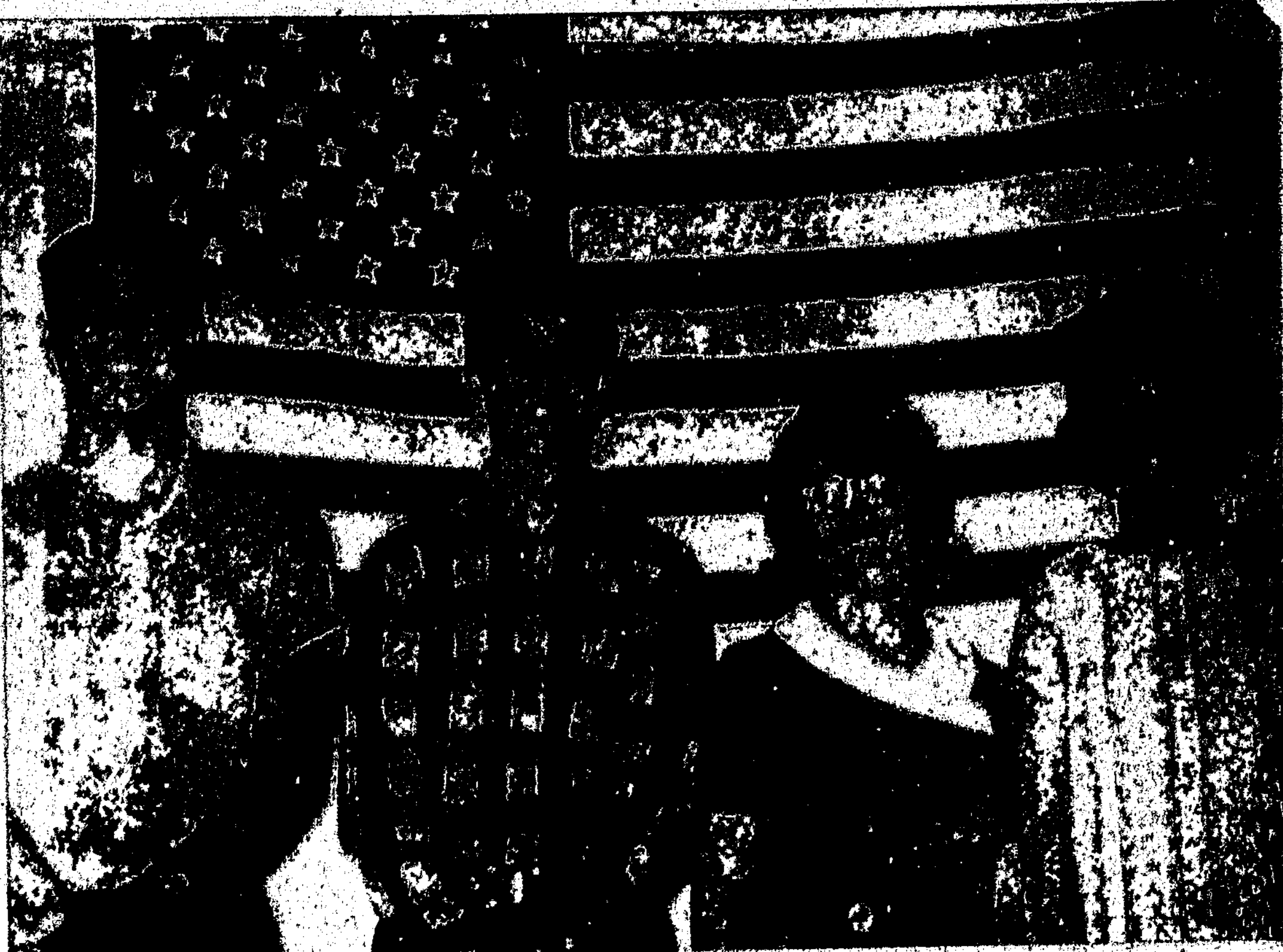

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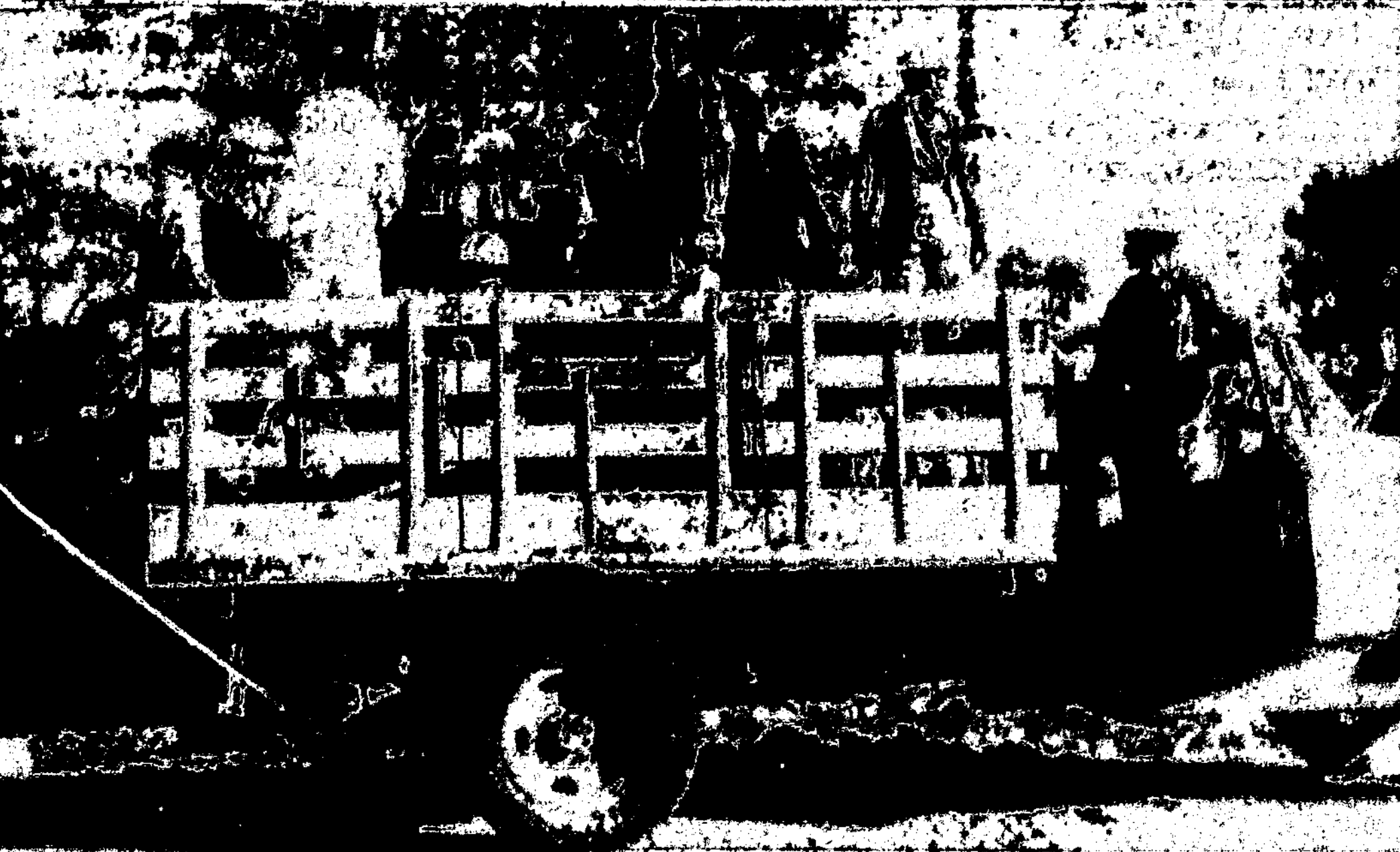

Closing Order
"Under the authority of Regulation T-1, section (1), the Secretary of Agriculture (36C. F. R. 261.2 (1)), the Lincoln National Forest of New Mexico is hereby closed to entry. This authority is effective May 10, 1967, at 8:00 a.m. and prohibits the going or being upon all portions of the Lincoln National Forest, designated by the Regional Forester as an area of high fire hazard, without a permit.

"No permit will be required of any actual settler going to or from his home or business. Permits are not required for those persons traveling on designated state and Federal highways.

"It will be necessary for persons requesting entry permits to show valid cause in order to obtain such a permit.

"This order is occasioned by the extremely hazardous fire condi-

tions currently existing on the Lincoln National Forest and will remain in effect until rescinded. "This order supercedes the closing order of April 28, 1967, as applicable to the Lincoln National Forest."

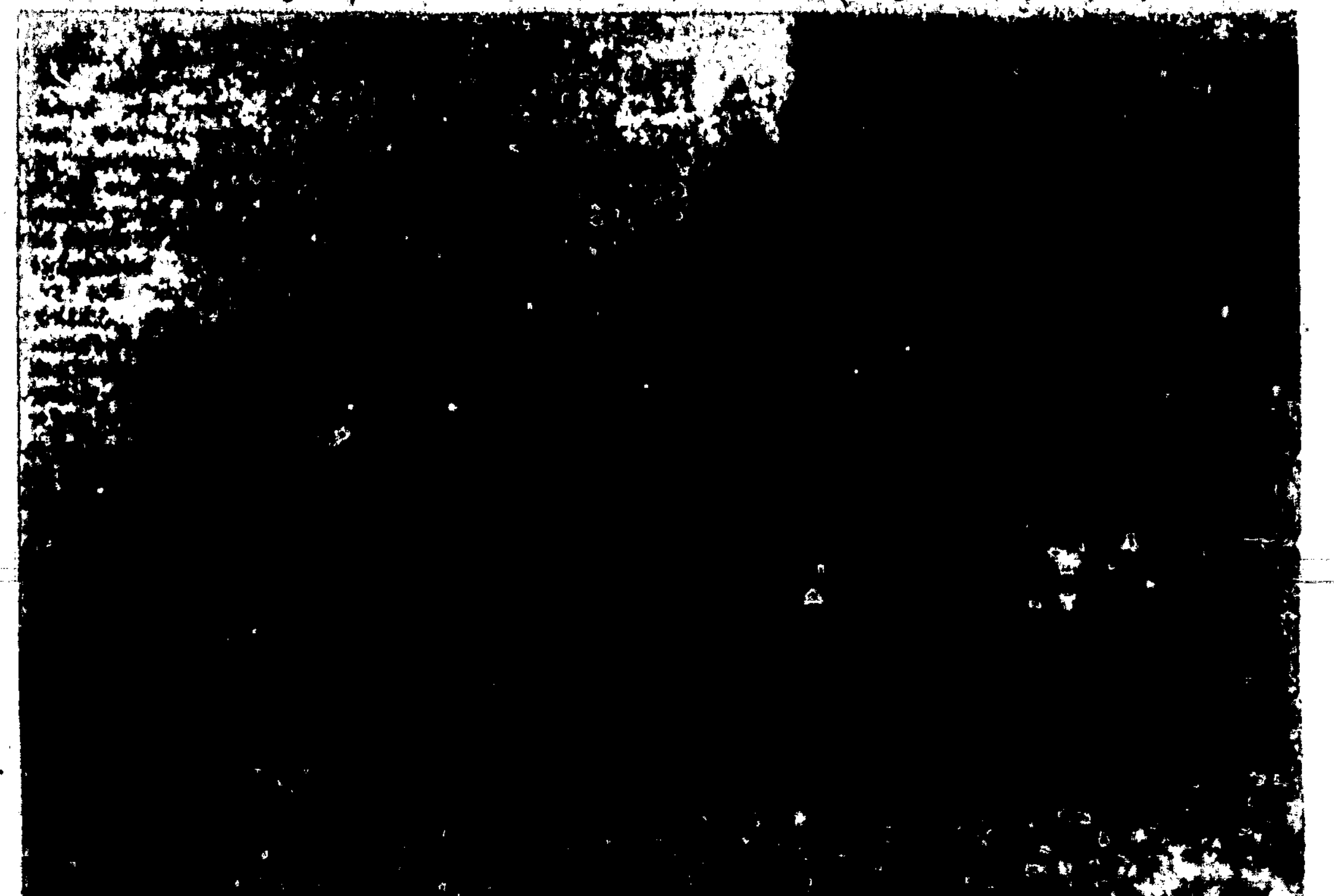

The agreement, which will be submitted to the stockholders of both companies for approval later this year, provides for the exchange of one-fourth of a share of United Utilities common stock for each of the 1,968,382 outstanding shares of Trans-Continental common stock, which is listed on the New York Stock Exchange, closed at 31 5/8 yesterday. Trans-Continental's common stock, which is listed on the American Stock Exchange, closed at 29 1/2. The agreement also provides that Trans-Continental's quarterly dividend, presently at a 10¢ per share level, may be increased to 18¢ per share at the discretion of its directors for normal intervening dividend periods between now and the effective date of the merger.

Trans-Continental now serves

over 85,000 telephones in Texas, Oklahoma, Missouri, Louisiana, New Mexico and Arkansas, and it operates, or has under construction, five CATV systems in areas in which it furnishes telephone service. Trans-Continental also owns Universal Controls Corporation, a manufacturer of products for the telecommunications and gas utility industries, based at Carrollton, Texas. Ruidoso Telephone Co., serving Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Mesalero, Capitán, Ft. Stanton, Nogal and the Ruidoso Valley, is owned by Trans-Continental.

The United Telephone System, the nation's second-largest independent (non-Bell) telephone system, with headquarters in Kansas City, Mo., currently serves nearly 1,300,000 telephones in 18 states and already has other transactions scheduled for closing this year which would add three additional states and about 230,000 telephones to those totals. With Trans-Continental added, the United Telephone System will serve over 1,600,000 telephones in its operating group. United also owns a controlling interest in North Electric Company, manufacturer of cross bar central office equipment and other products for the independent telephone industry.

Holloman AFB Helped Fight Fire

"Here we go again!" This may well have been the sentiments of the expert radio team from the 194th Communications Squadron of Holloman AFB, which was dispatched last week-end to help the fire fighters of the U. S. Forest Service in their battle against the forest fire which broke out Thursday near Ruidoso.

Just returned from supporting the fire fighters who conquered the devastating 2500-acre blaze in the Lincoln National Forest near the Air Force's Sacramento Peak Observatory at Sunspot, the weary communications crew was just beginning to relax when the call came for them to return to the tinder-dry forest in the area near Ruidoso.

The crack radio crew, composed of Second Lieutenant James Turk, Staff Sergeant Stanley Donner, Airman First Class Richard N. Baxter and Airman Second Class Sim Henry, was on the fire scene and set up communications in support of the fire fighters, many of whom are the same gallant crews who fought the Sunspot fire to extinction, only to find that man's carelessness had given them another hard job to do.

Holloman sent to the fire site at Ruidoso, twelve 1½-ton trucks, one refrigerator truck and two fuel trucks, all with drivers. Another pickup with driver was used as a shuttle vehicle between Alamogordo and Ruidoso by the Forest Service. In addition, one complete field kitchen with three cooks was set up to serve the fire fighters.

An expert first aid team composed of four medical personnel from the 6580th USAF Hospital at Holloman was standing by at the Ruidoso fire site, also, prepared to render first aid for any emergencies which might have developed.

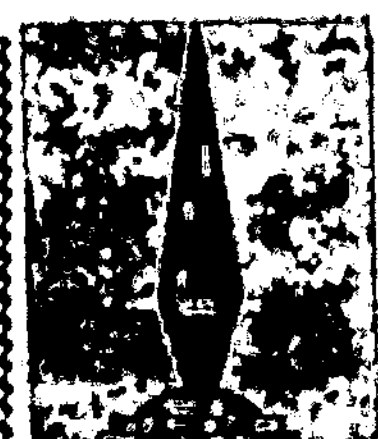

Social Security Aids Ruidosoan In Qualifying For Benefits

When Mrs. Aline Steed, 69, of Ruidoso signed up for medicare, she found she only needed two more quarters to qualify for a cash benefit under social security. She learned that she had only six quarters but that a woman her age needed eight quarters to qualify for one quarter for each year since 1950 and up to the year she reached age 62. For men the number goes to age 65 or three more quarters than a woman of the same age.

She asked the social security representative about the various ways to earn quarters of coverage under social security. She was told that she could earn quarters of coverage by working in a private home of anyone other than her son or daughter. The only requirement for this work was that she be paid at least \$50.00 cash wages from one employer in a calendar quarter. Mrs. Steed had done this type work, such as baby-sitting, quite often through the years. However she had not earned enough from each employer to qualify. When Mrs. Steed learned the requirements, she went to work to earn those last two quarters. She earned her seventh quarter in January, February and March of this year. By early April, she had been paid another \$50.00 cash wages. She applied for her social security and became entitled to a cash benefit effective April 1967.

Mrs. Steed came to New Mexico from Arkansas more than 20 years ago. When she came to Ruidoso, there was scarcely anything to the town from Skyland to Hollywood. She has seen it grow from a community of a few tourists each summer to a thriving year 'round resort. Mrs. Steed lost her husband 12 years ago. Mr. Steed had not worked enough under social security for Mrs. Steed to qualify for widow's benefits. Since his death Mrs. Steed has earned her living working for various people in Ruidoso. Mrs. Steed stated her favorite pastimes are flowers and her grandchildren. Her eyes light up when she mentions her grandchildren stating they are her greatest joy in life.

Clyde Gray, Social Security Field Representative, is at the City Hall in Ruidoso the first Thursday of each month from 10:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. to help local residents with any social security questions. He states that any persons who are not sure of the amount of their social security coverage should check and be certain. Social security records are strictly confidential. Mrs. Steed consented to have her story publicized in order that other persons could become aware of the requirements for social security coverage.
