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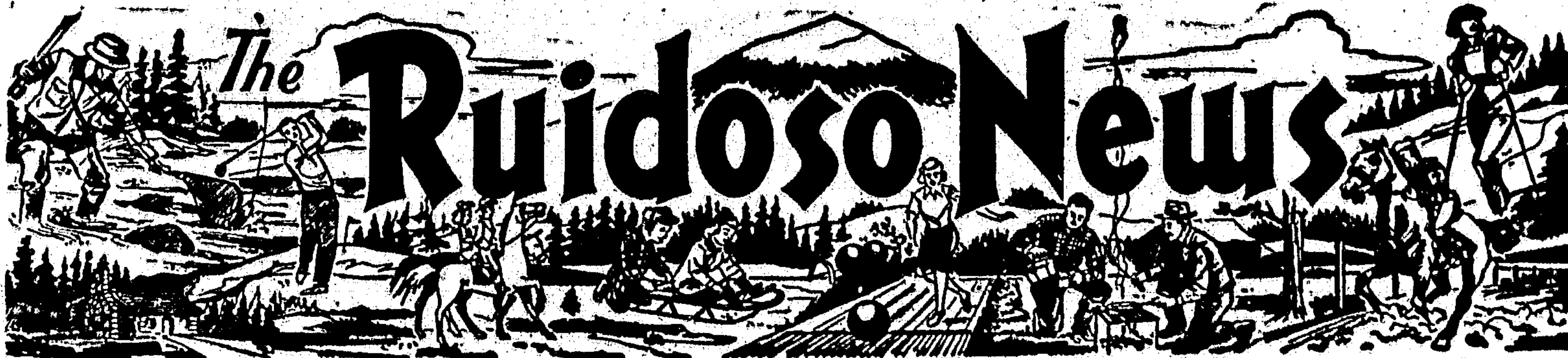

Ball Resigns As Hospital Administrator

Truett Ball, administrator of Ruidoso-Hondo Valley General Hospital, resigned that position, effective Jan. 1 in a letter to board president Robert McDaniel, last week-end. McDaniel called a meeting of the board for Monday night to act on the letter, and he reported the board accepted the resignation with regret. He said Ball reported he has secured an administrative position with a 56-bed hospital in Colorado at a considerable increase in salary.

Ball, who has been here three years with the hospital, paid tribute to the board and employees in his letter. It is reprinted below:

Nov. 22, 1967
Mr. Robert McDaniel, Chairman, Board of Trustees, General Hospital, Ruidoso, New Mexico
Dear Mr. Robert,
It is with reluctance and a great deal of meditation that I request the acceptance of my resignation as administrator of this institution. It is further requested that my resignation be effective Jan. 1, 1968 or before if convenient.

I wish to express the highest of tributes to you and the other Board members, both past and present, for your dedication to the burden, some and thankless task of policy making and direction in the operation of this institution. Few institutions are able to match this quality which I have found in your Board members.

Please accept my sincerest appreciation for all of the courtesies extended to me and my family while I was in your service. I hope that my labors have brought some measure of improvements in the services extended to the people of this community. The most difficult chore of all is the "leaving behind" of forty wonderful, dedicated and loyal employees. These people are unforgettable.

Please accept my sincerest wishes for a continued successful operation of this institution.

Board president McDaniel said that the hospital is now inviting applications from qualified people for the position, and all aspirants will be given full consideration.

DISMISSAL OVERULED

Third Judicial District Judge Edward Triviz Friday overuled four motions filed by defense attorneys Friday in Carrizozo asking dismissal of charges of murder against Cosmo Montoya, Jr. who is to stand trial Dec. 18 in the death of Earl Southern, 56, whose body was found by a searching party of officers Oct. 5 a couple of blocks from the Ruidoso Downs village hall.

Charged with accessory to the murder is Mellone Sanchez, Jr., who allegedly was in a fight which involved all three men. The defense had asked dismissal on four motions, including allegations Montoya's rights were violated under the fifth amendment of the U. S. constitution due to improper investigation and handling of information regarding the case, and that he was being held without bond.

Assistant District Attorney R. W. Hughes, Jr., Ruidoso, told the News Judge Triviz set bond for Montoya at \$18,000 and also had set bond for Sanchez at \$12,000.

Local Schools Accredited

Ruidoso's school system is now fully accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, Supt. George P. White reported Wednesday. He said oral acceptance was reported by a committee of ten educators who spent several days here reviewing the school for that purpose. Official acceptance will come in a letter within six weeks, he added.

He said the ten men were high in their praise of many parts of the school system here, and rated the local system superior for small schools. They noted the school did a good job with its money, that morale was high in all areas, including among students, faculty, administrators, employees and the community; that the student body reflected the highest in citizenship, courtesy, behavior and dress, and that the board should be given high regard for its efficiency and aggressiveness.

The articulation, or relation between faculty of all grades, from top to bottom, was rated fine, and the plan of having the school divided into grades 1-6 and 7-12, was a commendable one. Class size, in teacher-pupil relationship, was said to be ideal, also. The fact that subjects of all types are available to any number of students, whether one or five, or a classroom full, was also noted as being a fine practice. The use of state department of education help came in for praise, too, since the local schools use the many educational services offered. Planning for the future, in obtaining a large acreage for future growth, plus the well-diversified use of money for the elementary and high school departments was complimented, and the fine maintenance of the physical plant also was appreciated.

Some areas of need were noted by the survey board as being analysis of non-collegiate bound students to provide more vocational studies for their needs; more student activities should be held within classroom hours rather than after school hours—including a recommendation for stronger intramural programs; upgrading of the fine arts to include choral music and arts; co-ordination in keeping records and having a centralized place for all school materials and machines for better access and use by the faculty; more use of library facilities by the faculty; upgrading of teachers by attending more institutes of training; and an increase in interest and participation by teachers in national educational organizations.

Ambassador Team Captains Hold Meeting

New team captains of the Ruidoso Valley Ambassadors met Thursday at 11 a.m. at High Country Lodge. President George P. White appointed as the new captains Herb Brunell, Dave Parks, Mrs. Billie Clarke and T. C. Delaney.

The officers, along with the new team captains, met to revitalize the greeting teams. The regular meeting is being held immediately following the special meeting.

Ruidosoans will vote on an issue Monday next week that could have the most far reaching effect on this community as a resort area. The village council has asked the citizens to approve or disapprove the issuance of revenue bonds (amount yet to be determined) with which the assets of Ruidoso Racing Association can be purchased, thereby earning for the village the profits of operation of the race track here for various municipal needs and development.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis, Jr. Tuesday said he anticipated the number of ballots cast Monday will reach 800, and village clerk-manager James L. Hine estimated that the vote may go over 300—but both agreed that they hoped the turnout at the polls would be a record. "We want to know what the people desire, and the only way we can tell is from the interest shown in this election," the two men said.

The village proposes to set up a non-profit foundation to operate the track to be composed of a board of directors numbering five to seven. The election was called on the eve of the bonds, which do not obligate the property of the citizens, but which will be retired with revenues from operating the track, when the council determined the acquisition could be done legally. Offer of the track to the village was made by a majority of stockholders of the Ruidoso Downs Association. The election was held at the village hall, will be held at 8 a.m. and close at 5 p.m. The ballot will ask the question: "Are you for or against the village of Ruidoso acquiring the race track?"

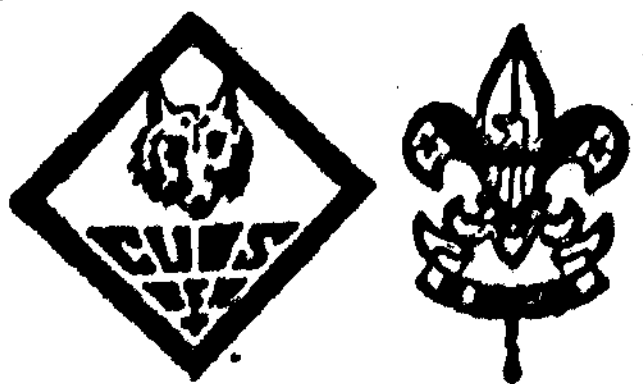

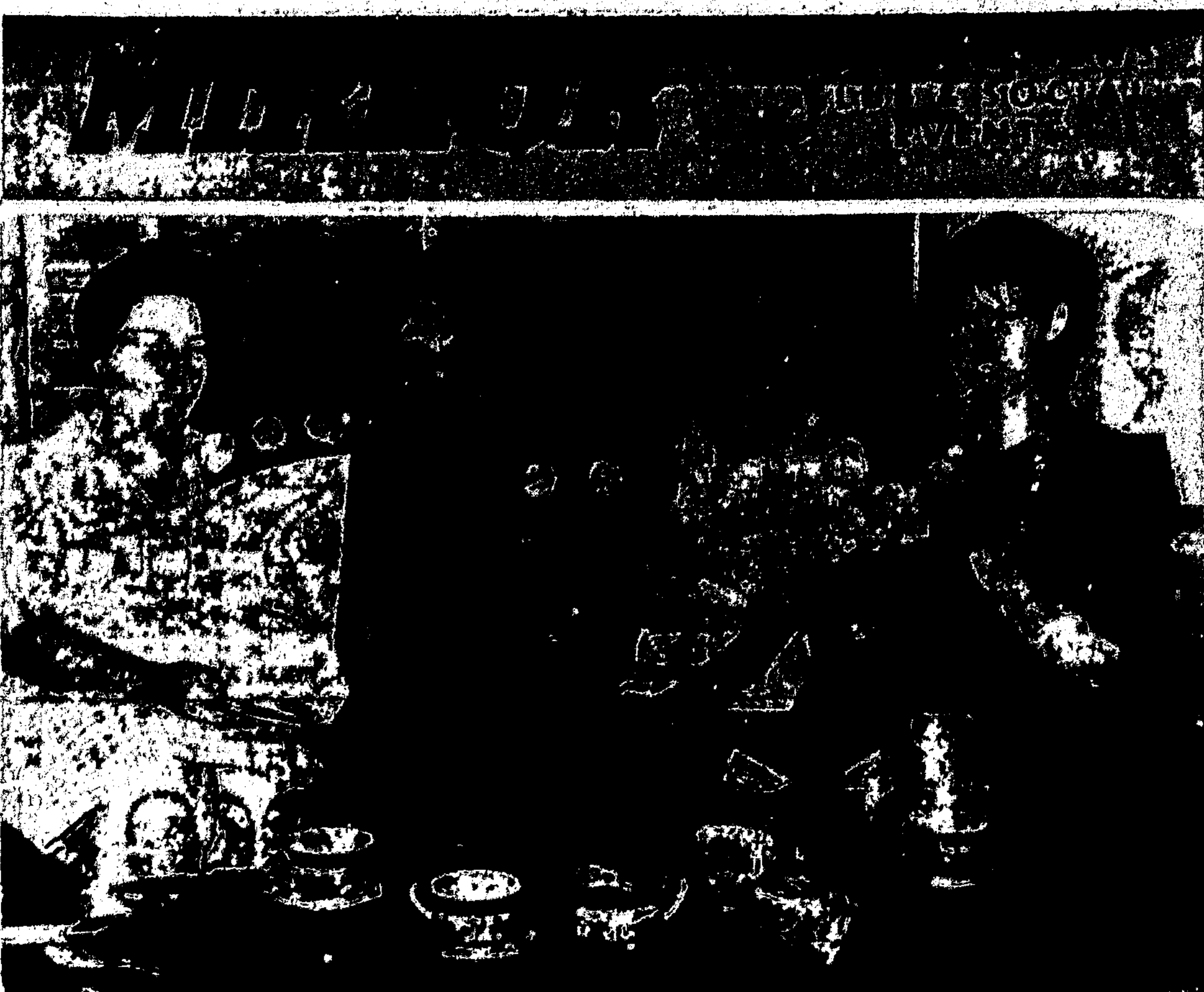

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Two Great Gifts . . .

No one hereabouts can recall any greater gift to this community than the 100-acre tract of prime land in the Alto community for a college or college branch, tendered Lincoln County by the R. G. (Bob) Scribner family. The steering committee to study prospects and plan a fund raising campaign to secure the college feels the same way—and it was summed up by Chairman Paul Wrye's remarks the night he was picked as head of the project when he said in substance that a great part of the project was already realized in the gift of the land. He said it could easily be valued at \$100,000, and that it was a most beautiful site—an inspiring piece of real estate in the High Mesa Ranch which could be the home of an equally fine institute of higher learning. Gift of the land alone is a major step towards securing a school of higher learning which will in time provide Lincoln County one of its greatest payoffs—as big as any industry you could bring in or develop here. On behalf of the local communities neighboring the site and for Lincoln County as a whole, we express thanks for this most magnanimous gesture.

Grateful thanks go also to the Sam Montgomery family who offered more than a year ago another fine piece of land, close to the village, for New Mexico State University at Las Cruces to use in developing a biological field station, or branch. The land has been accepted, and planning is underway for its development. Realization of one or both of these fine assets for our community would not be so close without the offer of land upon which to build them. Lots of sweat, toil and planning are necessary to see either one or both as a fact—but at least the land for a foundation is available.

We Still Figure That Way . . .

About a year ago the Ruidoso News learned that there was a distinct possibility that the Ruidoso Downs race track might be offered to the Village of Ruidoso—that if it could come up with the ways and means and resolve some legal problems it might obtain the facilities as its own. The idea seemed great to us when we first heard it, and we said so then, and we have yet to come up with a single, solitary reason why not acquire the track. We hope the revenue bond issue is given overwhelming approval by the village voters Monday. All of our village council members favor the prospects—let's give them a vote of confidence, as well as a tremendous economic lift to our village treasury, by voting to acquire this most valuable asset—a must for a community that can boast indisputably right now—and even more so later that it is the foremost resort in New Mexico.

Snow Rangers Have Varied Duty In Forest

By B. H. STARKY
(Ruidoso Ranger Station)

In the last article, I mentioned that some Forest Service snow rangers to help with administration of winter sports area. Like the year-long recreation specialist. These people keep a constant check on the area to see that permit conditions are complied with, however, the duties of a "Snow Ranger" differ slightly from those of the recreation specialist.

During the winter, he not only helps administer the ski area permit, but in addition, he is usually responsible for measuring and recording the snowpack on designated snow courses on a forest. These measurements are utilized by water conservation and agricultural services to estimate the water yield during the spring runoff period. These figures help planners predict the amount of water that will be available for irrigation or agricultural use. In addition, he is constantly observing snow conditions so that potential avalanche areas are noted. Having received special training in avalanche control, he can prepare a plan for detonating the avalanche so that life and property will not be endangered. If detonation is not possible, the area will be barricaded and signed as dangerous. The major aim of this specialized training is to recognize the avalanche hazard and attempt to avert it.

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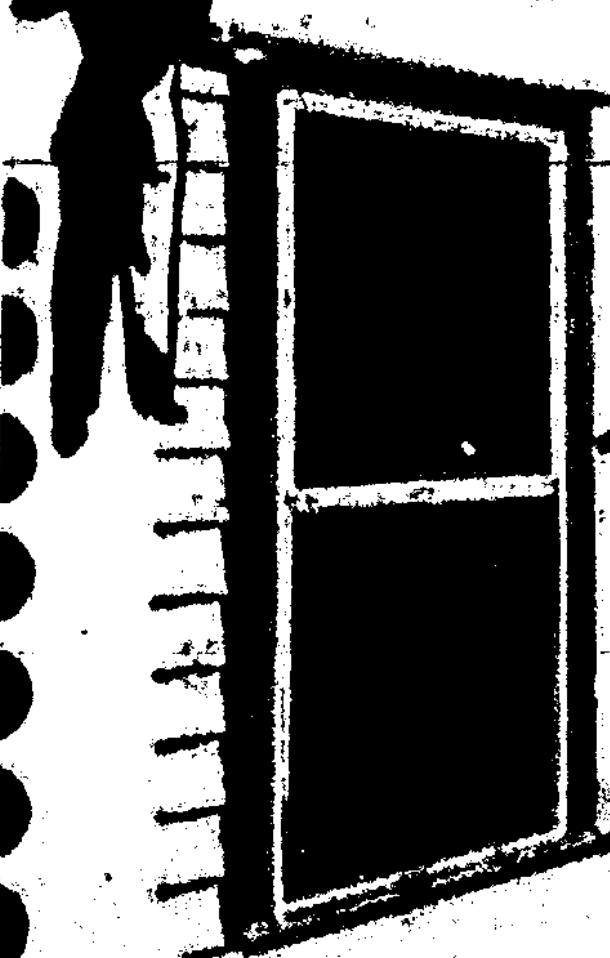

CC Directors Withdraw Resignations

Mail In Morning To Help Speed Christmas Parcels

Local postmasters today remind local residents that it is just as important to mail early in the day as to mail early during the Christmas season.

By mailing early in the day postal employees can assure that gifts, cards and letters can be sent on their way by the earliest possible transportation. Often there is only one connection per day for many distant points. If mail is deposited after that transportation has left there can be a one day delay in moving the mail on to its next sorting point.

Because of the heavy nationwide Christmas mailing, local postmasters asked that more than ever before, citizens mail early in the season to assure that there are no jam ups in major cities where trains, trucks and planes converge with their mail.

"Early mailing assures an even flow of mail, not a sudden surge which could log-jam the postal system," the postmasters said. "According to Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien's predictions, there will be over nine billion pieces of mail delivered during the Christmas rush. If all that mail
