The Bear Creek Mining Company, a subsidiary of Kennecott Copper Corporation, which has been test drilling in the Eagle Creek-Bonito Creek area since 1964, will be permitted to build a narrow temporary equipment trail about one mile into the Wilderness. The trail will be used to move heavy core drilling test equipment into an area which has potential mineral value. The trail will be closed and the surface of the area restored when testing is completed. The permit is being granted.

Hurst said, under provisions in the Wilderness Act of 1964 and Secretary of Agriculture Regulations which allow access to mining ciaims in Wildernesses. Permits to en.er the Wilderness with motorazed equipment for mineral exploration are given only after every other means of prospecting and expioration is exhausted.

The company has been test drilling outside the Wilderness, using both light and heavy equipment. Portable drills have been packed into the Wilderness by men and on horses, but final proof of the existence of economically valuable mineral deposits will require much heavier equipment.





(Bob) Scribner family.
