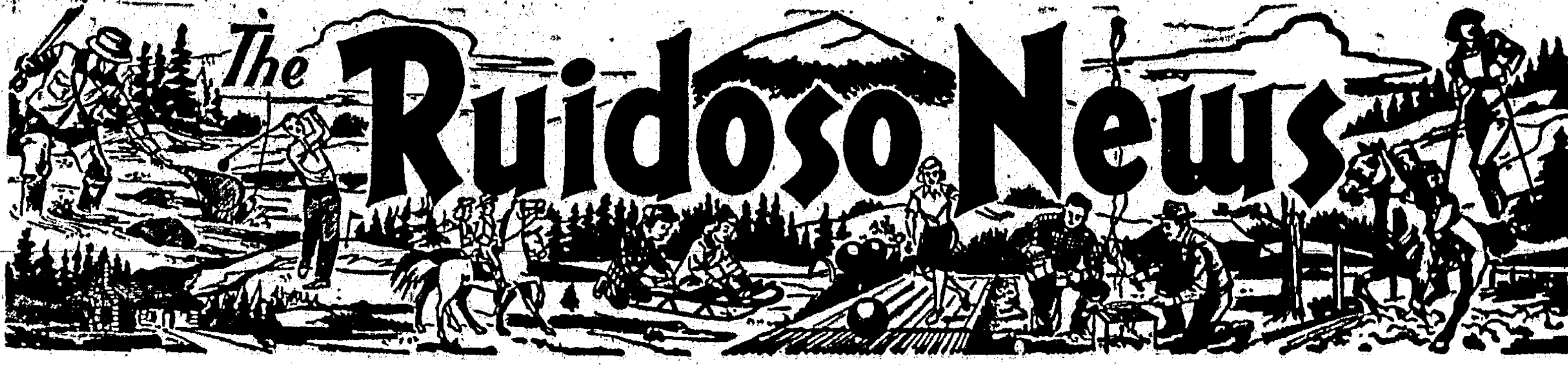

Work Underway On Highway 70

Construction started last week on the \$24 million dollar seven and a half mile all-new stretch of U. S. Highway 70 east of here, from a point a mile east of Kenneth Noeker's farm and ranch to a junction with U. S. 70-380 at Hondo. Jack Herndon, project supervisor for the route, said work will continue for about a year on the road which will include an all new alignment, and designed for a 70-mile-an-hour maximum speed. One bridge will be erected, over the Rio Hondo at Hondo. A detour around the bridge site will be among the first items to be completed in the big project, he added. Herndon has an office at Barnes' Mobile Homes in Ruidoso Downs and his phone number is 378-9972. He said he will have about a dozen men working out of his office.

Plans Finalized On Sewer Project

Plans for a sewer system expansion project that has been under study here for two years and which will serve a large portion of the village in the northern and western parts of town. Daniel told the trustees the plans and specifications have been approved by the State Health Department. The council was told that the federal agency, Housing and Urban Development is now reviewing the plans at the Ft. Worth regional office and that a request for a loan is being studied. In discussing the project, Daniel said there are some deductive alterations in the proposal. Loudermilk Construction Co., successful bidder on the job, will have from 30 to 40 men employed. Herndon said the old road will be left for use as a frontage road for access to homes, ranches and businesses in four places, one of them at San Patricio, another west of Hondo, one near Alta's curio store and one small segment at one other point. This is the next to last large section of the road improvement from here to Hondo. The other lies between the Storm Ranch at Glencoe down to Nosker's. He said, unofficially, the last improvements to be made will probably be put up for bids in August of 1968.

3 CABINS DAMAGED IN FIRE

A major fire, one of Ruidoso's most serious in several years, damaged or destroyed three cabins in the upper Ruidoso canyon in the early hours of Thursday this week. Cause of the fire was still being investigated by local fire officials and other authorities by mid-morning Thursday.

The loss could reach an estimated \$40,000, first reports to the News indicated. The cabins were located on the south side of Main Road in the vicinity of Nolsy Water Lodge. A Mrs. Foster first reported the fire at 2:33 a.m., police dispatcher records indicate.

Owners of the cabins were: J. H. Johnson of Big Spring, whose cabin was damaged and a shed completely destroyed; Mrs. Loren Counts, Ruidoso, whose cabin was completely gutted, and J. T. Middleton, Big Spring, Tex., whose cabin was a total loss.

The fire threatened the heavily timbered area, but a host of firefighters kept the blaze under control and only two large trees were burned.

Ruidoso's Sister Dies in Farmington

Mrs. W. E. Minatre, 76 of Truth or Consequences died in the home of her daughter in Farmington Wednesday this week, Dec. 6. Funeral services will be held in T. of C. Friday afternoon at 2 p.m. Among survivors is one sister in Ruidoso, Mabel Snyder, who will attend the services accompanied by Mrs. Tommy Hall, Ruidoso; one son, four daughters, another sister and a brother also survive.

CHARGES REDUCED IN SOUTHERN DEATH

All homicide charges were dismissed that had been filed against two Ruidoso Downs men implicated in the death of Earl Southern on Oct. 5 when his body was discovered after a search in a vacant lot two blocks south of the village hall in Ruidoso Downs, in a pre-trial hearing held Tuesday in Third Judicial District Court in Carrizozo. New charges of a lesser degree were filed. Como Montoya, Jr., who had been charged with murder, had his charge reduced to involuntary manslaughter, and Melitane Sanchez, Jr. who had been charged as an accessory to murder, pleaded to tampering with evidence.

Richard A. Parsons, Ruidoso attorney, who had been appointed by the court to defend the men, said sentencing of the pair will be done on Dec. 18, the date that trial had been set for the two on the original charges. The men face possible penitentiary terms of from one to five years under the new charges.

(Editor's Note: These terms to describe skiing conditions at Sierra Blanca Area will be followed in all future ski condition reports, and are used in the new tapes made daily to report latest developments which you can hear by dialing 257-4252.)

EXCELLENT: Sufficient base to cover any and all obstacles on all trails, and some new snow within past week.

GOOD: Sufficient base to cover all obstacles on all trails. No new snow within the past week and surface conditions may vary.

FAIR: Snow covering not sufficient to cover all obstacles on all trails. Some trails may be closed due to the lack of snow or difficult skiing conditions.

POOR: Many obstacles (bumps, rocks, etc.) showing on all trails. Some lifts and some trails may be closed due to insufficient snow.

1. Trails and/or lifts may be closed at any time at the discretion of the management due to insufficient snow, difficult skiing conditions, or for any other reason the management deems necessary. 2. There may be times when all the trails do not have the same conditions or the top of the mountain may not have the same conditions as the bottom. In this situation the report will be issued on the managements best judgment of the average conditions. 3. Road conditions will not be mentioned in our reports other than in the case that the road is closed. The conditions vary too much from morning to afternoon. The New Mexico State Highway Department maintains the road with excellent equipment including a new snow blower. Chains may be required and we advise skiers to have chains with them at all times when driving to the ski area.

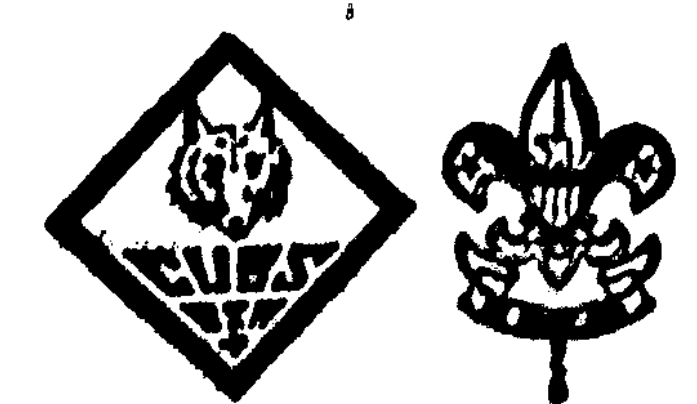

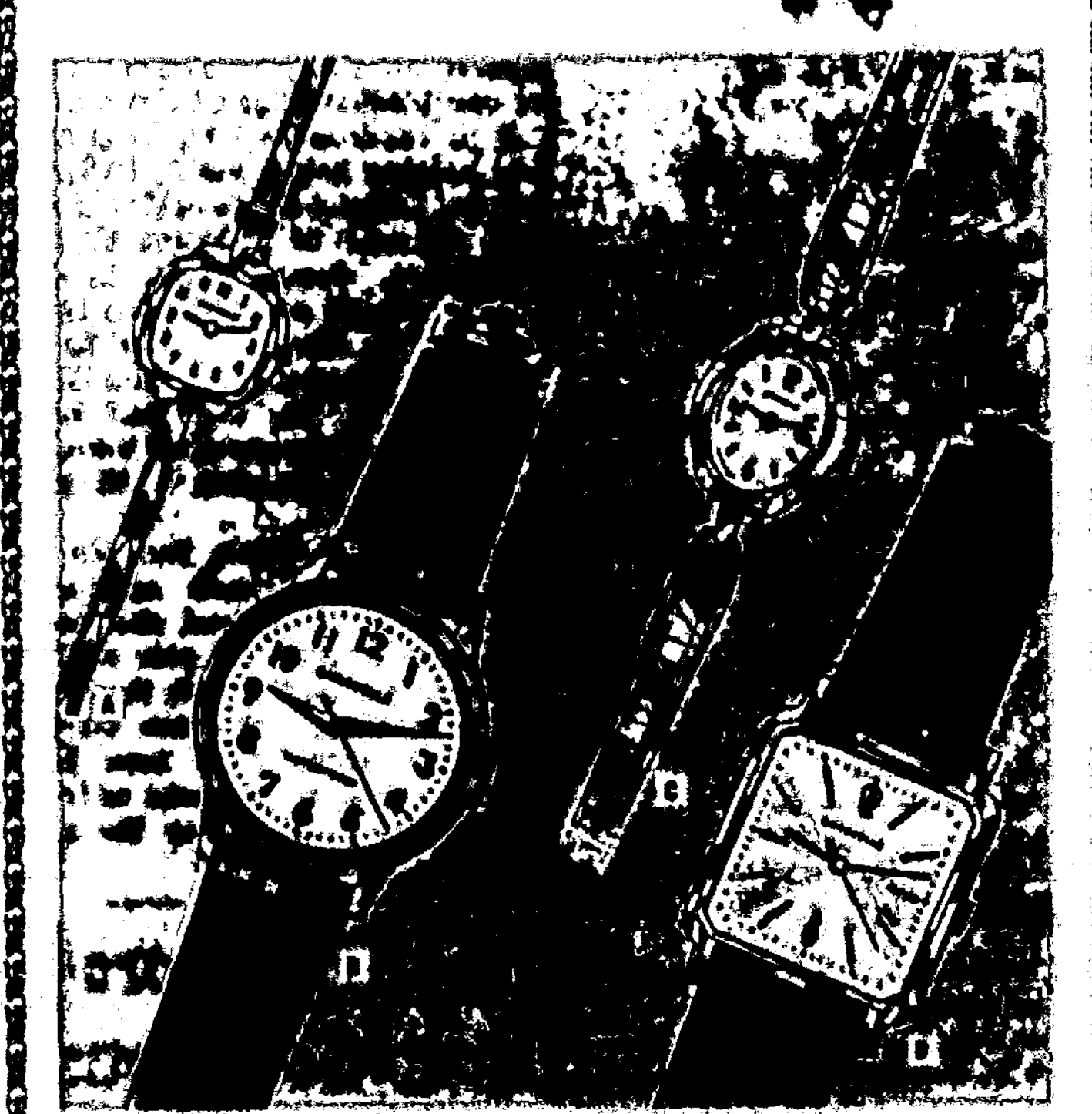

 Department. A partial payment of \$10,000 was voted by the board. The board approved transfer of the liquor license from Robert Crosby to Thelma Crosby for Billy the Kid Variety Liquor store here. Final plans of two subdivisions, plat of Sierra Blanca blk. 2, unit 1 and replat of Alto Lakes Golf and Country Club subdivision, portion of blk. 6, unit 2, were approved prior approval by the village planning commission. Discussed, with no action, was the need for a garage and shed for village vehicles and the seal coating of the village's residential streets. Mayor Davis gave a report on the County Commissioners meeting regarding their determining a need for a County Planning Commission. Mayor Davis stated that the commissioners had asked that the village of Ruidoso offer the names of four persons for consideration as members to the county planning commission and that the county commissioners would select two persons from the list of four for membership to the County Planning Commission to represent the village of Ruidoso on the proposed nine (9) man board. Mayor Davis stated, also, that the village's planning commission had submitted the names of Elmer Pirelli, Robert Hollis, Max McCoy, and Johnny Mobley for consideration, from which two were to be named by the County Commissioners at their Dec. 5, 1967 meeting. Village clerk-manager Jim Hine stated that the village had received a patent to the approximate 2.34 acres of land purchased from the State Land Office. The clerk, on suggestion from

Trustee Whitlock, was instructed to write a message of congratulations to the Ruidoso Schools on their obtaining accreditation to the North Central Association of Schools, and a letter of congratulations to the Sierra Blanca Ski Club on its efforts in promoting the skiing industry. Whitlock also mentioned that the drive for financial assistance of the proposed college is scheduled for December.

Mayor Davis asked the Trustees to consider at their next meeting someone for appointment to the Planning Commission since a vacancy exists.

Mayor Davis recognized Joe Trullitt, chairman of the Lincoln County Humane Society, who gave a report on the Society's activities during the past 30 days, and in particular with reference to the seven week's quarantine of animals imposed on Lincoln County by the New Mexico Department of Public Health as a result of two rabid dogs discovered in Ruidoso Downs. (The quarantine is still in effect). Trullitt also gave a full report on the use of the \$300 which the village had paid to the Humane Society for use during the crisis. Trullitt stated that over 160 dogs had been picked up and disposed of since Labor Day. Trullitt stated that the greatest problem they (the Humane Society) encountered is that of big dogs attacking smaller dogs. Trullitt stated that he wants the Humane Society to do the best job that the village demands. Mayor Davis recommended that Hine write the Health Department and check on the status-quo of the quarantine. The Society will be spending more time on controlling untaged dogs and impound same.

Revisit Old Frontiers Advises Minister In Thanksgiving Sermon

"Old Frontiers Revisited" was the title of the Thanksgiving sermon, delivered by Radford Hutcherson, First Baptist Church, Ruidoso, at Annual Thanksgiving Community Service, Nov. 22, 1967.

President, fellow ministers, friends, it is a joy and privilege to share this Thanksgiving Service with you. You just came in, I hope you were not embarrassed. There is an error in the publishing of the name and, though the time was late, some of you may have read that it would be 7:30. You may feel the high school boy who said, "I'm not tardy, they just started before I got here." It is unfortunate that we had to start late, but it was not our fault.

I shall not preach the kind of sermon tonight that you would expect to hear at such a service as this. When I began to think toward this service, I thought of other sermons I might preach. I remembered that G. K. Chesterton wrote:

"To an open house in the evening I shall come . . . to an older place than Eden, and a taller tower than Babel, to the end of the way of the wandering star, to the things that cannot be and are, to the place where God was homeless and all men are at home."

Chesterton was, of course, writing of the birth of Christ, but I thought of taking a part of one of his as a title and preaching on my thankfulness for

Philip Bailey has said of the American that he is . . . half-brother to the world with something good and bad of every land. In one hundred years, we have come from a primitive society to the greatest nation of wealth and might the world has ever seen. America is a paradox. Templeton has pointed out that this nation of paradox has produced: Abraham Lincoln and Huey Long; Franklin Roosevelt and Frank Sinatra; George Washington Carver and Father Divine; and Thomas Alva Edison and the inventor of the knee-action potato peeler.

Our's has been a nation's mightiest standard of living and we live on hamburgers and hot dogs. . . . Ours are the finest symphonic orchestras and we have invented the be-bop and jazz. Our nation of paradox can produce the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and the Ku Klux Klan.

We have the mightiest television industry and yet it is devoted, in a great part, to soap opera and Peyton Place. What a paradox! George Santayana has said of the American that "all his life he jumps into the train after it has started and jumps off before it has stopped; and he never once gets left behind or breaks his leg."

What a paradox! We are wise enough to produce the bomb but we are not good enough to be trusted with it.

What a paradox! Templeton has characterized America as a nation of: Houses without homes;

Medicine without health; Knowledge without wisdom; and Speed without direction. What a paradox! And so we find ourselves fighting a war we do not understand while internally and domestically we are torn with anarchy, violence, and lawlessness. Yet our churches are empty, our Bibles are dust-covered, our knees are stiff, our eyes are dry, and our hearts are cold. We sit in ease while the world is on fire!

We have the incredible spectacle of a nation founded on religious principles forbidding that those principles be explained in her schools; of people rejecting the Bible who have not read it; of young people who say Christianity is a dead and antiquated way of life who have no concept of its meaning.

It is my firm conviction that the responsibility for these misconceptions lies at the door of the church. We need to re-visit some old frontiers and the season of Thanksgiving is a good time to do it.

We have come a long way from 1821. We have formulated a dream based on the idea that all men are created equal and have certain inalienable rights.

We have come a long way to some new frontiers. Buck Rogers, whose name today is Glenn or Grissom or White, has stepped from the comic books and is on the way to the stars.

But I ask you if we have not advanced in technology at the loss and expense of some other cherished values? For our generation has, in spite of our technological advance:

The bloodiest wars in history; Incredible neuroses and psychosomatic ills;

Unprecedented breakdown of marriage and the home; Escalating juvenile delinquency and crime; and

The biggest liquor bill in history. And the world has grouped itself into two armed camps, each fully capable of destroying the other but at the certain threat of destroying itself.

Our is an age of education. A schoolboy today can go to his high school library and learn in an afternoon what the sages of a short time ago could not know in a lifetime. Yet we have all the answers but the important ones. We should step onto the shoulders of the past and boldly look farther into the future than any other generation.

Yet we have failed to read the minutes of the past generation. History's pathway is littered with the bleached bones of dead states which rotted out long before they were overthrown, and yet we sit back with folded arms and say, "God will deal differently with America." Yet, as someone has said, pointedly, yet reverently, "If God does not deal with America as with other nations, then He will have to apologize to the others at the judgment."

I say to you again that we must go back to some basic values. I am going to suggest four of these values we need to re-visit. But it is my hope they will set your thoughts into motion as you go away, causing you to think of other things we need to re-evaluate and re-visit. The first of these four is . . .

I. The Basic Worth of the Individual—Life means something to the American. Even as some of you, I have seen children of the Orient die from lack of food whose cold bodies were found in some lonely doorway. But life means more to us.

Yet citizenship has reached an alarmingly shameful low point in our time. Who could believe a few years ago that we would see the burning of draft cards and flags in our time? Who could believe that we would see demonstrations in the name of "peace" which would cause rivers of blood to flow and young people who are products of a free country refuse military service when that country is in need?

The Baptist Convention of New Mexico met in Albuquerque last week and my wife and I attended as delegates from our church. One of our young pastors introduced a resolution to that body that "the Convention go on record as pledging undying gratitude and support to all members of the armed forces and pledging continued prayers and encouragement to those now in the war in Viet Nam." The Convention passed on and adopted that resolution, and rightly so. It is high time we turned our attention away from the draft dodgers and those who are burning draft cards and pledge our support to young men who hear and heed the call of their country; who leave all that they know and love; and who take a rifle with which they are not familiar enough and march into a green hell of a jungle in a country halfway around the world to stop the onslaught of an ideology that would destroy the democratic way of life and the nation they love so well.

Government relief has become a fraudulent scheme by which a woman can get a bonus for illegitimate children and through which a weak-backed, jelly-spined people learn only to receive and never to give. We have not read well the minutes of the Roman generation. Integrity and basic honesty of the individual are at a low ebb. Time was when a man's word was his bond and a man was either a man of truth or a liar and a liar was shunned as was a rattle-snake. Today we have many refined means of dishonesty.

Education and appreciation for the fine arts are neither what they once were nor what they should be. I am amazed at the number of young people who graduate from our high schools today lacking the ability to formulate and write a simple paragraph.

We have lost an appreciation for the fine arts. We gaze in wonder at the Statue of Liberty but we have forgotten that there was a time when men etched bodies in the night that they might study muscle and bone structure to better enable them to sculpture and paint the human form.

Have you looked at our magazine stands and book racks lately? Isn't it time we called junk, "junk?"

II. Our Basic Morality—Ours is a Hollywood morality that places a premium on infidelity. We have worshipped Elizabeth Taylor and others like her as sex-goddesses when we should declare them ill.

We have bowed at the altar of sex and we have reaped a harvest of infidelity, un-wed mothers, broken homes and sex deviates.

Marital fidelity is too "old-fashioned" for our times. You see, we have the amazing spectacle of a situation in which if two people choose life time mates—if they do the normal thing, they are considered abnormal.

Henry Fordham, in the book, Marriage for Moderns, which has become an outstanding text in its field, has said:

"Modern marriage is like a sack, the stakes of which have been pulled out one by one, each time making it more vulnerable to wind and storm."

No wonder that at the close of the Civil War only one of thirty-six marriages ended in divorce while today one of three or four do.

Our entertainment is filthy. "Movies are better than ever," they have said, but the truth of the matter is that they are dirtier than ever. The movie industry got into financial hot water and found that they could fill the movie houses by making films of incest, prostitution, infidelity, nymphomania, homosexuality, seduction and nudity. "All this and popcorn, too," someone has said.

I ask you tonight, "Who is tampering with the soul of America?" We must re-visit a morality which is basic to the welfare of our spiritual life.

III. Sacredness of the Home—We hear a great deal of juvenile delinquency today but the truth of the matter is that the great neglect is in parental delinquency. The greatest misdeed you can do your child is to always give him everything he wants and never punish him for fear he will grow up to have a warped personality. You are certain to rear him to a warped personality if you do that. The Bible still says that when we spare the rod we spoil the child and that "foolishness is bound in the heart of a child; but the rod of correction will drive it far from him." (Prov. 22:15).

We have felt that better homes will be built when we build better persons but we seem to have forgotten that better persons are only made through the redemptive purposes of God. We have said that to build better tenements will guarantee better tenants. We have felt that to educate a thief would lift him into integrity and honesty. The truth is that to educate a thief of pennies would only guarantee that he could now steal thousands or millions, for his basic nature has not been changed. He still has the heart of a thief. But when the redemptive purposes of God have been at effect his heart has been changed. The heart of a thief has been replaced with the heart of a God-fearing man.

IV. A Strong Religious Faith—You who attend this service are the "cream of the crop" of Christians from your churches and you know as well as I that today's church is largely removed from the mainstream of American life. This is due, in part, to the reluctance of the church to face vital issues. It is busy answering questions no one is asking any more. It has refused, in the main, to become involved in race, civil rights, and social issues. We have seen the hungry and have not fed them. We have seen those who are sick and in prison and have not visited them. We have criticized and condemned the un-wed mother but we have been reluctant to lay the claim of Christ upon her heart and then, in turn, to help her lay claim to a new life for herself and her baby.

We have been busy at the task of oiling the machine and have not stopped to realize that the machine has long since stopped producing.

We have, as Isaiah said, served up wine mixed with water and the result is an unpalatable Christian faith.

We have never, as Jeremiah said, that has become dross and then we wonder where our might and strength have gone.

Or as Jowett asked of some young preachers fifty years ago: "Do we see the fireworks and miss the stars . . . ? Do we indicate the way, not to be found in it . . . ? Have we left our noontide lights in the study to go out into the streets with lanterns dark and dingy . . . ?"

And so is the condemnation against our churches today. We have built a mighty organization. We have seen, as it were from a valley of dry bones, bones come to

bone, and a covering of flesh and skin, but we have been content to see the mighty body still and prone on the ground, lifeless, spiritless and powerless.

For a long while I have been concerned over the sabotage of our faith. Movements like the "God is dead" group, itself now about dead, have attempted to undermine all that we know and cherish and love as a part of our Christian faith. In its time German rationalism, barren materialism and sterile secularism has made the same attempt.

Even many of our schools of theology today are teaching an empty faith. I do not criticize an institution about which I know nothing, for I am a product of the largest Protestant Seminary in the world.

and I did not graduate from it in a past generation but in the present decade—and I am still doing some graduate research work. But I know that if the present trend continues we can expect to reap dead churches, dead members, dead seminaries, and dead preachers.

My Christian friends, we must re-visit and re-evaluate and critically analyze who we are and where we are and what we are and where we are going. And when we do we must come back to the biblical imperative of "thus said the Lord."

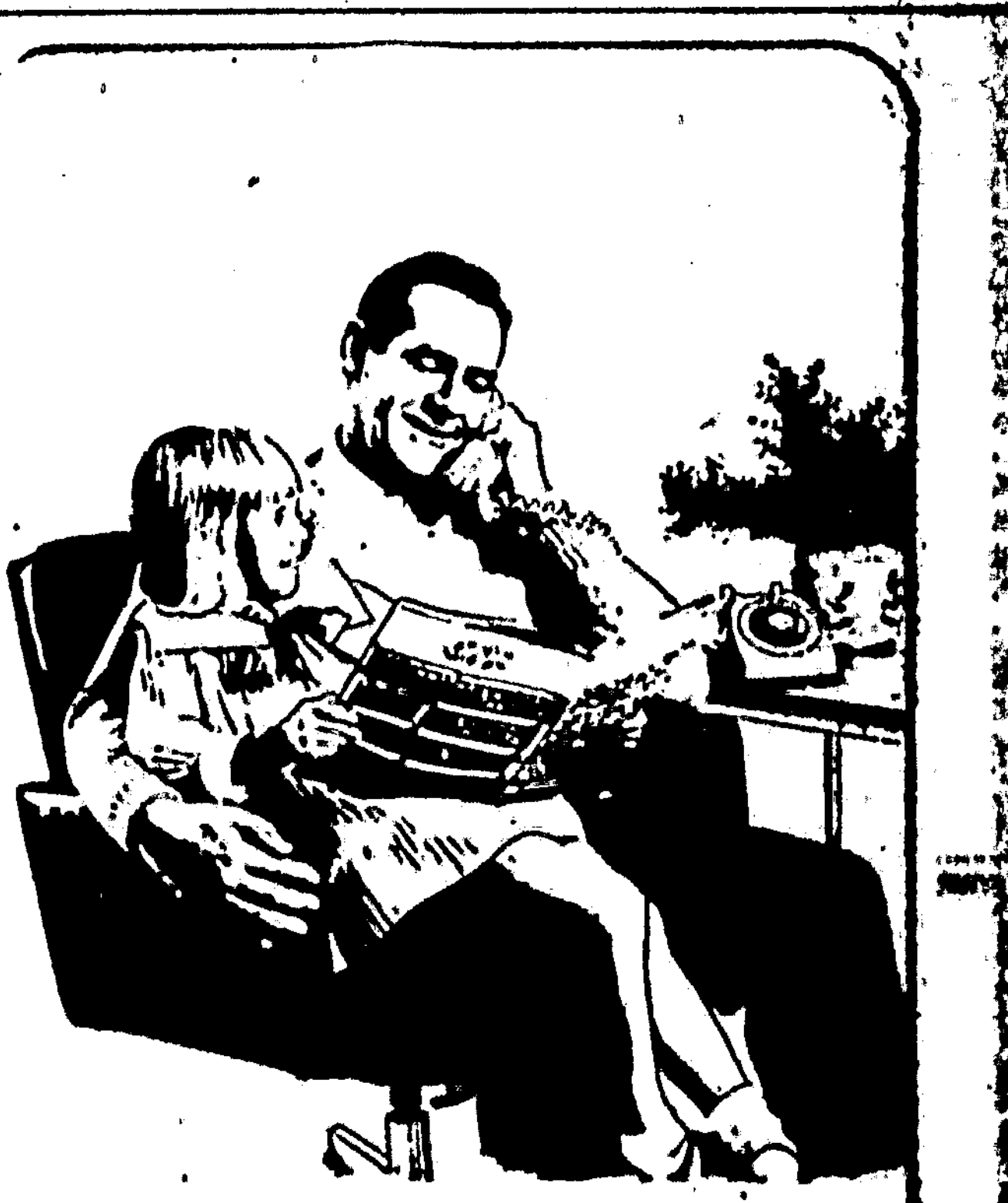

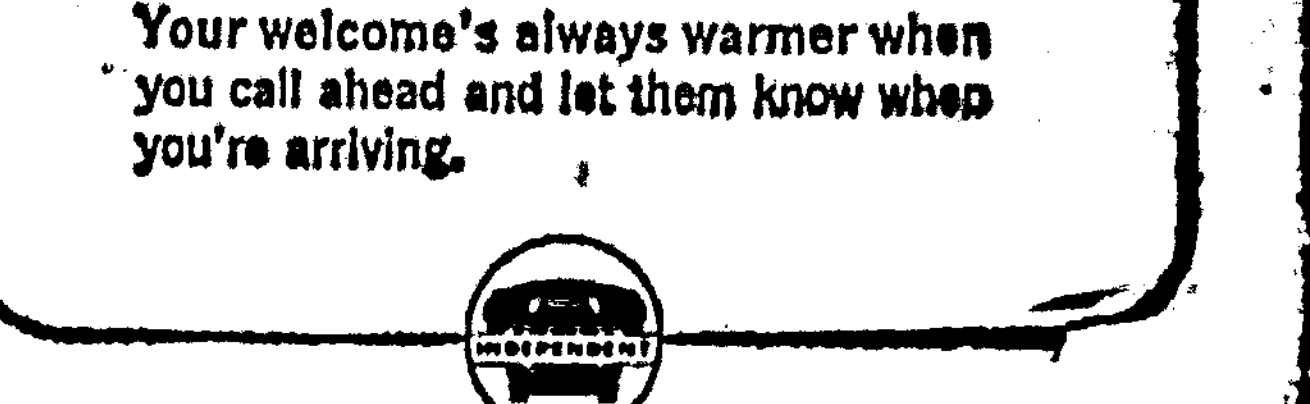

County Agent's Report

"Trunk Deeds" are one of the big problems in obtaining a clear or marketable land title in some areas of Lincoln County. The practice of early settlers of keeping the deed in a trunk in the family home gave rise to this term. In the trunk it was often lost or destroyed by fire or flood. The deed was never recorded in the county courthouse. A broken chain of title is the result of an unrecorded deed. Unless ownership can be proved on a given piece of land, a marketable title cannot be given. Without a marketable title you cannot borrow money.

If you need help with your land title, contact anyone of the County Technical Action Panel and they will be glad to help. They are: Howard Harker, Soil Conservation Service in Carrizozo; Dick Beaulieu, Forest Service in Capitan; Ralph Dunlap, County Agent in Carrizozo; Dave Sease, Farmers Home Administration in Roswell, and Bill Trammell of ASCS in Carrizozo.
