



Money made so far by the group of 30 Ruidoso High students for their planned tour of England in the summer of 1968, totals in the neighborhood of \$200, and it has come from such fund raising projects as ticket sales to a movie sponsored by the Lincoln County Art Association, several bake sales in local groceries, baby sitting and the sale of fireplace wood. Folks with pine trees, Christmas trees, old hot water tanks, used tires or other large items that the Park-Mor garbage trucks of the Village of Ruidoso sanitary department usually can't handle, will be picked up Monday and Tuesday next week in a flatbed truck and hauled away, it was announced this week. "Put the objects near your garbage cans if you want them removed," it was advised... Village municipal sales tax collections of 10 on the dollar retail sales were down for November last year from the same month in 1966—a drop of from \$5,557.50 to \$5,049.21... The cash for a federal grant to Ruidoso to help implement the huge new sewer assessment district which covers 18 subdivisions and a little more than 1,000 jobs—and planned to be engineered in 1967, has been set aside now awaiting Ruidoso's call, a telegram to village officials said this week. The proposed district was set up last year, but the estimated cost for property owners was higher than deemed feasible at that time. The next estimate is expected to be somewhat lower and a hearing on it will be advertised so property owners may learn the estimate per lot to be served sometime early this year... ### Thermometer Hits 21 Below

A new low temperature mark for this winter was recorded at the Ruidoso Municipal Airport's weather station Sunday morning. It dipped to 21 below zero shortly before dawn. The lowest mark recorded in the winter of a year ago was 16 below zero. C. A. Culver, co-operative observer here for the Department of Commerce U. S. Weather Bureau here has reported. His instruments are located adjacent to the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce building in Two Rivers Park on Sudderth Drive. While the airport weather gauge recorded 21 below zero, Culver's equipment recorded only 4 below for Sunday morning, Monday, when the airport recorded 10 below. Culver's equipment had it 2 below. This is a frequent occurrence in Ruidoso—some valleys, or canyons having colder "pockets" of air than others—and the area near the Rio Ruidoso generally always recording warmer temperatures. Culver's records show the coldest weather here he has recorded was 28 below zero on Feb. 1 in 1951 and 24 below zero on Dec. 24, 1953.

### FOOD STAMPS ARE SUBJECT OF MEETING

Grocers and other food retailers in Lincoln County will discuss the U. S. Department of Agriculture's food stamp program at a meeting scheduled Tuesday, Jan. 17. The meeting will be held at 8:00 p.m. at the American Legion Hall in Ruidoso. If you sell groceries, meat, fruits, vegetables, bakery goods or dairy products you will want to attend this meeting, officially recommended. Purpose of the meeting is to explain the food stamp program to retail and wholesale grocers. The success of the Food Stamp Program will depend largely on the understanding and cooperation of the grocers. The Food Stamp Program is operated jointly by the New Mexico Department of Public Welfare, the County Welfare Office and USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service. Under this program eligible families can use USDA food coupons like cash to buy food. They must buy coupons equal to the money they normally spend for food. Then, they receive additional coupons without cost. The amount is determined by the size of the family, its income, resources and other factors.

### Last Payment On Judgment At Ruidoso Downs

The last installment on a \$4,170.66 judgment against the village of Ruidoso Downs was paid last month, Mrs. Beadie Sewell, village clerk reported this week. The final payment, ordered by the trustees to save interest, figured \$1,179.16, she said. The judgment was secured by William Matolan & Associates in district court action in August of 1965, and a tax levy was ordered assessed against property in the village to pay it. The judgment was for engineering fees for a water system in Ruidoso Downs.

### ARTS, CRAFTS STUDIO TO BE IN GALLERY

Persons interested in painting or engaged in making crafts, such as wood carving, etc., are invited to use the Ruidoso Art Association's downtown art gallery in the Brunell Building on Sudderth Drive each Saturday afternoon from 2 to 5 p.m. They may bring their own materials and work there—and there will be no instruction by teachers—but those studying the various hobbies they are following may advise one another. This was a recommendation by a committee given the Lincoln County Art Association in its dinner meeting held Tuesday night at High Country Lodge, president David Travis reported. ## Juveniles Ordered To Detention

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**Lincoln County's Friend Gets Kicked Around . . .**

Just because David F. Cargo received a majority of votes in Lincoln County as well as in Ruidoso is no sign the voters of Lincoln County wanted him to make a political scapegoat of State Highway Commission Chairman John Sudderth. Goaded into a patently political smear of Sudderth by those disgruntled Albuquerqueans who haven't received EVERY foot of highway and EVERY dollar in improvements they have asked for, Cargo needn't think that Sudderth isn't held in mighty high regard by many hundreds of New Mexicans outside the Bernalillo county seat. Cargo isn't doing himself any justice by his attacks on Sudderth—there are many, many people in this state who know Sudderth is doing an honest and a very good job for the state as a whole. Sudderth has seen the need of highway improvements in this area—and in other areas of the state outside of Albuquerque that would benefit the state as a whole, economically and practically, sometimes even before the residents of the area benefitted realized those needs. This is true of some state roads, in particular, in this tourist attraction region, and in other parts of the state as well. Cargo will come out second best in this planned "scandal" in the highway department. The reaction won't be what he is being led to believe by some of his advisors. Sudderth has a fine record, and has made the state an exceptionally good "hired hand" in the work he was named to do. It is interesting to note that Sudderth is just as hard at work today on plans for our state travel needs as before the unsavory publicity that has been manufactured in some instances. He has judged the smears for what they are and is not letting them deter him. Those folks who believe as we do are invited to clip this and mail it to our highway chairman with remarks of your own telling of your support of him.

**Something To Thrill Visitors to New Mexico . . .**

The Ruidoso News editor, during the holiday break, enjoyed a new thrill now offered to New Mexicans and tourists visiting our state. We rode the fabulous Sandia Peak Tram that leaps up the west face of the Sandia mountains from its lower terminal in the outskirts of Albuquerque. The cable car ride carries two large gondolas from the valley floor up an incline to one peak and then across to the crest—almost three miles total length. The cars travel a mile and a half on one clear span over a valley between the peak and the crest—and are 3,000 feet above the floor of the canyon. On our ride we spotted three herd of deer—and saw some very beautiful mountain scenery—as well as gained a view of all of central New Mexico along the Rio Grande river valley, and the city of Albuquerque, too. A restaurant is at the crest. It has a capacity of several hundred people. It is at the upper terminal of a ski chair lift for skiers wanting to use the trails on the east side of the Sandias. Skiers can get a package deal—tram ride to the upper terminal and use of the chair lifts on the far side.

The Sandia tram has been the subject of several discussions by our city council on prospects of a similar means of transportation from Ruidoso into White Mountain Park where our beautiful Sierra Blanca area is located. The Sandia tram ride is such that some people will not ride it—it is frightening to a few folks. Such a ride through the foothills of Old Baldy into White Mountain Park would be equally as beautiful, and not near as scary to its riders. The one at Albuquerque cost \$2 million and was financed with private funds. It seldom has a slack day—carrying loads of from 20 to 50 persons each carload on a regular schedule—and it looks like it should pay for itself within a short time. The value of such an installation here is hard to measure, but it certainly is worth every effort to try and develop. It would provide an extra attraction for our vacationers year round, and could very well provide a boost in numbers of skiers. The Albuquerque tram saves skiers a long auto ride into the ski area there—and the same advantage would be gained here.

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

## Transportation of Students Becomes More Complex Each Year

(Editor's Note: This is the first of a series of articles to be written for the Ruidoso News at our request by Ruidoso Municipal School Superintendent George F. White. The articles will appear from time to time and will touch on various aspects of the school system and its operation.)

 (Ruidoso Municipal School Supt.)  
 The problem of transporting children to and from school is becoming more complex each year. The number of children to be transported is constantly increasing and traffic is changing rapidly. In order to insure maximum safety to those riding school buses, it is necessary that children and parents co-operate in this effort.

There is no substitute for training to develop safe habits in pedestrian and vehicular traffic. Much of this can be done prior to a child's entering school and carried on through the years.

School children in Ruidoso are provided with the safest equipment possible. Drivers are trained, not only in operating procedures, but in many related areas. However, to insure maximum safety, there are certain practices which must be followed by each bus rider.

Your Board of Education has adopted the following rules for school bus transportation to be used in the Ruidoso School System, and it is their wish that parents read the rules, observe them and see that children are given instructions to their responsibilities.

### SCHOOL BUS TRANSPORTATION

#### SECTION 4—

(4.1) Legal Distance:  
 Distances established by state law are: One mile, one way, for elementary pupils, grades 1 through 6, one and one-half miles, one way, for junior high pupils, grades 7 through 9; and two miles one way, for senior high pupils, grades 10 through 12.

(4.2) Definition of terms used in school bus transportation:

a. **PUBLIC ELEMENTARY**—Usually grades 1 through 6. However, if elementary school includes grades 7 and/or 8, include them.

b. **PUBLIC JUNIOR HIGH**—Usually grades 7 through 9. However, if the school organization includes only grades 7 and 8, list accordingly.

c. **PUBLIC SENIOR HIGH**—Usually grades 10 through 12. However, if grade 9 is included, list accordingly. Mid-high—(grades 9 and 10) should also be listed in this category.

(4.3) Hazardous Areas:  
 The board of Education may declare an area hazardous as a result of a highway, or lack of paved roads and transportation may not be provided. The Board of Education may allow children to ride the bus within the one mile limit if the Board declares the area hazardous.

(4.4) Loading and Unloading Children:  
 On a highway with divided roadways school buses should load and unload pupils only on the side of the highway on which they live so that no pupil will be forced to cross the highway to board the bus or to reach home.

(4.5) Feeder Routes:  
 Feeder routes will be established at the discretion of the Director of Transportation at the State level, and by the approval of the Board of Education and reimbursed at rates established by the New Mexico Director of School Transportation.

(4.6) Supervision:  
 The Superintendent shall supervise the transportation facilities in accordance with the policies of the Board of Education and the State Director of School Transportation.

(4.7) Discipline:  
 The following policies are to be observed in riding school buses:

- Teachers will be on duty while buses are loading and unloading.
- Students that ride the school buses shall obey the driver by being courteous and observing the directions and supervision. The driver is in complete charge of the bus and may assign seats.
- There shall be no smoking.

## Local Firemen Warn Of Flammable Dolls

The government has proposed action to remove from the nation's retail stores dolls imported from England and Poland which present a potential hazard because of their flammable, a spokesman for the Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department reported.

The Food and Drug Administration requested the importer, A. D. Sutton & Sons, of New York City, to recall all stocks from retail outlets.

The dolls range in size from 7 to 16 inches. The hair and face are made in part of nitrocellulose, a highly flammable material. The dolls carry a white or blue label with the importer's name and the country of origin.

The FDA has received no reports responsible for items left on the bus.

1. Pupils should not keep the bus waiting.

Any refusal to comply with these rules will cause the student to lose the privilege of riding on the bus for an indefinite period of time, and in extreme violations, for the remainder of the school year. A driver may refuse to allow a student to ride the bus at any time in case of misconduct while waiting on the bus.

2. Pupils should not keep the bus waiting.

3. Pupils are not to molest other pupils while waiting for the bus, and the same rule applies while riding the bus.



### Less Thefts, Accidents Here In 1966

There were fewer traffic accidents and less thefts in Ruidoso in 1966 as compared with the year before. Cost of operating the village police department went up slightly, but purchase of two vehicles instead of one, as compared with the former year, and the collection of additional fine money about balanced the figures. In 1966 operations cost \$51,661.80 and in 1965, \$58,324.14. Fines collected in the two years were reported as follows: \$7,588 in 1965 and \$9,589.14 in 1966.

The personnel in 1966 included a village marshal, O. S. Montes, who signed the activities report; a police sergeant, five police officers and three communications officers. Calls on the village's police radio totaled 20,934 and for the state, 16,043—less for the state but more for Ruidoso's system. Telephone calls answered by the dispatcher totaled 8,793 a few more than in 1965.

The local police gave 257 driver's tests; issued 333 citations as compared with 270 the year before, and traveled 110,101 miles, as compared with 98,453 the previous year. Vehicular accidents in 1966 totaled 149, most of them in July and August, and the year before there were 192. Stolen properties totaled 34 in 1966, four being recovered, and two of 62 breaking and entering cases solved. In 1965 stolen properties were 72, with four recoveries, and breaking and entering cases totaled 108, with 16 solved.

Ten missing persons were located, one suicide was recorded, one of 17 vandalism acts were solved. There was one traffic fatality in 1966, and none in 1965. During last year there were 222 prisoners days in jail logged as compared with 288 the year before.

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



### Parcel Post Rates

Advance Jan. 15:

Zip Code Use Urged

Use of Zip Code will make it easier to mail packages after January 15, Area Postmasters declare. New rates and a new system for identifying parcel post zones will go into effect on that date.

The rate increases will average 10 cents a parcel. Starting July 1, the law provides for a series of size and weight increases on packages mailed between first-class offices. The three local area offices are all second class. The size and weight increases will be in five annual steps, the last coming July 1, 1971.

Use of Zip Code in the recipient's address will enable the sender or a mail clerk to quickly determine the proper zone, and thus the rate, for the package. The zones will be based on the distance a parcel travels between the 552 sectional centers in the county.

By consulting a simple chart, which is available at all post offices, the zone can be readily identified because the first three numbers of the Zip Code represent the sectional center. This replaces a method in which a directory often had to be consulted to locate the proper zone for each of the nation's 33,000 post offices.

The new rates will range from 40 cents for a three-pound parcel delivered for local delivery to 60 cents for the same parcel to zone 3 (150 to 300 miles) to \$1.05 to zone 8 (over 1,500 miles). The new zoning method will also apply to air parcel post, catalogs, and to publishers who pay zone rates on the advertising portion of their periodicals.

Area Postmasters noted that all parcels mailed between post offices within the same sectional center will be charged at the first zone rate. There are 35 post offices within the Carrizozo sectional center.

The new rates are expected to provide an additional \$74 million a year for the Post Office Department. The later size and weight increases will add another \$32 million a year. The additional revenue is to help the Department within 4 percent of costs on parcel post as the law requires.
