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

CARL DeBORD RITES HELD HERE TUESDAY


Funeral services for Carl C. DeBord, 65, colorful Ruidoso pioneer businessman, were held here Tuesday afternoon in First Christian Church and burial was in Forest Lawn cemetery with Masonic graveside rites. He died shortly before noon Friday in his room in Cree Manor Apartment-Hotel which he owned. He acquired the property in a recent purchase from the corporation in which he was a member and which built the structure.

DeBord came to Ruidoso in 1944, first operating the Alamo Inn, but moved two years later to Deming where he operated the Roundup Lodge. He owned four other motels there. He became involved in Deming's local government, being elected mayor there for a term, then later as president of the Deming chamber of Commerce. He also built the Flamo Motel in Snyder, Tex. and operated it, later moving to Lubbock. He returned to Ruidoso in 1951 and bought the Navajo Lodge from Lloyd Davis, Sr. He was interested with others in forming Ruidoso Enterprises, Inc., which operated a cable chair lift from a terminal adjacent to Mau-Lee Sweet Shop which lifted passengers to a spot that gave a view of a great part of the Ruidoso area on the slopes of Moon Mountain. The same company developed land acquired at the time the Moon-Mountain project was instituted into a subdivision known as Paradise Canyon, and sold many lots on low down payments and reasonable monthly installments. The Ruidoso Enterprises firm also built Cree Manor. Shortly before his death he had acquired the corporation's land holdings and the motel. He was engaged in planning to place additional land the company owned on the market in three subdivisions, one to include a trailer park on land high above and north of Paradise Canyon.

DeBord was born Nov. 17, 1901 in Slaton, Kansas, the son of John Henry DeBord and Emma Watson DeBord. He was a member of First Christian Church, past president of the Rotary Club, member of Ruidoso Lions Club and member of Masonic Lodge 1111, A.F.M., El Paso. A memorial chapel window in First Christian Church is to be purchased with contributions made by friends in lieu of sending flowers to the funeral.

Survivors include his widow, the former Lois Crittendon; one daughter, Mrs. Carleen Catherine Hill-gendorph of Ft. Devens, Mass.; two sisters, Mrs. Mildred McKinley of El Paso and Mrs. Rozilee Baldwin of Dallas, and three grandchildren. During the services Sunday special vocal selections were rendered by Don Hart, with piano accompaniment by Mrs. Juanita Taylor. Active pallbearers were Lon Meadows, Dick Hobson and Robert Paulson, all of Deming; Howard Jackson, El Paso, and Lloyd Bloodworth, Lloyd Davis, Sr., Tom Hood and Stansell Jones, Ruidoso. Honorary pallbearers were members of the Ruidoso Rotary Club. Funeral details were handled by Lucas-Wooten Chapel of Roses here.

Aztec Airline Announces Scheduled Flights Into Ruidoso



First flight of a new scheduled air service for Ruidoso will be made into and out of this community this week. Aztec Airline of El Paso will begin the regularly scheduled timetable on Feb. 1 with one flight each day six days a week and two flights on Fridays.

The announcement came from Ed Wimberly, a vice-president of Ruidoso State Bank, and Mayor Lloyd L. Davis, Jr., who had been working with officials of the company to secure the air taxi service for several weeks. They became interested when David Winston, president of Aztec said he was asked about flights here to connect with American Airlines at El Paso. American Airlines marketing department noted that the Ruidoso resort area was the nearest to any terminal they serve—and the big company wanted to advertise a package ski vacation flight to expand their business. They lacked air connection into Ruidoso from the El Paso terminal, so gave encouragement to a daily schedule here—which could be termed a shuttle service. The Aztec schedules, as reported by Wimberly and Davis, will give Ruidoso connections with both American Airlines and Continental Airlines, which both have flights through El Paso. First flight out of here Friday will have five Sierra Blanca Junior ski racers and their coach Ray Heid aboard. The youngsters will change from Aztec to Continental Airlines to fly to Loveland, Colo. for Class C giant slalom championship races sponsored there for the entire Rocky Mountain Region of the U. S. Ski Association Saturday and Sunday. With Heid will be Al-fred Pearson, Carey Horton, David Estes, Danny Halladay and Kathryn Campbell. Their selection for the trip was determined in training races held last Sunday on Sierra Blanca courses in which about 40 local youngsters competed.

Juvenile Traffic Cases To Bring License Revocation, Stiff Penalties

District Judge Richard L. Stanlight-15 days revocation of license, has ordered that all juvenile traffic cases in the future be tried in their own locale, with referees to be named to assist in the cases. This would remove them from trials in district courtrooms in the county; in his district—and put them in justice of the peace courts. He also listed a schedule of penalties, with the first order declaring a 15-day minimum revocation of the drivers' licenses on all violations, with added time if the nature of the violation warrants it. In Lincoln County, the referee will be the local probation officer, R. H. Hedgecock. Judge Stanlight listed these classifications and penalties: a. speeding—15 days revocation of license plus 1 day for each mile in excess of speed limit. b. Running Stop Sign and Red Light—15 days revocation of license. c. Careless Driving—30 days revocation of license. d. Hit and Run With No Injuries—30 days revocation of license. e. Driving An Unsafe Vehicle—30 days revocation of license. f. Driving Without A Driver's License In Possession If driver's license is produced at time of Probation Office hearing, then case will be dismissed. All the above penalties will be enforced for first violations. For Second Violation—Double penalty. For Third Violation—Triple penalty. Minor violations like parking or meter violations and no brake and light stickers to be lectured and released on first violation.

County C. of C. Envisioned

A county wide chamber of Commerce to work for industrial development, increased tourist trade, expanding agriculture, better highways, and growth in other fields was envisioned in a meeting of county business leaders in Lincoln Thursday night last week in a discussion following a dinner at the Wortley Hotel. W. G. (Bill) Shreeengost, state representative from Lincoln and Sierra Blanca counties, called the meeting, and he said almost everyone he had invited by letter was present for the conference. The Ruidoso area provided almost half the attendance. Concluding a three-hour round table session, Don Stark, manager of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, was named temporary chairman to call together leaders from all the communities in the county to further survey the prospects, possible gains and potential of a county-wide development organization. Shreeengost said mayors of the organized communities, and heads of clubs or service organizations in others would be asked to name two representatives for another meeting to be held soon to determine the feasibility of the idea proposed in the Lincoln meeting. Shreeengost acted as chairman throughout the meeting, calling on about half those in attendance to express their views of what the county needed. Briefly, these were the speakers and their offering for the group's study: Dr. James A. Beall, Ruidoso, president of Ruidoso Valley C. of C. We need to push for a college in our county, not only for our own children, but to bring students from other areas. Don Stark: We need to push for more tourism, the kind that will keep vacationers here another day or two with tours and recreation in all parts of the county. We need to think county-wide on many development projects.

Mrs. A. N. Spencer, Carrizozo: We need a lake, not only for more water resources but for recreation, too. We need to hire a man to work for all of our county to be working through our ideas such as being proposed. Austin Fritchett, president of the Ruidoso Valley Ambassadors: We need to attract more retired people, Lloyd Davis Jr., mayor of Ruidoso: We need to develop the ski camp at Ft. Stanton. Alton Gray, Ruidoso Downs municipal judge: Better co-operation will build all the communities. Jack Schuster, director of Sierra Blanca Camp for Boys: Our youths are making signs and we have their manpower to help with some projects, even by making signs for whatever need the county might have. Mrs. Pat Ward, curator Lincoln museum: These folks with more leisure hours need to be attracted to our county. Max Oliver, Ruidoso Downs, and Lincoln county commissioner: Better roads are a must if we are to grow. Valton Hall: We need to tell our story to more and more people, and to dress courtesy. Buzz Whitlock, Ruidoso village trustee: Our development hinges on making U. S. 70 an interstate route to pull more people into our area. Jodie Fillemann, Ruidoso village trustee: We need a recreation lake, on which folks can boat and water ski and swim, besides fishing. We need the boat by not having water to put it on. Herb Brunell, Ruidoso village trustee: We need to improve the trucking situation in our county to step up shipments of vital needs quickly; and competitive liquor prices would also stimulate business. Mayor Davis named Stark and Beall as the two people from Ruidoso to sit in on the next conference.





Ken Knapp, operator of Dan Dee Cabins, was among several speaking for the group, and he stressed that there is no serious problem for motel owners at present, that incidents to date have been very few but that other resort areas are beginning to have some problems

of groups of young people involved in willful destruction and vandalism. He said the motel owners wanted to know their rights, how they might apply existing laws and how they might use peace officers in handling any such matters.

Reviewed were procedures by village police, of laws pertaining to juveniles (up to 18 years of age; minors, 18 to 21, and adults, 21 and over); R. H. Hedgecock, Lincoln County district court probation officer; Village Marshal O. S. Montes and Justice of the Peace Austin Pritchett, along with insurance agents Dave Parks and J. H. Cooper, each told of their part in assisting motels, or in represent-

ing young people, when an incident occurs. Hedgecock pointed out that he was not supposed to make investigations, nor file charges, that motel owners, or police, could do the latter. He told of his rights in holding young people in detention, and his part in attempting to get parents or guardians to pay for losses if such occur.

## Your Minister Writes . . .

Mescalero Reformed Church,  
Moccasins For Jesus)

The American Indian has little reason to put his hope and faith in the white man's religion (some white men are Christians) since all that he had was taken from him. Yet this story of an Indian's faith in Christ comes from Indian Highways, a publication from The Charles H. Cook Training School which trains Indian church leaders and offers a college program in conjunction with Arizona State University.

The late Dr. W. A. Felzold, missionary for a lifetime on the Montana Crow Reservation, used to tell the story of his friend Shows A Fish. Shows A Fish stayed out of the Kingdom of God for a long time, but one summer declared if God spared his life until the first snow of winter made a white blanket on the ground he would come into the "Jesus Road." The first snow began to fall on a Saturday night, and when time came for the Sunday morning service in the Little Horn valley, the foothills were all under a great white blanket. Through the storm to the church house came Shows A Fish. The only indication that he might be thinking of the vow he had made in the summertime was the fact that he had on a clean shirt.

He sat unmoved, unperurbed until the time for the invitation at the close of the service. He stood slowly and walked deliberately to the front of the meeting room. With the missionary he prayed and surrendered his life to Jesus Christ.

The uneducated, gaunt, seventy-year old veteran of wars, adopt with perspiration on his brow and moisture in his eyes. With great effort equal to any battle with soldiers he gave his first testimony for Christ; and until his death he showed himself one of the strongest and most dependable of Christians among his Crow people.
